Mission Statement

Baptisms

Parents anticipating the birth of their first child are asked to attend baptismal instructions classes before the birth of their child, if possible. Please contact the Rectory to register. Note: Baptisms cannot be scheduled until all the necessary paperwork is completed.

Confirmation

Confirmation is administered every year to all 8th grade students in our Parish CCD program. Children wishing to receive Confirmation must be enrolled and participating in the CCD program for two years before they are eligible to receive the sacrament.

Marriages

In order to complete the necessary paperwork, couples are asked to contact the Rectory at least one full year in advance of the proposed marriage date.

Reconciliation

The sacrament is celebrated each Saturday from 4:00 – 4:45pm and Monday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday from 11:45am – 12:00noon in the church and also by appointment.

Anointing of the Sick

Please contact the Rectory whenever a member of your family has become sick or hospitalized. Please note, because of the new government regulations regarding privacy, hospitals cannot release information without a patient's consent.

Monthly Visitations

Any parishioner who is homebound and wishes to receive the Eucharist on a monthly basis is asked to contact the Rectory to schedule a visit.

Rite of Christian Initiation in Adults (RCIA)

The RCIA prepares interested adults for reception into the Catholic Church. The program is adapted to the each person's needs and prepares them for full initiation into the faith. Please contact the rectory to register for the classes.

Liturgical Reflection

16th Sunday in Ordinary Time

FIRST READING: Genesis 18:1-10

Abraham and Sarah entered into covenant relationship with God who had promised that they would be the ancestors of a great nation. Being old and having no children, they continued to trust that God would be faithful to those covenant promises. After many years of trusting in God's covenant word, God visits Abraham and Sarah in the guise of three strangers. Abraham's cultural sensitivity to hospitality drives him to invite them in and prepare a rich meal for them. The three strangers representing the Lord announce to them the good news of a promised child. God is faithful and does not go back on promises, establishing right relationship with all those who trust in the Lord and who respond to God in mutual covenant love.

SECOND READING: Colossians 1:24-28

All who minister in Christ's name will endure suffering for the sake of others in imitation of Christ. But that suffering is offered up to God in the hope of speeding up the return of Christ to fulfill and complete God's plan for all humanity. In these last days, God has revealed to the holy ones "the mystery hidden from ages," namely that God's salvation is for all, including the Gentiles. As the Lord's ministers, we preach and proclaim Christ to all, so that all might be prepared and perfected in Christ and arrive at total union with him in the Father's Kingdom.

GOSPEL: Luke 10:38-42

This passage, unique to Luke, narrates the hospitality offered Jesus by Martha and Mary. For Martha, hospitality is best expressed by attentiveness to details while for Mary, hospitality is best expressed by attentiveness to the person. Martha even asks Jesus to tell Mary to help her. Jesus responds with the confusing statement that Mary has chosen the better part. The story has generated many different interpretations. However, what is clear from both the Abraham and Sarah and the Martha and Mary narratives is that hospitality demands attentiveness to the person first, from which the details of service will flow. Martha and Mary are two sides of the same coin of ministry and discipleship. Let us learn to minister well by being attentive to the needs of each person we encounter.

ABOUT THIS SUNDAY

The Collect is asking God to "mercifully increase the gifts of your grace," can be seen as setting a tone for hearing the parables in today's Gospel. The Prayer over the Offerings reminds us that Christ's "one perfect sacrifice" completed all prior offering of the law and asks that our sacrifice, like Abel's "will be made holy". The communal aspect of our worship is highlighted as the prayer gives the reason we ask the sacrifice to be made holy: "so that what each has offered to the honor of your majesty/may benefit the salvation of all." The Prayer after Communion asks that we "pass from former ways to newness of life" as a result of our having been "imbued with heavenly mysteries."

That's The Way It Is!

Police were shot last week, gunned down in cold blood. 12 of the finest in Dallas were shot and several others of the finest were shot in other states. Many are horrified at the violence taking place against police. Many are angry at the violence taking place against the police.

Then there are many movements like Black Lives Matter that feel exactly the same way about police involved shootings of black men. They are equally as horrified and equally as angry. They feel that people should be just as outraged when black men are shot by police as they are at the violence against the police.

Tensions and emotions are running high in our country and we are also severely divided. As a human being I have my personal feelings about what is taking place and what the problems are. Everyone does. I am not just any human being however. I am also a priest that happens to be the pastor of a parish. A lot of people are hurting and angry. What I need to do is try to bring God's love where there is anger, hate, fear, hurt, etc.

I can act like every other political commentator. I can talk about what I think the real problems are and I can point fingers at people I think are to blame. If I do this, of what value is it? All it will do is drive people further apart and inflame emotions that are already raw.

Anger is not going to get us anywhere, finger pointing and blaming people is not going to get us anywhere. This holds true whatever side we fall. Anger is not going to help. When people react to things in anger, even if that anger is justified, it only makes things worse. What is needed right now is love.

In my prayer last evening, I said to God "I know as much. Tell me something I don't know!" I was frustrated because I didn't know how to take such an abstract concept as love and make it concrete in this case. Taking sides does not help and it will not bring people together. As much as I like to debate, argue and be right, in the violence of last week, being right isn't what is important right now. Human lives were tragically cut short last week. Right now, what is needed is healing and love.

How do we bring people together? How do we drive out hate? How do we drive out fear? We pray. That means we pray for the people in the Black Lives Matter Movement. We pray for the police. We pray for President Obama. We pray for Hillary Clinton. We pray for Donald Trump. We pray for racists. We pray for drug dealers and gang members. We pray for all those killed through violence. We pray for the families of police who are grieving the loss of their beloved. We pray for the families of black men who have lost their beloved through a police shooting. We pray for the families of anyone who have lost their beloved through some kind of tragedy.

I realize it is difficult to pray for people we might disagree with, or even think are the enemy—whatever side

we are on. I admit it is difficult for me too. Thing is, we can continue to be angry and finger point and blame people. That is not going to solve anything. We have to pray for everyone, most especially we pray for those we think are the problem or the enemy. That is the only thing that is going to help. This is how we bring God's love where there is anger, hate, fear, etc. As Christians we must be concerned first and foremost with driving out hate, fear and anger with love. Right now, the best way I can think of to do that is to pray for those on all sides of this issue.

Whatever side we fall, we can all agree that violence against anyone is wrong, and violence against everyone must stop. We can all agree that racism is wrong and that racism must stop. We can all agree that human life is sacred. For this reason anytime a human life is taken or lost, even if that life was taken in self defense, it is regrettable and not something desirable or something to celebrate. May God be with us, bless us, and may we be beacons of God's love and peace. May we bring light where there is darkness.

That's the way it is!

STATEMENT OF BISHOP JOSEPH C. BAMBERA REGARDING DALLAS SHOOTINGS 8 July 2016

Once again, our nation has been confronted by the sad consequences of a senseless and violent shooting that took place in Dallas, Texas last evening. In the context of a peaceful demonstration against the police shootings of two black men in Louisiana and Minnesota earlier this week, five police officers were shot and killed in what appears to have been a coordinated attack. Our faith and history remind us that violence is never the way to confront violence. Yet, tragically, the innocent lives of these police officers were taken as they sought to protect the very rights of those who were protesting other acts of violence.

Please join me in praying for all victims of violence and for the resolve to live in peace with one another. All lives matter and all lives deserve the respect and dignity afforded to them as children of God. As we pray for the victims of the Dallas shooting, may we also remember the countless numbers of men and women in law enforcement who stand in harm's way on a daily basis to protect our communities and keep us safe.

Our faith in Christ, born of having recognized our own need for him who has come to heal our wounds, to enrich us, to give us life, to nourish us, is the basis of our concern for the integral development of society's most neglected members." — Pope Francis

News From the Vatican



Pope Francis said the parable of the Good Samaritan isn't just a nice passage to reflect on, but signifies a concrete choice we make in deciding how to live and treat those around us. "The Good Samaritan indicates a lifestyle, the center of which is not ourselves, but others, with their difficulties, who we meet on our path and who challenge us." "It's us who choose this lifestyle or choose to reject it," he said, "explaining that the attitude of the Good Samaritan tests our faith, since faith without works is dead. Let us ask ourselves: is our faith fertile? Does it produce good works? Or is it rather sterile, and so more dead than alive? Do I make neighbors, or do I just pass by?" Francis asked, adding that these questions would be good to ask ourselves often, since in the end "we will be judged on the works of mercy." The Lord, he said, will remind us of the situations in which we saw him in those around us and either helped, or did nothing. "Do you remember that time on the street of Jerusalem and Jericho? That man who was half dead was me. Do you remember? That hungry child was me. Do you remember? That migrant who many times they wanted to throw out was me. Those grandparents, abandoned in the nursing home, was me. That sick person in the hospital, who no one visited, was me," the Pope said, explaining that these are the questions we will be asked." It is through good works, done with love and joy toward our neighbor, which makes our faith sprout and bear fruit, Francis observed. When Jesus' disciples ask him "who is my neighbor?" it's the same question we must each ask ourselves today, he said. Francis cautioned that we mustn't "catalogue others to decide who is my neighbor and who isn't," explaining that being a neighbor entails adopting the same attitude as the Samaritan toward the people we meet who need help, "even if they are a stranger or even hostile." The Pope then pointed to how Jesus tells his disciples to "go, and also you do the same." Jesus, he said, repeats the same commandment to each one of us: "go and to the same, be a neighbor to the brother and sister you see in difficulty," whether they are a stranger, a migrant, elderly or sick.
