Baptisms

Parents anticipating the birth of their first child are asked to attend baptismal instructions classes before the birth of their child, if possible. Please contact the Rectory to register. Note: Baptisms cannot be scheduled until all the necessary paperwork is completed.

Confirmation

Confirmation is administered every three years to all 6th, 7th, and 8th grade students in our Parish CCD program. Children wishing to receive Confirmation must be enrolled and participating in the CCD program for two years before they are eligible to receive the sacrament.

Marriages

In order to complete the necessary paperwork, couples are asked to contact the Rectory at least one full year in advance of the proposed marriage date.

Anointing of the Sick

Please contact the Rectory whenever a member of your family has become sick or hospitalized. Please note, because of the new government regulations regarding privacy, hospitals cannot release information without a patient's consent.

Reconciliation

The sacrament is celebrated each Saturday from 4:00 – 4:45pm and Monday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday from 11:45am – 12:00noon in the church and also by appointment.

Monthly Visitations

Any parishioner who is homebound and wishes to receive the Eucharist on a monthly basis is asked to contact the Rectory to schedule a visit.

Liturgical Reflection

2nd Sunday in Ordinary Time FIRST READING: Isaiah 62:1-5

The First Reading comes from a portion of the Book of Isaiah know as "Third Isaiah," dating to the period when Israel began returning to Jerusalem from their time in exile. The language is filled with hope and the promise of new life. Israel's situation is totally transformed and the nation's relationship with the Lord is renewed. No longer languishing in exile, Israel basks in the mercy of the Lord. Her sin of idolatry is behind her. The marriage imagery tells us that the people have a fresh start; God has the ability to take a painful past and turn it into a glorious future.

SECOND READING: 1 Corinthians 12:4-11

Speaking to the oft-divided Church in Corinth, Paul introduces the concept of unity in diversity. Paul writes his spiritual children to restore peace and right teaching. He reminds them that that their gifts come from God for the good of all, not for the glory of the one who is the conduit of God's grace. He reminds the Corinthians (and us) that, though the Spirit has bestowed a variety of gifts, these gifts have a purpose: to build up the common good. By placing our gifts at the benefit of the community, Christians build up the Church and the Kingdom of God.

GOSPEL: John 2:1-11

John calls Jesus' first miracle at the wedding of Cana "the beginning of his signs." At his mother's urging, Jesus transforms the situation, turning water into wine and changing what could



have been a social disaster into a triumph. The seemingly unlimited fine wine calls to mind the "pure, choice wine" that the Lord has promised to provide on his holy mountain (see Isaiah 25:5) and so "his disciples began to believe in him." Mary's words to the servants – the last she speaks in all the Gospel accounts – echo down the centuries as sage advice to all who would be her son's disciples - "Do whatever he tells you."

ABOUT THIS SUNDAY

With the end of Christmas Time, we are now in a brief period of Ordinary Time until the season of Lent begins. The Collect acknowledges God as the one who governs "all things," and so asks him to "bestow his peace on our times." The Prayer over the Offerings reiterates how "whenever the memorial of this sacrifice is celebrated, the works of our redemption is accomplished." The Prayer after Communion highlights the unity of the faithful that is a constitutive element in the meaning of the Eucharist. It asks God to pour out the spirit of love on us to that those who have been nourished by the "one heavenly Bread" may become "one in mind and heart.".

That's The Way It Is!

Last week I explained the different tools available to theologians and why philosophy matters to theology. This week I want to explain why one's philosophical system is going to influence their theology.

One of the most basic problems in metaphysics is a certain paradox about reality: there is unity, yet diversity, change, yet permanence, multiplicity yet singularity, in everything that exists. The wisest of philosophers over the centuries have tried to harmonize and reconcile these seeming paradoxes with greater or lesser success.

The philosophers who have grappled with this problem fall into one of four metaphysical systems: 1) Realism, 2) Moderate Realism, 3) Conceptualism, 4) Nominalism. The modern philosophers tend towards Conceptualism and Nominalism, while the ancient and medieval philosophers tended towards Realism and Moderate Realism.

Why is this important? To egregiously oversimplify: If one's metaphysical system is Realist or Moderate Realist, one believes that there is an objective principle that makes things what they are. This principle, whatever it is called, whatever it is—is the underlying basis of all reality. If one's metaphysical system is Conceptualist or Nominalist, reality has no objective principle that makes it what it is. Any objective principle that seems to exist, exists only in the human mind (Conceptualism) and or is a name we assign something for convenience sake. (Nominalism.)

Understanding this, one should begin to understand why something like gay marriage or gender reassignment surgery (for example) makes sense to the modern mind. metaphysical systems underpinning Philosophy (Conceptualism and Nominalism) reject an objective basis to reality. This means there is no objective essence to marriage. Marriage is whatever we project it to be or define it to be. The idea that there is an objective essence underpinning gender is also rejected. If this is the case, than one's gender is a projection of the human mind, it does not exist objectively. This means all one has to do to change one's gender is change the biological components to bring them in line with one's personal and subjective "gender identity."

In a Realist or Moderate Realist metaphysical system, such things are unintelligible because there IS an objective basis that undergirds and unifies reality. This entails marriage does have an objective basis and the definition cannot be changed based on cultural whims. This means gender does not lie in one's mind, but has a basis in reality. In this system, then, gender reassignment surgery does not change one's gender. A man who has his genitalia removed and female genitalia added is not a women but a man with female genitalia. The same with a women who has male genitalia added and female genitalia removed. She does not become a man through such a surgery; she just becomes a female that has male body parts.

In some ways, the disagreements between liberal secularism and Catholicism are as much a disagreement about differing metaphysical systems as it is theology and doctrine. In fact I would suggest that one's metaphysical system is going to govern how one approaches the sources of Revelation and the teachings of the Church.

This may be one of the reasons dissident scholars have such trouble finding many of the Catholic teachings regarding morality in Scripture and or Tradition. For these scholars, even IF it is admitted that Scripture forbids something (say homosexual behavior) they can just dismiss the verse as being culture bound and time bound. You see, it is the culture that gives meaning to and informs the message of Scripture for the Nominalist or the Conceptualist. For the Realist or Moderate Realist, it is Scripture that gives meaning to and informs the community.

What I have written above is NOT intended to be in any way exhaustive and is I admit, overly simplistic. It has to be given the patience people have with such heady concepts and a limited amount of space in the bulletin. Anyone interested in learning more should consult the works of Professor Edward Fesor, a philosophy professor at Pasadena City College in CA. A particular work of his is "The Last Great Superstition: a Refutation of the New Atheism." He covers in far greater detail and far greater depth, the issues I am talking about. Caution: his works are not for the faint of heart. They are extremely heady. Even I have a tough time with them, and I am brilliant---or so I tell myself.

News From the Vatican

PRAYERS WORK MIRACLES

2016-01-12 (Vatican Radio) - Pope Francis says prayer works miracles and prevents the hardening of the heart. Pope Francis took his cue from the Bible reading of the day which tells the story of Hannah, a woman whom,

deeply distressed by her infertility, desperately prays to the Lord to give her a child, and of Eli, a priest, who looks on vaguely from afar and superficially judges the woman as a drunkard as he can see her babbling but cannot hear her words. "Hannah was praying silently, her lips moved but her voice was not heard. Hers is the courage of a woman of faith who is weeping and grieving and asks the Lord for his grace. There are many good women in the Church, many! They place all their trust in prayer. Let us think of one of them, Saint Monica who was able, with her tears, to be granted the grace of conversion for her son, Saint Augustine. There are so many."

Eli, the priest, is "a poor man" towards whom, Francis says, he feels "a certain sympathy because I find faults in myself that allow me to understand him well and feel close to him. How easily do we judge people and lack the respect to say: 'I wonder what he has in his heart. I do not know, but I will say nothing.' When the heart lacks compassion one always thinks evil and does not understand those who pray with pain and anguish and entrust that pain and anguish to the Lord."

"Jesus knows this kind of prayer. When he was in Gethsemane and was so anguished and hurt he sweated blood, He did not accuse the Father: 'Father, if You are willing, remove this cup from me; yet not my will, but Yours be done.' Jesus responded in the same way of the woman: with meekness. Sometimes, we pray, we ask things of God, but often we do not know how to engage with the Lord, to ask for grace."

The Pope also recalled the story of a man in Buenos Aires whose 9-year-old-daughter was dying in hospital. He said he spent the night at the shrine of the Virgin of Luján clinging to the gate and praying for the grace of healing. The next morning, when he returned to the hospital, his daughter was healed. "Prayer works miracles; it works miracles for Christians, whether they be faithful laypeople, priests, bishops who have lost compassion. The prayers of the faithful change the Church: it's not us popes, bishops, priests or nuns who carry the Church forward, but Saints. Saints are those who dare to believe that God is the Lord and that He can do everything."

CATECHESIS ON MERCY IN THE BIBLE

Vatican City, 13 January 2016 (VIS) – During today's general audience, the Pope began a new cycle of catechesis dedicated to mercy from a Biblical perspective, to foster an understanding of what mercy is through listening to what God Himself teaches us with His Word.

Francis referred to a passage from the Book of Exodus in which the Lord describes Himself as "a God merciful and

gracious, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love and faithfulness." "In other texts too we encounter this formula, with some variation, but stress is always placed on the mercy and love of God Who never tires of forgiving," he said, before going on to analyze each of these terms used in the sacred Scripture to describe God.

The word "merciful" evokes an attitude of tenderness, "like that of a mother towards her child. Indeed, the Hebrew word used in the Bible makes us think of the maternal womb. Therefore the image suggested is that of a God who is moved to tenderness for us like a mother when she holds her child in her arms, wishing only to love, protect and help him, willing to give everything, even herself. A love, then, that can be defined as ... visceral."

The Lord is full of pity and compassion; in His greatness "He stoops to those who are weak and poor, always ready to welcome, understand and forgive". He is like the father in the parable of the prodigal son "who does not close himself in resentment at his abandonment by his youngest son, but on the contrary continues to wait for him, and then runs out to meet and embrace him. He does not even let him finish his confession ... so great is his love and joy at finding him again".

Of this merciful God it is also said that He is "slow to anger", as if He waited before responding, breathing deeply without losing patience. "God knows how to wait: He does not have the impatience of men. He is like the wise farmer who knows how to wait, who leaves time to let the good seed grow, rather than weeds".

Finally, the Lord proclaims Himself "abounding in steadfast love and faithfulness". "How beautiful is this definition of God!", exclaimed the Pope. "Here we find everything. Because God is great and powerful, but this greatness and power are shown in loving us, so small and incapable as we are. The word 'to love' as used here indicates affection, grace, goodness. It is the love that takes the first step; that does not depend upon human merits but on an immense gratuity. It is the divine solicitude that nothing can stop, not even sin, as it goes beyond sin, conquering evil and forgiving it. A faithfulness without limits: here is the last word of God's revelation to Moses. God's faithfulness never ceases because the Lord ... never sleeps, but rather keeps watch over us continually to bring us to life".

"God is always and completely loyal", concluded Francis. "His is a solid and stable presence. It is the certainty of our faith. In this Jubilee of Mercy, let us trust fully in Him, to feel the joy of being loved by this merciful and clement God, slow to anger and great in love and faithfulness".

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
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
