Baptisms

Parents anticipating the birth of their first child are asked to attend baptismal instructions classes before the birth of their child, if possible. Please contact the Rectory to register. Note: Baptisms cannot be scheduled until all the necessary paperwork is completed.

Confirmation

Confirmation is administered every year to all 8th grade students in our Parish CCD program. Children wishing to receive Confirmation must be enrolled and participating in the CCD program for two years before they are eligible to receive the sacrament.

Marriages

In order to complete the necessary paperwork, couples are asked to contact the Rectory at least one full year in advance of the proposed marriage date.

Reconciliation

The sacrament is celebrated each Saturday from 4:00 - 4:45pm and Monday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday from 11:45am - 12:00noon in the church and also by appointment.

Anointing of the Sick

Please contact the Rectory whenever a member of your family has become sick or hospitalized. Please note, because of the new government regulations regarding privacy, hospitals cannot release information without a patient's consent.

Monthly Visitations

Any parishioner who is homebound and wishes to receive the Eucharist on a monthly basis is asked to contact the Rectory to schedule a visit.

Liturgical Reflection Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time FIRST READING: Zephaniah 2:3; 3:12-13

The reading has two sections coming from separate chapters of Zephaniah. The first verses are strong exhortations to the people to do three things: seek the Lord, seek justice, and seek humility. The presumption is that the people have been unfaithful, sinful, and arrogant. In the second section it is the voice of the Lord that addresses the people. The tone is quite different than the first part. The Lord promises that a remnant of Israel will know salvation. This remnant will be a transformed people; they will be faithful, honest, and live with integrity.

RESPONSRIAL PSALM: Psalm 146

The psalmist can hardly contain his exuberance in proclaiming the praise of the Lord. In the twelve lines of the psalm, he lists ten actions performed by the Lord on behalf of the people. Although the Lord is solicitous of the whole people, those most vulnerable are afforded special mention and care. The oppressed, the hungry, the captives, the blind, the strangers, the orphans, and the widows all receive divine help in their situations. Each of these actions will be marks of Jesus' ministry generations later.

SECOND READING: 1 Corinthians 1:26-31

Those whom the psalmist identifies as recipients of the Lord's care share a similar identity with those that Paul addresses in Corinth. Paul reminds these early believers that on their own, they have very little status or power or influence. Yet they are precisely the ones that God has chosen to spread the Gospel. Paul states that God's choice is deliberate; the circumstances of their lives will be instruments of the Gospel. Their lowliness will bring down the haughty; their foolishness will confound the wise. Such is the intention of God; for God's ways are not the way of human.

GOSPEL: Matthew 5:1-12



The eight Beatitudes are perhaps one of the best known teachings of Jesus. The beatitude is a genre of teaching from wisdom

literature. A blessing is bestowed on a person or persons because of their status, that is, the poor, the meek, and that blessing is followed by a subsequent action that benefits them. Jesus hints at what will later become explicit in his teaching; he retains what is of value in the Law of Moses, but expands it with his own depth of meaning. Not only will outward situations of hunger, thirst, and persecution be altered in God's reign, as Isaiah envisioned, those who suffer these things with proper intention, pursuing the righteousness proposed by God and revealed through Jesus, will enjoy the fullness of divine blessing. The virtues and actions that are espoused are at odds with the current ideology; they embody the vision of the Kingdom of God that Jesus has come to establish.

BLESSING OF THROATS NEXT WEEKEND

A 2 In the United States the annual blessing of throats is a traditional sign of the struggle against illness in the life of the Christian. This blessing is ordinarily given during Mass on February 3rd, the memorial of St. Blaise. Saint Blaise was a bishop during the 4th century. Very little is known about his life. According to various accounts he was a physician before becoming a bishop. His cult spread throughout the entire Church in the Middle Ages because he was reputed to have miraculously cured a little boy who nearly died because of a fishbone in his throat. From the eighth century he has been invoked on behalf of the sick, especially those afflicted with illnesses of the throat. Throats will be blessed after all Masses NEXT weekend.

PRESENTATION OF THE LORD

The Feast of the Presentation of the Lord celebrates the presentation of Christ in the temple at Jerusalem on the 40^{th} day after His birth. When Christ was presented in the temple, Simeon embraced the Child and prayed the Canticle of Simeon: "Now thou dost dismiss thy servant, O Lord, according to thy word in peace; because my eyes have seen thy salvation, which thou hast prepared before the face of all peoples: a light to the revelation of the Gentiles, and the glory of thy people Israel" (Luke 2:29-32). Inspired by the words of the canticle, the custom had developed in the West of blessing candles on the Feast of the Presentation. Because of this, the feast also became known as *Candlemas*. Parishioners are invited to bring any candles they would like blessed the 12:10pm Mass on February 2nd and Fr. Bechtel will bless them.

That's The Way It Is!



On Friday January 26, 2017, the annual March For Life was held. Thousands of people descended on Washington D.C. to bear witness to the sanctity of unborn human life and the rights of the unborn. President Trump issued an executive order banning

federal funds from paying for abortions in foreign lands. I have to commend him on that. Whatever anyone thinks of President Trump it is nice to see our president take action that defends innocent life, especially the unborn.

On January 21, thousands of women marched on Washington D.C. to make their voices heard about issues important to them. That event was heavily covered by the media. One of the sponsors of the march (New Wave Feminists based in Texas) was pro-life. The organizers of the march faced a lot of backlash from that. The organizers of the march apologized and put out a statement: "The Women's March's platform is pro-choice and that has been our stance from day one......The antichoice organization in question is not a partner of the Women's March on Washington. We apologize for this error." First, being pro-life does not mean being "antichoice," being pro-life means being anti-abortion. I have said it before and I will say it again: choice isn't the issue. The issue is abortion. Second, it is difficult to understand why the organizers of the march who are pro-"choice" and want to celebrate "choice" and "freedom" would not celebrate "choice" and "freedom" when women "freely" "choose" to be pro-life.

It is difficult to understand—if one accepts the way in which feminists frame the debate about abortion. If the issue really is choice, it follows those who are pro-choice would celebrate, well, choice! It should not matter to someone who calls themselves pro-choice whether one is pro-life. If choice is what really matters, why would someone calling themselves pro-choice get so offended when someone chooses life and chooses to advocate for the rights of the unborn? Why? Because the issue isn't choice and those who are pro-choice know this. The issue is abortion. Those who support abortion aren't stupid. If there is one thing I wish people would understand: prochoice equals pro-abortion. The terms are interchangeable; the terms are synonymous. No amount of semantics and word games can change this.

This is why I refuse to accept the terms of the debate as framed by feminists. I refuse to use the term "Pro-choice" when discussing abortion. I use the terms "Pro-Life" and "Pro-abortion." As I used to teach my students: once you accept the terms of the debate as framed and defined by feminists, namely choice vs. anti-choice, you have already lost the debate. Further discussion is futile. We cannot allow feminists to redefine and mask the evil of abortion as "choice."

In closing I want to talk on a related but distinct issue. Those who pressure or even force a woman to get an abortion will have far more to answer for on judgment day than the woman. We cannot lay the responsibility for an unborn human life solely at the feet of a pregnant woman. A husband, boyfriend, family, doctor, etc, who scare or pressure a women to get an abortion when she does not want one—those are the ones who will bear the burden of guilt for that child's life far more than the woman. If I have not made this clear in the past, I apologize. It is not just a pregnant mother who bears responsibility for the life inside of her.

I also want to make it clear that there is NO sin that God cannot forgive. I rail against abortion and will do so as long as life is in my body. However, the Sacrament of Confession is infinitely more powerful than the sin of abortion. God rejoices when someone repents and seeks His love and healing in the Confessional. God does not will that anyone who has had an abortion should suffer or be lost. God wants them to come to Him—so He can show them His love, mercy, forgiveness, compassion and healing. It is in love, mercy, forgiveness, and compassion where God reveals His true greatness and His power over sin and death. No person who has had an abortion or been part of an abortion should ever fear God if they want His forgiveness.

That's the way it is!

Pro Life News

PRIESTS FOR LIFE

"Make no mistake, abortion-on-demand is not a right granted by the Constitution. No serious scholar, including one disposed to agree with the Court's result, has argued that the framers of the Constitution intended to create such a right. Shortly after the Roe v. Wade decision, Professor John Hart Ely, now Dean of Stanford Law School, wrote that the opinion "is not constitutional law and gives almost no sense of an obligation to try to be." Nowhere do the plain words of the Constitution even hint at a "right" so sweeping as to permit abortion up to the time the child is ready to be born. Yet that is what the Court ruled. As an act of "raw judicial power" (to use Justice White's biting phrase), the decision by the seven-man majority in Roe v. Wade has so far been made to stick. But the Court's decision has by no means settled the debate. Instead, Roe v. Wade has become a continuing prod to the conscience of the nation." - President Ronald Reagan, in his book Abortion and the Conscience of the Nation (1983).
