

During this past year the students, teachers, administrators, alumni and supporters of Archdiocese of Chicago Catholic Schools experienced significant developments in the areas of leadership, vitality, academic excellence, and strategic management.

Leadership

The Office of Catholic Schools welcomed a new superintendent as Sr. M. Paul McCaughey, former President of Marian Catholic High School in Chicago Heights assumed the role on July 1. According to Cardinal George, "Sr. Mary Paul has both the professional experience and leadership qualities that are necessary to take responsibility for the future of our Catholic elementary and high schools."

Vitality

Sr. Mary Paul is now at the helm of a system witnessing the first increase in Catholic schools in 42 years, as all schools have remained open for the second consecutive year and with the opening of the new Christ the King Jesuit College Preparatory School in Chicago. To make this possible, enormous financial support is provided at the local school level, and the Archdiocese is providing \$7.9 million in operating grants to schools. Additionally, the Big Shoulders Fund www.bigshouldersfund.org is providing nearly \$12 million of assistance to Catholic schools and school families in the most needy areas of inner city Chicago this year. In addition, the Stewardship and Development Department launched a campaign to support Catholic schools, called *Lessons That Last a Lifetime*.

Academic Excellence

Six Archdiocese of Chicago Catholic Schools were named by Secretary Margaret Spellings of the U.S. Department of Education as No Child Left Behind–Blue Ribbon Schools, representing the most from any school system in the nation this year. This is the second consecutive year Archdiocesan Catholic schools have earned the distinction of being the school system with the largest number of No Child Left Behind–Blue Ribbon Schools. Since 2003, a total of 21 Archdiocesan Catholic schools have been designated as No Child Left Behind–Blue Ribbon Schools. This is the most from any school system in the nation under the new guidelines of the award program, which, prior to 2003, was known as the U.S. Department of Education Blue Ribbon Award. Since 1983, Archdiocese of Chicago Catholic Schools have received this distinction on 51 occasions.

Strategic Management

During the past year, the Office of Catholic Schools (OCS) launched a system-wide approach to evaluate the implementation of the Genesis Plan, which is the overall strategic management process for Archdiocese of Chicago Catholic Schools. Specific accomplishments include building capacity for evaluation within OCS, informing the direction of and building a foundation for ongoing evaluation, and gathering baseline data related to progress toward Genesis goals. Individual schools submitted annual goals based on the Genesis action plans.

The following pages detail specific accomplishments, data and progress made according to these action plans in the three focus areas of Catholic Identity, Academic Excellence, and School Vitality.



Catholic Identity

Archdiocese of Chicago Catholic Schools demonstrated Catholic Identity and Mission as seen through key indicators and initiatives from the past year, including:

- Finalizing and disseminating the Religion Curriculum for elementary schools.
- Students conducting over 500,000 hours of Christian service
- Providing ongoing opportunities for worship, prayer and sacramental preparation.
- Welcoming more than 1,000 educators to the annual Catechetical Conference.
- Certifying a total of 467 teachers as Catechists and 67 principals as Coordinators of Religious Instruction.
- Developing a partnership to support Catholic schools in the Diocese of Nsukka in Nigeria.
- Establishing outcome measures to assess the impact of Genesis action plans and implementation in the areas of Apprenticeship in Christian Living, Religion Curriculum and Assessment, Professional Development, Catechetical Certification, and Stewardship.



Academic Excellence


In the Academic Excellence goal area of Genesis, indicators and initiatives that mark progress made in the past year include:

- For the second consecutive year, achieving the most U.S. Department of Education No Child Left Behind - Blue Ribbon Schools (6) of any school system in the United States.
- Educating students who continue to exceed national standardized achievement test norms and using those scores to inform instruction practices.
- Maintaining a high school graduation rate of 98% for the Class of 2008 with over \$150 million in college scholarships offered.
- Receiving national honors from the National Catholic Educational Association (Distinguished Teacher), as well as local honors for the Golden Apple Awards for Excellence in Teaching.
- Revising the Handbook for School Administrators.
- Delivering tools and resources to families to increase their understanding of student assessment.
- Expanding the program offerings of the Archdiocesan Center for Inclusive Education.
- Establishing outcome measures to assess the impact of Genesis action plans and implementation in the areas of Curriculum, Teaching & Learning, Professional Development, Student Assessment, School Evaluation, and Inclusion.




2008 ACT Average Score Comparisons

Average of all Catholic Schools in Archdiocese of Chicago





School Vitality

In the area of Catholic School Vitality, progress was seen through indicators and initiatives of this past year, including:

- Witnessing, for the first time in 42 years, an overall increase in the number of Archdiocese of Chicago Catholic Schools.
- Distributing \$7.9 million in transitional grants to schools for temporary fiscal assistance.
- Certifying 12 elementary school boards of specified jurisdiction that completed an intensive consultation process.
- Scaling up communication and sharing of resources through the OCS Resource Portal (<http://ocs.archchicago.org>)
- Conducting marketing initiatives, including the launch of the Catholic School NewsWire as an online means of highlighting the good news happening in the schools.
- Establishing outcome measures to assess the impact of Genesis action plans and implementation in the areas of Leadership, Fiscal Management, Governance, Alternative Models of Catholic Schools, and Marketing.




