Minister's Musings:

Rev. Karla Brockie

This month (as always!), we are called to look deeply for what our faith calls us to do. On May 7 with a teach-in designed to reveal



some of the lenses of whiteness in order to see beyond our customary way of seeing, to see the hidden structures of oppression operating even here, more clearly. We are not white supremacists by any means, but the de facto result of the hidden structures of racism we are swimming in, is white supremacy. Our faithful UU people of color are asking us to hear them, to pay attention to the painful reality. We need to find our way forward beyond the fragmentation that racism inflicts on all of us, to true wholeness ("... because your liberation is bound up with mine"). We need to be present to one another in that workship; I invite you to step into sacred discomfort with me and with Hanne on that day.

We are being called to live into our mission:

We are a compassionate spiritual community that celebrates diversity, nurtures the personal and spiritual growth of all ages, shares our gifts, promotes justice for all, and serves the world we live in.

That means making those noble passions manifest in our hearts and in our congregation. How do we live into more compassion? How do we develop deeper spiritual connection? How do we get beyond what is usual and comfortable and get uncomfortable enough to actually experience diversity, and celebrate it?

I am also particularly concerned with nurturing the personal and spiritual growth of all ages, and that includes children and youth. Having real relationships with folks of every generation is essential to anyone's spiritual well-being; without those connections, we are depleted, less than whole. The beloved community of a congregation needs to include all ages, or it is not the beloved community we seek. The world is changing fast, and we have been creative in seeking ways to engage young folks here; we need to become even more creative, and to learn to think "outside the box." To me, that also means sustaining a staff position for the ministry of Faith Development. We need

to staff for the vision. And right now, that means some of us who are able to stretch a bit further in stewardship, for the sake of the beloved community and the mission.

We are feeling some growing pains. Let's remember our legs are growing stronger as we engage in this sacred work.

ATTENTION ALL GPUUC MEMBERS: set your calendars

for Sunday, May 21, after the service (at about 11:30) for GPUUC's Annual Congregational Meeting. This is our one major business meeting of the year. At this meeting, we approve the coming year's budget and discuss a number of items that are important for us, this year including a rollout of an early Strategic Plan draft. We try to keep the meeting moving along and concise. Please plan to attend.

Speaking of the proposed 2017-18 budget, by now most congregants are aware that the Board reluctantly recommended that the Director of Faith Development (DFD) position be reduced from 20 hours per week to 13 hours next year. It was done reluctantly because there is plenty to do for the full 20 hours, but we simply don't have the budget or the numbers to support this position at ½ time given our anticipated income.

At the Congregational Budget Forum on April 23, a number of congregants and Karla made a heartfelt plea to find additional income for the \$6,000 needed to restore the DFD hours to 20 hours per week. Pledge income is the lion's share (over 80%) of our income. If you are in a position to consider increasing your pledge, we would request that you do so this coming Sunday, April 30, so that it can be incorporated into the budget to be presented at the Annual Meeting. Cards will be available Sunday to indicate your willingness to do so. Thank you in advance for those who are able to help.

Lastly, this is a last call for anyone attending GA in New Orleans this summer to sign up to become a delegate at the Plenary Sessions there. We have one more delegate slot to fill. If you've not been a delegate before, it's really quite fascinating in this writer's humble opinion!

Recommended 3 Sink Dishwashing Method

Many people use our kitchen and dishware without using the sanitizing dishwasher. If you help with an event or Sunday coffee time, please remember to use the 3 sink method for safe sanitizing of articles that may be contaminated by human saliva, including cups and silverware. After scraping, do this:

Wash in soapy water in Sink #1
Rinse in clean water in Sink #2
Sanitize in clean water with 1 oz. of household
bleach per gallon (bleach is located under the sink)

Air dry all articles

The most healing instrument of all is your own voice. C.W. Child



Songs have power. In her book "Music is Medicine'," composer Kay Gardner writes, "Hildegard de Bingen* believed that the human voice, when singing music with words, would arouse sympathetic vibrations in the body and allow the words to directly enter the soul." As an interactive, musical engagement artist for Senior communities, I have seen immediate benefits from singing. Even people slumped in chairs have tapped their feet to the beat. By the end of an hour, the energy in the room is lifted, its brighter and lighter, vitality is flowing and faces are glowing. Eyes sparkle with life. Past GPUUC music coordinator, soprano Jayne Casselman, shared that after singing hours of Wagner, her face in the mirror was radiant and shined with light.

Studies show singing has an energizing effect. It releases oxytocin and endorphins, biochemicals linked to feelings of trust and bonding, I host a regular weekly singalong class. The title of the class sounds elementary, "Sing and Be Happy," but its true! Singing *does* make you happy.

In these times of deep concern and social activism, singing can rejuvenate, it can disperse sadness and disappointment. Make a list of songs to sing. Next time your mind begins to sink into the familiar pattern of "doom and gloom," pull your attention out from its roaming, and sing a song.

Oh What a Beautiful morning, oh what a beautiful day, I've got a wonderful feeling, everything's going my way


Look for the silver lining, you know that somewhere the sun is shining

I'm singing in the rain, what a glorious feeling, I'm happy again. I'm laughing at clouds, so dark up above, the sun in my heart and I'm ready for love.

One time, when I was a pianist in a restaurant, a trouble shooter businessman from Australia often sat at the table next to the piano. He frequently asked for the song "My Way." One night in particular, he insisted, "I need to hear My Way...especially tonight." He sat with his eyes closed, absorbed, drank the music like an expensive brandy, "and now, the end is near and so I face the final curtain, My friend I'll say it clear, I'll state my case, of which I'm certain.... I did it MY WAY."

Songs not only lift our spirits, they take us to our devotional heart, connect us to Source. Martin Luther King's favorite hymn was *Precious Lord, Take my hand, lead me on.* I sing a UNITY hymn to help cope with anxiousness of uncertain times--"I'm ready for a miracle, ready for a miracle, I'm ready for a miracle today!" Find a UU hymn that resonates a core value or touches your heart. Sing it. Within 20 seconds, your energy will shift. All you have to do is start.



General Assembly 2017 June 21-25, New Orleans, LA

Planning has begun for General Assembly 2017 at the Ernest N. Morial Convention Center, 900 Convention Center Blvd, New Orleans, LA 70130. Steeped in a history of influences from Europe, the Caribbean, and Africa, New Orleans is one of America's most culturally and historically-rich destinations. It is a city known for its music, food, architecture, and festivals. The average high temperature in June is 89 degrees and the average low is 71.

New Orleans is also known as a place of re-birth following the devastation of Katrina in 2005. Many Unitarian Universalists have contributed time and funds in the effort to rebuild both the city and the congregations in the area. By going to New Orleans, we can both celebrate our successes and recommit to the relationships that have been forged with this community.
