Spokane Community Colleges first year Respiratory Care program began with 22 students and currently has 20 students left in the program. First year students are currently in their second clinical quarter and are becoming more comfortable in the clinical setting. This quarter's clinical sites are held at 4 of the major hospitals in the Spokane area (SHMC, Deaconess,

Holy Family, and KMC). Students have been learning and practicing: Non-Invasive and Invasive mechanical ventilation as well as Arterial punctures. SCCs RT program has also become more involved in CPR club; making up 50% of the CPR club and training new students coming in to the many medical programs SCC has to offer. CPR club is very active and is continuously doing food drives and participating in Family Fun Nights held on campus. In return for being a part of CPR club and assisting in the many hours of CPR trainings, the club paid for the RT students admission fee and hotel rooms this year at the RCSW meeting. This year 32 out of SCCs 36 current RT students were able to attend the RCSW state conference that was held in April at the Hilton. First year students are excited to end another quarter and begin summer clinical where they will complete 13 clinical hours per day at 3 days a week, equaling 39 clinical hours a week. During this summer, First year students will have the chance to gain more knowledge about mechanical ventilation and arterial blood draws; along with becoming more efficient in the skills they have already acquired. Summer Clinical sites will consist of SHMC, Deaconess, Holy family, KMC, Valley Hospital and Northern Idaho Advanced Care Hospital.

The goal of the TCC respiratory club is to spread awareness of respiratory diseases within our local community.

We are involved in several on-campus events, such as health/club fairs, the great American smoke-out, and the drive for COPD. At these events, we reach out to our

peers about topics like smoking cessation, COPD, and asthma. We offer students and teachers brochures, pamphlets, and flyers that have information and resources. Other things we love to display at our events are our 'Clem's Phlegm' jar, which show the amount of phlegm a COPD patient coughs up, and our pig lungs, showing the difference between smoker and nonsmoker lungs. We'll also display therapeutic devices like flutter valves, inhalers with spacers, and incentive spirometry. If students are interested, we have disposable mouthpieces they can use to test the equipment with.

This past March, we held a mini 4X4 respiratory conference at TCC. We invited 4 speakers to talk on various topics in respiratory care. We thought this was a fun and worthwhile event that we hope to continue.

In addition, the TCC respiratory club is also involved in many off-campus events. We work with several professional organizations to volunteer at their events. For example, we've worked with the ALA at the fight for air climb and lung force walk and the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation's Great Strides walk. At these events, we volunteered beforehand by passing out flyers and hanging posters up at local gyms, businesses, and at TCC. We then worked at the events as monitors to watch and aid participants who were in distress.

As a club, we believe that working in our community is worthwhile, because we get to support others and make connections with people in our profession.

On Monday, April 13th, 2015, students nearing graduation representing each of the five respiratory programs in the state attended a special session organized by the Respiratory Care Society of Washington (RCSW) leadership. Educators, managers, nationally renowned speakers as well as RCSW leaders were on hand to offer advice to those on the verge of entering the respiratory work force.


