First, we would like to thank you for your generous contributions to the Christmas food baskets.

Second, we would also like to thank all the volunteers who came out and braved the cold, wet weather to purchase, pack and deliver the food.

We collected \$7,235.00 in donations and were able to purchase food for the **40 families** at almost \$200.00 per family! We spent \$7,793.58. A large group met at Sam's Club in Pharr on Thursday the 8th at 6:00 pm. We completed the purchase and were back at the Church to unload before 7:00 pm. Amazing how quickly we can shop for 40 families!!

On Friday the 9th, we met in the fellowship hall at 7:00 pm to start sorting the food, so each family would receive 1 of each of the items.

What fun. Then on the worst Saturday in a very long time, a bunch of brave souls gathered once again in the Fellowship Hall. Each group that was delivering, picked names and loaded up and left to deliver. Some of these Santa elves had to return to deliver to additional families. Some families we had names for were either not home or the addresses were unable to be found, but the food was then distributed to another family that needed it.

This is such a worthwhile project, and I hope it will continue in the future, as this is my last year on the Session. Someone else will be found to take over and will have a wonderful crew of volunteers to work with.

Thank you so much for all the money and time everyone put in. I cannot thank you enough.

If you didn't participate this year, maybe next year you will be able to help out.





CLERK'S CORNER: History of the Church...

The Planning Committee has been working on a church history project for the last several years. The following is the conclusion of the history of First Presbyterian Church Mission, compiled through the years....



Fast forward to the decades of the 80s, 90s, and 2000s – to meet another interesting and influential person involved with the Church – Pastor Don Owens. Don preached his sermons at the church for twenty three years from 1986 through 2009, entertained the congregation with his “true stories,” and helped guide the church to a new age of growth, evangelism, and outreach.¹⁹

While the Mission Presbyterian “Church’s One Foundation” has surely been in one continuous firm spiritual existence for over 100 years, its physical existence has been housed in three distinct separate physical plants. Like the 1953 planned campaign, another building campaign was launched in 2004 – but this time, the campaign was not by choice. The Church had been set on fire by four teenagers in January 2004. Thankfully, no lives were lost in the fire. Pastor Don Owens wrote in February 2005, “On January 16th, 2004 our hearts were broken over the destruction of our Sanctuary. On January 16th, 2005 our hearts were happy to break ground for our new Sanctuary. Today, you are invited to be a part of the campaign to ‘Rebuild God’s House.’¹⁹

On August 14, 2005, “God’s House Rebuilt,” a service of dedication of the new sanctuary, was held with members of the Church and community attending. The new sanctuary has 12,000 square feet and seats 550 people, compared to the 1955 structure with 4200 square feet and a seating capacity of 300. Total Construction Costs were \$1,474,000, funded by insurance proceeds and over \$650,000 of private donations. This Church is one of very few Presbyterian churches owned by the local congregation – it is not owned by Presbytery, and it is fully paid for, with no outstanding debt against it. Records, photos, and articles describing the rebuilding campaign are contained in historical records of the church.^{19,20}

Even though the physical plant has changed throughout the Church’s first century of history, some physical items from the first two structures still remain and are displayed in the new 2005 building. In the narthex of the church is the pew where President Eisenhower worshipped – it is marked with a plaque, and is located between the nursery and the parlor. Worshipers enjoy sitting here each Sunday between services.

A tribute to the former pastors who have served the church since its founding can be seen in the unusual windows on the east side of the sanctuary. These windows feature stained glass alternates with clear in diamond shaped panes. Inscribed in each colored pane are the names and dates of the ministry of pastors. In the years to come, the names of succeeding pastors will be etched on the windows. These windows were designed and installed as a memorial to Mrs. J. Hopson, church member at time of her death in 1954.²¹

The eight stained glass windows from the 1955 structure, set in cut limestone, have been preserved and are located on the north and south sides of the sanctuary. Two of the windows were given as memorials while the other six windows were gifts of active members at the time of 1955 building. All of these windows depict important Old and New Testament incidents. They are marked with descriptive plaques.²²

The Official Seal of the Presbyterian Church, U.S., formerly adorning the façade of the 1955 church sanctuary above the entrance now rests proudly

on the east side of the church plant housing church offices and classrooms. The Seal faces the play yard recently installed in 2011. This location is appropriate, as the seal was originally donated in 1956 by Mr. and Mrs. Weaks Martin in memory of their young son, Tom Dumas Martin (1932-1934).²³

In the narthex of the present church, there is a cabinet donated in honor of Roscoe and Betty Watkins, long-time members of the church, which displays some of the Church's tangible pieces of history. A Communion Token, struck to commemorate the fiftieth anniversary of the First Presbyterian Church of Mission, Texas, is contained here. The obverse of the Token shows an exterior view of the 1955 church and the reverse shows the center view of the 1955 chancel area. This token was presented to each member in 1960 in TRUST as a reminder of a link in the chain of heritage as Presbyterians.²⁴ A detailed description of the historical significance of this token can be found in church histories and records located in this display cabinet. A signed copy of *Border Trails*, written by the Church's organizing minister, Dr. Glasgow, also resides in this cabinet.

Finally, a tangible symbol of this Church's continued existence through the past 101 years can be found in the form of a candle, located on one of the display cabinet shelves. It comes from the altar table of the building at the time of the fire. It is unblemished and not melted, in spite of the flames and smoke surrounding it on that evening of January 16, 2004. This candle serves as a reminder to First Presbyterian Church worshippers that God's love is never ending and the call to do His work cannot be brought down by earthly acts.

III. Significance

First Presbyterian Church, Mission, Texas, was founded in 1910 to provide spiritual guidance to Protestants settling in this rough, previously unsettled portion of our country. It was founded to offer people of all denominations a place to come, spiritually refuel and refresh and most importantly, hear God's word, and do His work. Throughout the past 101 years, the Church has done His work and been a vital part of the Mission Community. Outreach programs have consistently been part of this Church's history, from the early days of sending citrus fruit from trees donated by church members to orphanages to active participation in Su Casa De Esperanza, Pennies from Heaven, Agape Christian School, Food Baskets, Mission Service Projects, Mission Food Pantry, and Hosting of work groups to provide housing for the poor in the Rio Grande Valley.¹⁹

One of the most continuous and important ministries of the Church has been its music ministries – starting in 1909, with Dr. Glasgow's wife and her portable organ, to present day programs attracting people of all denominations. Present day music programs include organists, chancel choir, instrumental ensembles, Sun Shine Players Youth Drama and Music, Bells of Hope and Faith, and Celebration Sunday Concerts. There are numerous historical memorabilia and descriptive pictures and writings located in the narthex of the church describing the music and other important outreach programs and ministries of our church.¹⁹

There is an expression – “things come full circle, and the cycle begins again.” While the first century of the Church has ended, the beginning of the second century of First Presbyterian Church Mission Texas continues the legacy brought by its founder Dr. Glasgow, in 1910.... “Oh to Seize and Mould the Day.”

The attendance at the December potluck luncheon didn't have quite as many people as we've had before, so let's turn it around in January! January 8 in the



