Baptisms

Confirmation

Confirmation is administered every year to all 8th grade students in our Parish CCD program. Children wishing to receive Confirmation must be enrolled and participating in the CCD program for two years before they are eligible to receive the sacrament.

Marriages

In order to complete the necessary paperwork, couples are asked to contact the Rectory at least one full year in advance of the proposed marriage date.

Reconciliation

The sacrament is celebrated each Saturday from 4:00 – 4:45pm and Monday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday from 11:45am – 12:00noon in the church and also by appointment.

Anointing of the Sick

Please contact the Rectory whenever a member of your family has become sick or hospitalized. Please note, because of the new government regulations regarding privacy, hospitals cannot release information without a patient's consent.

Monthly Visitations

Any parishioner who is homebound and wishes to receive the Eucharist on a monthly basis is asked to contact the Rectory to schedule a visit.

Liturgical Reflection

First Sunday of Advent FIRST READING: Isaiah 2:1-5

Mountains are sacred, mysterious places, where God is often found. "The mountains of the Lord's house shall be established as the highest mountain." And "all nations shall stream toward it." Here, we see the initial move toward Jerusalem, a frequent theme in the Gospel accounts as well. We must climb to grow in our faith. When Israel and all the nations walk in the light of God's instruction, they will truly "cease doing evil" and "learn to do good."

RESPONSRIAL PSALM: Psalm 122

Psalm 122 follows the theme of climbing form the First Reading. It is the one of several Psalms of Ascent used by Jewish pilgrims on their journey to Jerusalem. "Jerusalem, built as a city with compact unity. To it the tribes go up." It sets our entire attitude for Advent as we sing "Let us go rejoicing to the house of the Lord."

SECOND READING: Romans 13:11-14

In his holy Rule, Benedict tell his monks to "Keep death daily, before your eyes" (Rule of St. Benedict, 4:47). That is what Paul is telling us. Sometimes, it is easy to fall asleep, to become complacent in our faith. The Romans were returning to some of their earlier ways, and Paul tried to shake them awake with this reminder to leave earthly things behind. Today's Second Reading provides the reason for Christians to live according to Commandment to love ones' neighbor as oneself: the final fulfillment of God's plan for salvation is near at hand. Paul stresses that Christians must act in accord with the new life already begun in Christ and soon to be completed with his coming in glory. Those who continue to live in the spirit, the abiding presence of God's love freely given in Christ, will surely live by the divine command of love.

GOSPEL: Matthew 24:37-44

Stay awake! For you do not know on which day your Lord will come. Today's Gospel stresses that the time of God's coming is unknown; therefore believers must always be prepared. As the great flood caught people unaware, the coming of the

Son of Man will also arrive in God's own time. For that coming, Christians must always be prepared. Our lives must reflect the Gospel. The best way to be ready for God's coming is to live it every moment.

Advent Prayer

God of power and mercy, open our hearts in welcome. Remove the things that hinder us from receiving Christ with joy, so that we may share his wisdom and become one with him when he comes in glory, for he lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, forever and ever. Amen.

That's The Way It Is!



We have begun a new liturgical year with the start of this weekend. The First Sunday of Advent is analogous to New Year's Day in liturgy. We begin a new cycle of readings; in this case we move from year C to year A. Advent is to Christmas what Lent is to Easter. It is a time of preparation for a

special event in the life of Christ. The tenor of the season is penitential, though not so much as Lent. The Mass is more somber. The musical tone changes from joyful and celebratory to more somber and meditative.

The Advent wreath has three purple candles and one pink candle to mark the weeks of Advent and countdown to Christmas. Some Advent wreaths have a white candle in the center called the Christ candle. This candle marks the birth of Christ. The Advent wreath has been described as lighting the candles to symbolize our journey from night into day. As the birth of Christ draws ever nearer the light gets brighter until the dawn of Christmas.

The pink candle lit on the third Sunday of Advent marks a change in tone in the season of Advent. In the first two weeks of Advent the readings focused on the coming of Christ in glory and the final judgment. The last two weeks focus on the birth of Christ. The lighting of the pink candle signifies a shift in focus from the coming of Christ in glory to the birth of Christ.

The lighting of the pink candle also signifies Gaudete (rejoice) Sunday. The third Sunday of Advent is special: the penitential nature of the season is lighter in tone. The music and Mass strike a more joyful tone. On this day, the priest also has the option of wearing a special pink vestment to highlight the day. There is only one other day of the year where a priest may wear pink and that is in Lent to mark Laetare Sunday. Laetare Sunday is the Lenten counterpart to Gaudete Sunday in Advent.

The secular "Holiday Season" has begun Stores will open on Thanksgiving night. Thanksgiving. People will complain about how capitalism is intruding on holidays and how awful that is. Of course those same people don't seem to stop and think about one fact: market drives business. Stores are open on Thanksgiving because people shop on Thanksgiving. If people didn't shop on Thanksgiving, stores would not be open. The market demands that business open on the holiday, so business are, as expected, open. Think about it: if you owned a business, and you had all these people who wanted to come and spend money at your business on Thanksgiving, you are going to open your store. People that remain closed on days when a whole slew of people want to spend money at their business—don't make money and don't remain in business for long.

My point is this: people are going to spend the next four weeks worried more about whether they are prepared for Santa Clause than they are the coming of Christ. People are going to spend the next four weeks worried more about whether they are prepared for the coming of their family for Christmas dinner than they are the coming of Christ. People are going to spend the next four weeks worried more about getting special holiday "deals" than they are the coming of Christ.

Black Friday will be a mob scene at many places. Don't get me wrong, I am no prude. I like material things as much as anyone else. But I am not about to stand in some stupid line for six hours so that I can get a 1000 dollar widget for 200. What I find rather ironic is that the same people who will stake out a place in line for six or more hours can't seem to find an hour a week to get to Mass. The same people who will get up at 3:00AM Black Friday, are too tired to get out of bed for the 8:30AM Mass on Sunday.

My point: people are putting too much energy into things that do not matter and not enough energy into the things that do. By all means, have fun, shop, enjoy the secular parts of the holiday season. Just make sure you remember to put energy into preparing your hearts and minds for the things that matter. If you are going to stand in line on Black Friday for a holiday deal, make sure you are also willing to stand in line for Confession. If you are going to get up at 3:00AM on Black Friday, make sure you also find time to attend Mass. If you are worried about preparing your children for the coming of Santa, make sure they are also prepared for the coming of Christ. Make sure that they understand that even Santa recognizes that Jesus is what matters.

News From the Vatican



IF YOU GIVE GOD A CHANCE...HE IS READY TO START YOUR LIFE ANEW'

"As soon as we give God the chance, He remembers us. He is ready to completely and forever cancel our sin, because his memory –

unlike our own – does not record evil that has been done or keep score of injustices experienced. God has no memory of sin, but only of us, of each of us, we who are his beloved children. And He believes that it is always possible to start anew, to raise ourselves up. It would mean very little, however, if we believed Jesus was King of the universe, but did not make Him Lord of our lives: all this is empty if we do not personally accept Jesus and if we do not also accept his way of being King"

The Jesuit Pontiff then went on to present three figures in last Sunday's Gospel that appear, along with Jesus: the people who are looking on, those near the Cross, and the criminal crucified next to Jesus.

Speaking first on the people who "stood by, watching," without drawing closer, Francis reflected: "Given the circumstances of our lives and our unfulfilled expectations, we too can be tempted to keep our distance from Jesus' kingship, to not accept completely the scandal of his humble love, which unsettles and disturbs us." Even if at times we feel tempted to keep our distance, Francis pointed out: "A people who are holy, however, who have Jesus as their King, are called to follow his way of tangible love. They are called to ask themselves, each one each day: "What does love ask of me, where is it urging me to go? What answer am I giving Jesus with my life?"

Turning to the second group, including various individuals, the leaders of the people, the soldiers and a criminal, who mock Jesus and tell Him 'Save yourself.' Francis noted that in saying 'Save Yourself, they are committing a terrible

temptation, in trying to tempt Jesus, just as the devil did at the beginning of the Gospel. "This temptation," the Pope said, "is a direct attack on love: "save yourself," not others, but yourself. He continues rather to love; he forgives, he lives this moment of trial according to the Father's will, certain that love will bear fruit." In order to receive the kingship of Jesus, the Holy Father explained, we are called to struggle against this temptation, fix our gaze ever closer to Him and become always more faithful. "How many times, even among ourselves, do we seek out the comforts and certainties offered by the world," Francis said. "How many times are we tempted to come down from the Cross. The lure of power and success seem an easy, quick way to spread the Gospel; we soon forget how the Kingdom of God works."

Turning to the thief, the Gospel's third figure, who begged Jesus to be remembered in His Kingdom, Francis applauded his faith. "He was not closed in on himself, but rather – with his errors, his sins and his troubles – he turned to Jesus, and experienced God's mercy: "Today you will be with me in paradise" and we are called to do the same. Pope Francis called on us to pray for the graces of "never closing the doors of reconciliation and pardon, to know how to go beyond evil and differences, opening every possible pathway of hope," and to realize that, "as God believes in us, infinitely beyond any merits we have, so too we are called to instill hope and provide opportunities to others. The true door of mercy, which is the heart of Christ, always remains open wide for us; from the lacerated side of the Risen One until the very end of time flow mercy, consolation and hope."

Pro Life News

PRIESTS FOR LIFE

Active Waiting...The Second Vatican Council reflects upon the relationship between the coming of Christ and our activity to prepare for it. In the Constitution on the Church in the Modern World, we read, "Far from diminishing our concern to develop this earth, the expectancy of a new earth should spur us on, for it is here that the body of a new human family grows, foreshadowing in some way the age which is to come....When we have spread on earth the fruits of our nature and our enterprise -- human dignity, brotherly communion and freedom -- according to the command of the Lord and in his Spirit, we will find them once again, cleansed this time from the stain of sin, illuminated and transfigured, when Christ presents to his Father an eternal and universal kingdom...." (#39). In other words, the spirit of Advent should naturally bolster our pro-life efforts, and the progress we make in promoting human dignity becomes the "building blocks" for the eternal kingdom.



Beginning the Church's liturgical year, Advent (from, "advenire" in Latin or "to come to") is the season encompassing the four Sundays (and weekdays) leading up to the celebration of Christmas. Advent is a time of preparation for the coming of the Lord. In this season, we recall two central elements of our faith: the final coming of the Lord in glory and the incarnation of the Lord in the birth of Jesus. The key themes of the Advent season are watchful waiting, preparation, and justice. In this new liturgical year, the Gospel of Luke will be the primary Gospel proclaimed (Lectionary Cycle C).

The Advent Wreath -

Advent devotions including the Advent wreath, remind us of the meaning of the season. Traditionally, Advent wreaths are constructed of a circle of evergreen branches into which four candles are inserted, representing the four weeks of Advent. Ideally, three candles are purple and one is rose, but white candles can also be used.

The purple candles in particular symbolize the prayer, penance, and preparatory sacrifices and goods works undertaken at this time. The rose candle is lit on the third Sunday, Gaudete Sunday, when the priest also wears rose vestments at Mass; Gaudete Sunday is the Sunday of rejoicing, because the faithful have arrived at the midpoint of Advent, when their preparation is now half over and they are close to Christmas.

The progressive lighting of the candles symbolizes the expectation and hope surrounding our Lord's first coming into the world and the anticipation of his second coming to judge the living and the dead.

Blessing Of An Advent Wreath -- The use of the Advent Wreath is a traditional practice which has found its place in the Church as well as in the home. The blessing of an Advent Wreath takes place on the First Sunday of Advent or on the evening before the First Sunday of Advent.

When the blessing of the Advent Wreath is celebrated in the home, it is appropriate that it be blessed by a parent or another member of the family.

All make the sign of the cross as the leader says:

Our help is in the name of the Lord.

Response: Who made heaven and earth.

Then the Scripture, Isaiah 9: (*lines 1-2 and 5-6*) or Isaiah 63 (*lines 16-17 & 19*) or Isaiah 64 (*lines 2-7*) is read:

Reader: The Word of the Lord. **Response**: Thanks be to God.

With hands joined, the leader says:

Lord our God, we praise you for your Son, Jesus Christ: he is Emmanuel, the hope of the peoples, he is the wisdom that teaches and guides us, he is the Savior of every nation.

Lord God, let your blessing come upon us as we light the candles of this wreath.

May the wreath and its light be a sign of Christ's promise to bring us salvation.

May he come quickly and not delay. We ask this through Christ our Lord.

Response: Amen.

The blessing may conclude with a verse from "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel":

O come, desire of nations, bind in one the hearts of humankind; bid ev'ry sad division cease and be thyself our Prince of peace. Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel shall come to thee, O Israel.

Saint Andrew Christmas Novena

Hail and blessed be the hour and moment in which the Son of God was born of the most pure Virgin Mary, at midnight, in Bethlehem, in piercing cold. In that hour, vouchsafe, O my God! to hear my prayer and grant my desires, through the merits of Our Savior Jesus Christ, and of His Blessed Mother. Amen.



While a novena is normally a nine-day prayer, the term is sometimes used for any prayer that is repeated over a series of days. The St. Andrew Christmas Novena is often called simply the "Christmas Novena" or the "Christmas Anticipation Prayer," because it is prayed 15 times every day from the November 30th - Feast of St. Andrew – until Christmas. The novena is not actually addressed to St. Andrew but to God Himself, asking Him to grant our request in the honor of the birth of His Son at Christmas. You can say the prayer all 15 times, all at once; or divide up the recitation (perhaps five times at each meal). Prayed as a family, the St. Andrew Christmas Novena is a very good way to help focus the attention of your children on the Advent season. It is piously believed that whoever recites the St. Andrew Christmas prayer 15 times each day from the feast of St. Andrew until Christmas Eve will obtain the favor requested.

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
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
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A Gift in Your Will
