Presidential Ponderings:

Budgeting Goals for 2018-19

As always at this time of year, creating a budget for the coming church year is a challenge undertaken by the Board with some trepidation and uncertainty—and, yes, humility and grace. The Board met earlier in January to prioritize that which our precious resources can allow us to accomplish in the year to come.

I'm pleased to report that with care, commitment and a little creativity, I believe we have come up with an excellent preliminary budget that is both achievable and which moves us a large step forward. Those who were at the Budget Forum on January 14 got a look at the details; it is also available on the website.

The goals we could accomplish with this budget are:

Structuring the budget to be able to attract high-quality ministers, both an interim minister for this coming year, as well as for a permanent settled minister the following year;

Meeting our mission of social justice through fair compensation practices and supporting our social justice programs;

Assuring that we can live into our mission by providing adequate staffing to further our programs for our members and for the community.

This will require at least modest increases in pledges from most members of the congregation, and significant increases from those that are fortunate enough to have that capacity. Please plan to give generously to the upcoming Stewardship Campaign. Your future in this congregation depends on it.



Everyone is invited to join in this powerful early morning Social Justice Reflective Service that is held on the first Wednesday of every month. Through this service we connect with each other and support our social justice work as a truly spiritual practice.

Evening Justice Vespers Service Returns Third Thursday of the Month Feb 21, 6:15 pm.

Everyone is invited to gather for a moment of quiet contemplation and sharing among those of us who want to deepen and strengthen our commitment to Justice in our community and our world. Along with short readings, inspirational music and silent meditation, we share stories, insights and observations of how our Unitarian Universalist faith reflects social justice as a spiritual practice. Come to listen and be heard and gather energy for the work of creating Justice in our lives. This service is an effort to combine the morning social justice reflective service and a vespers style service while providing at a convenient time for those of us who work or who are not morning people to engage in these powerful and special services.



Seeds of Support for February – Prescott Creeks

Their VISION is for a central Arizona with healthy watersheds and clean waters, including water suitable for swimming in the creeks and lakes of the Granite Creek Watershed.

Their MISSION is to achieve healthy watersheds and clean waters in central Arizona for the benefit of people and wildlife through protection, restoration, education and advocacy.

They value leadership that promotes a healthy watershed through coalition-building and networking. They value empowerment of citizens to make our community a better place to live. We value community responsibility for the health of our watershed. They value accountability to regulations, policies and procedures that protect our waters. They value respect for our waterways to protect the right of people and wildlife to clean waters.

They have organized the annual Prescott Creeks Clean –up which takes place on Earth Day where over 5,000 volunteers have collected 46 tons of waste from the creeks over the last 11 years.



Prescott Creeks is still dealing with the aftermath of the fire on December 11 that destroyed their main office. There are in desperate need of financial support. Let us give generously to Prescott Creeks to show support for all the community work they have engaged in for the past 11 years.

We received \$ 2307.43 for SOS in Dec for PASS. And Christmas Eve we collected \$ 326.75 for Operation Deep Freeze.

Side with Love: (formerly *Standing on the Side of Love*)

The Unitarian Universalist Association announced January 10 that its “Standing on the Side of Love” campaign is now “Side with Love.”

In June 2017 the UUA General Assembly approved a responsive resolution, written by the Rev. Theresa Ines Soto, urging the leaders of the campaign to “create a new imagining that better includes and reflects the needs and contributions of disabled people.”

The shirts will still be bright yellow, and the logo will remain a sketch of a heart, but the name of the Unitarian Universalist Association's high-visibility public witness campaign is now much shorter—and less controversial for accessibility rights activists.

Also, the Rev. Jason Shelton wrote a popular UU song based on the phrase; in 2016, he changed it to “*Answering the Call of Love*” to be more inclusive.




Granite Peak Members Spoke, Performed and Marched with Hundreds of Others in Memory of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. on January 15.

Scores of Granite Peak members and friends joined more than 400 marchers who made their way from Prescott College to the courthouse square and back to the Prescott United Methodist Church. Hundreds of signs with messages of peace, solidarity, non-violent social change and concerns for the lives and safety of all minorities were hoisted and carried along the route.



Granite Peak members, Lou Burrell, Lena Hubin and Robert Shegog spoke or performed at the “Celebrating the Legacy” service that followed the march. Kendra Hobson of St. Luke’s Ebony Christian Church was the master of ceremonies for the inspirational multid denominational service.



It was a very good day for concerned members and friends of Granite Peak to come together with like-minded people from all different faiths to communicate a strong message that “We will carry on together to fight for justice in the quad city area and beyond.”



PUUF and Granite Peak UU Members and Friends at the 2018 Prescott Women's March

Saturday, January 20, scores of GPUUC and PUUF folks braved the rain, snow and wind to participate in the 2018 Women's March on Courthouse Square in Prescott. Altogether, there were about 1,150 marchers plus many display workers and petition gatherers. We all were overjoyed when the bad weather cleared up around 11 a.m., allowing for more comfortable gathering, marching, dancing and singing in celebration and support of women and women's issues worldwide.

PUUF friend and artist/activist, Meg Bohrman, courageously led the singing in close proximity to protesters who opposed the march. Granite Peak's Brianna McKinney and Tegen Griffes danced with the multitudes in the One Billion Rising Dance after the march ended. Anne Stephens, Sam Bellis and Marianne Erickson staffed the Indivisible/Planned Parenthood table, gathering supporters' names and recruiting folks to volunteer at phone banks and help with the campaign for Comprehensive Health Education in Prescott Public Schools.

Second Monday Drum Circle—February 12 at 6:00 pm, GP Sanctuary



Granite Peak Library Spotlight...

2018 Common Read *Daring Democracy* Book is New Library Addition

Our spotlight this month is on *Daring Democracy—Igniting Power, Meaning, and Connection for the America We Want*, by Frances Moore Lappe and Adam Eichen. The book is one of the two 2018 UU Common Read books—discussion of it at GPUUC will take place on Sunday February 25 during the early (9:00 – 10:15 AM) educational slot before the

regular Sunday service. If you want to participate in this, but failed to join the bulk purchase to get your own copy, if you act fast you can borrow and read our library copy!

The book begins with the story of the unlikely collaboration of the two authors—75 year old famous author (of multimillion selling *Diet for a Small Planet*) Frances and 25 year old Adam—who met at a 2015 conference in Mexico City on international money in politics. From there they present “an essential truth: it’s not the magnitude of a challenge that crushes the human spirit. It’s feeling powerless.” They go on to describe how people are reclaiming their rightful power—uniting across causes and ideologies in this divisive time to forge a “canopy of hope” they call the “Democracy Movement.” Their accounts of those “daring democracy” include adventures of movements and groups whose names include Occupy Wall Street, Our Revolution, Move On, Common Cause, Citizens for Clean Elections (and others formed after the outrageous *Citizens United* Supreme Court decision), Movement for Black Lives, Moral Mondays, Indivisible, Meetup to Resist, Moms Rising, etc. Of this book, Ann Ravel, former chair of the Federal Elections Commission, says, “Now, more than ever, to save our democracy, every American needs to read *Daring Democracy*.”

Two just acquired Granite Peak Library books—one from the “Sustainability” section of our collection, the other a “Science” book (although it might better be thought of as “history of science / religion.”) Both are / were national best sellers—the first a 2017 publication, the second bearing a 2008 copyright date.

The first is *Drawdown* edited by Paul Hawken, subtitled “The Most Comprehensive Plan Ever Proposed to Reverse Global Warming.” The work of a coalition of researchers, professionals, and scientists, the book presents one hundred “realistic and bold solutions to climate change.” Spanning a wide range from harnessing renewable (solar & wind) energy, to plant-based diets, to educating girls in poor countries, to land use practices that pull carbon out of the air, etc.- - together they represent a path forward over the next few decades that could reach drawdown:

when greenhouse gases in the atmosphere begin to decline.

The second is *The Invention of Air* by Steven Johnson, subtitled “A Story of Science, Faith, Revolution, and the Birth of America.” It revolves around Joseph Priestley, who—besides isolating oxygen, founding ecosystem science, being a protégé of Benjamin Franklin, and a friend and mentor to Thomas Jefferson—was a radical thinker/theologian who cofounded the Unitarian Church. Generously donated by Dan Tokar, the book is available for immediate checkout.

In contrast you’ll have to wait a few weeks before you can checkout *Drawdown*. It is being used by the Yavapai Climate Change Coalition (of which Granite Peak UU is a member) in planning upcoming education and climate action activities/
