On Seeking God

A favorite writer, and one I'd recommend to everyone, is Kathleen Norris. In her book Amazing Grace: A Vocabulary of Grace, she writes about her experience preaching (she's a layperson) on evangelism. In her sermon she suggests that 'going up to people at a picnic and asking, 'do you know the Lord?' [is] a good way to get yourself stuck with a barbecue fork. And you would deserve it." For Norris, evangelism is more a matter of, "Do not describe." present," and "show, don't tell." I thought you'd enjoy her subsequent conversation:

"As I was packing up in the deserted sanctuary, a young woman approached me, someone I had known casually for years, but had not seen before in church. 'I've just begun finding my way back to all this,' she said, 'and I think you can help me.' I was stunned: me, of all people? ... She went on to say that she was longing for a relationship with God but didn't know how to go about it. How to pray, for example. Desperately, I tried to summon some bit of wisdom that Fr. Robert had imparted at the abbey in one of our late-night talks: remember that it's not a monologue, but a dialogue. A relationship; and like any real relationship, full of surprises.

She told me she didn't know how to get started, but her little girl seemed to talk to God all the time. 'There you have it,' I said, 'just imitate her.' And she laughed.

"I was being partly serious, I told her, because adult selfconsciousness makes us more anxious than we need to be about 'seeking God.' . . . Just relax, I told her, don't worry, and if you begin to read the Bible you'll find that if you think you want to find God, God wants to find you even more. I admitted that the fits and starts I had spoken of in my sermon still plagued me, and that sometimes the only thing that got me into church on Sunday morning was the fact that I was preaching. . . . She told me that her renewed interest in religion had caused some strain in her marriage, as her husband did not share it. She seemed relieved to hear that I had had the same problem. . . .

"I told her that I had worried for a long time about what my religious conversion might do to my marriage. But I had held firm to the conviction that if the God of the gospels is real, and the commandment to love is primary, then my most intimate loving relationship would not be destroyed but enhanced by my faith. It had been a struggle, I said, and it took time, but my husband and I had worked

things out. That question: 'Why are you afraid?' was one that had been helpful, when I had remembered to ask it of myself during difficult times.

"I said that I was sure that the new pastor who would be coming in a few weeks would be glad to help her; more than glad. I knew from my own experience that just one person who is serious about reclaiming their faith, and willing to talk about it, can renew a pastor's sense of ministry. It validates what they do. This seemed welcome news to her, and we walked out of church together.

"I had been an evangelist, and in the conventional sense. It amazed me and still does." pp. 302-304, <u>Amazing Grace</u>.

This is Norris's story. On September 15 I preached about sharing our 'spiritual autobiographies' – each person's story of their unique spiritual journey – with one another. Will you share yours with me? Let's have coffee, and explore together. (No homework needed!)

Bible Reading Every Day: Teach Us to See

At the parish Homecoming Day picnic I had the pleasure of playing HedbandzTM. The gist is that you randomly pick a card, don't look at it, display it on your headband, and then ask questions until you guess what's on it. One of our five-year-old members showed an uncanny guessing ability. Am I a princess? Yes. Am I Ariel? Yes. Two questions and she was done. She chose another card. Am I a person? No. Am I a fish? Yes. Two questions and she was done again. Did the child have ESP or could she somehow see the card through her forehead?

It reminded me of a story I read recently in 2 Kings 6:8-23. The king of Aram was ticked off because every time he attacked Israel, they seemed to anticipate his plans and were one step ahead of him. The king started to suspect his generals of being double agents, but actually the source was a prophet named Elisha (a former student of Elijah), who always knew what Aram was up to and warned Israel. The Aramean king figured he would fix that, and sent an army to capture Elisha.

Early one morning, Elisha's servant got quite a shock as he saw that enemy troops had surrounded them. He ran to Elisha and asked, "Alas, master! What shall we do?" Elisha calmly answered, "Do not be afraid, for there are more with us than there are with them." The Bible doesn't tell us what the servant was thinking, but I imagine it was something like, "Boss, with all due respect, I know you haven't had your coffee yet and might not be thinking too clearly, but it's just you and me here."

But "then Elisha prayed: 'O Lord, please open his eyes that he may see.' So the Lord opened the eyes of the servant, and he saw; the mountain was full of horses and chariots of fire all around Elisha." The Aramean army didn't see God's army. They also didn't recognize Elisha. It reminds me of a Jedi mind trick from Star WarsTM, only instead of Obi-wan Kenobi telling the stormtroopers, "These aren't the droids you're looking for," it's Elisha telling the Arameans, "This is not the way, and this is not the city; follow me, and I will bring you to the man whom you seek." Elisha led them right to the Israelite king, who fed them dinner and then sent them home.



It's tempting to have a chuckle at the Arameans' expense, except that I can't help wondering if I see any better than they did. Or am I more like the servant, seeing the problem but not seeing that God is providing an answer? On the encouraging side, Elisha didn't laugh at his anxious servant. He comforted him, explained the spiritual reality to him, and then prayed that God would enable the servant to see for himself. And this I believe is God's offer to each of us. If we ask God to open our eyes and teach us to see, then he will reveal himself to us more and more. And as we learn to perceive God's presence, his power, and his goodness, we can live peacefully assured that no matter how big a problem might come against us, God is even bigger and God is for us.


