Sacramental Information

Baptisms - Parents anticipating the birth of their first child are asked to attend baptismal instructions classes before the birth of their child, if possible. Note: Baptisms cannot be scheduled until all the necessary paperwork is completed. Contact the Rectory to schedule.

Confirmation - Confirmation is administered every year to all 8th grade students in our Parish Religious Education program. Children wishing to receive Confirmation must be enrolled and participating in the program for two years before they are eligible to receive the sacrament.

Marriages- In order to complete the necessary paperwork, couples are asked to contact the Rectory at least one full year in advance of the proposed marriage date.

Anointing of the Sick - Please contact the Rectory whenever a member of your family has become sick or hospitalized.

Monthly Visitations - Any parishioner who is homebound and wishes to receive the Eucharist on a monthly basis is asked to contact the Rectory to schedule a visit.

Rite of Christian Initiation in Adults (R.C.I.A.) - The R.C.I.A. prepares unbaptized adults for reception into the Catholic Church. The program is adapted to the needs of each person and prepares them for full initiation into the faith. Contact the Rectory for more information.



Liturgical Reflection 14th Sunday in Ordinary Time

FIRST READING: Zechariah 9:9-10

Zechariah proclaims the coming of the Messiah in striking imagery. The king will not come on a warhorse, with a display of military might, but meekly, on a beast of burden. And yet, his power is beyond question, as he sweeps away chariots, horses, and weapons of war, and proclaims peace to the whole earth.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Psalm 145

I will praise Your Name forever my King and my God! Psalm 145 praises God, the great king, who is full of compassion, kindness, and mercy towards all he has made.

SECOND READING: Romans 8:9, 11-13

Those who have been baptized into Christ are no longer "in the flesh" but rather "in the spirit." Through Baptism, we have become the dwelling places of the Holy Spirit, and everything we do must take this great reality into account. We no longer live for this life only; we look to the life yet to come, which has already begun for us through Baptism.

GOSPEL: Matthew 11:25-30

Jesus praises God who reveals his wisdom not to the usual suspects – the wise, learned, the important – but to those no one would expect: the little ones, the childlike. This passage ends



with a wonderful invitation, as Jesus calls all who carry heavy burdens to come to him and find rest. Jesus is "meek and humble of heart," the king of gentleness and power that Zachariah foretold. Using an image that would be familiar to his first-century audience, Jesus says that his yoke is easy, unlike the heavy burdens place on people's shoulders by the Pharisees, who according to Matthew's Gospel, did nothing to ease the weighty burden. Jesus' yoke is well fitted and matched to each person.

That's The Way It Is!



"I do not believe that just because you are against abortion that makes you pro-life. In fact, I think in many cases your morality is deeply lacking if all you want is a child born, but not fed, not a child educated, not a child housed. And why would I think that you don't? Because

you don't want any tax money to go there. That's not pro-life, that's pro-birth. We need a much broader conversation on what the morality of pro-life is." This quote comes from a notorious dissident Catholic nun by the name of Sister Joan Chittister. She is notorious for lambasting pro-lifers. I have never understood why so many people think this is a good argument. Not only is the argument patently false, it is utterly ridiculous.

First things first: her argument is patently false. There are many private pregnancy centers run on Christian principles that offer poor women health care and assistance, without abortion and without violating Christian principles. In Tioga County we have many charities that offer poor women assistance. Our own Church offers assistance to single mothers. We have paid the rent of single mothers, given them food, etc. As many of our parishioners know we also collect items to be given to poor women who have an unplanned pregnancy. This fact alone is plenty enough proof to demonstrate that Sister Joan has no clue what she is talking about. Pro-lifers indeed not only want children born, but also desire to help single mothers or poor families wherever possible.

It does not follow, however, that we pro-lifers believe that the government is best equipped to help single mothers. That would be why we might not support the use of tax dollars for government charity programs. We also might not support government charity if the programs violate Christian principles. We also might not support government charity if we have reason to believe government charity does not work. One of the issues with Sister Joan's argument is that it assumes the only way and or the best way to help single mothers is by supporting government anti-poverty programs and high taxation to pay for them. Assuming this, she then accuses pro-lifers who do not support such programs of hypocrisy. There is no hypocrisy involved. We are not against helping the poor.

The debate over the proper use of tax dollars and government anti-poverty programs is a debate about means, not ends. This is not to say that pro-lifers must be against government anti-poverty programs. I am saying that there are many ways to help the poor. Being pro-life does entail in a broader sense the realization that we have an obligation to help the poor. Being pro-life does not entail what Sister Joan assumes, namely, that it is mandatory to support government anti-poverty programs and high taxation to pay for them. I know of some pro-lifers that do not believe government run charity is the best way to help the poor. I know of no prolifers that believe we have no obligation to the poor, or to single mothers.

Here is where we get to the utter ridiculousness of her argument. Suppose I came across a child that was drowning.

Suppose I wanted to save the child, but I didn't want to take care of the child or otherwise help support the child in any way after I saved the child. Does it follow I should not try to save the child? Does it follow I don't care about the child? Would Sister Joan tell me that I don't really care about the life of the child because all I want to do is save the child from drowning but not take care of the child after I did? Would Sister Joan suggest I just let the child drown in such a case?

Suppose that pro-lifers actually do believe what Sister Joan accuses them of, namely that they are only pro-birth. They don't care at all about the child after birth. Does it follow that murderer is morally justifiable? Does it follow that prolifers should support murder? That is what makes her argument a Red Herring. The main issue for pro-lifers is abortion. It is all well and good to sit around and "have a broader conversation on what the meaning of pro-life is." More fundamentally we have to first agree that a child has a fundamental right to exist! Even if every pro-lifer was against helping single mothers, even if every pro-lifer sat in judgment of single mothers, all that would prove is that they are wrong on those points. It would not make them wrong when they decry the scourge of abortion.

What good is food, clothing, shelter, education, antipoverty programs in a country where people do not first agree that children have the right to exist? If someone is going to tell me that abortion is acceptable, on what basis do they demand that I care whether children are educated, fed, clothed, housed, etc? If such a person does not even believe that a child has the right to be born, why should I care what happens to the child after birth? If a child does not have a right to life, then how do they have a right to food, clothing, shelter, education etc? On the one hand, abortion supporters want to tell us that children do not have the right to life. On the other hand they tell us that the same children that have no right to life have the right to food, clothing, shelter and education. How does that work? I would like abortion supporters to explain that. I won't hold my breath waiting for an answer.

Pro Life News

PRIESTS FOR LIFE

"His dominion" (First reading) is brought about through "the Spirit of the one who raised Jesus from the dead" (Second reading). It is the dominion of life over death, not only in our bodies (Second reading) but in our culture, institutions, laws and policies. That Spirit dwells in us (Second reading). We, therefore, are life-givers! In fact, we will either spread life or death. There is no neutrality. It is an easier yoke (Gospel) to both embrace and spread life than death, because we were made that way. We were made to be life-givers. The Son wishes to reveal the Father to us (Gospel) precisely through that Spirit. What do we learn when he does so reveal the Father? We find the revelation of ourselves – people of life, people of self-giving, people who can love like the Father loves!

Third Apparition of Our Lady of Fatima

On July 13 1917 they recited the rosary with the crowd, they saw the usual reflex of light and then the Lady on the holmoak. Lucy asked: "What do you want from me?" She answered: "That you come the 13th of the next month, that you continue to recite the Rosary every day to our Lady of the Rosary to obtain peace in the world and the end of the war, because only She will be able to aid you." Lucy said, "I want to ask you to tell us who you are, and to make a miracle for the crowd to believe that you appear." She Answered: "you continue to come here. In October I will tell you who I am, that which I want, and I will do a miracle that all can see and believe. Sacrifice yourselves for sinners, and say often this prayer, especially during any sacrifice: "O my Jesus, I offer this for love of Thee, for the conversion of poor sinners, and in reparation for all the sins committed against the Immaculate Heart of Mary." As she spoke these words, Our lady stretched out her hands, and bright rays came forth which seemed to penetrate into the earth. All at once the ground vanished, and the children saw Hell, frightened they lifted their eyes to the Lady who told them:"You have seen Hell, where the souls of poor sinners go. To save future souls God wishes to establish in the world the devotion to My Immaculate Heart. If people do what I tell you, many souls will be saved." Then She said:" If my requests are granted, Russia will be converted and there will be peace. If not, she will scatter her errors throughout the world, provoking wars and persecution of the Church. The good will be martyred, the Holy Father will have much to suffer, and various nations will be destroyed...But in the end, my Immaculate Heart will triumph. The Holy Father will consecrate Russia to me, Russia will be converted, and a certain period of peace will be granted to the world". "Do you want to learn a prayer?" the vision asked, "Yes we do!" the children responded. "When you recite the Rosary, say at the end of each decade: Oh My Jesus, forgive us our sins, save us from the fires of hell, and lead all souls to Heaven, especially those in most need of Your Mercy.
