The humble labor of cleaning house is a constant in life. Its rhythm shapes our days and our most intimate memories of home and family. Yet we hardly ever talk about this work, because it is not glamorous or highly valued. In *Cleaning: People Talk About Housework*, twenty people share their feelings about cleaning house. In talking about housework, they reveal their essence: the family histories, relationships, and priorities that structure their diverse lives. The interviews and photographs presented in *Cleaning* invite readers to reflect on their own unexamined relationship to this daily work. *Cleaning* combines richly detailed storytelling with intimate and compelling color photographs, in a clean layout that invites readers to sink into each person's story.

Adele Horne has been making documentary films for 17 years.
