Sacramental Information

Baptisms - Parents anticipating the birth of their first child are asked to attend baptismal instructions classes before the birth of their child, if possible. Note: Baptisms cannot be scheduled until all the necessary paperwork is completed. Contact the Rectory to schedule.

Confirmation - Confirmation is administered every year to all 8th grade students in our Parish Religious Education program. Children wishing to receive Confirmation must be enrolled and participating in the program for two years before they are eligible to receive the sacrament.

Marriages- In order to complete the necessary paperwork, couples are asked to contact the Rectory at least one full year in advance of the proposed marriage date.

Anointing of the Sick - Please contact the Rectory whenever a member of your family has become sick or hospitalized.

Monthly Visitations - Any parishioner who is homebound and wishes to receive the Eucharist on a monthly basis is asked to contact the Rectory to schedule a visit.

Rite of Christian Initiation in Adults (R.C.I.A.) - The R.C.I.A. prepares unbaptized adults for reception into the Catholic Church. The program is adapted to the needs of each person and prepares them for full initiation into the faith. Contact the Rectory for more information.



Liturgical Reflection

12th Sunday in Ordinary Time

FIRST READING: Jeremiah 20:10-13

The prophet finds himself in a terrifying situation: he is surrounded by whispered threats and violence, and his friends have become his enemies. But he refuses to be afraid, and instead turns to God. Jeremiah's tormented prayer is his sixth lament to God for his suffering. Taken cumulatively, these prayers seem to depict Jeremiah on the edge of despair. But the prophet does not rely on himself for rescue: he trusts in God, who walks with him. Even cries of pain are an expression of belief that God does hear those who grieve. Praise of God before the rescue occurs is surely a hope-filled prayer of confidence, even in the midst of suffering.

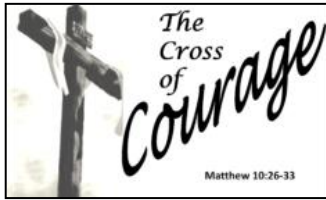
RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Psalm 69

Psalm 69 is the song of one whose obedience to God's will brings him only insult and danger. He prays to God for kindness, help, and mercy. The last verses call on all the "lowly ones" to do the same, trusting in God who hears their prayers.

SECOND READING: Romans 5:12-15

Paul contrasts Adam and Christ – sin and grace. Since Adam and Eve, sin has been inextricable from the human condition. The Mosaic Law did not take away sin, but rather made its presence more clear by measuring or "accounting" it. But with the coming of Christ, this pattern is broken forever, as grace overflows, healing the sin of the world. The grace of God is far more powerful than sin.

GOSPEL: Matthew 10:26-33



Jesus is continuing his instruction to his closest disciples, the Twelve, to prepare them for their mission. He has already told them he is sending them out as sheep

among wolves. Jesus knows that his disciples will experience much of what Jeremiah experienced in today's First Reading: abandonment, persecution, fear. He reminds them not to be afraid, but to trust in the all-present, all-loving God who is always with them. The most important thing is to let nothing deter them from proclaiming the Kingdom of God.

That's The Way It Is!



I don't know if you are tired of hearing about the articles I read on YAHOO, but, they give me ideas for topics for my column. I think they also demonstrate how the media intentionally misleads people when it comes to the Catholic Church. I cannot caution people

enough: if you want accurate news about the goings on in the Catholic Church, the media is not the best source to get your information. The media is not fact driven. The media is agenda driven. An example of this is the article "Pope Honors 'Rebel' Priests Censured for commitment to the Poor." The article was written Nicole Winfield and Antonio Calanni of the Associated Press.

The title of the article is misleading. The fact is that no one in the Catholic Church is ever condemned for a commitment to the poor. No one in the Catholic Church is ever ordered not to help the poor or care for the poor. What would get someone in trouble would be the ideas and theology they espouse in their care and concern for the poor if those ideas and theology are contrary to the Faith. If one is acting in an official capacity and representing the Church when they care for the poor, they have to ensure they espouse Catholic values and not their personal ideology or whims.

I often read the blog of Bridget Mary Meehan. Bridget Mary Meehan is a former Catholic sister who left the Church over the issue of women's ordination. She now calls herself a validly ordained bishop who pastors a "grass roots community of 'equals.'" She wrote an article on her blog a few years ago claiming that the Faithful she represents are through asking for permission to live out their baptismal graces to help the poor. Here too, we see the misleading claim. No one needs to ask permission of their bishop to perform works of charity or live out their baptismal vows. All are encouraged to do so. One would, however, need permission of their bishop, for example, if they want to open a soup kitchen under the auspices of the Catholic Church or work as an official representative of the Catholic Church. Anytime a person wants to act on behalf of or represent the Catholic Church in an official capacity, they have to espouse the values and teachings of the Catholic Church. When they do not do so, they are going to get into trouble.

Why people should be troubled by this, I will never understand. I mean, if I worked for the Obama administration and started telling people that I do not support or agree with the values that the Obama administration supports, how long am I going to be employed by the Obama administration? If I work for Planned Parenthood, but discourage women who come to Planned Parenthood from seeking an abortion, how long is Planned Parenthood going to keep me employed? If I am one of Bridget Mary's women priests and I invite President

Trump to the Church I pastor and honor him with a special award, how long am I going to be a priest under Bishop Bridget Mary?

The issue in these cases is not and never has been helping the poor. The issue is the ideology and values espoused by the person representing the Catholic Church who is helping the poor. When they espouse contrary values from the institution they represent, they are going to earn the ire of the bishops—and why would anyone expect otherwise?

The priests mentioned in the article are Don Primo Mazzolari and Don Lorenzo Milani. I could not find much information on them. I do not know why they were condemned or what of their writings or preaching bishops may have found objectionable. I can say this: sometimes people are mistakenly condemned for whatever reason. Saint Thomas Aquinas was once condemned as a heretic. Padre Pio was seen as a nut. It was only later that the Church began to realize the brilliance of Thomas Aquinas and the saintliness of Padre Pio. Based on what little information I could find, it seems that the two priests mentioned in the article might have been misunderstood. I can't say for sure, however.

In general, however, I see the social justice warrior type with a bit of a jaundiced eye. This is because many a social justice warrior use their position to promote Communism or Socialism. If the Church is condemning someone who is helping the poor, it is usually because their writings or preaching are suspect for promoting communistic or socialistic values. Communism and Socialism have nothing in common with Christianity. They are so dangerous because on the surface, they seem decidedly Christian. They seem like something Jesus would support. It is only when you pierce the surface and study them closely that you see them for what they truly are. Perhaps in my next article I will explore that topic more deeply.

Whatever the case may be with the two priests mentioned by the article, remember that no one in the Church is condemned for helping the poor. What gets people into trouble is espousing values and beliefs that are contrary to the Catholic Faith, while acting on behalf of and officially representing the Church.

That's the way it is!

Pro Life News

PRIESTS FOR LIFE

“All the hairs of your head are counted...you are worth more than many sparrows.” This assertion in today's Gospel forms the basis for preaching on how much God values human life. It is not just “living things” that God values, because he created them. Rather, it is human beings – worth more than other living beings – who are privileged to have a particular relationship with God. This “capacity for God” marks out what we mean by the “sanctity” of human life. There is a relationship opened up for us with the Creator – a relationship of which lower forms of life are not capable. We can know him, praise him, receive a share in his divine nature, and one day see him face to face. We were made for him, as St. Augustine said, and our hearts are restless until we rest in him.

If a sparrow does not fall to the ground without the Father's knowledge, what about a tiny unborn child killed “in secret” by chemical abortions (sometimes masquerading as birth control), or a new human embryo destroyed “in secret” in a laboratory in the name of “research?” Part of acknowledging Jesus before others, then, is to bear witness to the care that he and the Father give to the smallest human lives, and the concern God has to preserve such life.

News from the Vatican



IN PRAYER, WE ALLOW GOD TO TRANSFIGURE ALL THAT WE LIVE

In prayer, we give everything to God, our thanks, our pain, our desperation and our hopes... and we allow him to transfigure it all. Speaking on prayer, and particularly, the Virgin Mary's power as we pray to her, Francis reminded how she is like ‘a ladder,’ who brings her Son in our midst. “I too often used the Rosary in front of a mosaic: a small mosaic of Our Lady with the Child, where Mary appears in the centre, while in reality, using her hands, she becomes a kind of ladder through which Jesus can descend in the midst of us. “The center is always Jesus, who lowers himself to walk with us men so that we can ascend into Heaven with Him.”

In the Rosary prayer, he reminded, we turn to the Virgin Mary to bring us closer to her Son Jesus, to know Him and to love Him more and more. “And while we repeat ‘Hail Mary,’ we meditate on the mysteries, the Joyful, luminous, sorrowful and glorious stages of Christ's life, but also of our lives: for we walk with the Lord.” This simple prayer, he stressed, helps us to contemplate all that God has done for us and for our salvation in his love, and makes us understand that our life is united to that of Christ.

“In prayer, we are giving everything to God: fatigue, hurt, fears, but also joys, gifts, people ... all to God. By praying we allow God to enter into our time, to accept and transfigure all that we live. This powerful prayer of the Holy Rosary serves us often because it brings peace to hearts, to families, to the Church, and to the world.”

Pope Francis concluded, offering his blessing and reminding those watching to pray for him.
