Baptisms

Parents anticipating the birth of their first child are asked to attend baptismal instructions classes before the birth of their child, if possible. Please contact the Rectory to register. Note: Baptisms cannot be scheduled until all the necessary paperwork is completed.

Confirmation

Confirmation is administered every year to all 8th grade students in our Parish CCD program. Children wishing to receive Confirmation must be enrolled and participating in the CCD program for two years before they are eligible to receive the sacrament.

Marriages

In order to complete the necessary paperwork, couples are asked to contact the Rectory at least one full year in advance of the proposed marriage date.

Reconciliation

The sacrament is celebrated each Saturday from 4:00-4:45 pm and Monday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday from 11:45 am-12:00 noon in the church and also by appointment.

Anointing of the Sick

Please contact the Rectory whenever a member of your family has become sick or hospitalized. Please note, because of the new government regulations regarding privacy, hospitals cannot release information without a patient's consent.

Monthly Visitations

Any parishioner who is homebound and wishes to receive the Eucharist on a monthly basis is asked to contact the Rectory to schedule a visit.

Rite of Christian Initiation in Adults (RCIA)

The RCIA prepares interested adults for reception into the Catholic Church. The program is adapted to the each person's needs and prepares them for full initiation into the faith. Please contact the rectory to register for the classes.

FIRST READING: Exodus 32:7-11, 13-14

The narrator of Exodus reports a dramatic conversation between God and Moses. God is displeased with the infidelity of the "stiff-necked" people and intends to bring punishment upon them. God sends Moses to make such an announcement. But Moses implores God to remember that they are "your own people" and reminds God of the promise to make this people a great nation. God listens to Moses and relents.

SECOND READING: 1 Timothy 1:12-17

Paul's biographical account to Timothy recalls his time of persecution of the followers of Christ. But Paul gives thanks to the Lord for sending him the grace to change his life. He now believes that Christ came into the world to save sinners and he humbly counts himself as one of them. He then expresses gratitude that Christ Jesus considered him a trustworthy Apostle.

GOSPEL: Luke 15:1-32

Chapter 15 of Luke's account recounts three of the most familiar parables of Jesus. The lost sheep, the lost coin, and the Prodigal Son attest to the mercy of God. Each notes the joy of the shepherd, the woman, and the father when the sheep, the coin, and the son have been found. The compassion of God is personified in the actions of the shepherd, the woman, and the father who seek out the lost. The story of the prodigal centers on the Father's mercy and reminds us we can always return home. All are offered forgiveness, but not all embrace it.

PRIESTS FOR LIFE

That's The Way It Is!

Dear parishioners,

I will pick back up with the "That's the way it is" next week. Since we are putting out a financial report this week I felt I should address that.

This week's bulletin contains a financial report for the fiscal year 2015-2016. We have tried our best to take loads of data and details and give you a general picture of the finances here in the parish. We have also tried to present the report in such a way as a person does not need a background in accounting or business to understand it.

Overall I am happy to tell you that the parish is fiscally healthy. We have a budget that matches income with expenses. We are not deficit spending. As long as the giving and generosity of the parish at large remains as it is, I project that we will remain fiscally healthy. As you know, our parish needs \$5,900 each week to maintain its fiscal health. While the totals are sometimes below that amount, they appear to even out in the course of the year because some totals (like those at the beginning of the month) are larger.

I, along with the business manager and finance council worked hard to ensure that the yearly budget does not require us to ask for an increase in offering. All we ask is that you continue to contribute to the parish at your current level. Much of the budget involves fixed expenses. These fixed expenses involve things like salaries, insurance premiums, assessments, utilities, taxes, etc. Where possible we did trim expenses in the parts of the budget that are not fixed.

I want to thank you for your consistent generosity to the parish and also the Diocesan annual appeal. Our parish is one of the few in the diocese that not only reaches its goal but surpasses its goal. This year we received approximately \$5000 dollars back from the appeal. This often helps us during the summer when our offering totals are lower because people are away.

I realize you have a limited amount of money. The way I handle my own personal contributions to Saint Peter's is this: Saint Peter's always gets first priority. The second priority is the Diocesan Annual Appeal. The third priority is the other diocesan "second collections." After that comes everything else.

When it comes to your contributions, I cannot tell you what you should or should not offer. That is a personal decision. My only request is that when you decide what your contributions are going to be that those contributions reflect your state in life.

We have some projects coming up that I am going to have to tackle. Our parish church is in need of a new roof. The HVAC in the parish center is nearing the end of its lifespan. For this reason I project that we will need to replace the HVAC units. (I will give more information when the time comes to replace the roof and the HVAC)

When those projects are completed, I would like to explore the possibility of replacing our organ.

The money to pay for these and other projects will come from the building fund. I have written to Bishop Bambera to request permission that the building fund continues to not be assessed. The bishop has granted permission. This is why it is important for you to continue to contribute to the building fund.

Our parish maintains two parish cemeteries. We have a cemetery in Antrim and we also have Saint Peter's cemetery. Please continue to use your cemetery envelops and contribute to these accounts. This enables us to maintain our cemeteries without being burdensome on the general parish funds.

I would be remiss if I did not mention our parish outreach Samaritan House. We receive many donations from all over that support the work of Samaritan House. Our community at large is extremely supportive of this important work. Our work in Samaritan House does not go unnoticed or unappreciated.

Thank you all for your generosity to your parish and the diocese. May God allow the blessings you contribute to return to you one hundredfold. If you have any questions about the financial report simply stop by the office.

Diocesan Appeal Kick-Off Video Transcript

Bishop Joseph C. Bambera

In announcing the Jubilee Year of Mercy, Pope Francis reminded us of words that come from St. Luke's gospel, "Be merciful, as your Heavenly Father is merciful." Jesus' invitation to all of us to live the gospel of mercy, through our care for the poor, through feeding the hungry, through providing shelter for the homeless is most vividly seen in the great ministry of Catholic Social Services of the Diocese of Scranton and in many of our parish social justice opportunities and activities. This past winter, Catholic Social Services teamed up with parishes throughout the greater Hazleton area to open a shelter for people who are on the streets. Not too long ago, I was privileged to dedicate St. Michael's on the Hill, (Jessup, PA) a wonderful housing project for senior citizens.

Stanyal Shay: Resident at Shepherd Maternity House

I had lost my mom when I was 11. I was bouncing around from then—seventeen friend's houses just to finish high school. When I got into the car accident it took everything I made, and then I found out I was two months pregnant. At twenty-eight weeks they told me I was diagnosed—she was diagnosed with Heterotaxy, which is a heart defect, so they sent me to Philadelphia, the children's hospital. The first time I went they did open me with a lot of decision-making and as much as I had to do it in my life, this was a decision making thing that I was like, "which way do I go?" A bunch of the family and friends that has helped me throughout the years definitely told me I could do it. They were like, this would be my biggest challenge, but they know I could do it. So, I went through it and I did it.

Jessica Dobinson: Director Shepherd Maternity House

Stanyal came to us around Christmas-time of last year. She moved in. Right from the beginning, we knew that Stanyal was motivated to change her situation and make a better life for herself and her child. We found Stanyal a permanent supportive housing program that's going to be taking over the care after she leaves us, and we're just really excited to see her kind of dive into the next chapter of her life and have her own apartment and kind of make a life for herself and her child.


