Baptisms

Confirmation

Confirmation is administered every year to all 8th grade students in our Parish CCD program. Children wishing to receive Confirmation must be enrolled and participating in the CCD program for two years before they are eligible to receive the sacrament.

Marriages

In order to complete the necessary paperwork, couples are asked to contact the Rectory at least one full year in advance of the proposed marriage date.

Reconciliation

The sacrament is celebrated each Saturday from 4:00 – 4:45pm and Monday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday from 11:45am – 12:00noon in the church and also by appointment.

Anointing of the Sick

Liturgical Reflection



Fourth Sunday of Advent FIRST READING: Isaiah 70:10-14

Other nations are at war with Judah, and Ahaz fears for the safety of his tribe. God assures Ahaz that the welfare of Judah will be taken care of. This prophecy of the birth of Emmanuel and his virginal conception follows the same formula of the appearance of the Angel to Sarah in the Book of Genesis, as well as the story of Sampson in the Book of Judges. We can be a bit like Ahaz. We may not want to "ask" or "tempt" the Lord, but we don't always trust him either. This is the reason for the seemingly exasperated response of Isaiah to "Believe already!" May we be open to see signs in our lives and respond to God.

RESPONSRIAL PSALM: Psalm 24

This psalm was part of a ceremony when the Ark of the Covenant (signifying God) entered the Temple. Now we make way for Jesus the Lord to enter the world. Verses 3 and 4 ask, "We can ascend the mountain of the Lord? Or who may stand in his holy place? One whose hands are sinless, whose heart is clean, who desires not what is vain." Have you made the proper preparations for Christ? Is your heart and hearth clean? Can you earnestly welcome him in good faith?

SECOND READING: Romans 1:1-7

We hear the beginning of Paul's letter to the Romans. Paul stresses his call to be an Apostle of Jesus, who is the fulfillment of all that was prophesied in the Scriptures (Old Testament). His reference to Jesus as descended from David is particularly important, as this points to Jesus as the promised Davidic Messiah or Anointed One. As the prophets of old foretold, salvation is offered not only to the Jews, but also to the Gentiles.

GOSPEL: Matthew 1:18-24



This infancy narrative takes place right after the genealogy account in Matthew. It is one of five

stories which tell of Jesus as a young boy. Though the natural genealogy line is broken, it is fulfilled through Joseph, for Mary, his betrothed, accepts the child form the angel. The evangelist carefully notes that the righteous man chosen to parent descended from King David, thus suggesting that Samuel's prophecy is about to be fulfilled in Jesus. Lest the point be missed, he repeats that Mary's child has his true origin in God and God's plan for salvation; further, the child is to bear the name "Jesus," which means "God saves." The events that have their origin in God, reveal the fullness of Isaiah's words. In the child soon to be born, God is with us in an unimaginable way: in the person of a human infant.

That's The Way It Is!

We are now entering into the fourth Sunday of Advent. In one week we will be entering into Christmas. Remember that for the Church, Christmas begins on December 25 and does not end until the Baptism of the Lord some two to three weeks later. Until the Christmas Eve Mass begins we are still in the Season of Advent. This means we still have time to prepare for Christmas. Prepare for the secular holiday by all means. Make sure your children are ready for Sandy Clause. Just make sure you and your children spend time preparing for the real reason for Christmas. If we are not prepared to face God on the day of judgment, getting a lump of coal will be the least of our worries.

Confession is a great way, in fact the best way to prepare for Christmas—even the new year. Now is a good time to take stock of our lives. Are we giving the necessary time to the observance of our religious duties and obligations? If you were told you were going to die tonight, would you be ready to face God? If not, why? Answering that question might be a good starting point to an examination of Conscience. If there is anything on your soul or heart that needs the healing, forgiving love of God, that is something to bring to Confession.

The Sacrament of Confession is technically only necessary when one is conscious of having committed This is just like a medical doctor only Mortal Sin. technically being necessary for a medical emergency. However, I know of no one that would recommend only going to the doctor for medical emergencies! While the Sacrament of Confession is only absolutely necessary for the forgiveness of Mortal Sin, nevertheless, for the average person I like to recommend that they go twice a year: once during Advent and once during Lent. Doing so is analogous to visiting the doctor for a checkup. Advent and Lent, given the penitential nature of the seasons are great times to take stock of our spiritual health. If we find that we are engaging in practices that are harmful to our spiritual health, even if they do not constitute Mortal Sin, it is good to bring those to Confession and give them to Jesus.

Sometimes people get nervous because they haven't been to Confession in years. They worry they might forget what to do. They worry they might forget their Act of Contrition. There is nothing to fear. Priests will always help someone through the Sacrament and with their Act of Contrition if they forgot what to do or say. Sometimes people get nervous because they might have committed one of the big sins—like Abortion for example. They are worried that they cannot be forgiven. They might worry that the priest will judge them, yell at them or otherwise make them feel bad because of their sin.

Back in the day, it might have happened that a priest would yell at someone in Confession or judge them. I can't speak to why any priest would ever have thought that such behavior was ever appropriate in the Sacrament of Confession. What I can say is that such behavior is very rare today. Priests (especially myself) today are more interested in reconciling sinners to God then they are judging people or yelling at them.

There is only one sin that cannot be forgiven. That sin is Blasphemy of the Holy Spirit. What is Blasphemy of the Holy Spirit? Blasphemy of the Holy Spirit is a refusal to seek forgiveness from God for our sins. There is no sin that God cannot and will not forgive save the sin of refusing to acknowledge our sin and seek God's forgiveness. On the pulpit you will hear my rail against many sins, especially abortion. On the pulpit I am a lion. In the Sacrament of Confession, I am a lamb.

I want to encourage everyone to take advantage of the Sacrament of Confession—and do not be afraid. Pope Francis has officially closed the year for mercy. That, however does, not entail that there is no more mercy! The year of mercy highlighted the mercy of God that is always available. On Monday, December 19, there is a penance service at Holy Child in Mansfield. All are welcome.

Be aware that I am a simple guy—and that means I like to cut to the chase. I am like that with the Mass and I am like that in Confession. There is no need for long, complicated, prayers and liturgies. Come to Confession, confess your sins, receive a small penance and absolution and you are on your way! No muss, no fuss. I keep things easy! However—if you need spiritual direction along with Confession you are always welcome to make an appointment. I will be happy to set aside time.

News From the Vatican



THIS CHRISTMAS, OPEN UP YOUR HEART'

This Christmas, open up your heart. Pope Francis gave this as he continued his new series of catecheses on Christian

hope. Reminding those present that we are approaching Christmas, he noted how the prophet Isaiah can help us again to open ourselves up to the hope of the Good News of the coming of salvation. Pope Francis used the reading to illustrate how God never abandons His people, and Whose grace surpasses all and any sin.

"I will pose the question: who is greater, God or sin? God! And who wins in the end? God or sin? God," Francis stressed, saying, God's love has the power to conquer the biggest, most terrible sin. "The most beautiful of Christmas joys," Francis went on to say, "is the joy of inner peace: 'the Lord has blotted out my sins, the Lord has forgiven me, the Lord has had mercy on me, he came to my rescue." "This is the joy of Christmas!" he said.

"When everything seems to be over, when, in front of so many negative realities, faith becomes tiring and is tempted to say that nothing else makes sense, here was the good news." God, the Pontiff added, is coming to do something new. While he comes to establish a kingdom of peace, and bring freedom and consolation, we must realize evil will not triumph forever, he noted. Since "the desperation is conquered, for God is with us," the Pope observed, "we are also urged "to wake up a bit" and "become men and women of hope." "How bad when we find a Christian who has lost hope! "But I do not hope anything, everything is over for me": so says a Christian who is not able to look at horizons of hope and in front of his heart only a wall."

"But God destroys these walls with forgiveness!" he continued. "And for this we must pray that God will give us every day and give hope to all, the hope that comes when we see God in the manger in Bethlehem."

The message of the Good News entrusted to us, the Pontiff exclaimed, is "urgent," as the world cannot wait for justice, truth, and peace. "And seeing the little Child of Bethlehem, the little ones of the world will know that the promise was fulfilled," Pope Francis concluded, "the message has come true." "In a newborn baby, in need of everything, wrapped in swaddling clothes and laid in a manger, found inside is all the power of the God who saves."

OPENING THE HEART BEFORE THE LORD: CALLING SIN BY ITS NAME

The Lord, the Pope said, "helps us to prepare ourselves for Christmas with great faith" because "for the healing of the soul, for the existential healing the re-creation that Jesus brings requires great faith in us." Being transformed, he said "is the grace of salvation that Jesus brings." We need to overcome the temptation to say "I can't do it," and to allow ourselves instead to be transformed, to be re-created by Jesus. "Courage" is the word of God."

"We are all sinners, but look to the root of your sin, and that the Lord goes there and re-creates it; and that bitter root will flourish, flourish with works of justice; and you will be a new man, a new woman. But if we [say]: 'Yes, yes, I have some sins; I go, I confess myself... two little words, and then I go on as before, I don't allow myself to be re-created by the Lord. Only two coats of paint, and we believe that with this the story's over. No! Naming my sins, with name and surname: I've done this, and this, and this, and I am ashamed at heart. Beginning the Church's liturgical year, Advent (from, "ad-venire" in Latin or "to come to") is the season encompassing the four Sundays (and weekdays) leading up to the celebration of Christmas. Advent is a time of preparation for the coming of the Lord. In this season, we recall two central elements of our faith: the final coming of the Lord in glory and the incarnation of the Lord in the birth of Jesus. The key themes of the Advent season are watchful waiting, preparation, and justice. In this new liturgical year, the Gospel of Luke will be the primary Gospel proclaimed (Lectionary Cycle C).



BLESSING OF NATIVITY SCENE

In its present form the custom of displaying figures depicting the birth of Jesus Christ owes its origin to St. Francis of Assisi, who made the Christmas crèche or manger for Christmas Eve of 1223.

The blessing of the Christmas manger or nativity scene may take place on the Vigil of Christmas or at another

suitable time. When the manger is set up in the home, it is appropriate that it be blessed by a parent or another family member.



All make the sign of

the cross as the leader says: Our help is in the name of the Lord.

Response: Who made heaven and earth.

One of those present or the leader reads a text of sacred Scripture, for example, Luke 2:1 (lines 1-8) or Isaiah 7:10 (lines 10-15, the birth of Emmanuel).

Reader: The Gospel of the Lord.

Response: Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

Leader: God of every nation and people, from the very beginning of creation you have made manifest your love: when our need for a Savior was great you sent your Son to be born of the Virgin Mary. To our lives he brings joy and peace, justice, mercy, and love.

Lord, bless all who look upon this manger; may it remind us of the humble birth of Jesus, and raise our thoughts to him, who is God-with-us and Savior of all, and who lives and reigns forever and ever.

Response: Amen.

CHRISTMAS SEASON

December 25 - January 10

Christmas is a privileged opportunity to meditate on the meaning and value of our existence. The approach of this Solemnity helps us on the one hand to reflect on the drama of history in which people, injured by sin, are perennially in search of happiness and of a fulfilling sense of life and death; and on the other, it urges us to meditate on the merciful kindness of God who came to man to communicate to him directly the Truth that saves, and to enable him to partake in his friendship and his life. Therefore let us prepare ourselves for Christmas with humility and simplicity, making ourselves ready to receive as a gift the light, joy and peace that shine from this mystery. Pope Benedict

Christmas is one of the most important days of the Church year, second only to Easter itself. It is the feast of the incarnation, the feast of God becoming flesh (the Latin "in carne" means "enfleshment"). It is a uniquely Christian teaching, the Divine choosing to become one of us. Because of this belief, God is not only Transcendent, but also wholly Immanent, Emmanuel (God-with-us). While remaining Transcendent (meaning we must rise above our present condition to reach Him), He is at the same time Immanent (meaning He is with us as we rise toward Him). Every Eucharist is like Christmas where the bread and wine are transformed into His flesh, His Body and Blood, and, in a sense, He is born anew on the altar.

The liturgical season of Christmas begins with the vigil Masses on Christmas Eve and concludes on the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord. During this season, we celebrate the birth of Christ into our world and into our hearts, and reflect on the gift of salvation that is born with him...including the fact that he was born to die for us.

The Christmas tree and the Nativity scene are popular symbols of the season and a tradition in many Christian homes. It is also traditional to exchange Christmas gifts with family and friends as a way to honor God the Father's gift of his only son to the world. Having received the gift of Christ, we naturally want to pass that gift along to our loved ones.

A Prayer for Christmas

O God, our loving Father, help us rightly to remember the birth of Jesus, that we may share in the song of the angles, the gladness of the shepherds, and the worship of the wise men.

May Christmas morning make us happy to be your children, and Christmas evening bring us to our beds with grateful thoughts, forgiving and forgiven,

for Jesus' sake, Amen

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
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
