Mission Statement

Baptisms

Parents anticipating the birth of their first child are asked to attend baptismal instructions classes before the birth of their child, if possible. Please contact the Rectory to register. Note: Baptisms cannot be scheduled until all the necessary paperwork is completed.

Confirmation

Confirmation is administered every three years to all 6th, 7th, and 8th grade students in our Parish CCD program. Children wishing to receive Confirmation must be enrolled and participating in the CCD program for two years before they are eligible to receive the sacrament.

Marriages

In order to complete the necessary paperwork, couples are asked to contact the Rectory at least one full year in advance of the proposed marriage date.

Anointing of the Sick

Please contact the Rectory whenever a member of your family has become sick or hospitalized. Please note, because of the new government regulations regarding privacy, hospitals cannot release information without a patient's consent.

Reconciliation

The sacrament is celebrated each **Saturday from 4:00 – 4:45pm and Monday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday from 11:45am – 12:00noon** in the church and also by appointment.

Monthly Visitations

Any parishioner who is homebound and wishes to receive the Eucharist on a monthly basis is asked to contact the Rectory to schedule a visit.

Rite of Christian Initiation in Adults (RCIA)

The RCIA prepares interested adults for reception into the Catholic Church. The program is adapted to the each person's needs and prepares them for full initiation into the faith. Please contact the rectory to register for the classes.

Liturgical Reflection

Third Sunday of Easter

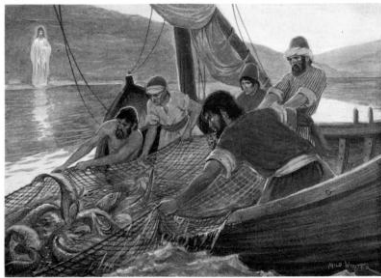
FIRST READING: Acts 5:27-31,40-41

The Acts of the Apostles continues to tell the story of the spread of the Gospel in the days following the Resurrection and the Ascension of Jesus. This Sunday we again hear of the Apostles and the ongoing conflict with the Sanhedrin. To keep them from preaching about Jesus, the authorities had the Apostles jailed. But an angel of God secretly released them during the night and ordered them to resume their preaching in the Temple area. The authorities puzzle over how these men escaped locked cells, but the Apostles are convinced God is directing their fate. That's why, after this second arrest, they dare to defy the Sanhedrin and insist they must "obey God rather than men." Beaten and warned to keep silent about Jesus, the Apostles go forth rejoicing, not because they are free, nor because they narrowly escaped death, but because they were "found worthy" to suffer for the sake of Christ.

SECOND READING: Revelation 5:11-14

In chapter 5, the Book of Revelation shifts from extolling the creator to unfolding the story of the plan of salvation. The vivid depiction of the heavenly liturgy finds all in the universe raising its voice to the glory of God. John's message is clear: Christ is not a victim; he is a victor reigning at the right hand of God. He is the source of life and those who give themselves to him, no matter what present trials they must endure, will conquer death with him and find eternal reward in his Kingdom.

GOSPEL: John 21:1-19



The third appearance of the Risen Christ happens at the seashore. Just as his disciples are first called from their nets, the Apostles now are engaged at their work. Again, the Lord is

encountered in meal fellowship. Notice how the three affirmations demanded of Peter are parallel to his three denials before the Crucifixion. Peter and the others will be called to powerfully shepherd the flock, even though it will be to the death. Peter's death is referenced in the stretching out of hands. Not only will Peter follow Jesus as shepherd of the flock, he will also follow him to the glory of martyrdom for the sake of his sheep.

ABOUT THIS SUNDAY

In the Collect we ask God to "Open the eyes of our faith, that we may behold him in all his redeeming work." The Prayer over the Offerings continues the joyful tone of the texts by describing the Church as "exultant" as we offer these gifts, again asking that the offerings will "bear fruit in perpetual happiness."

That's The Way It Is!



Mother Angelica, founder of the Eternal Word Television Network, passed away at age 92 on March 27, 2016 around 5:00pm. I want to apologize for not writing sooner about this great woman. Mother Angelica was a giant in the Catholic Church. I also believe and hope another saint. She accomplished what the United States bishops could not: create a successful Catholic television network that reached the masses. Mother was known for her wit and fidelity to the Church as well as being fiery and feisty on her program at times. She used her life and influence to defend and glorify God and his Revelation as handed on and kept by the Church.

What is amazing is that Mother built the EWTN Empire and shrine in an area where there was rampant racism. 30 some years ago, Blacks, Hispanics and Catholics were not welcome in Hanceville, Alabama. The hatred was so bad that Mother actually had to employ private armed guards to patrol the shrine. Initially mother simply headed her community of nuns in the abbey. She raised money to build and run the abbey through simple fundraisers: peanuts, fishing lures, tapes and books. While Mother Angelica was a simple woman who was self educated, her books and tapes proved to be quite popular. This led her to television. Mother understood that television was a way to reach the masses with the Gospel.

Mother Angelica pulled no punches with people. If she felt that something was God's will, she threw herself into it and did not let anyone stand in her way. Raymond Arroyo (popular TV personality at EWTN) recounts that Mother Angelica had contracted with a local TV station to

film her videos. The TV station also decided to air a movie denying the resurrection of Christ. Mother demanded that the station not air the movie or they would lose her business. The manager threatened her by telling her that without him she would never be on TV. Mother Angelica, not to be trifled with said "I don't need you. I only need God. I will build my own studio."

Build her own studio she did—along with a television empire that has no parallel or equal in the Catholic Church. Mother Angelica when faced with daunting challenges, followed these steps: 1) Ask God's will in prayer, 2) once she knew it, throw caution to the wind and trust in God, 3) work, work work, paying no attention to naysayers and dissenters, 4) rinse, and repeat. Mother let nothing stand in her way. She knew there are two kinds of people in life: those who tell you why something cannot be done, and those who tell you how they did it.

On her TV shows, Mother told it like it was. Mother even bucked the US bishops at times. In 1996 at a Called to Holiness conference in Detroit, she refused to interview some of the bishops. The bishops demanded by whose authority she refused them. Mother replied "I own the network." When the bishops replied that she would not always be there, she famously quipped "I'll blow the damn thing up before you get your hands on it." At one point, Mother even took a powerful US cardinal to task over a pastoral letter he wrote. She felt he watered down the Church's teaching on the Real Presence. Point by point on air she offered a critique of the letter!

This was one feisty woman who was not easily intimidated or bullied. When her conscience demanded it, she bucked even the bishops. Now, I am not saying let's all go out and buck the bishops after Mother's example. However, her example should serve to show us at the very least that being a woman religious in the Church does not, as our adversaries suggest, mean being weak, submissive, and blindly obeying the bishops. Mother Angelica was very much her own person and did not sacrifice her values for the sake of blind obedience, or playing some stereotypical role in the Church.

I believe Mother Angelica was a saintly woman despite any flaws she may have had. I think there are many great attributes in her that we would do well to emulate. These include but are not limited to: her strength of character, integrity, and tireless devotion to the truth of the Catholic Faith.

Eternal rest grant unto her O Lord and let perpetual light shine upon her. May she rest in peace. May her soul and all the souls of the faithfully departed through the mercy of God rest in peace, Amen.

That's the way it is!

IMPORTANT INFORMATION TO SHARE

My brother is getting married on Saturday April 16, 2016. I am leaving on Thursday April 14 after the 12:10 Mass. There will be no Mass on Friday April 15. We will have a visiting priest for the weekend Masses.

From Monday April 18 to Friday April 22 I am taking some vacation time. During this time the Church and Hall will be shut down. There will be no mass and no meetings/etc taking place anywhere in the Church or Hall. Three things are going to take place during that time: 1) a new sound system will be installed in the Church, 2) the carpet in the Hall and Church will be steam cleaned/shampooed, 3) the floor of the Church will be cleaned and refinished/polished. The people doing the projects need to have the campus to themselves so they can complete the work. Hence, while I am away, we thought it would be a good time to close the Church so this work can be completed. In this way, our Church will be in great shape to celebrate the Sacraments of Confirmation and First Communion. With the installation of the new sound system, it is hoped that our sound issues will be solved once and for all. The price for the system is \$14,800. The money to pay for this will come from the building fund. The parish council and finance council unanimously approved the project and expense. Please continue to give to the building fund. The diocese does not assess money raised for the building fund. Donating to the building fund also enables us to tackle some medium expense projects (like this) without having to come to you and ask for money. Fr. Bechtel

News From the Vatican



MARTYRS ARE STILL 'LIFE BLOOD OF THE CHURCH'

Vatican City, Apr 7, 2016 ~ Pope Francis praised the consistency and courage of the modern day martyrs who continue to "carry the Church forward" even as they face death for their witness to the Risen Christ. "These are the lifeblood of the Church; these are the ones that carry the Church forward, the witnesses, who attest that Jesus is Risen, that Jesus is alive, and they bear witness through the consistency of their life, with the Holy Spirit they have received as a gift," He said that the Church needs their witness now, just as much as at the beginning of Christianity when "Peter the coward" became "courageous" after Christ's death and resurrection, as today's readings reflected.

In the reading from the Acts of the Apostles, we learn that Peter, the very apostle who denied Christ hours before his crucifixion, has become emboldened by our Lord's resurrection and preaches the Gospel to the leaders of the Sanhedrin even though they had forbidden it, the Holy Father said. Being a Christian means being consistent "in what he says, in what he does, and what he receives," even if witnessing to the Gospel means one "puts his life on the line" by doing so.

Today, we still see so many people living out their faith in Jesus in hostile environments, he said, but their witness is what carries the Church forward. "It is the witness of our martyrs of today – so many! – chased out of their homeland, driven away, having their throats cut, persecuted: they have the courage to confess Jesus even to the point of death." In times of trouble people will often say that their country "needs heroes" which is an admirable thing to do, he said. But in the case of the Church, he continued, we need "witnesses" and "martyrs." They are "the saints of everyday, of ordinary life" which is lived with consistency and bears Christian witness "to the end, even to death." "It is the witness of those Christians who live their life seriously, and who say: 'I can't do this; I can't do evil to another; I cannot cheat; I cannot lead life halfway, I have to give my witness,'" Pope Francis said. "And this witness consists in saying what has been seen and heard in faith, namely, the Risen Jesus, with the Holy Spirit received as a gift."
