

10 STEPS TOWARD BRIDGING OUR PAINFUL RACIAL DIVIDE

Note: After the distressing protests and riots in Baltimore, I promised to provide information in the Messenger about how we can each combat racism. This article was written by Margaret Mitchell, President & CEO, YWCA Greater Cleveland, in 2012 as part of the YWCA's national Stand Against Racism campaign. Mitchell talks about racism from a personal perspective, and then moves into concrete suggestions and a plea for all of us to become more aware and more committed to equality for all - something we all agree to when we say the Baptismal Covenant. Peace – Mother Sandra

The year was 1937. My mother and her sisters were playing in the front yard of their Greensboro, North Carolina home when a speeding delivery truck jumped the soft earthen curb, hitting and killing three-year-old Anita Shoffner. The driver, who was drunk and White, was never charged in the murder of my mother's sister, who was African American. My mother's family story is not unique, and growing up in Fresno, California, I knew hate was not just a Black and White issue. I spent more afternoons than I can count in the home of Mary and Ernest Gonzales eating homemade tortillas with fresh butter, learning the realities of Mexican American life, the harsh realities of extreme bias. Here are 10 steps we can each take to step out of the shadows of silence:

- 1. Learn about other people and their culture but go beyond foods and festivals.
- 2. Explore the unfamiliar. Put yourself in situations where you are in the visible minority.
- 3. Be a proactive parent. Talk to your children candidly about race.
- 4. Don't tell or laugh at stereotypical jokes.
- 5. Think before you speak. Words can hurt whether you mean them to or not.
- 6. Be a role model and help educate others regarding your own experiences.
- 7. Don't make assumptions because they are usually wrong and stereotypes are destructive.
- 8. Consider how race and racism impact your life and those around you.
- 9. Don't let others get away with biased language or behavior—speak up and out.
- 10. Take a position against hate and take a Stand Against Racism.

For far too many Americans, the death of 17 year-old Trayvon Martin reopened

painful wounds. Sometimes I am lulled

into believing these old wounds have healed.

The Defibrillator is Up and Running!

Our defibrillator is now mounted on the wall, ready for use. Also referred to as the

"AED" (Automated External Defibrillator), notice the "Automatic" part of the device's name: this amazing technology talks you through the procedure if it's necessary (God willing, we won't ever have to use it). It's small, but it's a bright lime green so that people notice it and remember where it is. It's mounted on the wall next to the alley door – right near the inside stairs that go down to the activity room. Eleven people were trained by Jack Spottiswood, both in defibrillator use and in basic CPR. Please keep it in mind; the best chance of helping someone in a cardiac emergency is if as many people as possible know <u>exactly</u> where the unit is so that emergency response is as quick as possible.

Bridging Racism continued

But the devastation of hate and racism is an injury that never seems to heal. Instead it brings bitterness, anger and hopelessness to the surface, which breeds with fear and disillusionment in the open air. This same destructive fear thrives in San Diego, where an Iraqi-American woman was murdered on March 24, 2012, and racism is the suspected culprit. Hate and racism also hang in the air in Kansas City, where police are investigating two Black teens who allegedly set a younger White teen on fire in late February of [2012].

The scar tissue of hate and racism is everywhere. A 2005 study by the U.S. Department of Justice estimated there are about 191,000 hate crimes incidents per year. How many more times will mourners need to gather at candlelight vigils or march for justice as the result of racism and hate? When will it stop? Will the wounds of racism be healed in 2042, when, according to State of the Dream 2012: The Emerging Majority report by United for Fair Economy, a major demographic shift will take place and the majority of the country will be non-white for the first time in our nation's history? 2042 will be a reality, but it won't be a magic wand. In fact, some data from the report suggests the economic divide between people of color and Whites may be cavernous. Will this vast economic divide aggravate generational wounds of bias into a frenzy not seen since the 1960s?

There is a cure against racism. The deep wounds can be healed but the healing process is intricate, deliberate and will require involvement from those who have previously remained silent. When racism raises its ugly head, silence becomes toxic and our apathy is interpreted as total acceptance. We always have a choice: do nothing and let racism go uncontested and flourish, or do something -- act up, rise up, and speak up. We must pick up the armor of righteousness daily in order to slay the evil forces of racism at work against us. It will not be easy and it will not always be comfortable for any of us but courage is a game changer. We must each take a step each day to garner support and find our voice as the moral majority.

Minutes of the April 2015 Vestry meeting were approved.

- Lighting repairs were made.
- Storm drains were cleaned out.
- The parking lot was measured in preparation for re-lining.
- The AED (defibrillator) unit was mounted on the wall.
- Closets and shelves were cleaned out and re-organized.

The vestry agreed to give an unused glass display case to the school in which Stacey Dello Buono teaches, with a request for a donation in exchange for the case.

The next vestry meeting will take place on Wednesday, June 17, 2015 at 6:30 PM.




watch the Phillies host the Washington Nationals. This is a great opportunity to relax,

How the Lord chose a career path for me

I was a pint-sized bookworm. Since the age of 6, or as soon I began to read and write, I loved reading. Fortunately for me, my parents lived a small town that had a public library, pretty much like Norristown. I would go to the library to read, daily. I was particularly interested in newspapers. I wanted to know what was happening around community, my country and the world. I couldn't understand why government would buy and make available newspaper free for anyone who wanted to read and couldn't afford to buy them. My parents surely could not buy five newspapers for one child to read.

While in the library, I was attracted by an entirely different event, besides the papers. I noticed the library assistant in charge of the reading room, a tall slim young black lady. When a library patron went up to her to seek assistance with any information, she would walk effortlessly through the room, put her finger out, pull out a book from the collection of about 3,000 books, and come back to her desk for the patron. When she placed this book in the patron's hands, his or her face would light up. This happened regularly over the months.

One day I was so intrigued, I asked myself how would she read every book in this library but remember not only what is in them but also where each book was kept? That was simply impossible for a human mind. Such skill is similar to having extraordinary power. I wanted this extraordinary power. I wanted to use it to give service. I wanted to see anybody who comes to me for any assistance leave with his face lit up. I wanted to see myself, like that lady, giving a meaningful and fulfilling service to humanity. I want to be a librarian!

From that light-bulb moment, a first-hand inspirational encounter, and in watching someone bring joy to people, I looked out for opportunities for a career in librarianship. And the doors began to open.

First, as soon as I had finished a college degree in microbiology, another great institution was recruiting young college degree holders for a career in librarianship. I was taken and sent for a postgraduate training in Masters in Library Science. The college that did that announced that it wanted to advance excellent graduates of Masters of Library Science programs to a Doctor of Philosophy in library science program. I was among the best and was advanced.

Today, I hold a Doctorate degree in Library and Information Science from one of the best schools in the



world, and have practiced in many countries, such as, Côte d'Ivoire, Mauritius, Nigeria, and the United States. And as in the beginning, the philosophy of my service remains the same: to use the extraordinary skills as a librarian and bring happiness to people. Halleluiah.

Are you called to the ministry of acolyting at ASC?

While we have as a parish family added a few new people to serve as acolytes, we still remain a relatively small group. We appreciate those who are conscientious in their duties and serve well, but the truth is, we need more people on our team. In the past year, several youth have moved on to other ventures. Remember, youth *and* adults are welcome to this ministry and upcoming training (date to be announced); some adults have found that it is a particularly profound way to participate in worship services. We especially need adults for second Sundays, when children and youth go out with Mother Sandra for Sunday school. It goes without saying that the more people who are willing to serve, the less the time commitment for all. As always, I am thankful for the help of those who do now and will in the future participate in this meaningful ministry.


