Mission Statement

Baptisms

Parents anticipating the birth of their first child are asked to attend baptismal instructions classes before the birth of their child, if possible. Please contact the Rectory to register. Note: Baptisms cannot be scheduled until all the necessary paperwork is completed.

Confirmation

Confirmation is administered every year to all 8th grade students in our Parish CCD program. Children wishing to receive Confirmation must be enrolled and participating in the CCD program for two years before they are eligible to receive the sacrament.

Marriages

In order to complete the necessary paperwork, couples are asked to contact the Rectory at least one full year in advance of the proposed marriage date.

Reconciliation

The sacrament is celebrated each Saturday from 4:00 - 4:45pm and Monday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday from 11:45am - 12:00noon in the church and also by appointment.

Anointing of the Sick

Please contact the Rectory whenever a member of your family has become sick or hospitalized. Please note, because of the new government regulations regarding privacy, hospitals cannot release information without a patient's consent.

Monthly Visitations

Any parishioner who is homebound and wishes to receive the Eucharist on a monthly basis is asked to contact the Rectory to schedule a visit.

Liturgical Reflection Second Sunday of Advent FIRST READING: Isaiah 11:1-10

The Root of Jesse is described in an allegorical sense. Here, a little shoot comes out of a barren stump and will reach out to the Gentiles. The wolf and the lamb, the child and the adder (a snake), are examples of this extreme contrast between what was possible and what will be. Centuries after Isaiah, Christians understood his vision of God's ultimate reign over all things through a chosen ruler to be fulfilled in Jesus the Messiah, who proclaimed the Kingdom of God.

RESPONSRIAL PSALM: Psalm 72

Psalm 72 speaks of endowing the king with judgment and the king's son with justice. This is a reference to King David and his son Jesse, the youngest and the chosen one. The Root of Jesse is Jesus, who will "rescue the poor when he cries out, and the afflicted when he has no one to help him."

SECOND READING: Romans 15:4-9

Endurance and encouragement is a curious description of God. It contrasts with the sometimes angry and brooding images of God we hear in the Old Testament. Paul called for harmony among the early Church followers. This is not that much different than the Christian communities and various theologies of God that exist today. Jesus led us to look beyond our differences and ministered to people in many walks of life.

GOSPEL: Matthew 3:1-12



John the Baptist preached a message, difficult and challenged the Pharisees and Sadducees, "Who warned you to flee from the coming wrath?" One is not baptized out of fear. nor is it about pedigree education, or background position. or Baptism is a response to the

call to "produce good fruit as evidence of …repentance." John makes clear that he himself is not the Messiah, but rather, his messenger; he baptizes with water, but God's Anointed One will baptize with divine Spirit. In Greek, *baptizo* means to wash or immerse; thus the Messiah will immerse the baptized in God's own life-giving presence.

SOLEMNITY OF THE IMMACULATE CONCEPTION



The Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception celebrates the saving work of God in preserving the Blessed Virgin Mary from the stain of original sin. Because of His foreknowledge that Mary would consent to bear Christ, God kept Mary free from original sin from the moment of her conception in the womb of her mother, Saint Anne. Unlike certain other Holy Days of Obligation, where the requirement to attend Mass is abrogated when the date of the feast falls on a Saturday or a Monday, the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception is so important that the obligation is not waived.

That's The Way It Is!



Pope Francis was elected to the papacy in 2013. In the three years since his election he has certainly proven to be very different from his predecessors in his style. The pastoral style of Pope Francis especially seems to resonate with progressive

Catholics given his emphasis on the poor and Catholic social teaching. Some Catholics, while praising his progressive style have nevertheless been disappointed that he has not done more. Many were hoping that he would reverse Church teaching on a whole host of issues. They were hoping that he might open the door to women priests, gay marriage, artificial birth control, abortion, divorce and remarriage, etc. They were disappointed when the pope reaffirmed church teaching on all those issues.

The idea that a pope could undo Church teaching with the stroke of a pen is based on a fundamental misapprehension of the nature of the papacy. The papacy is not like the US presidency or the US Supreme Court. When it comes to the US presidency or Supreme Court, ideology and politics matter. Depending on the ideological make up of the Supreme Court laws and doctrine can be overturned or changed. An incoming US president of a differing political ideology than their predecessor can overturn or undo some of the policies of his or her predecessor. US laws are not static. They will change and evolve based on the current political climate. Even the US Constitution itself can be amended—though doing so is difficult.

The papacy does not work like that. The pope's authority, contrary to what many believe is also not absolute. The pope does not have the authority to do whatever he wants, whenever he wants---even if his personal ideology might propel him in certain directions. Certain teachings of the Church cannot change—not now, not ever. It does not matter what the current political climate is, or whether the majority of Catholics want the teachings to change. This is because the Catholic Faith is based on the Word of God. The Church, with the pope as the visible center of unity and visible expression of Christ's invisible headship is the servant of the Word of God. The Church is to pass on the Word of God. The Church informs herself by the Word of God.

The Word of God is not informed by the Church. The pope does not have the authority to change what God has revealed.

What this means is that it is not a matter of "getting the right person" into the office of the papacy. If only we could get someone who is more liberal into the papacy—then we would get women's ordination, gay marriage, artificial contraception, divorce and remarriage, etc. If only we could get someone who is super conservative into the office of the papacy. Then we could get rid of Vatican II and all will be right with the Church. Whether the pope is liberal, conservative or moderate, whether the pope wants the teachings to change or not, certain teachings will never change.

When I have explained this in the past, some people have said "Well, the church changed her teaching on a whole host of things: slavery, meat on Friday in Lent, the Mass, etc." First: even if I grant this, just because the Church changed teaching on some things does not entail all things are up for grabs. Second: the church tolerated slavery for a time. Eventually the institution was rightly condemned. However—would anyone assert that church teaching on slavery could change now? Would anyone assert that a pope could overturn the condemnation on slavery and allow it again?

As for meat in Friday in Lent, that is a discipline. Nowhere in Scripture did God say "Thou shall not eat meat in Friday's in Lent." That law is an ecclesial law, not a divine law. Hence the Church can adapt as needed. The form the celebration of the Mass takes has changed throughout the centuries, as has the form the Sacramental celebrations take. However, the essence of the Mass and the essence of the Sacraments has not changed. The Church has the authority to determine the form our worship will take, but the Church does not have the authority to change the essence of worship or the essence of the Sacraments.

In summary: regardless of who the pope is, what his ideology or personal opinions, women are never going to be admitted to Holy Orders. Church teaching on human sexuality is never going to change. Church teaching on marriage and what constitutes marriage is never going to change. Anyone who believes otherwise is deluding themselves.

Notice Regarding Reporting Sexual Abuse of a Minor

It is the policy of the Diocese of Scranton to report any allegation of sexual abuse of a minor to law enforcement. If you are a victim of sexual abuse committed by a priest, deacon, religious or lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton, you are encouraged to immediately report the matter to law enforcement. If any priest, deacon, religious, lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton has cause or reason to suspect that a minor has been subjected to any form of abuse, including child sexual abuse, the matter will be reported to law enforcement. In accordance with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's Child Protective Services Laws, reports of suspected child abuse should also be made immediately by phone to the 24-HourChild Abuse hotline (ChildLine) at 1-800-932-0313 or at www.compass.state.pa.us/cwis.

It is also the policy of the Diocese to adhere to all civil and state regulations. To this end, the Diocese is equally committed to adhering to the norms of the Code of Canon Law and to upholding the tenets of the USCCB Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People, which includes supporting victims of sexual abuse in their pursuit of emotional and spiritual well-being. As such, information regarding an allegation of sexual abuse of a minor should also be reported to the Victim Assistance Coordinator, Joseph DeVizia at (570-862-7551) or to Diocesan officials, including the Vicar General, Monsignor Thomas M. Muldowney, V.G., at (570-207-2269).

News From the Vatican



ADVENT CALLS US TO ENLARGE OUR HORIZONS (Vatican Padio) Pope Francis marked the

(Vatican Radio) Pope Francis marked the beginning of the new liturgical year at the Angelus for the First Sunday of Advent. On this Sunday, he said, the Gospel intro-

duces us to one of the most "evocative" themes of the Advent season: the visit of the Lord to humanity. Pope Francis pointed out three visits of the Lord: the first, in the past, with the Incarnation, and Birth of Jesus at Christmas; the second, in the present, as Jesus visits us continually, every day; and the final visit, in the future, when Jesus "will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead." Advent encourages us to reflect on the contrast between our daily routine and the unexpected coming of the Lord. The Gospel, the Pope said, is not trying to frighten us, but "to open our horizons" to further dimensions, giving meaning even to everyday occurrences.

This perspective, he continued, is also an invitation to "sobriety, to not be dominated by the things of this world" but rather to keep them in their proper place. If, on the other hand, we allow ourselves to be overpowered by a concern for material things, we will not be able to perceive what is much more important: our final encounter with the Lord. And so, the Pope said, Advent is "an invitation to vigilance, because, not knowing when He will come, we must always be ready to depart."

During Advent, Pope Francis concluded, "we are called to enlarge the horizons of our hearts, to be surprised by the life that is presented each day with its newness. In order to do this we need to learn to not depend on our own securities, our own established plans, because the Lord comes in the hour which we don't imagine."

Beginning the Church's liturgical year, Advent (from, "advenire" in Latin or "to come to") is the season encompassing the four Sundays (and weekdays) leading up to the celebration of Christmas. Advent is a time of preparation for the coming of the Lord. In this season, we recall two central elements of our faith: the final coming of the Lord in glory and the incarnation of the Lord in the birth of Jesus. The key themes of the Advent season are watchful waiting, preparation, and justice. In this new liturgical year, the Gospel of Matthew will be the primary Gospel proclaimed (Lectionary Cycle A).

Advent Traditions for Families

Advent Wreath: The Advent wreath, which has German origins, is probably the most recognized Advent custom. It is a wreath made of evergreens that is bound to a circle of wire. It symbolizes the many years from Adam to Christ in which the world awaited its Redeemer; it also represents the years that we have awaited His second and final coming. The wreath holds four equally spaced candles, the three purple ones lit on the penitential Sundays and a pink one for Gaudete, the joyful third Sunday in Advent. The Empty Manger: Each child may have his own individual manger, or there may be one manger for the whole family. The idea is that when acts of service, sacrifice, or kindness are done in honor of Baby Jesus as a birthday present, the child receives a piece of straw to put into the manger. Then, on Christmas morning, Baby Jesus is placed in the manger. Encourage your children to make Jesus bed as comfortable as possible through their good deeds. In the process, explain Christ's incomparable selfgift at Christmas and Easter that enables us to be part of Gods family.

The Jesse Tree: The Jesse tree tells about Christ's ancestry through symbols and relates Scripture to salvation history, progressing from creation to the birth of Christ. The tree can be made on a poster board with the symbols glued on, or on an actual tree.

St. Nicholas Day: The feast of St. Nicholas is on Dec. 6th. It is a highlight of the Advent season. Each child puts out a shoe the night before St. Nicholas Day in the hope that the kind bishop with his miter, staff, and bag of gifts will pay a visit. Many families give gifts on both Dec. 6 and Christmas.

The Christ Candle: Any large white candle can be used for the Christ candle. The idea is to decorate it with symbols for Christ. Use old Christmas cards, sequins, holly, etc. The candle can be lit on Christmas Eve to show that the Light of the World has arrived. Then continue to light the Christ candle throughout the year at Sunday dinner to remind your family of our waiting for Christ, as well as celebrating His birth and Resurrection. The Mary Candle: Some families have the custom of decorating the Christ candle with a blue veil on December 8th, the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception. On this great feast, others place a candle with a blue ribbon before a statue or picture of the Blessed Virgin, whose yes to God enabled our Lords coming at Christmas. The candle is lit during meal times to serve as a delightful reminder of Mary's eager expectation of the Light of the World. It can also serve as a reminder to each family member to keep their own light of grace burning as a preparation for Christ's coming.

St. Lucy Cakes: The feast of St. Lucy, virgin and martyr, is on December 13th. This marks the opening of the Christmas season in Sweden. Her life story can be found in most saints books, as can the recipe for the traditional cakes. The symbolism is rich and her life story worthwhile reading.

The Nativity Scene: This is the event in which the entire family shares setting up the Christmas manger. Mary and Joseph should be far off traveling and their approach to Bethlehem can be adjusted daily. Older children can make life-size Nativity models, carve them, cut them out from cardboard, or set up pre-made figurines. The creative ideas are without limit. Make sure to place the Nativity scene where many can admire the children's efforts to give God glory.

Christmas Baking: There are many recipe books available to find great traditional Christmas baking ideas. The baking usually starts around December 20th. As Christmas approaches, the house will smell of baking and fresh wreaths. The glory of Christmas is at hand! Move the manger to a focal point, add lights to the Nativity to be lighted on Christmas Eve, and anticipate together.

Blessing of the Tree: More and more frequently families are blessing their Christmas trees. It is good to remind children that the tree relates to many aspects of our faith. For example, we are reminded that our first parents were not allowed to eat from one tree, and that Christ paid the great price for our redemption by hanging on a tree (cf. Acts 5:29-32).
