Sacramental Information

Baptisms - Parents anticipating the birth of their first child are asked to attend baptismal instructions classes before the birth of their child, if possible. Note: Baptisms cannot be scheduled until all the necessary paperwork is completed. Contact the Rectory to schedule.

Confirmation - Confirmation is administered every year to all 8th grade students in our Parish Religious Education program. Children wishing to receive Confirmation must be enrolled and participating in the program for two years before they are eligible to receive the sacrament.

Marriages- In order to complete the necessary paperwork, couples are asked to contact the Rectory at least one full year in advance of the proposed marriage date.

Anointing of the Sick - Please contact the Rectory whenever a member of your family has become sick or hospitalized.

Monthly Visitations - Any parishioner who is homebound and wishes to receive the Eucharist on a monthly basis is asked to contact the Rectory to schedule a visit.

Rite of Christian Initiation in Adults (R.C.I.A.) - The R.C.I.A. prepares unbaptized adults for reception into the Catholic Church. The program is adapted to the needs of each person and prepares them for full initiation into the faith. Contact the Rectory for more information.



Liturgical Reflection

The 22nd Sunday in Ordinary Time FIRST READING: Jeremiah 20:7-9

Jeremiah's words outwardly express his internal, personal, frustration with the Lord. Others have scorned and reproached Jeremiah for his prophesies such that he no longer wants to speak the Lord's name. Yet the power of the Lord's name becomes too much for him to keep inside. Later in Jeremiah's words, which we do not hear today, he affirms the Lord's presence with him. This will allow those who persecute him not to win out. Today's reading is only a brief portion of one of the six laments among Jeremiah's prophesies. Vehement and accusing as he is, it is significant that he continues to address all his pain to God. God alone is the one who can understand the depths of Jeremiah's grief, and the only one who can rebuild prophet and people.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Psalm 63

The Responsorial Psalm assigned for today is also one of the common psalms for Ordinary Time. In the psalm the author longs deeply for God to point that his soul thirsts for him. The psalmist's confidence in the Lord's kindness and care is evident. Like us, the author has gazed upon the Lord in the sanctuary and knows the riches of the banquet. The Lord who provides is also the Lord to whom we cling when others scorn us as they did Jeremiah.

SECOND READING: Romans 12:1-2

For three more Sundays our Second Reading comes from Paul's letter to the Romans. Today's brief passage, addressed to both Jewish and Gentile Christians, comes from the beginning of Romans 12, a chapter in which Paul instructs on how they responsibly live in the light of the free gift of justification in Christ and provides the foundation for the pattern of life to be embraced by all believers. They cannot live with disregard for their actions. God holds them accountable. Conformity to Christ, not the world, is the Christian charge. Living in Christ will lead us to discern God's will for us.




GOSPEL: Matthew 16:21-27

Today's Gospel reading follows immediately upon last Sunday's, in which Simon Peter professed Jesus as the Christ and in turn, Jesus follow me blessed Peter with the keys to the kingdom

and acknowledged that the Church would be built upon him. In today's Gospel Jesus is realistic with his disciples informing them that he must suffer, die, and rise. Peter rebukes the Lord, disagreeing with him, perhaps neither hearing nor understanding what it meant that Jesus would be raised. Jesus, in turn rebukes Peter, and teaches the disciples that if they wish to follow, the Cross is also theirs. The cross is ours, too. What Jesus says about his own dying and rising, his own loss and finding of life, teaches his disciples of every age about their own death and resurrection, about losing their lives to find them again eternally.



SCHEDULING 2018 MASS INTENTIONS

Scheduling Mass intentions for 2018 can now be done through the parish office, during regular business hours. Due to the change in our Mass Schedule, we have established new guidelines for scheduling intentions:

- 1.One weekend Mass on each weekend must be celebrated for the intentions of the parish. This is required by Canon Law (c. 534). Because of this we only have one weekend Mass for which we can accept an intention. Due to this limited availability of weekend Masses, no family may schedule more than ONE WEEKEND MASS PER QUARTER, or four weekend Masses per year.
- 2. There is no limit to the number of DAILY MASS INTENTIONS, including those Masses said at the nursing homes each month, which may be scheduled by each family.
- 3.Canon 948 states, "Separate Masses are to be applied for the intentions of those for whom a single offering, although small, has been given and accepted." Therefore, only one intention may be scheduled for any given Mass. However, for pastoral concerns to better accommodate the needs of the parishioners, we will adhere to the following: Up to three first names with the same last name (i.e. John, Paul and Mary Smith) or two last names only (i.e. Scott and Smith Families) will be allowed per intention.
- 4. The stipend given for a Mass intention is \$10. While we are willing to take requests over the phone, your Mass Intention will be not be scheduled until we are in receipt of your donation.
- 5. Christmas, Easter, Mother's Day, Father's Day, and All Souls Day Masses are always for the individual intentions listed by parishioners on their envelope.
- 6.The Sanctuary Candle, burning in memory or honor of someone, is available on a weekly basis with no limit to the number each family may reserve.

September Month of our Lady of Sorrows

On September 15th the Church observes a memorial honoring Mary as our Lady of Sorrows. "And a sword will pierce your own soul, too," Simeon told Mary when she presented the child Jesus in the Temple forty days after his birth (Luke 2:35). That prophecy was fulfilled when Mary stood at the foot of her son's Cross, sharing his bitter suffering. During this month of September, we honor Mary under the title of Our Lady of Sorrows. This month let us bring to Mary all our sorrows, knowing that she understands what it is to suffer.

This month is a good time to draw closer to Mary by meditation on the great hymn to the Mother of Sorrows, *At her Cross Her Station Keeping*. In this beautiful prayer we ask for the grace to feel with Mary, to share her sorrows:



tholy Mother! pierce me through, in my heart each wound renew of my Savior crucified:
Let me share with thee his pain, who for all my sins was slain, who for me in torments died.

That's The Way It Is!



Pope Pius IX is the pope that everyone loves to hate. He was the pope who called Vatican I. Vatican I is the council best known for defining Papal Infallibility. When one of the bishops at the council argued that Papal infallibility is not in the

Tradition of the Church, Pius was said to have remarked "Tradition?! I am Tradition!" Pope Pius IX defined the Immaculate Conception. Pope Pius IX also wrote the infamous document known as the Syllabus of Errors. Pius IX was not known for his humility.

Pius condemned the notion of religious liberty. Vatican II supports religious liberty. Many people claim that the Church has changed her teaching on religious liberty. Of course the Church has done no such thing. Whenever Church teaching appears to conflict with itself the conflict can often be resolved by understanding the precise question that is being answered and or the context in which the teaching appears.

The long and short of the apparent contradiction concerning religious liberty is that religious liberty meant something entirely different in the context of the time Pius lived. Embracing the concept of religious liberty at the time would have entailed the Church surrendering her rights to the government. It would have entailed embracing government persecution of the Church. Even in the US Catholics were persecuted. Given the context, I think we can understand why Pius IX would have been suspicious of the concept of religious freedom. In his mind, religious freedom was synonymous with persecution of Catholics. To this end, Pius also believed it was necessary for the pope to have temporal power. This is because he feared without temporal power the pope would be unable to defend the rights of the Church against state encroachment.

The context of Vatican II is far different. The documents of Vatican II have in mind the modern notion of civilization where church and state are no longer intertwined. Because church and state are not intertwined, the government has no competence to speak to religious matters. If the government is not competent to speak to religious matters, citizens of the government must have the freedom to seek truth without government interference. The context of Vatican II also does not equate religious liberty with persecution. Even though the state has no competence to speak to matters of Faith, nevertheless the state can restrict religious freedom when moral issues are at stake. This is because moral truth can be discerned through human reason. I grant that the light of Faith certainly helps us to better conform our minds to truth, but Faith is not absolutely necessary to know right from wrong. Moral Truth can be abstracted by our intellects from the Natural Law.

While Pope Pius condemned religious liberty, it is important to note that Pope Pius never suggested that people should be forced to convert or that other religions should be suppressed. The documents of Vatican II also do not suggest any such thing. Without the gift of Faith, a person cannot assent to the truths of the Catholic Faith. To a person without the gift of Faith, the claims of one religion over that of another seem to boil down to little more than personal opinion or taste.

I need to note that there is a difference between someone who has not been given the gift of Faith and someone who has been given the gift of Faith and is a heretic. When a person is baptized, they take on certain rights, duties and obligations. The Church has every right to hold those who claim to be Catholic accountable for what they believe and profess. Being Catholic means something. The Catholic Faith is not just a matter of personal opinion or personal taste. When a person, therefore, claims to be Catholic, it means something. This is why the historical coercion of heretics is a separate issue from the one being addressed by Vatican II. Vatican II has in mind those who have not been enlightened by the Faith. They cannot be coerced because without Faith, they cannot assent to Catholic Truth. Religious liberty, therefore, enables someone to seek truth. Religious liberty does not entail that those who have been given the gift of Faith have the right to dissent or that they ought not be held accountable for what they claim to believe.

That's the way it is!

PRIESTS FOR LIFE

The Church's efforts to proclaim, celebrate and serve the Gospel of Life are marked by the themes in today's readings. First, the effort to defend life is based on the thirst for God that today's first reading and Psalm express. We long for him, who is life itself, and we long for others to possess him as well. We serve the Kingdom of Life because it has captured and enthralled us, and convinced us that all our happiness and fulfillment are found in it.

Second, it is that conviction which departs from a worldly way of thinking, which would see no connection between freedom and truth, but which instead asserts that individual belief and choice are primary, even over life itself. This attitude builds a culture of death. As St. Paul says in the second reading, we must not conform ourselves to this age, nor to its "pro-choice" ways of thinking, especially about the unborn and the disabled. The pro-life movement is based on the renewal of our mind, that results in the ability to discern "what is good, pleasing, and perfect."

Third, the Gospel passage reinforces the need for this discernment. Peter was thinking in a worldly way when he saw suffering and crucifixion as something to be avoided at all costs. Such thinking today leads some to see abortion as a solution to the suffering of a "crisis pregnancy," or euthanasia as the escape from illness and disability. But that is not Godly thinking.

OUR FIRST ENCOUNTER WITH JESUS

During the General Audience in St. Peter's Square, the Pope continued his catechesis on Christian hope by meditating on the memory of vocation revives hope.

Every vocation, marriage, consecrated life, priesthood begins with an encounter with Jesus that gives new joy and hope. Jesus wants people who experience that living with Him, gives immense happiness He recommended that young people not give into those who are cynical and the old-hearted. Do not trust someone who extinguishes enthusiasm by saying that nothing would be worth the sacrifice of a lifetime. God wants us to dream like him and with him.

Dear Brothers and Sisters, I wish to reflect again on the relationship between hope and memory. In the Gospel passage we have heard, Saint John shares with us the precious memory of when Jesus called the first disciples and asked them: "What do you seek?" It is a question that he asks each of us in our own time. Jesus recognizes that a young heart, and a healthy one at that, is a searching heart, full of a desire for life and happiness. For the first disciples, this encounter was only the beginning of their relationship with Jesus and the living out of their vocation; it ignited a flame in their hearts, which transformed them into missionaries who always treasured the memory of that first encounter with Christ.

Their story reminds us how we discover our vocation. Whether we are called to marriage, consecrated life or priesthood, our vocation finds its origin in our first encounter with Jesus. It is that first spark which, even in the midst of trials, leads to an ever-deeper relationship with the Lord and which brings us hope and joy. Let us treasure this flame of love that burns in our hearts, by recalling our first encounter with Christ. May we be joyful disciples, who dream with God of a better world, and who share the reason for our hope with all whom we meet.

EVERY STONE HAS ITS PLACE IN THE CHURCH

"No small stone is useless, rather, in Jesus' hands it becomes precious, because He gathers it, looks at it with great tenderness, works on it with His Spirit, and puts it in the right place, which He has always thought of and where it can be more useful to the entire edifice. Each one of us is a small stone, but in Jesus' hands we participate in the building of the Church. And all of us, in as much as small, have been made living stone, because when Jesus takes the stone in His hand, He makes it His, He makes it alive, full of life, full of life by the Holy Spirit, full of life from His love, and thus we have a place and a mission in the Church: she is a community of life, made up of very many stones, all different, which form one edifice in the sign of fraternity and communion."

Notice Regarding Reporting Sexual Abuse of a Minor

It is the policy of the Diocese of Scranton to report any allegation of sexual abuse of a minor to law enforcement. If you are a victim of sexual abuse committed by a priest, deacon, religious or lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton, you are encouraged to immediately report the matter to law enforcement. If any priest, deacon, religious, lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton has cause or reason to suspect that a minor has been subjected to any form of abuse, including child sexual abuse, the matter will be reported to law enforcement. In accordance with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's Child Protective Services Laws, reports of suspected child abuse should also be made immediately by phone to the 24-Hour Child Abuse hotline (ChildLine) at 1-800-932-0313 or electronically at www.compass.state.pa.us/cwis.

It is also the policy of the Diocese to adhere to all civil and state regulations. To this end, the Diocese is equally committed to adhering to the norms of the Code of Canon Law and to upholding the tenets of the USCCB Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People, which includes supporting victims of sexual abuse in their pursuit of emotional and spiritual well-being. As such, information regarding an allegation of sexual abuse of a minor should also be reported to the Victim Assistance Coordinator Mary Beth Pacuska at (570-862-7551),or to Diocesan officials, including the Vicar General, Monsignor Thomas M. Muldowney, V.G., at (570-207-2269).


