
"How Will I Know If I'm Called To Be An Elder?"

In the Reformed (Presbyterian) Tradition, our ordination as Pastor, Elder or Deacon is recognized to be among equals that are distinguished by function, not hierarchically. We further believe that the more people involved in a decision, the less likely the decision will be manipulated by one person, hence our emphasis upon committees under the direction of the Holy Spirit...

That is why in the Call to Ordination as either Minister of Word and Sacrament (pastor), Elder or Deacon; we discern the "call" by three means. The first means of discernment is the "outward call". Where the church seeks out and identifies those who give evidence of their faith in their daily lives and relationships. The second means of discernment is the "inward call". Where she/he surrenders to God's overwhelming love and struggles with God's choosing to use them as his faithful servants. The third means of discernment is by the Church's Session, who has the

responsibility to raise up and prepare new leaders for their particular Church. Your "call" to ordination is filled with joy, trepidation and confirmation...

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Session representatives, will present at the Annual

Since the KNIT FOR KIDS PROJECT was introduced to FPC Mission by the Chancel Choir 3 years ago, more than 300 sweaters have been knitted or crocheted by this church and its friends. The sweaters are sent to the World Vision Organization to be distributed to

needy children around the world.

In addition to this project, the choir is also participating in another knitting project called LITTLE PEOPLE. Small colorful dolls are being knitted and contributed to soldiers, firefighters, police, and EMT personnel who give them to children in traumatic situations.

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"Am I Qualified To Be An Elder?"

The obvious answer to the question of being qualified, is that you are as qualified to lead the Church as Moses was to lead the Hebrews...or the disciples were qualified to lead the church in Jerusalem. Instead, Ephesians 4:12 tells us that those who are given to the church as its leaders are "to equip the saints for the work of ministry..." Eldership is all about "OJT", On the Job Training- being coached by the existing Elders.... More than the gifts that we all bring to our call to leadership in the church is the need for us to be "teachable...trainable...moldable" in Jesus' hands.

1 Timothy 3:1-7, Titus 1:5-9 both give us the qualities of life and faith that God desires: above reproach, an apt teacher, strong faith, self-controlled, hospitable, as caring of church as their own family. The closer you walk with God, the more God will rub off on you... So that like Moses whose appearance was changed because of the time he spent with God on Mt. Sinai: that's being qualified!!!

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A Sunday School Update...

Back in October the kids in both the Pre-K/Kinder and the Elementary classes learned the story of the widow's mite (Luke 21:1-4). We had a conversation about how her offering of two small coins made very little sound when they went in the offering box (compared to the noise of pouring in a bagful of a rich man's heavy coins). We discovered that she was poor and her offering did not add up to much at all. But, more importantly, we also learned that she gave gladly and out of

love...and that made God very happy.



In Sunday School, we often come up with ways that we can serve God with our whole selves...our time, our energy, our words, our prayers, etc. When we read Luke 21:1-4, we found out that another way that we can choose to serve God is by giving monetary gifts. We talked about how, by giving to God, we can also show God's love and care to others.

During the children's sermon that morning, the kids got to take a look at the offering plates that are used in worship. They saw that adults can worship God by giving an

offering, just like we had discussed, and they became excited about bringing an offering to Sunday School. A piggy bank and a jar (one that counts the coins as they pass through the lid...oh my, this is most thrilling!) were brought in for the kids to use for their offering.

We recently finished our fall quarter of Sunday School and celebrated that \$18.37 had been given as an offering! The children enthusiastically voted to support the "Child and Family Health Fund" through World Vision. Their offering will go toward a fund that will "help local experts provide services such as training for health workers, provision of medical supplies, and delivery of critical care based on each community's specific needs." They took this decision VERY seriously and are really excited about it!

Their desire to be generous is overwhelming and the kids decided that, this quarter, the offering will be given to the "Shelter and Clothing Fund" of World Vision. Through their involvement with Su Casa de Esperanza, Christmas

baskets, Pennies from Heaven, the local animal shelter, their schools, and more, the kids already are actively, and eagerly!, serving others (and animals) in our community and now they're also sharing God's love with God's people all over the world! Thank you, Sunday School classes!!

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The Allstate Foundation and Channel One News Challenge Sharyland High School Students and the Community to "X the TXT" for \$10,000

Partnership to elevate awareness of the dangers of texting while driving; empowers students to help save lives

The Allstate Foundation and Channel One News, the leading television news network for teens, announced a pledge competition for students to "X the TXT" and stay focused behind the wheel. High school librarians Nicole Cruz and Janie Flores received permission from campus principal Diamantina Chapa to register Sharyland High School to compete in this important safety awareness competition. The week-long online competition will launch Feb. 7, 2011 on the Channel One website http://www.channelone.com/xthetxt/ Only pledges received online from Monday, February 7, 2011 to Sunday, February 13, 2011 will count towards winning the competition.

"Students can get involved with X the TXT online and on-the-ground by asking their friends, family,

and fellow students to take the pledge not to text and drive," said Susan Duchak from The Allstate Foundation. "In partnership with Channel One News, the X the TXT student program gives teens the chance to talk about the dangers of distracted driving and tell their community to keep their thumbs off their phones and their eyes on the road."

As part of National Youth Traffic Safety Month in May 2011, The Allstate Foundation will reward the winning school with a \$10,000 grant and, together with Channel One, will host a private concert featuring rising music star Ashlyne Huff (www.ashlynehuff.com; www.facebook.com/ashlynehuff) and a taping of a Channel

One newscast from the winning school. Ashlyne, whose music has been heard recently on hit MTV shows like *The Hills* and *World Of Jenks*, is currently putting the final touches on her new album due out in Spring 2011.

"Sharyland High School was one of the first 200 schools to register to participate. The campus collaboration from teachers to police officers to student clubs and organization is going to make this effort a success," according to Nicole Cruz. Nicole is one of our FPC elders.

"X the TXT is an important program that is making an impact through education and by featuring influential voices who reinforce the significant risks that come with dangerous behaviors while driving," said Kent Haehl, CEO, Channel One Network. "By helping The Allstate Foundation bring its message directly to students in our schools, Channel One can lend a hand in making a difference to a population at greater risk and by means that we hope will not only create a positive movement within the school environment, but also extend the message into the community."

The school-focused X the TXT initiative marks the third year of Channel One News and The Allstate Foundation's working together to educate and inform young adults on critical issues related to safe and responsible driving.





We will recognize the obvious that we are in a rapidly changing world where our "Vision" is
