Individual and short-term volunteers are needed to help with specific projects or upcoming events. The requirements vary depending on the opportunity and timeframe. Long-term volunteers are those who will commit to a consistent time and number of hours each week or month for a specific position, or several projects over an extended period of time. Long-term, ongoing volunteers must be at least 21 years old, complete a volunteer application, provide references and fingerprint clearance (Criminal Records Check), negative TB test results, and attend orientation/training.

We also facilitate a number of different opportunities for students to receive practical experience in a community mental health setting. Internship opportunities are available for Bachelors and Masters level students and vary across the state.

UCAN's story begins in the early 1860s at the onset of the Civil War. As men left for service, the members of St. Paul's United Church of Christ made a promise to care for the children of fallen soldiers.

Mr. and Mrs. Carl Gottfried Uhlich announced the donation of a large piece of property to perpetually endow the orphanage home. In March of 1869, the Illinois Legislature approved an act to incorporate the Uhlich Evangelical Lutheran Orphan Asylum.

October 8, 1871 was an unforgettable date for members of St. Pauls and the children of the orphan home, as both buildings felt the rage of the Chicago fire. A year later, a new home was built at Burling and Center streets, which housed boys and girls for the next 56 years.

In 1924, Pastor Pister conducted a campaign for funds to build a new home. Mr. and Mrs. Carl Buehler generously donated 10 large city lots in the 3700 block of North California and ground was broken in 1927.

With establishment of the Illinois Department of Child and Family Services in 1965, Uhlich Children Home's enrollment became almost completely that of wards of the state.

In 2002, Uhlich Children's Home changed its name to Uhlich Children's Advantage Network (UCAN) to reflect the wide variety of services provided, and in 2004, UCAN merged with FamilyCare of Illinois.

Today, UCAN is a multi-faceted social service organization building strong youth and families through compassionate healing, education and empowerment. The meaningful programming UCAN provides meets the critical needs of Chicago's most at-risk populations.

However, Asian Americans are an incredibly diverse population, and the accomplishments of those visible to the mainstream have masked the struggles of particular groups within the community. Certain Asian ethnicities face poverty rates over two times that of the national average, low educational levels, and many other realities that are not reflected in the “model minority” myth.

These issues in the Asian community are rooted in cultural, educational, and language barriers. AACS seeks to raise awareness of these challenges in mainstream society and to create a better quality life for all API persons in Central Ohio regardless of citizenship status, cultural or ethnic background, socioeconomic level, or any other factor. To achieve these goals, we offer services in four major areas: Youth & Family, Health Care & Prevention, Community Education, and Interpreting & Translation.
