Mission Statement

We, the parishioners of St. Peter's Church, are called to holiness by God as present day disciples of Jesus Christ. Baptisms

Parents anticipating the birth of their first child are asked to attend baptismal instructions classes before the birth of their child, if possible. Please contact the Rectory to register. Note: Baptisms cannot be scheduled until all the necessary paperwork is completed.

Confirmation

Confirmation is administered every three years to all 6th, 7th, and 8th grade students in our Parish CCD program. Children wishing to receive Confirmation must be enrolled and participating in the CCD program for two years before they are eligible to receive the sacrament.

Marriages

In order to complete the necessary paperwork, couples are asked to contact the Rectory at least one full year in advance of the proposed marriage date.

Anointing of the Sick

Please contact the Rectory whenever a member of your family has become sick or hospitalized. Please note, because of the new government regulations regarding privacy, hospitals cannot release information without a patient's consent.

Reconciliation

The sacrament is celebrated each **Saturday from 4:00 – 4:45pm and Monday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday from 11:45am – 12:00noon** in the church and also by appointment.

Monthly Visitations

Any parishioner who is homebound and wishes to receive the Eucharist on a monthly basis is asked to contact the Rectory to schedule a visit.

Rite of Christian Initiation in Adults (RCIA)

The RCIA prepares interested adults for reception into the Catholic Church. The program is adapted to the each person's needs and prepares them for full initiation into the faith. Please contact the rectory to register for the classes.

Liturgical Reflection

All Saints

FIRST READING: Revelation 7:2-4, 9-14

John recounts a vision of those who will be delivered in the end times. The group is described as a great multitude representing every people and nation on the earth. In response to the question of who these people are, the answer is the cryptic “they have washed their robes and made them white in the Blood of the Lamb.” Because their clothing is symbolic of who one is, the author wants us to know that while sharing in the suffering of Christ, these are the ones who remained faithful, even to the shedding of their own blood. They now rejoice in the presence of God.

SECOND READING: 1 John 3:1-3

A great deal is compressed into the simple opening sentence of today’s Second Reading. John indicates that those who believe in, and enter into a personal relationship with Jesus, as the Incarnation of God’s own Word, can become children of God (John 1:12-13); that is, share a oneness with God similar to that enjoyed by Jesus. John goes on to say that what we will be, has not been revealed. As believers, we submit our lives to him, imitating the earthly Jesus to the best of our ability. But, the day is coming when we will not simply remember Jesus, nor merely experience what it means to be children of God. In the future, when we see Christ as he is in the glory of the Father, that vision will transform us. Now we strive to imitate him, then we will “be like him.” Now, we see dimly, as in a mirror. Then when we see the glorified Christ face to face, we will be transformed in ways we cannot imagine.

GOSPEL: Matthew 5:1-12

Today’s Gospel, commonly referred to as “the Beatitude,” opens the first of five sections of Jesus’ teaching in Matthew. This first discourse, usually called the Sermon on the Mount, presents many of the key elements of Jesus’ instruction regarding behavior expected of those who accept and belong to the Kingdom of God. Matthew portrays Jesus as the true and final interpreter of the Law of Moses. The people who are the objects of divine favor, the blessed, are those who recognize that they have nothing to bring to God but are dependent on grace for everything. Injustice causes them to mourn, while their desire for right is as strong as hunger and thirst. Hearts fully devoted to God lead them to act with mercy and to sow peace. Their way of living, like that of Jesus himself, will be an affront to powers of domination and like the Master, they, too, will suffer. But even as they have grown in his image, they cannot imagine what awaits them in the end.

ABOUT THIS SUNDAY

The Collect remind us of the great cloud of witnesses by which we are surrounded as it tells of how in this one celebration we venerate the merits of all the saints. The Prayer over the Offerings reiterates that we live our lives, and offer this Eucharist, in the Communion of Saints, and therefore, they celebrate with us. The Prayer after Communion reminds us that the holiness of the saints is only possible because it is God who alone is holy.

All Saints Day

Today, November 1st, we celebrate the Solemnity of All Saints, remembering all the saints known and unknown to us who enjoy the glory of heaven. In today’s Gospel account we hear the Beatitudes, which are guidelines for true joy and the

attainment of sanctity in our Christian lives. WE hear how to live lives of holiness so that we may attain happiness in this life, but even more happiness in the next life as we strive to likewise be numbered among all the saint in heaven.



All Souls’ Day

Tomorrow, November 2nd, we commemorate all the Faithful Departed. All Souls’ Day is unique on the liturgical calendar. Neither a solemnity nor a feast, this commemoration outranks other feasts and even takes the place of a Sunday in Ordinary Time (should this commemoration fall on a Sunday). Prayer for the dead reaches deep into our human history, and it has been our custom from the earliest days of the Church. The belief that our prayers can be of assistance to the dead is a treasured tenet of our Catholic faith. We profess it every time we recite the Nicene Creed: “I look forward to the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come.”

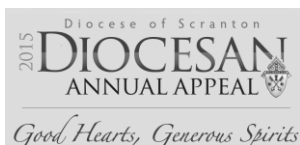

ANNA OSBORN MISSION TRIP

Hi, my name is Anna Osborn, I am an Ambassador Girl Scout with Troop 40058 and am working on my final project for Girl Scouts, the Gold Award, which is the highest award a Girl Scout can earn. My gold project is to fill a backpack to help a child learn. In order to complete this project, I will be going to Nicaragua in January 2016 for a two week mission trip.

Mission Project



There are hundreds of children in Nicaragua who can't attend school or get an education because they are unable to afford it. Their parents only make on average \$300-\$500 US dollars a year, and this isn't enough to live on, let alone pay for education, which is not mandatory in Nicaragua.

For only \$20 we can put together a backpack that is filled with school supplies for an entire year of schooling. Without the scholarship program, hundreds of children will never get a chance to get an education at all. My goal is to raise enough money to buy and fill one hundred backpacks for these children. The education that they will receive thanks to these backpacks will change the rest of their lives for the better, and I am so excited to be able to work towards helping them better themselves.

There are two ways in which you can help me toward the completion of my Gold award and my mission trip. The first is prayer. Prayer is always needed for myself and my team, as well as the missionaries and people of Nicaragua. Prayer for our safety, and that our presences in Nicaragua will show the people who live there what it is like to serve them with a loving and Godly heart.

The second way to support my project is to donate a monetary gift. Any and all money you donate will go directly towards the purchase of necessary items for the backpacks and supplies. You cannot imagine how a few dollars will impact the lives of these children!

My Prayer is that we will have the necessary funding to serve the people of Nicaragua in an important and lasting way. I appreciate you taking the time to consider thinking about praying for or donating to my cause. Not only will this help me obtain my Gold Award, it will also help change the lives of so many children. As the Girl Scouts always say, among other things, we promise to serve God, help people at all times, be honest and caring, and to make the world a better place. I truly thank you for allowing me to do these things and more in my own life as I try to help others.

Thank you for your time and consideration in this effort. I am so excited to see where this journey takes us and how many lives we will change together!

That's The Way It Is!

This weekend is a unique weekend in the cycle of Ordinary Time. In normal circumstances we would be celebrating the 32nd Sunday in Ordinary Time. However the Feast of All Saints (a Holy Day of Obligation) this year falls on a Sunday. This means that the Feast of All Saints liturgically trumps the 32nd Sunday in Ordinary Time. Consequently we will be celebrating the Feast of All Saints, and that means we will also have the readings and prayers from the Feast rather than that of the Thirty Second Sunday in Ordinary Time.

All Saints is really part of a larger celebration where the Church remembers in her worship, life and prayer all who are deceased. November 1st is the Feast of All Saints. On this day the Church remembers those Holy people who have made it to heaven. The Church honors them and looks to them to be an example of holiness. The Saints are the heroes of our Faith. Just as there are legends in athletics, so too there are legends of the Catholic Faith. What sports heroes are to athletics, the saints are to the Catholic Faith. These are the people who service to inspire us as we on Earth seeking the narrow path that leads to life. The saints not only serve as inspiration but also as intercessors. They pray for us and they are always there to aid us. The saints are our brothers and sisters in the Faith. They have made it to eternal life. What better example for those of us who are on the path to eternal life than the saints? The great thing about the saints is that many of them were normal, average, every day people. We are all called to be saints.

On November 2nd, All Souls Day, the church remembers those who are deceased. The month of November is dedicated to the Holy Souls in Purgatory. These souls are destined for eternal life; in fact they have already gained it. Before they can fully enter into life with God however they must be cleansed of their earthly attachments to sin. Whenever we are overly attached to something it can be painful to give it up. This is why the process of purgation (purification) is seen to be painful and why Purgatory is often described as a fire. While there is no literal fire in Purgatory, nevertheless the process is analogous to refining gold. When gold is refined the impurities are purged away leaving a beautiful and pure bar of gold. When we pray for the souls in purgatory we are praying that they may be loosed from their sins and speedily whisked to the fullness of eternal life with God. Our prayers express our love for them and also help to ease the process of purification.

In the Catholic Faith we remember those who have gone before us, both the saints and the sinners. We pray that the sinners may become saints. Most importantly we remember our loved ones—and not just those we knew in this life, but our whole family lineage. Remember this month to pray in particular for the deceased and also in a particular way the role that the saints play as the heroes of our Faith.

That's the way it is!

News From the Vatican



CHRISTIANS MUST WORK FOR ABOLITION OF WAR

10-26-15 (Vatican Radio) - Pope Francis urged the “abolition of war” and said the issue is “unfortunately, very topical” due to the increased violence and armed conflicts in different parts of the world,

such as Africa, Europe, and the Middle East.

“In this age, in which we are experiencing a piecemeal third world war, we are called upon to supply the military and their families with the spiritual and ethical dimensions which help them to face the difficulties and often harrowing questions inherent in this peculiar service to their country and to humanity. Many soldiers return from war operations or peacemaking missions with real inner wounds,” Pope Francis said. “War can leave an indelible mark in them. War, in fact, always leaves an indelible mark.”

Pope Francis said it is appropriate to wonder how to treat the spiritual wounds of soldiers who have witnessed atrocities during war. “These people and their families require specific pastoral attention, which allows them to feel the maternal presence of the Church.”

Pope Francis also spoke of the role humanitarian law plays in safeguarding the essential principles of humanity in a context which is “itself dehumanizing.” The Holy Father pointed out humanitarian law aims to protect non-combatants; tries to ban weapons which cause horrible and unnecessary suffering; and attempts to protect the natural environment and cultural heritage. He said because of this important mission, humanitarian law deserves to be “promoted and spread” among all militaries and armed forces, “including non-state actors.”

“In addition, it needs to be further developed, to deal with the new reality of the war, which today, unfortunately, uses increasingly deadly tools. However, as Christians, we are deeply convinced that the ultimate goal, the most worthy of the person and the human community, is the abolition of war,” he said.

“Therefore, we must always strive to build bridges that bring us together, and not walls that keep us apart; we always have to help search for an opening to mediation and reconciliation; we must never give in to the temptation of considering the other only as an enemy to be destroyed, but rather as a person, endowed with inherent dignity, created by God in His image. Even in the midst of the lacerations of war” – the Holy Father said – “we must never get tired of remembering that each person is extraordinarily sacred.”

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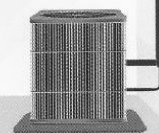
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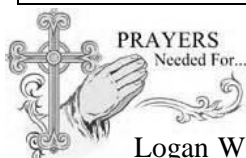
