Mission Statement

Baptisms

Parents anticipating the birth of their first child are asked to attend baptismal instructions classes before the birth of their child, if possible. Please contact the Rectory to register. Note: Baptisms cannot be scheduled until all the necessary paperwork is completed.

Confirmation

Confirmation is administered every year to all 8th grade students in our Parish CCD program. Children wishing to receive Confirmation must be enrolled and participating in the CCD program for two years before they are eligible to receive the sacrament.

Marriages

In order to complete the necessary paperwork, couples are asked to contact the Rectory at least one full year in advance of the proposed marriage date.

Reconciliation

The sacrament is celebrated each Saturday from 4:00-4:45 pm and Monday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday from 11:45 am-12:00 noon in the church and also by appointment.

Anointing of the Sick

Please contact the Rectory whenever a member of your family has become sick or hospitalized. Please note, because of the new government regulations regarding privacy, hospitals cannot release information without a patient's consent.

Monthly Visitations

Any parishioner who is homebound and wishes to receive the Eucharist on a monthly basis is asked to contact the Rectory to schedule a visit.

Rite of Christian Initiation in Adults (RCIA)

FIRST READING: 2 Kings 5:14-17

This brief passage about the healing of Naaman is rich with images. He plunges into the water seven times, a number that denotes fulfillment. Although Naaman was an important figure, he travelled with a "whole retinue," his leprosy would have placed him on the edge of the community. His healing brings conversion and thanksgiving, and a promise to worship the God of Israel. Elisha's refusal of gifts for his service reflects no rancor, but his awareness that he did only what God required, so any reward will come from the Lord. Both men are bold exemplars of faith lived and spoken with conviction.

SECOND READING: 2 Timothy 2:8-13


Paul writes to Timothy from prison and uses his situation to give a perspective on the power of the Word of God. He boldly proclaims that the "word of God is not chained." This statement is intended to give courage to those who will proclaim their own testimony of the Risen Lord. Their salvation lies in believing that those who have died with the Lord will also reign with him in glory. Paul's key word appears at the beginning: "remember." That's what the liturgy is – an act of ritual remembrance of the saving acts of God in Christ. Paul is not theorizing but speaking from the heart about his own lived experience of faith. He has preached this "gospel" and is now suffering for it, writing from a prison cell. Paul suffers willingly because he trusts that his suffering will be for the benefit of those who have come to know Christ.

GOSPEL: Luke 17:11-19



The healing of the ten lepers is another story of Luke's account that proclaims the interventions of God in the struggle of those who seek relief from human events. The narrative bears testimony to

the compassion of God for those unjustly left on the edges of society through no fault of their own. But there is a concluding teaching for all of us: giving thanks for God's great love is also expected. The ten had demonstrated faith by calling out to Jesus and addressing him as "master." That only one returns genuinely disappoints Jesus. The nine settled for too little for had they returned, they too would have received the far greater gift he gives the Samaritan: the promise of salvation.

That's The Way It Is!



I have been ordained for eight years. Since being ordained I have been through two presidential election cycles. The next election constitutes the third election cycle since I have been ordained. Every time we face a

presidential election year, questions are raised and debates ensue about the relationship of the Catholic Faith to our political ideology. Questions are also raised and debates ensue about the relationship of the Church and state.

There are those who think they can divorce their political ideology from their Faith. They think their political ideology can take precedence over the Catholic Faith. Some even think that political ideology should inform the Catholic Faith, not the other way around. In other words—when faced with a conflict between the Church and state, the person believes the state should win out. The Catholic Faith must take a back seat to the demands of politics and the state.

Let me state at the outset that the early Christians did not share those views. When faced with a conflict between the demands of the state and or politics, the early Christians chose the Faith. For that, the government put them to death. This is pretty much the history of the Church until around the 300's when Constantine assumed the throne and legalized Christianity.

Whether "separation of church and state" means that government is to stay out of the Church, not that the Church must stay out of government, or visa-versa is not my concern here. What I want all Catholics to understand is that the Catholic Faith is not a private affair. By definition it is public and therefore going to enter the political sphere. This cannot be helped because of the very nature of Faith. A private Faith is no Faith at all. What good is the Catholic Faith if it is confined to the four walls of the Church, or the four walls of our homes?

The Bible says "You are the light of the world. A town built on a hill cannot be hidden." (Matthew 5:14.) The Bible also says "No one lights a lamp and puts it under a bushel basket. Instead the lamp is placed on a stand where all who enter the house can see it." (Luke 11:33) Those who claim "My Faith is private, between me and God" are akin to those who light lamps and hide them. Faith is not private. That is what must be understood.

If the Church does not have the right to speak to issues, even political issues facing us, what good is the Church?

Who would argue that priests and bishops should have not spoken out against Hitler in Nazi Germany—because of separation of Church and state and Faith is private? There are those who claim that the Church did not do enough when slavery was legal in this country to speak out against it. If I granted that, but argued that this was because the bishops didn't want to wade into the political arena and violate separation of Church and state, who would buy that as a justifiable reason for not speaking out against the evil of slavery?

I could go on and on with examples. I hope the above two are sufficient to prove why 1) Faith is not private, and 2) the Church must have the right to speak to political issues that are important to the Catholic Faith and offer guidance to Catholics regarding those issues and where the Church stands.

I can grant that the Church should not speak to political party or candidate in any direct way under normal circumstances. I do not see that as an absolute, however. For example, Hitler went after churches that spoke out against him and his persecution of the Jewish people. Would any person suggest that churches should have not criticized Hitler because they would have been directly speaking to a party or political figure?

Remember: Faith is public, and by definition it is going to have to enter the political arena at some point. Sometimes conflicts are inevitable between our Faith politics. I can't tell you what to do if your Faith conflicts with your politics. I can tell you that by God's grace my loyalty lies with Christ. By God's grace, Christ will win out every time, even if it means jail, persecution or death at the hands of the state. By God's grace is always the key word. On my own, I would be like Sergeant Shultz from the popular TV series Hogan's Heroes: "I know nothing, I see nothing!"

Notice Regarding Reporting Sexual Abuse of a Minor

It is the policy of the Diocese of Scranton to report any allegation of sexual abuse of a minor to law enforcement. If you are a victim of sexual abuse committed by a priest, deacon, religious or lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton, you are encouraged to immediately report the matter to law enforcement. If any priest, deacon, religious, lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton has cause or reason to suspect that a minor has been subjected to any form of abuse, including child sexual abuse, the matter will be reported to law enforcement. In accordance with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's Child Protective Services Laws, reports of suspected child abuse should also be made immediately by phone to the 24-HourChild Abuse hotline (ChildLine) at 1-800-932-0313 or electronically www.compass.state.pa.us/cwis.

It is also the policy of the Diocese to adhere to all civil and state regulations. To this end, the Diocese is equally committed to adhering to the norms of the Code of Canon Law and to upholding the tenets of the USCCB Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People, which includes supporting victims of sexual abuse in their pursuit of emotional and spiritual well-being. As such, information regarding an allegation of sexual abuse of a minor should also be reported to the Victim Assistance Coordinator, Joseph DeVizia at (570-862-7551) or to Diocesan officials, including the Vicar General, Monsignor Thomas M. Muldowney, V.G., at (570-207-2269).

POPE FRANCIS' IN-FLIGHT PRESS CONFERENCE

John Jeremiah Sullivan, New York Times Magazine: Holy Father, as you know the United States is nearing the end of a long presidential campaign

that has been very ugly and has received much attention in the world. Many American Catholics and people of conscience are struggling with how to choose between two candidates, one of whom diverts from some aspects of the Church's teaching and the other of whom has made statements vilifying immigrants and religious minorities. How would you counsel the faithful in America and what wisdom would you have them keep in mind next month when the election occurs?

Pope Francis: You pose me a question where you describe a difficult choice, because, according to you, you have difficulty in one and you have difficulty in the other. In electoral campaigns, I never say a word. The people are sovereign. I'll just say a word: Study the proposals well, pray and choose in conscience. Then, I'll leave the issue and I speak of a fiction, because I don't want to speak to this concrete issue. When it happens that in whatever country here are 2, 3, 4 candidates that no one likes, that means that the political life of the nation perhaps is too politicized but perhaps it doesn't have that much politics. And, one of the jobs of the church, also in the teaching in the (university) faculties, is teaching to have political culture. There are nations, and I'm thinking of Latin America, which are too politicized. But, they don't have political culture. They are from this party, or this one or this one. Effectively, (they are) without a clear thought on the foundations, the proposals.

REMEMBER OCTOBER IS THE MONTH OF MISSIONS

(Vatican Radio) Pope Francis drew attention to the fact October is the Month of Missions. He invoked the Virgin Mary, Queen of the Missions, in his traditional special blessing to young people, the sick, and new spouses; "Dear young people, be missionaries of the Gospel in your circles with the mercy and tenderness of Jesus; Dear sick and infirm people, offer your suffering for the conversion of those faraway, and of the indifferent; and you, dear newlyweds, be missionaries in your family by announcing with Word and example the Gospel of salvation."

Evangelization: World Mission Day - That World Mission Day may renew within all Christian communities the joy of the Gospel and the responsibility to announce it.

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
