Sacramental Information

Baptisms - Parents anticipating the birth of their first child are asked to attend baptismal instructions classes before the birth of their child, if possible. Please contact the Rectory to register. Note: Baptisms cannot be scheduled until all the necessary paperwork is completed.

Confirmation - Confirmation is administered every year to all 8th grade students in our Parish Religious Education program. Children wishing to receive Confirmation must be enrolled and participating in the program for two years before they are eligible to receive the sacrament.

Marriages- In order to complete the necessary paperwork, couples are asked to contact the Rectory at least one full year in advance of the proposed marriage date.

Anointing of the Sick - Please contact the Rectory whenever a member of your family has become sick or hospitalized. **Monthly Visitations -** Any parishioner who is homebound and wishes to receive the Eucharist on a monthly basis is asked to contact the Rectory to schedule a visit.

Rite of Christian Initiation in Adults (RCIA) - The RCIA prepares interested adults for reception into the Catholic Church. The program is adapted to the needs of each person and prepares them for full initiation into the faith. Please contact the rectory to register for the classes or for more information.



The Book of Sirach is a collection of wise sayings that help humans order their life and make right choices. These sayings have been handed on within the community. Sirach offers a series of choices, starting with the fundamental choice to keep the commandments of God. Three others follow: fire and water, life and death, good and evil. Each represents a total opposite of the other. The wise person chooses the positive option, the one that gives life. God allows a person to make such choices for he has given persons the gift of free will.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Psalm 119

The first verse is an affirmation of blessing that comes to those who live a blameless life. People can choose to live according to the law of the Lord or not; a theme that echoes the wisdom teaching in the First Reading. Those who observe the law of the Lord are blessed and wise. The remaining verses address God in a form of petition. The psalmist believes that faithful persons need the grace of the Lord in order to make right choices. Only the Lord can instruct the faithful; only the Lord can help to discern the depths of the law.

SECOND READING: 1 Corinthians 2:6-10

The notion of wisdom connects this reading with the reading from Sirach and the psalm. Paul speaks of the wisdom of God which has been hidden from all time and which will be revealed in the time to come, the end time. The wisdom is not available to rulers of this age, or they would have crucified "the Lord of glory." However this wisdom has been made available through God's son and in turn to those who believe and accept him. Paul's quote form Isaiah (64:4) underlines the way of wisdom; it is the love of God.

GOSPEL: Matthew 5:17-37

In this lengthy passage from chapter five, Jesus replies to those who have accused him of doing away with the tradition of the law and the prophets. He states that he intends to fulfill the law. His words are emphatic and he employs a repeating technique to make his point by using the phrase, "You have heard that it was said... But I say to you." Using four examples from Mosaic Law he offers an interpretation that goes beyond the mere letter of the law. He wants his listeners to live the law from their hearts, not just from external obligation.

That's The Way It Is!



There is a lot of controversy among some over President Trump's executive orders regarding immigration. Judge Robart overturned President Trump's executive order and was upheld by the Ninth Circuit. Presumably this issue will find itself before

the SCOTUS. I am not a lawyer. I cannot speak intelligently to question of whether Judge Robart is on solid legal ground or whether his ruling was the result of ideology. For a parish bulletin it does not matter anyway. I am concerned with how Catholic social teaching might apply on the question of immigration. I can speak intelligently on that question.

Let's start with the Catechism of the Catholic Church. CCC 2241 states:

"The more prosperous nations are obliged, to the extent they are able, to welcome the foreigner in search of the security and the means of livelihood which he cannot find in his country of origin. Public authorities should see to it that the natural right is respected that places a guest under the protection of those who receive him.

Political authorities, for the sake of the common good for which they are responsible, may make the exercise of the right to immigrate subject to various juridical conditions, especially with regard to the immigrants' duties toward their country of adoption. Immigrants are obliged to respect with gratitude the material and spiritual heritage of the country that receives them, to obey its laws and to assist in carrying civic burdens."

Catholic teaching, then, believes that prosperous nations like America should take a position of generosity towards those who are seeking a better life. At the same time, the CCC acknowledges that there is a practical limit to how many immigrants a country can comfortably absorb. The right a person has, then, to immigrate depends upon a nation's practical ability to absorb the immigrants into their nation.

Catholic teaching also makes it clear that nations have the right to set policy on immigration. Church teaching does not expect nations to adopt "open boarder" policy, nor does Church teaching deny nations the right to have immigration laws, policies and procedures. Church teaching requires those who immigrate to follow the laws of the nation they immigrate to. Held in tension, then, is the right of people to seek a better life for themselves in prosperous nations, vs. the right of nations to secure their boarders and set policy that ensures those who are immigrating are not a threat to the health and well being of the nation. Somehow we need to work together on coming up with immigration policy that respects the rights of immigrants and the rights of a sovereign nation.

I don't know what such a policy looks like. However, what is not helpful in the debate is name calling. Those who want strong border security and a strong vetting of immigrants are not necessarily racist. They just want to make sure that those coming into our country have been vetted to make sure they are good people and not a threat. Those who fight for the rights of immigrants on the other hand, are not necessarily bleeding hearts who want open borders so they can sign more people up for government handouts.

In the debate, then, it is more helpful to focus on facts than it is ideology or motives. Ultimately Church teaching leaves it up to the government of the nations and the citizens of a nation to decide on immigration policy. The debates between groups of people will become heated. This cannot be helped. The issue of immigration is a politically and emotionally charged issue. However, it helps if reason and logic can prevail over emotion, politics and ideology.

I wish I could be more clear. The problem is that I don't know what the answer is. Yes, you heard that right. I, Father Bechtel said that I don't know something. Mark your calendars because you won't hear me say that again. The best I can say right now is that people have the right to immigrate and to seek a better life for themselves. On the other hand nations have the right to set immigration policy and they have the right to border security and national security. I don't know what an immigration policy would look like that holds both in tension. I do know that our Faith informed by logic, reason and facts should guide the discussion rather than ideology, name calling, politics and emotion.

That's the way it is!

PRIESTS FOR LIFE

Lord proclaims through Sirach commandments are possible to keep. "If you choose you can keep the commandments." God is not unfair. He does not give us burdens we cannot handle. The reason Jesus says his voke is easy and his burden light is that he transforms our nature so that we can know, love, and serve God with the very same Spirit he has. One might say, upon understanding the commandments, that they are impossible to keep. But we do not rely only on human strength. Christ lives in us, and that is the ultimate fulfillment of the truth spoken through Sirach. This is why Paul will later declare, "God is faithful; he will not let you be tempted beyond what you can bear. But when you are tempted, he will also provide a way out so that you can stand up under it" (1 Cor. 10:13). Relative to pro-life, this means that no matter what the circumstances may be tempting or pressuring someone to abortion, those forces can be resisted. The power to say "Yes" to life is always there.

News from the Vatican



REMEMBER YOU HAVE GOD'S DNA

Pope Francis reflected on how 'God created us as children in His image.' Drawing inspiration from the Book of Genesis' account of the Creation of man and woman, Francis recalled how God has given us His

DNA and spoke about the first of three great gifts, which God gave humanity in Creation.

Pope Francis stated that God's first gift is He made us His children. "First of all, He gave us His DNA, that is, He made us His children, created us in His image, in His image and likeness, like Him. And when one makes a child, he cannot take it back: the son is made, he exists. And whether or not he resembles the father, he is a son; he has received his identity. If the child is good, his father is proud of that son, right?, 'Look at how good he is!' And even if he is a little ugly, the father in any case says: 'Isn't he beautiful!', because a father is like this. Always. And if the son is bad, the father justifies him, waiting for him. Jesus taught us how a father waits for his children. He gave us the identity of a child: to 'man and woman', we must add the identity of 'child'. We 'are like gods', because we are children of God."

"God's second gift in Creation is a 'task,' namely the work of advancing Creation. Not to destroy it; but to make it grow, to care for it, to keep it and make it carry on. He gave everything. It's funny, I sometimes think, He did not give us money. We have everything. Who gave us money? I don't know. Grandmothers have this saying that 'the devil enters through the pocket'. This may be... God gave humanity all of Creation to preserve it and care for it: this is the gift. And finally, God created mankind in His image, male and female He created them."

"God's third gift in Creation is 'love,' beginning with the love shared between a man and a woman. Male and female He created them. It is not good for the man to be alone. And He made his partner. In love, God gives man love and a 'dialogue of love,' which must have been the first between man and woman.

Pope Francis concluded, praying: "Let us thank God for these three gifts He has given us: an identity, a gift/duty, and love and ask for the grace to preserve this identity of a child, to work with the gift He has given us and to advance this gift with our work, and the grace to learn to love ever more each day."

MAKE MOST OF EACH DAY...STARTING TODAY, NOT TOMORROW

Pope Francis stressed to faithful during his daily morning Mass that there is "only one 'today', in our lives," only one "real, concrete" today. "Our temptation and everyone's temptation is to say: 'Yes, I will do tomorrow,' though this is the temptation of a 'tomorrow' there will not be. I say

this not to scare you, but simply to say that our life is today: now or never. I think of this: tomorrow will be the eternal tomorrow that never sets, with the Lord forever – if I am true to this day; and the question that I put to you is the same the Holy Spirit is putting to all of us, i.e. 'How ought I to live, this day?' Today' is played out in our hearts. Are our hearts opened to the Lord? To me it always strikes me when I find an older person – often priests or nuns – who tell me, 'Father, pray for my final perseverance' – 'But, you did well all your life long, all the days of your 'today' are in the service of the Lord, and still you are afraid?' 'No, no, my life has not yet waned: I want to live it fully, I pray that the day arrives full, full, with a heart strong in faith, and not ruined by sin, vices, corruption.'"

The Holy Father invited all faithful to question themselves about their own time and their own heart. "Today is full of days, but we will not repeat any one of them. Days go by until the Lord says enough. We go home with these two words only: how is my today: The sunset can be today, this day or many days later. But how are you, my today, in the presence of the Lord? ... And how is my heart: Is it open? Is it firm in the faith? Is it led by the Lord? We ask the Lord for the grace to which each of us needs."

FEBRUARY PRAYER INTENTIONS

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
