September is a time of beauty and back-to-business bustle and, for churches in particular, a time to reconnect as a community. This fall, of course, is no exception: there are numbers of things to pay attention to:

- **Sunday School:** Last year, Sunday School in the Rectory worked well, but it never felt like quite enough time to do anything significant. This year, we would like to try out a “rotation workshops” model for Sunday School. We will have Sunday School on the second and fourth Sundays, at least to start with. Please bring your kids, so that we can have a thriving program that kids really want to come to:

- Second Sunday of each month: Sunday School *and Eucharist* in the Rectory with Mother Sandra. Instead of coming back into church for Eucharist, kids of all ages will remain at the Rectory.

- Fourth Sunday we will have Sunday School after church: this will be an opportunity for activities related to the theme.

For the fall, starting on **September 27**, we will focus on “Caring for God’s Creation.” Several scripture passages will give the context for activities such as a “Creation Newspaper,” gardening, learning about composting, and other activities.

In keeping with this theme, please join us for a **St. Francis Day Blessing of the Animals Service** on **October 4, 2015**. This will be our main service at 10:00 a.m. Bring your dogs, hamsters, goldfish, pet wallabies and gophers . . . or whatever animals you want to bring. Obviously, all animals need to be on a leash or in an appropriate cage/carrier.

HOMECOMING SERVICE AND PICNIC: Mark your calendars for **10:00 a.m. on September 13** (no 8:00 service) followed by a picnic for the entire church. Hamburgers, hot dogs, and vegetarian options will be provided by All Saints; please bring side dishes. It’s a get-together for people from both services and we can admire the new walkway to the Memorial Garden (provided by the Tempest trust funds), which is where we’ve had our picnic the last few years.



FEEDING OF THE 5,000: On September 12, 2015, the Bread of Life Café serves its 5,000th dinner! In July, the Café celebrated three years of service, good food, fellowship, and partnership with other churches as well as our patrons. See page 4 for more details.

And, of course, we have Sunday services at 8:00 and 10:00. Fall can be busy, but it’s possible to walk prayerfully amidst the busyness, always aware of God’s presence and awake to opportunities for service, true connection, prayer, and a blessed simplicity that strips away all the noise, seeking the deeper reality of God’s kingdom.

Vestry Highlights: July 15, 2015

- ❑ Minutes of the June 2015 vestry meeting were approved, as amended.
- ❑ The “new” computers have been installed in the Computer Lab and are now being used by local preschool and day camp children.
- ❑ Len Porcelli was recognized for his many years of outstanding leadership of the West-End Computer Lab.
- ❑ St. John’s has donated many items to All Saints, including vestments, choir robes, costumes and a baby grand piano.
- ❑ The vestry discussed suggestions for updating the vestibule and choir room, including repainting the walls and upgrading of the current bulletin board area.
- ❑ A list of 15 items related to building and facilities upkeep was reviewed and discussed.
- ❑ The vestry agreed to close the VIST deposit account and move those funds into the existing money market account, which provides a higher rate of interest. The vestry also approved moving funds into the endowment account.
- ❑ Karen Spottiswood has volunteered to take charge of updating the All Saints website.
- ❑ A blessing of animals will take place on October 4, 2015, the feast of St. Francis of Assisi.
- ❑ An estimate for repairs to the pipe organ was discussed. A fundraiser will be needed if all repairs are to be made.

The next vestry meeting will take place on Wednesday, September 16, 2015 at 6:30 p.m.






Bishop Michael Bruce Curry from North Carolina Elected 27th Presiding Bishop of The Episcopal Church

The Rt. Rev. Michael Bruce Curry, Bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of North Carolina, was elected the 27th Presiding Bishop of The Episcopal Church on the first ballot on June 27.

Bishop Curry, 62, is the first African-American to be elected Presiding Bishop of The Episcopal Church.

The election occurred during the 78th General Convention of The Episcopal Church held June 25 - July 3, 2015, in Salt Lake City, Utah. Of the 174 votes tallied, Bishop Curry received 121 (89 needed to elect).

Following his election by the House of Bishops, Bishop Curry's election was overwhelmingly confirmed by the House of Deputies, 800 for, 12 against.



The Annual Diocesan Convention will be held Friday evening, November 6, beginning at 6:30 p.m. and Saturday, November 7, 2015, beginning at 7:30 a.m. at the Philadelphia Episcopal Cathedral in Philadelphia. Milestone for Bread of Life Café

“In those days when there was again a great crowd without anything to eat, he called his disciples to him and said to them, “I have compassion for the crowd, because they have been with me now for three days and have nothing to eat. . . .” His disciples replied, “How can one feed these people with bread here in the desert?” He asked them, “How many loaves do *you* have?” Mark 8:1-5 (emphasis added).

In July, the Bread of Life Café celebrated 3 years of existence. In 2012, the Café began serving healthy, delicious, and well-presented dinners on the second and fourth Saturdays of each month at 5:00. Word quickly spread around the community that these were good meals, served by people who enjoyed working with each other and with the dinner guests.

The closing of Central Presbyterian Church, who had hosted a Saturday dinner for a decade or so, created a clear need, and All Saints had the facilities and willingness to at least give it a try. Thus the Bread of Life Café was born. Jay Petel has been the hard-working coordinator since its inception, and Kate Petel is the main chef. They both feel committed to providing meals that anybody would want to eat – and many do! Bread of Life serves meals on “real” plates with “real” flatware (not disposable), and, at least at its inception, provided the only regular dinner in Norristown.

Many people have made this endeavor possible, including a number of other churches, members of All Saints, and individual members from the Norristown community. Marie Maharty gets desserts and breads for every dinner (some of which the dinner guests can take home with them if they wish), and the Second Time Around Shop keeps a steady supply of clothing in the hallway that people are also welcome to take.

If you've never visited, come on September 12. Jesus asks us all to have compassion and to feed those who have nothing to eat; see how we are doing that, and how you might help as well.


WECL receives new computers

Team Children's mission aims to ensure every child has the tools and opportunities they need to contribute and compete effectively in today's 21st century digital, global environment, and those goals line up perfectly with the ideals of the West-End Computer Lab. Rick Schwartz made a statement in his 1997 high school yearbook, which leaves a legacy to remember him by: *"You only live once so make it count. Do things to make a difference in this world so you won't be forgotten."*



Apple Cream Pie

owner. LOVE this pie!"*


2 cups sliced apples
3/4 cups sugar
2 Tbsp. flour
1 cup cream
1/2 cup sour cream
1/2 tsp. vanilla
1 egg (beaten)

Topping:

1/3 cup sugar
1 tsp. cinnamon
1/3 cup flour
1/4 cup butter
2 cups halved walnuts

Combine sugar and flour. Add both
creams, egg, and vanilla. Beat.
Add apples and fold into pie crust.

Bake at 450° for 15 minutes. Reduce
heat to 325 ° and put back in for 30
minutes more. Remove from oven,
apply topping and bake another 20
minutes at 325 °.



USHERS & GREETERS

Thanks to all our greeters, ushers and presenters for their continued time and effort in these ministries. Your gifts are well appreciated! As we continue to keep everyone equally informed, please read the following information regarding recent changes.

As with many ministries at All Saints, we have experienced a decline in volunteers coming forward to serve as ushers and presenters as well as greeters. As a result, we are combining our Greeter and Usher/Presenter Ministries for the 10 a.m. service. We will schedule two ushers each week. One will serve as a greeter in the lobby and the other will hand out the bulletins at the back of the church. Both will collect and present the offering and facilitate an orderly procession during the Eucharist. The ushers may recruit a family or group of individuals to bring the gifts of bread and wine forward to the altar or choose to do so themselves. The instructions will be updated and distributed in a few weeks. All parishioners are encouraged to volunteer to usher once every three months. If you have not ushered in the past, we'll make sure you're paired up with an experienced usher. It takes only a little extra time on Sundays, and you can sit with family or friends in the pews (or even usher together as a family). Can you help?

The Rector's Discretionary Fund is used for parishioners in need, but we also get occasional requests from community members in dire straits. At times, those visitors seem to be the ones Jesus meant when he said, "Whatever you do for the least of these, you do for me." I seldom give anyone everything they need, and if their need is too great (like someone who said they needed over \$1,000 for a water bill) I often decline, because it seems unlikely that they will be able to raise that much money. We seek a balance of practicality, discernment of the honesty and need of the request (getting things like a copy of their lease or utility bill), and openness to the needs of others. At this point, the funds are dwindling, and lately Donna Longobardi and I are fielding more requests than usual. If anyone feels moved to supplement this fund, it will go to good use to help those who are already a part of our ASC family or who come to our door.

Friends: Anita Friday is a member of our diocesan Anti-Racism Commission. I read about her experience thinking of my two sons, and how different it was for me to raise two white boys than it is for any African American parent in the U.S. This mother's touching plea that we see human beings instead of stereotypes is one way in which we can live out our baptismal vows. Four out of 5 of those vows pertain: first, to "persevere in resisting evil," second to "proclaim by word *and example* the Good News of God in Christ," third, to "seek and serve Christ in *all person*, loving your neighbor as yourself," and fourth, to "strive for justice and peace among *all people*, and respect the dignity of every human being." July 25, 2015

My fifteen year old African American sons were riding their bicycles with a friend in the Greens of Waynesboro Friday afternoon. The boys were videotaped and followed through your neighborhood for approximately ten minutes by a white woman with short dark brown/black hair who was driving a white SUV.

My sons are Boy Scouts who attend the Lawrenceville School and Friend's Central. They have friends who live in the Greens of Waynesboro. They are actively involved in our church, and unlike many children their age, they opted to go swimming at a friend's house and ride bikes (rather than play video games) that day.

As they were leaving your neighborhood two police cars stopped them because "suspicious" activity had been reported. Their information was taken and a police incident report was filed. When I heard about this I went to the police station and was told that there have been some burglaries in the area. The complainant was worried because she was going to be leaving town and the boys had on back packs (which contained their wet swim suits and towels).

But we all know that the real reason the call was made to the police was because they are black. I understand that there have been several recent burglaries in your community and everyone is on a heightened sense of alert because of that. However, I am grateful that [the homeowner's association newsletter] has agreed to share this letter with your community because I want you to understand the kind of heightened alert I am on every day and every time my sons leave the safety of their home.

To the woman who was following and videotaping my sons, you frightened my children. Not only did you scare them at the time, but you have permanently changed their sense of security in this world. Your racial profiling has damaged their spirits forever.

They have lived in this community their whole lives. We live in Berwyn Estates. Please explain to me why my sons were so frightening and suspicious? Do you fear every child riding a bicycle in your community? Are backpacks the Berwyn equivalent of a hoodie? Please understand where my heightened alert comes from. Whatever you think of the Trayvon Martin verdict several things are clear. The young black man (who is now dead) was perceived as one who was "suspicious and did not belong in that community"

These are the words that you told to the police about my boys.

To the parents in the Greens at Waynesboro, how would you feel knowing that a stranger followed your children, terrified them and now has a video tape of them. How would you feel knowing that there is now a police incident report with your children's' names, address and birthdays permanently a part of an official record? How would you feel if your children tell you now that they no longer feel comfortable going to their friends' homes, or riding their bicycles? How would you feel knowing that the prejudice of one person has permanently adversely affected the way the child you love sees himself and the world?

My request to you all is that you try to see human beings, NOT stereotypes.

Blessings from St. John's



“The chasuble is the outer garment worn over the alb and stole. . . Derived from the Latin word *casual*, meaning “house” the chasuble in the Graeco-Roman world was like a cape that completely covered the body and protected the person

from inclement weather. Spiritually, the chasuble reminds the priest of the charity of Christ: “Over all these virtues put on love, which binds the rest together and makes them perfect” (Colossians 3:14). [A prayer used when vesting, or putting on the special garments, is] “O Lord, who has said, ‘My yoke is sweet and My burden light,’ grant that I may so carry it as to merit Thy grace.” [All the vestments] symbolize the function of each ministry. But at the same time the vestments should also contribute to the beauty of the rite.” [found on a website]

We received a number of chasubles, wine and bread for the Eucharist, and many cassocks and surplices (the black and white vestments worn by adults assisting in the liturgy and by the choir) from St. John's upon its closure, along with a beautiful baby grand piano that you can see in the choir room, a huge amount of choir music (which will eventually be distributed to other churches in the Valley Forge Deanery), and many other items. We are glad that all of these items will remain in use for sacred purposes.
