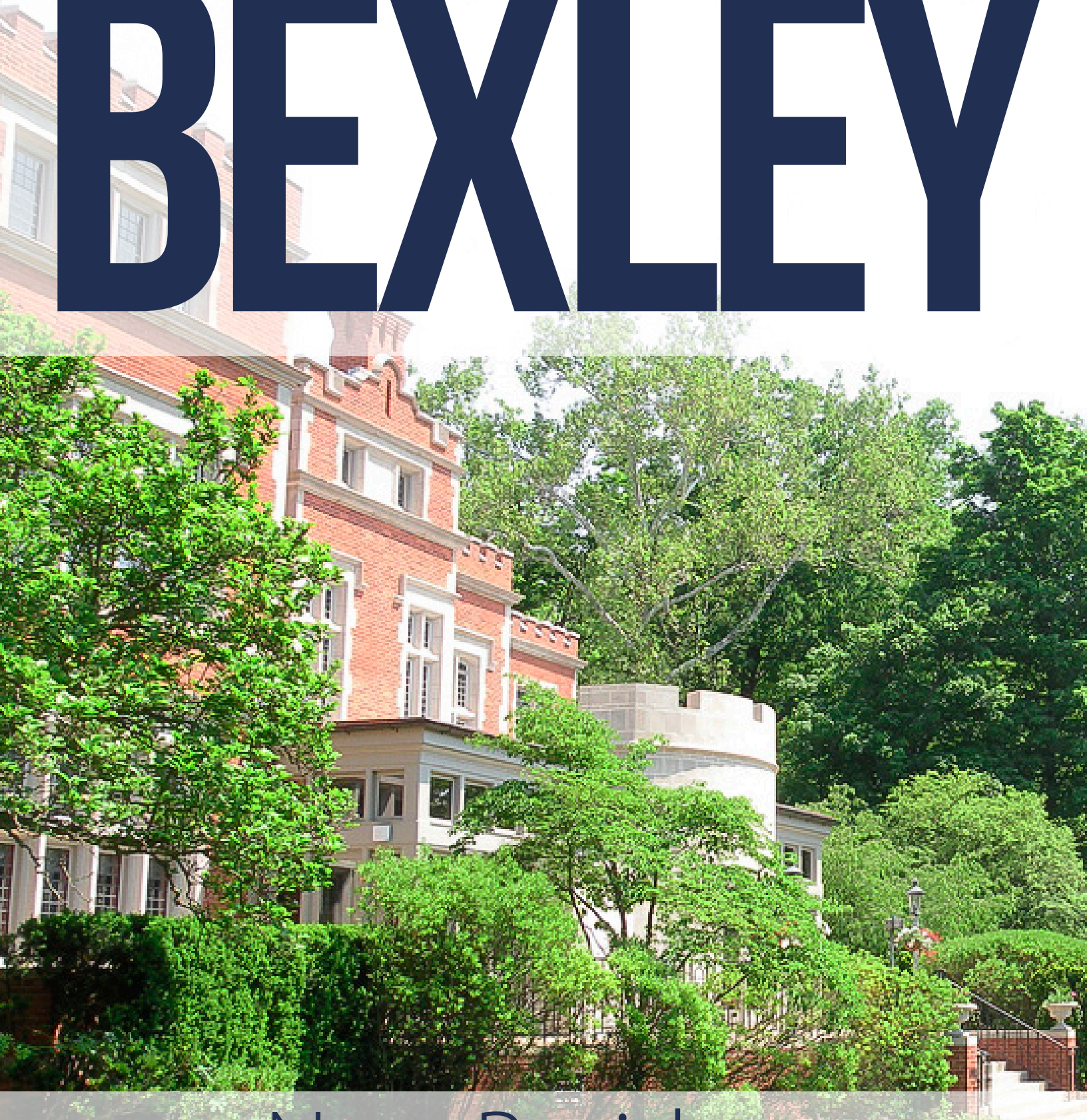

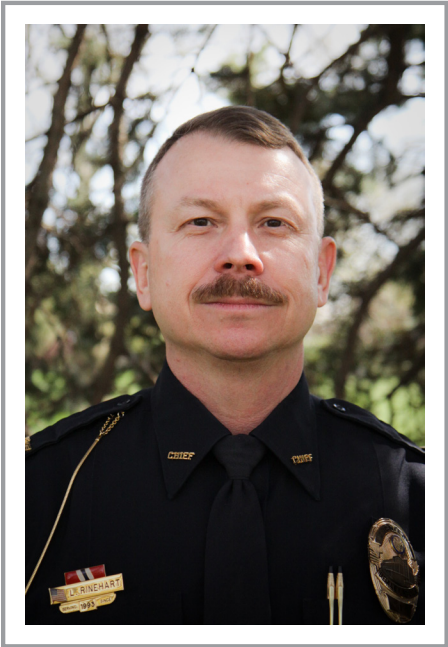

A WELCOME FROM THE CHIEF OF POLICE

A welcome and overview of safety in Bexley from Police Chief Larry Rinehart

Welcome to Bexley! The City of Bexley is a thriving, dynamic, diverse and unique community perfect for enjoying the very best that central Ohio has to offer and even better for raising a family and enjoying a great quality of life. Just like with any other community, we are not immune from concerns relating to crime and safety issues. Below are a few safety practices I ask you to consider as a resident of our great city:

- 1. Our police officers are friendly and strive to be helpful. Never hesitate to approach any uniformed Bexley police officer to ask for help or assistance or to ask a question.** We are a community policing oriented police department and pride ourselves on having strong relationships with the members of our community.
- 2. Enter the police non-emergency number into your cell phone and encourage your family members to do the same.** The non-emergency number is 559-4444. This number rings into the dispatch center at our police department located at 559 N. Cassingham Road at the north end of Bexley. Our police dispatch center is staffed 24 hours a day, every day of the year so that when you call the police number or stop by the police department you are greeted by an experienced dispatcher who knows our city very well.
- 3. Call Us Anytime!** Do not hesitate to call the police department whenever you see any suspicious activity. Trust your instincts. If you think it is suspicious, call us. We are glad to check it out. Never think that you are bothering us or being a busy-body by calling the police. Use that non-emergency number you already have entered into your cell phone and call. We will come. If it turns out to be nothing, no harm no foul. Vigilant residents provide many more eyes than those of the police officers on patrol. We need your help - please don't hesitate to call.
- 4. We provide an excellent vacation check of your house when you are out of town.** All you have to do is call our dispatcher at 559-4444 and tell them you are going on vacation and wish to be put on the vacation house check list. The dispatcher will ask you a few basic questions and our officers will keep a close eye on your house while you are gone.
- 5. Lock it up!** You can lessen the chance of falling victim to petty theft by taking a few simple steps. First, always lock your car. Second, always keep valuables out of sight so that thieves will not see something so inviting that they decide to force entry into your car. These two simple steps will greatly dimin-

ish the chance of having something stolen from your car. Lock your car and keep valuables out of sight. Third, make sure the lock on your garage and/shed is in working order and keep it locked when you are not in the garage. When they are taken, bicycles and other items are often stolen from unlocked and open garages.

6. **Bike Locks:** Bexley is a great town for bicycling and many of our residents are avid bicyclists. Unfortunately many bikes are stolen each year because they are left unlocked in the front yard, in front of a store on Main Street, or in an unlocked garage. Please use a good bike lock and keep your bike secured when you are not on a ride. If you have children please teach them to do the same. This alone will greatly diminish the chance that your bike will be stolen. You can come to the police department and register your bicycles with us. We take your information and put a sticker on the bike so that if it is ever stolen and if we recover the bike, which we often do, we will know you are the owner.
7. **Bike Helmets:** If you ride a bike, I encourage you to wear a helmet. If you have any family members below the age of 16, Bexley ordinance requires them to wear a helmet. Please make sure those under the age of 16 in your household wear an approved bicycle helmet.
8. **Please do your best to drive the speed limit and to come to a complete stop at stop signs in our town.** We have many stop signs and receive many complaints of speeders and stop sign violators. We write many citations for those violations each month. Please pay attention to stop signs and posted speed limits.
9. **We are a block watch community. Block/community watches are a great way to get to know your neighbors and to keep an eye out for each other.** If you move into one of the areas where a block watch exists, join up and become involved. If your neighborhood does not currently participate in a block watch program, talk it up and call us when you are ready for a police officer to stop by and explain how it works. Block watches are a great way to keep our communities safe and significantly reduce crime.

Enjoy your time in Bexley. Take in a show at the Drexel Theater and enjoy our great restaurants as well as the great events hosted in this city throughout the year. We are glad you have picked Bexley for your home and are confident that you will quickly grow to appreciate and love this city as much as we do.

BEXLEY RECREATION AND PARKS DEPARTMENT

The mission of the Bexley Recreation and Parks Department is to enhance the quality of life for Bexley residents by providing recreational programs and leisure opportunities, well-maintained parks, and strengthening our community foundation through special events, while delivering services in a safe and fiscally responsible manner.

Seasonal Activity Brochures

Each year the Bexley Recreation and Parks Department (BRPD) releases 3 seasonal activity brochures. Winter/ Spring Brochure is released in January, Summer Brochure is released in April, and Fall Brochure is released in August. The BRPD activity offerings for any given season are listed in that season’s brochure. Brochures are distributed through the Bexley ThisWeek newspaper, or can be picked up at the Jeffrey Mansion, Bexley Public Library, City Hall, or downloaded through the City website.

Facility Reservations

The Bexley Recreation & Parks Department offers facility reservations for Jeffrey Mansion, the Memorial Shelter House, the Clifton Shelter House, and field/diamond usage. All Mansion and Shelter reservations must be made in-person between the hours of 8:00am-4:30pm, Monday through Friday. You must be 21 years of age to reserve either facility. Reservations are taken on a “first-come-first-served” basis.



Parks and Facilities:
Commonwealth Park, Schneider Park, Jeffrey Mansion

Jeffrey Park:
Jeffrey Park consists of nearly 40 acres, including the two Commonwealth Parks located on the east side of Parkview Avenue. A large portion south and west of Jeffrey Mansion is a natural woodland traversed by walking trails. Alum Creek forms the park’s western boundary. Other recreation opportunities include a play apparatus for children, two tennis courts, picnic areas with grills, passive and active green space and the community pool facility. Jeffrey Park is open for visitors to enjoy daily from 7:00am– 10:00pm.

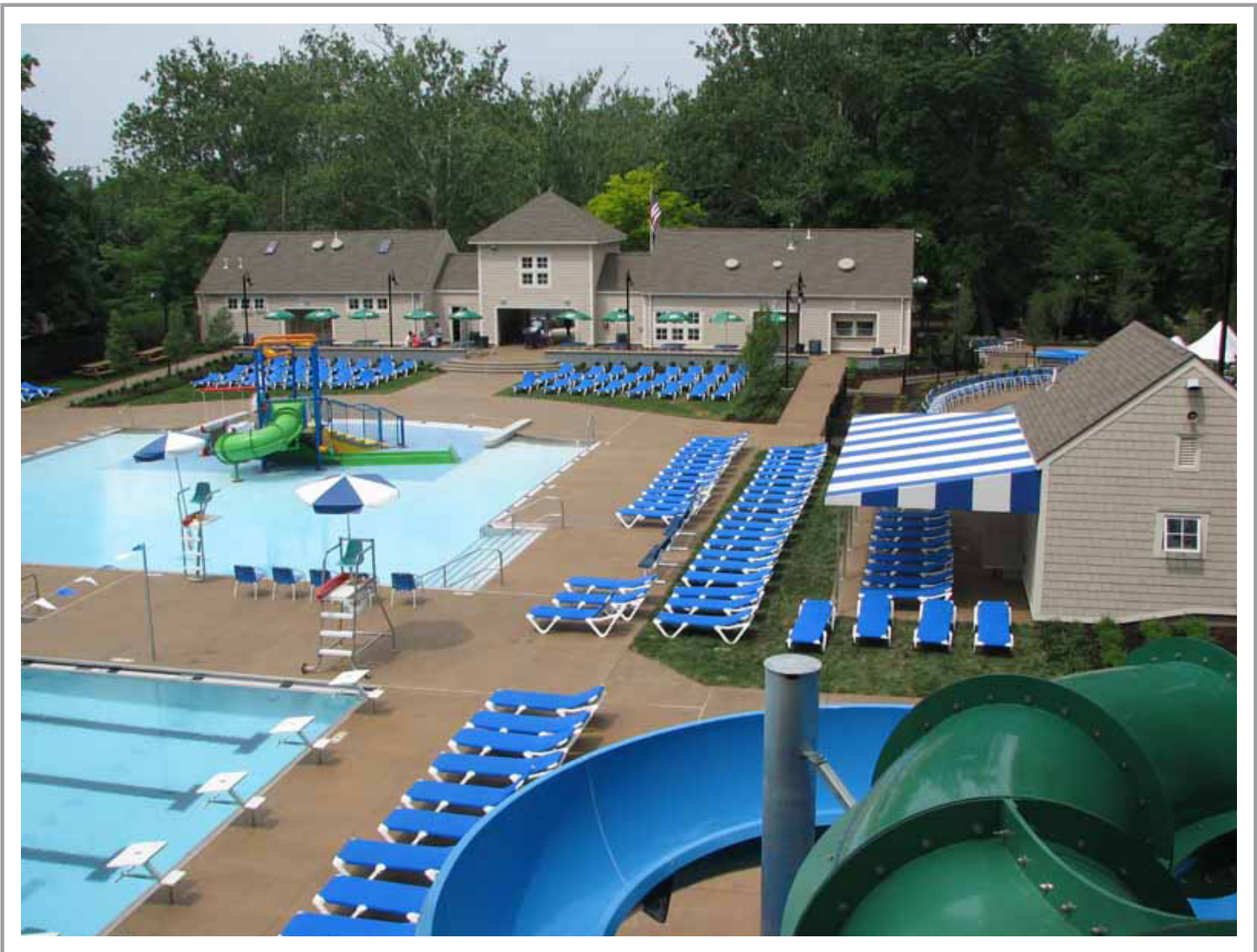
Parks and Facilities:
Commonwealth Park, Schneider Park, Jeffrey Mansion

Schneider Park:
Schneider Park is located in the southwest portion of Bexley, and is accessible via Astor Avenue just west of Sheridan Avenue. The park has a walking trail along Alum Creek, a gazebo, and a small boat launch for Bexley’s kayak and canoe program.



David H. Madison Community Pool:
The newly renovated facility is composed of 6 different features including a zero depth entry leisure pool, an 8-lane competition pool, a diving well, two water slides, a toddler pool and a splash pad! This new concept was designed to accommodate all ages and swimming abilities. We also provide a handicap lift into the competition pool for those individuals who are physically disabled.

CODE ENFORCEMENT

Introduction

Bexley City Code establishes a minimum standard that structures and exterior property are to meet. The laws and codified ordinances can be found at www.bexley.org/public-documents/. The Building and Zoning Department will, in rare circumstances, issue a citation to a citizen. In almost all cases there will be two violation notices distributed to the home owner explaining the violation and then a grace period allowing the owner to resolve the violations.

Building Permits

Are you thinking of making upgrades and changes to your home and property? Building Permits are required for:

- Additions
- Decks
- Driveways & Approaches
- Electrical
- Enclosures of porches
- Excavations & Trenches
- Fences, Garages
- Hot Water Heaters
- Plumbing
- Pools & Spas/Hot Tubs
- Public Sidewalks
- Sheds
- Stoops/Steps
- Roofs
- Siding
- Sun Rooms
- Water, Sewer & Gas Line Work
- Windows

Address Posting

- Display address number near the front door or entry
- All structures (garages and fences) that abut an alley must have the number visible
- Arabic numerals only (not numbers written out - i.e. "4" instead of "four")
- Size of number: minimum of four inches in height
- Be a contrasting color to the surface

Parking and Storage

- Vehicles advertised for sale may not be parked on the street or in plain site on private property
- Only one boat or RV is allowed in the rear yard and must be screened with a six foot solid fence or non-deciduous landscaping
- No vehicles are allowed to be parked in the grass
- No commercial vehicles allowed, unless work is being performed during working hours
- Vehicles may not be parked on the street for more than 48 hours without being moved

Trees and Bushes

- Minimum height clearance required:
 - Over sidewalks - 8 feet
 - Over streets and alleys - 15 feet
- Planting of trees, shrubs, flowers or other materials in the right-of-way requires a permit. There are certain species that are prohibited to be planted in the right-of-way. A complete list of prohibited species can be found by contacting the Tree and Public Garden Commission at (614) 559-4200.

Weeds

Noxious weeds such as, but not limited to: thistle, ragweed, milkweed, poison ivy, poison oak, poison sumac, and burdock are prohibited.

Exterior Property Areas

Such violations include, but are not limited to:

- Grass over 8" is prohibited
- Overgrown tree limbs and bushes over the streets, alleys, and sidewalks rights of way
- Broken or dilapidated fences, walls, or other structures
- Deteriorated structures, roofs, windows, etc.
- Broken, uneven, or improperly maintained walks or driveways
- Driveways with loose stones or gravel spilling into right of way
- Motor vehicles, trailers, boats, and/or other motorized vehicles parked in grass
- Storage of building materials or materials such as earth, sand, or dirt not intended for current use on the property
- Out of use or un-usable appliances or automobile parts
- Unsightly or offensive materials.
- Outdoor use of furniture intended for indoor use
- Improperly disposed of materials, junk and clutter, unkempt garbage, trash, litter, and yard waste
- Trash containers, recycle bins and yard waste are not to be taken to the curb before noon the day before collection, and are to be taken in by 8:00 pm the day after pickup.

Water Department

The City of Bexley purchases its water from the City of Columbus. We administer all utility billing for the City of Bexley. Residents are billed quarterly and most businesses are billed monthly, with charges including water, sewer, and refuse. Bexley offers a senior citizen discount on the refuse for homeowners 60 years of age or older. To enroll in automatic payment deduction fill out the application form that is posted to the Water Department's page at www.bexley.org/water-department/.

Trash Collection

Trash, yard waste, and recycling is picked up on Mondays of each week. The City of Bexley contracts with Rumpke, a third party waste management contractor, to provide this service. Residents with alleys should place their trash at their alley frontage in lidded trash cans, and place their recycling and yard waste at their front yard between the sidewalk and the curb. Residents without alleys should place their trash at the top of their driveway, with recycling and yard waste placed between the sidewalk and the curb. Please do not put trash, yard waste, or recycling out more than 24 hours before collection and please retrieve the bins within 12 hours of collection.

Recycling Bins

To obtain a recycling bin, stop in at the front desk of City Hall, located at 2242 East Main Street. Recycling is also picked up by Rumpke every Monday.



CITY OF BEXLEY INCOME TAX

Introduction

The City of Bexley is a member of the Regional Income Tax Agency (RITA). RITA administers and collects the City’s income tax.

City Income Tax

The City of Bexley Income tax is 2.5% of earned income. For residents working in other municipalities, the City credits 65% towards local income tax paid elsewhere.
