After graduating from UCLA with advanced degrees from Saint Mary's College of California and the University of San Francisco, Anne went on to become an educator at several prestigious schools, including De La Salle High School in Concord and Santa Clara University. Throughout her career she received a number of awards: "LaSallian Educator of the Year," Chapman University College "Teacher of the Year," and "Outstanding Teacher Award" from the University of California, San Diego.

As most educators can attest, the rewards go hand in hand with the challenges. One such challenge happened one day when an angry parent stormed into the school demanding to speak to the principal. A sharp secretary intercepted the agitated parent and explained that the principal was off campus. Truth be told, Anne was in fact the principal in disguise as the secretary. A difficult situation was avoided, and good material to be used for a future essay earned. Fact *is* grander than fiction.

After decades of writing academic papers for college courses, Anne decided to write, as she says, "As a way to figure out what I thought about questions that mattered to me but no one ever talked about." Anne's first book, **It's All About the Story-Composing a Life in Books**, is a collection of twenty-two essays giving tribute to popular fiction books. It's about celebrating books in the midst of an electronic age, which threatens remembering the past and the lesson we're to learn from it."
