Sacramental Information

Baptisms - Parents anticipating the birth of their first child are asked to attend baptismal instructions classes before the birth of their child, if possible. Note: Baptisms cannot be scheduled until all the necessary paperwork is completed. Contact the Rectory to schedule.

Confirmation - Confirmation is administered every year to all 8th grade students in our Parish Religious Education program. Children wishing to receive Confirmation must be enrolled and participating in the program for two years before they are eligible to receive the sacrament.

Marriages- In order to complete the necessary paperwork, couples are asked to contact the Rectory at least one full year in advance of the proposed marriage date.

Anointing of the Sick - Please contact the Rectory whenever a member of your family has become sick or hospitalized.

Monthly Visitations - Any parishioner who is homebound and wishes to receive the Eucharist on a monthly basis is asked to contact the Rectory to schedule a visit.

Rite of Christian Initiation in Adults (R.C.I.A.) - The R.C.I.A. prepares unbaptized adults for reception into the Catholic Church. The program is adapted to the needs of each person and prepares them for full initiation into the faith. Contact the Rectory for more information.



Liturgical Reflection

16th Sunday in Ordinary Time FIRST READING: Wisdom 12:13, 16-19

This passage from the Book of Wisdom is addressed directly to God. We can sense the wonder of the inspired writer, who recognizes that God's power is seen most clearly in God's gentleness and mercy. And God's people must strive to become more like God – our justice, too, must be joined with great kindness.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Psalm 86

Psalm 86, like the First Reading, praises the forgiving mercy of our all-powerful God.

SECOND READING: Romans 8:26-27

As we continue our reading of Romans, we come to a wonderful passage about prayer. We are weak, and we struggle to pray as we ought. But we do not need to be discouraged or afraid, since the Holy Spirit, dwelling in each of us through Baptism, is praying, not with words, but with "groanings" beyond the power of speech – a language God understands better than any other.

GOSPEL: Matthew 13:24-43

What is the Kingdom of Heaven? How can we understand something that we cannot readily see or measure or touch? The Kingdom of Heaven is a mystery so multifaceted, that there is always more



to understand. With so much to grasp while leaving so much still to understand, Jesus chose the language of poetry and parable to offer sketches of God's Kingdom. Last Sunday we had a parable of the sower; today we have three parables of the Kingdom: the weeds and the wheat, the mustard seed, and the yeast. Each of these parables gives us a glimpse of what God's reign is like. It is not tidy: rather, good and bad grow together, like the weeds and the wheat, and there is no way to remove the one without also destroying the other. God's Kingdom starts small: like the mustard seed, something tiny, almost infinitesimal, leads to extraordinary results. And the kingdom is mystery: like yeast in dough, it is invisible, yet makes all the difference. Since parables are open-ended, offering more than the one way to understand them, we can also see the admixture of the wheat and weeds within the Church itself where we experience both healthy, vigorous wheat, and unhealthy, destructive weeds growing and struggling to survive. Further, we can see in ourselves both good and evil, wheat and weeds present in our hearts, our thoughts, and our actions. Whichever way we look at the parable, we see that God who sows the good seed remains present, patient, and attentive. And ultimately, whether it is the world, the Church, or ourselves, the final judgment is left to God, not to us.

News from the Vatican

GO TO JESUS WHEN LIFE BECOMES OVERWHELMING



Jesus says: "Come to Me, all who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest" (Matthew 11:28). The Lord does not reserve this phrase for some of His friends, no, He addresses to "all" those that are tired and

oppressed by life. And who can feel excluded from this invitation? The Lord knows what a burden life can be. He that many things weary the heart: past disappointments and wounds, burdens to carry and wrongs to be endured in the present, uncertainties and worries for the future. In face of all this, Jesus' first word is an invitation, an invitation to move and react: "Come." The mistake, when things go badly, is to stay where one is, lying there. It seems evident, but how difficult it is to react and open oneself! It's not easy. In dark moments it is natural to stay with oneself, to brood over how unjust life is, over how ungrateful others are and how evil the world is, and so on. We all know it. We have suffered this awful experience sometimes. But thus, closed in on ourselves, we see everything black. Then we even become familiar with sadness, which becomes as home: that sadness that prostrates us; this sadness is an awful thing. Instead, Jesus wants to extricate us from this "quicksand" and therefore He says to each one: "Come!" "Who?" "You, you, you . . ." The way out is in relation, in extending the hand and raising one's eyes towards the One who really loves us.

In fact, to come out of oneself isn't enough, it is necessary to know where to go, because so many aims are illusory: they promise rest and distract somewhat, assuring peace and giving amusement, then leaving one in the solitude of before; they are "fireworks." Therefore Jesus points out where to go: "Come to Me." Often, in face of a burden of life or a situation that pains us, we try to talk about it with someone who will listen to us, with a friend, with an expert . . . It is a great good

to do this, but let us not forget Jesus! Let us not forget to open ourselves to Him and to tell Him about our life, to entrust people and situations to Him. Perhaps there are areas of our life that we have never opened to Him and that have remained dark, because they have never seen the Lord's light. Each one of us has his/her own story. And if someone has this dark area, seek Jesus, go to a missionary of mercy, go to a priest, go . . . But go to Jesus, and tell this to Jesus. Today He says to each one of us: "Courage, do not give in to the burdens of life, do not close yourself in face of fears and sins, but come to Me!"

He waits for us. He always waits for us, not to resolve our problems magically, but to make us strong in our problems. Jesus does not remove the burdens of life, but the anguish of heart; He does not take the cross away from us, but carries it with us. And with Him, every burden becomes light, because He is the rest that we seek. When Jesus enters our life, peace comes, that peace that remains even in trials, in sufferings. Let us go to Jesus, let us give Him our time, let us meet Him every day in prayer, in a confident and personal dialogue; let us familiarize ourselves with His Word, let us rediscover His forgiveness without fear, let us be satiated with His Bread of life: we will feel loved and consoled by Him. It is He Himself who asks this of us, almost insisting. He says, "Learn from Me and you will find rest for your souls." And thus we learn to go to Jesus and, while in the summer months we will seek a bit of rest from what wearies the body, let us not forget to find true rest in the Lord.

PRIESTS FOR LIFE

God gives time for repentance. This is a key theme of today's readings, and it can be applied to the patience that the People of Life need to have as they build a Culture of Life with painstakingly slow but steady steps. Why, some might ask, does God not just stop all the abortions today? He certainly does not justify a single one of them, nor does he allow us to justify them. Moreover, he calls us to do the most we can to restore justice today. Yet the weeds and wheat grow together; good and evil co-exist. This generous patience of the Lord by which he allows the sinner room to find repentance has led to many conversions. The website of the Silent No More Awareness Campaign (www.SilentNoMore.com), example, contains numerous testimonies of those who speak out about their abortion and healing. Also, many abortionists have converted and now speak out publicly about it (see www.AbortionTestimony.com). As we try to elect and lobby public officials, it is particularly important to emphasize the theme of patience. Weeds and wheat grow together – but they do grow. As the bishops indicate in Living the Gospel of Life, we are called to use our votes to advance the culture of life. Yet no candidate has a magic wand to end the culture of death.

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
