Baptisms

Parents anticipating the birth of their first child are asked to attend baptismal instructions classes before the birth of their child, if possible. Please contact the Rectory to register. Note: Baptisms cannot be scheduled until all the necessary paperwork is completed.

Confirmation

Confirmation is administered every year to all 8th grade students in our Parish CCD program. Children wishing to receive Confirmation must be enrolled and participating in the CCD program for two years before they are eligible to receive the sacrament.

Marriages

In order to complete the necessary paperwork, couples are asked to contact the Rectory at least one full year in advance of the proposed marriage date.

Reconciliation

The sacrament is celebrated each Saturday from 4:00 – 4:45pm and Monday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday from 11:45am – 12:00noon in the church and also by appointment.

Anointing of the Sick

Please contact the Rectory whenever a member of your family has become sick or hospitalized. Please note, because of the new government regulations regarding privacy, hospitals cannot release information without a patient's consent.

Monthly Visitations

Any parishioner who is homebound and wishes to receive the Eucharist on a monthly basis is asked to contact the Rectory to schedule a visit.

Rite of Christian Initiation in Adults (RCIA)

Liturgical Reflection

27th Sunday in Ordinary Time


FIRST READING: Habakkuk 1:2-3, 2:2-4

Our speaker is a prophet of God who lives within a privileged relationship with the Lord and who is entrusted with vision and insight beyond the reach of the rest of us. This passage is in two parts. The first is the cry of the prophet who believes that God does not listen or intervene in his misery. The second part is God's response. God's response is not so much an answer but, a vision which the prophet is to write down so all can know it. Writing down a vision, it was believed, would help make it come true. The content of the vision is not stated, but it has the purpose of stating that the events of life are in the mind of God and his plan will not disappoint. Over and over God promises the vision will be fulfilled. But it will take faith and patience to reach that day and only the "just," not the "rash" will get there.

SECOND READING: 2 Timothy 1:1-6, 13-14

Paul encourages his disciple Timothy to be courageous and faithful in bearing witness to the Gospel. Perhaps Timothy has been timid in his "testimony to our Lord." So Paul reminds him of his own struggles, including being imprisoned, and exhorts Timothy to be mindful of the strength that comes from God and from the help of the Holy Spirit that "dwells within us." That same Spirit endows us with "love" and "self-control" so we can proceed down life's path with confidence and peace. All Timothy has learned from Paul remains true and reliable. Now he must "guard" that "rich trust" to ensure it remains pure and true even to our day, as we must guard it for those who follow us.

GOSPEL: Luke 17:5-10



The Apostles are concerned with their lack of faith, which they assume has to do with a certain quantity that needs to be increased. Jesus tells them that even if their faith is the size of a mustard seed, they

will be able to do what they have been asked to do. Jesus' image of the mustard seed speaks of the quality of a commitment to their ministry and rather than a concern for how much or how great the results they accomplish. In further response to their request for greater faith, he illustrates the concrete form faith takes. And that form is service. His no-nonsense example presents a master who expects his servants to do their work without having to thank them for simply doing their duty. Discipleship is its own reward. Those who enter the vineyard can't stand around waiting to be crowned with laurel. Faith changes us into servants who do what's necessary – love, give witness, repent, forgive – no matter how hard the task. And they do it expecting nothing in return.

That's The Way It Is!



Life Chain is something that has taken place the first weekend of October, as long as I can remember. The Life Chain is a witness to the sanctity of human life. It is a major event for the pro-life movement. The other major event is the March for Life in Washington, D.C. The march takes place on or around the anniversary of one of the worst decisions of the SCOTUS: Roe. V. Wade. That decision, handed down on January 22, 1972, legalized abortion in this country.

Since that decision, almost 59 million (yes million) unborn children have been killed in the name of "choice," "women's rights," and "women's health care." I note that the abortion industry has been so successful in getting the people in this country to accept abortion precisely because they control the terminology and they frame the debate. They redefined abortion as "choice," "women's rights," and "women's health care." As I used to teach my students in any debate, there are those who frame the debate and control the terminology control the debate.

This Sunday, many people from churches all over the area and even people who do not attend Church, will be witnessing to the sanctity of unborn human life. Notice I say that they will be witnessing, not protesting. Is there a difference? In my mind, the difference is this: a witness is more passive, while a protest is more active. During the life chain we will stand on the sidewalks with signs decrying the evil of abortion. We are silent. We do not march. We simply stand for one hour on the sidewalk with signs. We also pray during that time.

There are people who drive by or walk by and make obscene gestures or shout obscene things at us. This is part and parcel of the Life Chain. We are supposed to get insulted. That is the whole point. Witnessing to God's Truth leads to persecution. Jesus said "Blessed are you when they insult you and utter every kind of evil against you falsely because of me. Rejoice and be glad for your reward in heaven will be great" (Matthew 5: 11-12). On the back of the sign, those who are engaged in the witness are explicitly instructed to say nothing to any hecklers and allow them to hurl insults. We are instructed to pray for them.

Parents often bring their children to Life Chain. Last year as I participated in the Life Chain, I overheard a couple say "O my God...I can't believe these people even brought children to this. What is wrong with them?" I remember thinking "Wrong with us!!?? What is wrong with YOU!!?? What, precisely do you think this witness is about if not children, in particular unborn children!!??" I have never understood, and no one who supports abortion seems interested in explaining to me exactly, 1) what is so great about abortion, and 2) The connection between abortion and women's rights, health care or choice. What, precisely, does abortion have to do with any of that?

Even President Obama, one of the most ardent supporters of abortion, believes abortions should be "safe, legal and rare." ("Rare" is the key word.) Exactly why abortions should be rare, if no human life is being destroyed, is not explained. If an abortion really is just a medical procedure like any other medical procedure, what does it matter if it is rare?

Hilary Clinton got herself into hot water with Planned Parenthood. This shocked me as much as anyone else, given the fact that Hilary Clinton is one of their most ardent supporters. Hilary Clinton referred to an unborn child as a "person." Planned Parenthood was none too happy with this. Of course they would not be happy. If people start realizing that an unborn child is, well, a child and therefore a person, they might rethink the concept of abortion. Those who support abortion aren't stupid.

This weekend, I invite you all to participate in the Life Chain and witness to the sanctity of all human life, especially the unborn. Remember, the event is a witness, not a protest.

Diocesan seminarian Ryan Glenn is serving a year of pastoral assignment at St. Matthew Parish, East Stroudsburg, with his long-time spiritual shepherd, Fr. Serving with Mercy



Jubilee Year of Mercy

This Holy Year will conclude on Sunday, November 20th, the Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe and living face of the Father's mercy.

Pope Francis said the ongoing Jubilee of Mercy is a time of grace and of mercy “for all, good and evil, those who are healthy and those who suffer. The good and the bad...because the Church is mercy!” “Nothing can separate us from the love of Christ!” he said, and directed his words to all who are “nailed to a hospital bed, who live closed in a prison, to those who are trapped in war,” telling them: “look to the Crucifix; God is with you, he remains with you on the Cross and offers himself to all as the Savior.”

News From the Vatican



CNA/EWTN News- In a passionate speech, Pope Francis condemned as arrogant the mentality of revenge and the abuses of power that lead to violent conflicts. “Violence begets violence,

and we have the impression of being caught up in a spiral of arrogance and inertia from which there is no escape,” the Pope told members of charitable and humanitarian organizations, adding that the evil “which grips our will and conscience should challenge us.” “Why, even at the cost of untold damage to persons, property and the environment, does man continue to pursue abuses of power, revenge and violence?” he said, and pointed to a recent attack on a U.N. humanitarian convoy as an example. Acts of violence such as this are part of the “mysterium iniquitatis,” he said, referring to “that evil which is present in man and in history and which needs to be redeemed.” Francis condemned the attack as “destruction for destruction’s sake,” and stressed that “the answer to the drama of evil lies in the mystery of Christ.”

Pope Francis lamented that despite extensive efforts made in the past five years, “Even now, we have not been able to put an end to the exasperating suffering and repeated violations of human rights.” Those who work or volunteer in charitable and humanitarian organizations are a reflection of God’s mercy, and a sign that “evil has limits and does not have the last word,” Francis said. “This is a sign of great hope,” he continued, and offered his thanks to those who pray daily for the victims of the conflicts, particularly the children, observing that “in Aleppo, children have to drink polluted water!” However, Pope Francis noted that beyond the necessary humanitarian aid, what citizens in the Middle East really want more than anything else is peace. Because of this, the Pope said he will never tire of asking the international community “for greater and renewed efforts to achieve peace throughout the Middle East, and of asking not to look the other way.” “This request is my daily prayer to God, to inspire the minds and hearts of all who have political responsibility, that they may be able to renounce their own interests in order to achieve the greater good: peace,” he said.
