8th grade reminders:

- High schools have posted their Open House and Shadow Days on their websites, I encourage you to begin your search early and to take advantage of the shadow day opportunities.
- Any student interested in the CPS Selective Enrollment High Schools must register for the NWEA test by September 10th. This is the only standardized test that CPS will accept when considering acceptance into their schools.

Medical forms:

All children new to St. Hilary need medical, dental, and vision forms. Preschoolers need medical and vision forms. Kindergarteners need medical and dental forms. 2nd graders need dental forms and 6th graders need medical and dental forms. According to the Illinois State Board of Education students are to be excluded from school by October 15 if these health and immunization requirements have not been met.

ST. HILARY SCHOOL

The Extended Care Program is an extension of the school day and not a traditional day care program. Therefore, it is only open to children attending St. Hilary School and is not available on days when school is not in session or during the summer. As the program is an extension of the school day, appropriate behavior and cooperation are expected from the students in attendance. The students are under the supervision of paid adult personnel. Families may use the program on a regular or as needed basis. For your child's sense of security and the integrity of the program, we ask that parents/guardians strictly adhere to the hours of each session.

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HOURS:

7:00 AM - 7:55 AM

COST:

\$4.00 per day/per child

OVERVIEW:

Students are brought to the main door of the school during session hours.

They remain in the program until the first bell at which time they are dismissed to their homeroom.

AFTER SCHOOL

HOURS: COST: 3:00 PM - 6:00 PM First Wednesdays Only: 1:00 PM - 6:00 PM

All other days based on pick-up times:

OVERVIEW: Students report to the

The session schedule is as follows:

Recreation – outdoors or in the gym

Snack break - students must provide their own after school snack.

Homework/study session

Recreation - indoors; materials and games are provided.

Parents/guardians are requested to come to the school's main entrance to pick up their children

and to sign them out on a daily attendance roster.

HALF DAY

HOURS:

11:30 AM - 6:00 PM

COST: OVERVIEW: \$4.00 @ hour Based on hourly pickup time.

Session schedule is the same as the after school session.

A lunch break is provided; students must bring their own lunch on half days.

Due to the length of half day sessions, videos are used during recreation periods.

Parents/guardians are requested to come to the school's main entrance to pick up their children

and to sign them out on a daily attendance roster.

PAYMENT OF FEES

REGULAR BASIS:

\$150.00 deposit required to begin using the program. This deposit is credited to your account.

Family accounts are then billed twice a month for payment 2 weeks in advance. Families whose

accounts are not kept current will not be able to continue to use the program.

Regular basis is defined as 2 or more days per week morning and/or after school.

AS NEEDED BASIS:

Families who use the program sporadically will be asked to pay on the day of service or on the

Friday nearest the day of service.

DAILY LATE FEES

For the after school and half day sessions, students must be picked up by 6:00 PM.

There is a five minute grace period. After the grace period, there is a \$5.00 per 15 minute late fee. Consistent disregard for the time schedule could result in exclusion from the Extended Care Program.

Please notify the School Office when your children will be using the Extended Care Program so we will know to expect them and include them on the attendance sheet. If you know that you will be using the program on a regular basis, please fill out the below portion and return it to the School Office with your \$150.00 deposit. art 2015-16

The art room is set up and ready to go for the new school year. I am Mrs. Rhodes and I have taught art at St. Hilary for over ten years. I can't wait to get started.

This year we will have a Guess the Artist board. Each week a clue will go up and students will have a chance to guess until all five clues are given, then the artist will be revealed. Hopefully by the end of the year we will know a lot about artists that create contemporary works.

I will also be featuring two student artists every week by hanging their work in the hall. More to come on that when we get going on our projects.

I am also excited to start the year and get our online museum set up through Artsonia. Look for an email or flyer more information soon on your child's gallery.

Students can expect to learn about art history and will be creating many works of art, using different media and techniques.

All students will be studying the elements of art in various ways and exploring many different materials and techniques. Below is a breakdown by grade with examples of some of the projects they will be doing this year.

Pre- K works with clay to help build strength and support fine motor skills. They learn to roll, pinch and coil clay, create small pots and animals. They also explore their imagination through drawing and painting.

Kindergarten learns all about lines. They learn the different kinds and directions lines can move, that they can make shapes, and are important when drawing. They will create drawings of dragons using lines and patterns, they will learn about color and create a color train.

First grade learns about the first artist during the Ice Age. They explore native cultures around the world and find out how they celebrate events and use art.

Second grade learns more drawing techniques. They learn about different kinds of shapes and view them in works of art. They learn to use shapes to make forms, and lines to create three-dimensional space. They get to explore many drawing materials as well as, paint and clay.

Third grade learns all about nature and how artists like Henri Rousseau and Georgia Okeeffe created their works of art. They will practice sketching realistic trees using line and texture and go on a field trip to the Garfield Park Conservatory.

Fourth grade gets serious about drawing, they learn to use vanishing points to create forms, draw humans in proper proportion and create celebrity portraits.

Fifth grade creates three-dimensional space with vanishing points as well. They draw city scenes and create paper mache sculptures, learn about architecture and explore many techniques and materials,

Sixth grade will be working with value. They will use pens to create textures, tones and values. They will do fun drawings in pen, learn about the color wheel and create fauvist paintings in groups.

Seventh grade will be learning more about the elements of art but also about principles of design. They start off the year by learning Sumi-e painting, a Japanese style of painting that uses black ink, which the students mix themselves from dry ink sticks just like the Japanese masters use.

Eighth grades learns about African art and creates plaster masks, they do drawings that explore the elements of art and become advertisers inventing their own products and creating ads to sell them.

When students come to the art room they are expected to follow all of the same basic rules they do in their classroom. In the art room it is extremely important to respect others. This includes their artwork, opinions and personal space. The art room is for everyone, no messes should be left and no materials should be ruined. Students should take extra care of all community property in the art room. Children are welcome to bring their own pencils and drawing materials as long as they can keep up with them and they are not a distraction to other students.

Physical Education

Physical education class is a very important class. The students have **FUN** – growing physically, emotionally, and socially. We provide your children with a positive learning experience through discovery, movement, and play. Participation in class through **PLAY** improves coordination and skill. Through participation, effort, and encouragement, children **LEARN**.

While in Physical Education Class, students will work to master individual skills and group activities in a healthy, encouraging environment. Classmates will work with others, practice teamwork, show positive sportsmanship, and develop a set of positive values about themselves and others.

Our Pre – Kindergarten students are asked to wear comfortable clothing and gym shoes to class. With the hot weather during the beginning of this year, shorts are also appropriate gym wear. This provides the students with the best opportunity to move with ease while participating in class.

Our Kindergarten through Eighth Grade students are asked to wear the St. Hilary Gym uniform and gym shoes to Physical Education class each day. On the day your child has Physical Education Class, he/she may wear the gym uniform to school in place of the regular school uniform. You may order a gym uniform through our main office, contacting Mr. Flaherty, or through the St. Hilary Elementary School website. If a gym uniform has been previously ordered and has not yet arrived at school, please have your children wear an appropriate T – shirt and shorts to Physical Education class until the uniform has been distributed.

Our Primary Grade classes will work to improve their coordination and flexibility by learning directionality, balance, speed, quickness, and rhythm, as well as playing on their own, in small groups, and with the entire class. This will be enhanced through a number of organized games and activities. We will also work with volleyballs, basketballs, and softballs, in addition to other equipment in order to improve gross motor and fine motor skills.

Our Intermediate Grade classes will continue their work on the fundamentals of athletic activity, as well as begin to shift their focus to organized team games. As we work towards our goal of involvement in team games, we will continue to fine tune the skill incorporated in these activities. Students will also be introduced to the major rules that apply to each sport, such as football, soccer, volleyball, and basketball.

Our Junior High classes will continue to work hard to improve their own athletic skills which apply to team games. We will work hard to "master" those skills as well as the sportsmanship involved in these games. Students will also take a look at lifetime physical activity and its advantage to your children as they grow towards being an adult, as well as concentrating on building a healthy lifestyle.

There may be days throughout the year when the gym is closed for our use. On those days, your children may be introduced to different topics within athletics, discussing a health issue, or current athletic topics relating to sportsmanship.

Once again this year, the children in first through eighth grade will participate in the Presidential Physical Fitness Test within the framework of physical education class. A series of five different fitness tests will be given to each student. Each student is eligible to earn an award based on the test results. The tests will be given to each student beginning in the second half of the year.

This year the students have the opportunity to add a minimum of 5 points each day during Physical Education class. Positive participation, following directions, being prepared for class (proper gym uniform), cooperation, skill progression, teamwork and sportsmanship are among the factors to be considered when grading the children in Physical Education class. Points will also be awarded at certain times during the year for creative writing assignments, sports rules tests, or quizzes. In any case, ample time will be given to complete the task.

There are many options for us to enhance our partnership this year. Please consider staying current with your child's progress by logging onto Power School. This will be updated every two to three days. Another option would be to check our St. Hilary website Physical Education Teacher Page for activity updates. The Physical Education webpage should be updated monthly.

Physical Education Class at St. Hilary Elementary School has always been enjoyable for the students as well as the teacher. Your child will enjoy Physical Education class this year by having **FUN**, through **PLAY**. If they are having fun while playing, they will **LEARN** at the same time. It is my hope that Physical Education at St. Hilary gives your child a solid foundation for the future.

Welcome!

I am excited for my 2nd year of teaching at St. Hilary! All students deserve the opportunity to learn through music. Students deserve a safe, encouraging, and positive learning environment in the classroom. Together, students and I will help each other grow as musicians and people, expanding their knowledge and skills.

Goals

Pedagogy and Techniques

Students at St. Hilary are taught primarily through the Kodaly and Orff pedagogies. These pedagogies focus on music literacy and learning through experience. They are the most popular and effective methodologies in teaching Western music.

Additional activities include: BrainDance, improvisation, composition, games, projects, usage of iPads and computer lab, etc.

Rules and Expectations

Classroom Rules:

Make choices that help you and your classmates learn Use instruments and materials with care Speak, sing, and play only when asked Involve yourself in activities Choose to be your best

Students are expected to follow classroom and school rules, at all times.

Ms. Lamorena and each class will discuss expectations for each other at the beginning of the year. Mutual agreement on expectations, following procedures and rules, and accountability are essential for our success in Music Class.

Materials Needed

PreK through 3rd grade are expected to bring materials when requested. Students' teachers will be also be reminded.

4th through 8th graders are expected to bring folders and pencils to every class, unless otherwise noted. Instruments will be provided, but students may use their own buckets, guitars, etc.

- Main goal: To create students who are tuneful, beatful, artful
- We'll learn about: Our voices, body movement, letters, numbers, folk songs, and more!

1st-3rd

- Goals: Continue working on our fundamental singing voices, music literacy, learning about classroom instruments
- We'll learn: rhythms, solfege, musical notation, how to play instruments, how music relates to stories, art, and the world, and more!
- 3rd grade will have a recorder unit in the Spring.

4th-5th

- We'll learn about: singing technique, orchestral instruments, composition, rhythm, melody, and more!
- 4th grade will continue recorder in the Spring.
- 5th grade will play bucket drums.

6th-8th

- We'll learn about: singing technique, harmony, musical notation, composition, history, careers, and more!
- Students will play bucket drums.
- 7th-8th grade students will play guitar in the Spring.

Band and Choir

- All students 4th-8th grade may join either/both ensembles.
- There are 3 concerts this school year.
- We will study many types of music.
- Keep an eye out for Band/Choir informational meetings and flyers!

Grades

Students earn their grades! Grades are divided into the following categories: Participation/Behavior, Homework/In Class Work, Projects, and Assessments. Not every class will have a grade from each category. Examples of some assessments are: skill evaluations and written quizzes/tests.

Participation/Behavior is the most weighted grading category due to its impact on our class' success. Students' Participation/Behavior grades will be based off of the following criteria: Rules and Procedures, Required Materials, Attitude, and Participation.

Extra Credit Opportunities:

- Band and Choir members will receive credit for preparation and participation in each concert.
- Non-Band/Choir students can receive points for attending St. Hilary Concerts (not including the Christmas concert)
- Students who attend high school, collegiate, or professional concerts, musicals, or other music events can receive points or a Cardinal Card by bringing in a parent-signed program or ticket.

How Can Parents Help?

The easiest yet most effective way for parents to help is to ask what their child is doing in music class. Ask your child what songs they are singing, what words they have learned, what notes they know how to read, etc. When a child teaches what they have learned, that is when they show their knowledge of material. Play them all types of music; classical, jazz, what you enjoy listening to, Beatles, anything!

Invest in Kids - Additional Details

School, District, Foundation or Organization Receiving Donations

- All schools and districts are automatically eligible to receive tax credit donations.
- In order for their donors to receive tax credits, all foundations and organizations must apply to the State and show that they:
 - Are certified by the IRS as a tax exempt organization;
 - Use at least 90 percent of qualified contributions to support the goal of their foundation or organization; and
 - Hold all money received via the tax credit in an account separate from their general fund.
- All schools, districts, foundations and organizations must issue annual reports detailing how much money they
 received from the proceeds of Invest in Kids and how that money was spent.
- Any school, district, foundation or organization that violates these provisions can lose its eligibility to receive tax credit donations.

Donor Tax Credit Process

Prior to making a contribution to a school, district, foundation or organization, a taxpayer will apply for a contribution authorization certificate with the Department of Revenue, then:

- The Department will mail a contribution authorization certificate to the taxpayer.
- The Department will notify the school, foundation or organization that it has issued a contribution authorization certificate to the taxpayer for the donation.
- Each registered school, district, foundation or organization that receives a donation in accordance with the
 contribution authorization certificate notice will issue a contribution authorization certificate receipt to the taxpayer
 once the donation is made.
- A taxpayer must donate to the school, district, foundation, or organization within sixty days or they will lose the tax credit for their donation. A taxpayer may also rescind any reserved donation within the same time period. All unused or rescinded tax credits will be added back to the total available tax credits.





Scholarship Organization Regulations

- Must give at least 60 percent of total scholarship funds raised via the tax credit to students attending
 persistently low-performing schools, overcrowded schools, or students whose families earn the income
 needed to qualify for the free and reduced-price lunch program.
- Must not give scholarships to students whose families earn more than 2.5 times the income standard needed to qualify for the free and reduced-price lunch program.
- The total average for all scholarships given by an scholarship organization annually must not exceed \$6,500 for elementary school students and \$8,000 for high school students.
- Must provide a scholarship to an eligible student on a first-come, first-serve basis unless the student qualifies for priority status.
- · May not grant multi-year scholarships.

Teacher and Parental Tax Credits

- All teachers are eligible for \$250 annual credit for out-of-pocket classroom expenses.
- Parental tax credit increased to \$1000 for public and private school feed.
- Responsibility lies with individuals on annual tax returns.

Illinois Department of Revenue Responsibilities

- Creates an internet portal where donors can reserve tax credits.
- Develops standardized forms for taxpayers as well as schools, districts, foundations and organizations.
- Conducts either a financial review or audit of any entity that receives a tax credit if IDOR possesses evidence
 of fraud.

Illinois Board of Education Responsibilities

- Ensures that all public schools are eligible for tax credits.
- Develops a standardized format for a foundation or organization to become eligible for tax credits.
- Determines which foundations and organizations are eligible for tax credits.
- Creates a list of nationally-normed tests non-public school students may take if they receive a scholarships.
- Works with non-public schools to ensure they are offering nationally-normed tests or the state test to their scholarship students.
- Conducts a parent satisfaction survey.
- Commissions a study by an education policy expert at a public or private post-secondary institution in Illinois to determine the efficacy of the program.




