Moments in our life

About three months ago George Soros, the American billionaire and philanthropist of Hungarian background, calmly explained, during an interview, that he had decided to contribute something like thirty-five to forty million dollars in order to help needy high school students from New York State attend the college of their choice. There were to be no strings attached. It was inspiring, to say the least, to hear him state that the main reason he embarked on this philanthropic venture was because he remembers vividly how much he had been touched when as a university student in England he received an unexpected check of forty pounds from a philanthropic association on the recommendation of his adviser. There were no strings attached on that occasion either. The money helped Soros in continuing with his studies and moving on to his brilliant career as a businessman and as a philanthropist. Most likely, Soros would have excelled in his chosen objectives anyway, but judging by the emphasis he put on that happening, that gesture of generosity left an indelible mark on him. Our lives hinge on small details, it has often been pointed out. I want to share this moment of generosity as stated by George Soros, because I want to remind our many wonderful donors of the tremendous impact that contributions to SPAN can have on the life of our students who choose to have a study abroad experience through this program.

I have frequently said: Once a SPANner always a SPANner. This is reinforced every time I meet a former SPANner regardless of how many years may have elapsed from the last time we chanced upon each other or regardless of which part of the world such happy events occur. Such occasions are indeed extraordinary. I was fortunate to experience one such moment this summer when after nearly half a century I reconnected with the person who was chiefly responsible for introducing me to SPAN. This was Carlyle E. Hystad, a 1960 SPANner to the Soviet Union. I had just joined the faculty at the University of Minnesota as a junior professor of modern Russian history. Carl was majoring in International Relations (he received his B.A. in 1961), with a strong interest in the Soviet Union (he received his M.A. in Russian Area Studies in 1962), and found himself enrolling in the first course on Soviet history I taught at

the University. I also agreed to be a reader of his SPAN paper which dealt with “Reorganization of Industrial Management in the Soviet Union,” and later I served as his major adviser. The important thing is that it was he, as Executive Secretary of SPAN (1961-62), who invited me to explore the possibility of serving as a SPAN adviser and for this moment, which has revolutionized my life, I am eternally grateful to Carl. As many of you know, SPAN has been an integral part of my life ever since. I was fortunate to meet Carl and part of his family in Minneapolis over dinner at the “It’s Greek to Me” restaurant, and to thank him in person for introducing me to SPAN. During this pleasant visit I also heard the story of his life and career, a story I am happy to share with the rest of the SPAN family. It is another example of the power of lighting a candle as opposed to cursing the darkness, as our SPAN motto admonishes us to do.

After completing his studies at Minnesota, in 1962 Carl Hystad joined the U.S. Atomic Energy Commission as an International Affairs Specialist. While with the AEC, he served as Assistant Atomic Energy Attaché at the American Embassy in London (1963-65), and in 1969 he joined the White House Office of Management and Budget as the Budget Analyst for Federal Science programs, including the National Science Foundation programs. He was later selected to direct a group of analysts to advise the President on budgets and legislation for commerce, business assistance, and international trade programs of the federal government. In 1976, Carl Hystad was named Associate Administrator of the Federal Energy Administration in charge of planning the U.S. Petroleum Reserve Program. In 1978-79, he served as director of the program, in charge of building the 500-million barrel oil reserve, before being named Director of the Office of Emergency Response Planning for the new Department of Energy. He served in this key position during the oil-supply crisis resulting from the American Embassy hostage situation in Iran, which involved another SPANner, Bruce Laingen. In short, his government service was extensive and useful.

During our conversation, Carl kept reminding me of the connection between his career and his SPAN experience. This connection became even more evident when he described the current phase of his many internationally-oriented involvements. After leaving government service Carl founded an energy consulting (*continued on page five*)

We asked the students (bound for the European Union and Greece) about their proposed research projects, and listened with delight as they told us their plans.

In this sense, SPAN hasn't changed over the decades. The program still provides a rich tapestry of life experiences for those with the courage to embark on new intellectual and—let's face it—incredibly fun adventures.

It was wonderful to hear Professor Theo G. Stavrou, Ph.D., deliver a stirring and inspirational speech about SPAN's history and the importance of the educational program. And, it was a privilege to be among the alumni who stood briefly to talk about our SPAN experiences. Everyone who has been involved in SPAN has a rich treasure of stories to share.

To face the unknown during two or more months of travel takes patience and persistence, too. This seems to be the hallmark of every generation of SPANners.

For me SPAN marked a turning point, both professionally and personally. Although I had been to Greece before, through the SPAN program, I learned the difference between being a tourist and being a foreigner.

For the first time, I learned the language, studied the history and culture, and came home with a new appreciation for my American life. In addition, I developed a deep appreciation for my (Greek) grandfather's roots, as well as his experience as an immigrant to this country. I think of SPAN as a microcosm for life – when you wholeheartedly embrace new adventures, and stretch your intellectual curiosity, you're taken down roads you never dreamed of travelling – and, oh, the stories you have to tell! you have to tell!

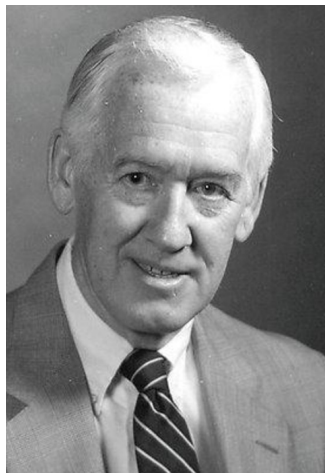
First Scanlan Scholarship Award

As a first-year graduate student at the University of Minnesota Hubert H. Humphrey Institute, SPAN is giving me a head-start researching policy issues relevant to my degree in public policy. Additionally, this experience is allowing me to focus on conflict resolution, a concentration that will help sculpt my masters program and advance my future career in the Foreign Service.

Former U.S. Ambassador John Scanlan (Turkey, '54) also used SPAN, both as a researcher and later as an adviser, before he went on to join the Foreign Service as a U.S. diplomat and later as U.S. Ambassador to Yugoslavia. Throughout his career with the U.S. State Department, he maintained contact with SPAN and even received SPAN students while serving in Poland. This lifelong commitment to "building bridges of understanding across borders, cultures, and continents" is something I've noticed in all SPAN alumni while discussing their post-SPAN careers and experiences, but it was especially present in Scanlan's work over his lifetime.

I am honored to be the first recipient of the John Scanlan scholarship. The Scanlan scholarship is an important contribution toward making the making the SPAN program possible for me; at the same time the scholarship has connected me to someone whose life journey and career path I would like to emulate. As Scanlan wrote to SPAN Executive Director, Professor Theofanis Stavrou, "I am convinced that without my SPAN experience I probably would not have had the inspiration to seek entry via the Foreign Service examination into a diplomatic career nor the confidence to pursue that career as effectively as I have." As a current SPANner who is pursuing a career in the Foreign Service, the experience of Ambassador Scanlan gives me confidence and excitement; I am optimistic about my own career path and the potential impact I hope to have on the lives of future SPANners.

 firm, providing services to several government agencies and corporations. In this capacity he also founded International Career Employment Opportunities, a weekly publication that collected and distributed information on current job openings for professionals who wished to work with international programs, including humanitarian assistance, health care, economic development, education, and international understanding. The International Career Employment

Center has evolved into a leading Internet source of information for international job seekers, as well as a service to international employers. Carl Hystad continues to oversee this operation as Chairman of the Board of the Carlyle Corporation.

I am sure that, just like George Soros, Carl Hystad would have most likely succeeded in his major objectives anyway. But it is a matter of great satisfaction to know that he credits SPAN with the international vision that has characterized his busy and productive career. Perhaps this is the reason he has remained such a loyal SPAN alumnus and a faithful contributor so that others may continue to benefit from research abroad experiences, becoming thus citizens of the world. In a recent communication with me, Carl assured me that we can continue to count on his support and that he is willing to help us think of new ways by which SPAN may continue to serve students creatively. He can do so, he maintains, from rural Virginia, near Charlottesville, where he lives with his wife, Lisa, and where the shouts of his four children and eight grandchildren can reach him most readily.

We salute you and thank you, Carl, and look forward to seeing you again in Minnesota. There are many more great moments to share and to explore.
