Sacramental Information

Baptisms - Parents anticipating the birth of their first child are asked to attend baptismal instructions classes before the birth of their child, if possible. Note: Baptisms cannot be scheduled until all the necessary paperwork is completed. Contact the Rectory to schedule.

Confirmation - Confirmation is administered every year to all 8th grade students in our Parish Religious Education program. Children wishing to receive Confirmation must be enrolled and participating in the program for two years before they are eligible to receive the sacrament.

Marriages- In order to complete the necessary paperwork, couples are asked to contact the Rectory at least one full year in advance of the proposed marriage date.

Anointing of the Sick - Please contact the Rectory whenever a member of your family has become sick or hospitalized.

Monthly Visitations - Any parishioner who is homebound and wishes to receive the Eucharist on a monthly basis is asked to contact the Rectory to schedule a visit.

Rite of Christian Initiation in Adults (R.C.I.A.) - The R.C.I.A. prepares unbaptized adults for reception into the Catholic Church. The program is adapted to the needs of each person and prepares them for full initiation into the faith. Contact the Rectory for more information.



Liturgical Reflection

The 23rd Sunday in Ordinary Time FIRST READING: Ezekiel 33:7-9

A prophet is like a watchman appointed to herald the advance of a country's enemies by blowing a trumpet. God appoints Ezekiel as the watchman for the house of Israel. The watchman's task is to speak the truth to others and lead them from their evil inclinations. Should the watchman not do that, he is liable for the person's injury or death. But the persons who simply not heed the watchman's words or the sound of the trumpet, are responsible for the consequences that befall them. Through the prophet, God's warnings offer the people a chance for a new life, even in exile, if only they will take heed. Listen, repent, and receive God's blessings: this is a prophetic message reiterated by all of Israel's prophets, including the greatest prophet, Jesus.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Psalm 95

Psalm 95 is another common psalm for Ordinary Time. The refrain commands us not to harden our hearts to the Lord's words like God's people did at Meribah and Massah in the desert. The psalm is also a call to worship. This is seen in the first two stanzas. The psalmist twice invites us to "Come" to the Lord in song and worship. Our gestures of bowing and kneeling serve to acknowledge that God created us and we honor him as Creator and our shepherd.

SECOND READING: Romans 13:8-10

Christ's own love shown for us through his Death and Resurrection means that love is now the fulfillment of the law. Following the letter of the law no longer satisfies, but rather embracing fully the commandment to love one another does. Love is the opposite of evil. When we love our neighbor as ourselves, we fulfill the law as Jesus did, for he is Love, the Love whom God calls us to imitate.

GOSPEL: Matthew 18:15-20

If your brother sins against you, go and rebuke him in private. If he listens to you, you have won your brother. We skip ahead a few chapters in Matthew for this Sunday's Gospel reading where we find Jesus teaching his disciples

how to handle a situation in which a person sins against them. Jesus' instructions initially follow the pattern of Ezekiel's words form the First Reading in which a disciple is to speak honestly with the person who sinned. If the sinner does not listen, then a small group of people comes to address the situation as in trial. Failing resolution, then one is to tell the Church, which Jesus instructs, is to treat the sinner as he treated tax collectors and Gentiles. Remember: even Gentiles and tax collectors are welcomed into the community if they believe in Jesus and show the fruits of repentance in their lives. So too will anyone who finally repents, be welcomed home. We, who are the Body of Christ, the Church, dine with sinners in the Eucharist, extending God's forgiveness in Christ. Throughout the process of healing divisions, Jesus remains present in the community. Even with as few as two or three witnesses, he is present in their efforts at reconciliation.

Parish Activities and Information EUCHARISTIC ADORERS NEEDED



Eucharistic Adoration is adoring or honoring the Eucharistic Presence of Christ. In a deeper sense, it involves the contemplation of the Mystery of Christ truly present before us. During Eucharistic Adoration, we watch and wait, we remain silent in His Presence, and open ourselves to His Graces which flow from the Eucharist.

By worshiping the Eucharistic Jesus, we become what God wants us to be! Like a magnet, The Lord draws us to Himself and gently transforms us. In its fullest essence Eucharistic Adoration is God and Man reaching out for each other, at the same time!

You are invited to grow in faith and love of our Lord with us, by coming to Eucharistic Adoration. Every Tuesday from 8:00am – 7:00pm, adoration is held at St. Peter's. We are in need of more adorers. Two adorers are needed for each hour. All are invited to participate. You are free to visit any time without signing up. If you wish to sign up for a committed weekly hour, a sign-up sheet can be found on the bulletin board in the church or you can call Sue Singer at 570-724-2360.

How does one spend an hour before Jesus exposed in the Blessed Sacrament? This hour Jesus wants you to spend with Him is spent any way you want. You may bring your own prayer books, use the books in the chapel, read the Bible, pray the Rosary, or just sit, relax and enjoy the sweet peace that comes from simply being in the Presence of God. You may feel you can't pray well. Don't let this discourage you. The mere fact that you take time out at a specific time each week to spend an hour with Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament pleases Him very much, and is in itself a prayer of great faith.

HOLY FAMILY ICON WILL VISIT THE CHURCH

The Holy Family icon will visit St. Peter's Church from September 22nd to 26th. The Holy Family Prayer Program and icon began August 4th at the 133rd Supreme Knights of Columbus Convention in Philadelphia. This program features an image of the Holy Family and a set of prayer booklets. Each Knights of Columbus jurisdiction (state) received several Holy Family images, which will be the centerpiece of prayer services conducted in churches and council meeting places throughout the Order for the duration of the program. This is the 17th Marian Prayer Program sponsored by the Knights of Columbus, beginning with the first program - honoring Mary under her title of Our Lady of Guadalupe - in 1979. In preparation for the 1982 Centennial of the Order, the second prayer program was initiated, which highlighted the Holy Family. Since then, the Blessed Mother has been honored by her Knights under her titles of Our Lady of Perpetual Help, Our Lady of Czestochowa, Our Lady of Pochaiv, Our Lady of the Assumption, Our Lady of the Rosary and Our Lady of Charity. These Order-wide programs of Marian Prayer have gathered together more than 16 million people at some 140,000 prayer services conducted at local councils and parishes.

SCHEDULING 2018 MASS INTENTIONS

Scheduling Mass intentions for 2018 can now be done through the parish office, during regular business hours. **Due to the change in our Mass Schedule, we have established new guidelines for scheduling intentions:**

- 1. One weekend Mass on each weekend must be celebrated for the intentions of the parish. This is required by Canon Law (c. 534). Because of this we only have one weekend Mass for which we can accept an intention. Due to this limited availability of weekend Masses, no family may schedule more than ONE WEEKEND MASS PER QUARTER, or four weekend Masses per year.
- 2. There is no limit to the number of DAILY MASS INTENTIONS, including those Masses said at the nursing homes each month, which may be scheduled by each family.
- 3. Canon 948 states, "Separate Masses are to be applied for the intentions of those for whom a single offering, although small, has been given and accepted." Therefore, only one intention may be scheduled for any given Mass. However, for pastoral concerns to better accommodate the needs of the parishioners, we will adhere to the following: Up to three first names with the same last name (i.e. John, Paul and Mary Smith) or two last names only (i.e. Scott and Smith Families) will be allowed per intention.
- 4. The stipend given for a Mass intention is \$10. While we are willing to take requests over the phone, your Mass Intention will be not be scheduled until we are in receipt of your donation.
- 5. Christmas, Easter, Mother's Day, Father's Day, and All Souls Day Masses are always for the individual intentions listed by parishioners on their envelope.
- 6. The Sanctuary Candle, burning in memory or honor of someone, is available on a weekly basis with no limit to the number each family may reserve.

We ended the 2016-17 fiscal year with a net loss of \$4,210.75. Although this amount is less than 1% of our overall budget, it is a shortfall nevertheless. The deficit cannot be linked to a single factor, but several variances occurred, including our weekly and special collections not meeting budgeted amounts, and unexpected increases in certain expenses; the loss was mitigated as a result of cost savings in other areas. A complete financial report is available in the rectory for anyone who wishes.

Please note, although the budget for the current year weekly collection amount was reduced to \$5,750 from \$5,900 last year, we are already behind our Year-to-Date goal by \$3,988. Please reflect on your monthly giving and be as generous as you are able. We are grateful to all those who financially sacrifice every week to support our parish and its ministries.

That's The Way It Is!



The extreme weather in our country, especially with the Hurricanes affecting the south, has many people asking the question "Where is God in all of this?" "If God is so good, why does he allow Hurricanes and other severe weather to cause all the

suffering that they cause?" This weekend is also close to the anniversary of September 11. This causes people to ask why God allows hate and evil to exist. These are natural questions. They are questions I ask all the time.

In this life, I am sorry to say that we will not have the answers we seek. Even Scripture does not really give satisfactory answers to those questions. If you read the Book of Job, the classic book of Scripture that directly deals with the suffering of the innocent and godly, God's answer to Job is decidedly unsatisfactory and inadequate from the human perspective. God basically tells Job to man up and stop complaining—because he has no right to complain. In the end, God restores Job one-hundred fold, but gives no real answer to why the godly suffer and why evil seems at times to be far more powerful than that of good.

If God has chosen not to give a substantial answer to the question of evil, I certainly can't give an answer. What I can do, however, is offer some observations that I think are worth reflecting and praying over.

At the Easter Vigil, a special prayer is chanted called the Exsultet. There is a part of the prayer that sounds rather bizarre: "O happy fault, O necessary sin of Adam which gained for us so great a redeemer..." The prayer praises the sin of Adam. It is the only time I am aware that sin is praised in the worship of the Church. Why would the Church be praising sin? It is not so much that the Church is praising sin so much as it is the Church is reflecting on the greatness of God. Had Adam never sinned, we would never know the full extent of God's power. Had Adam never sinned, we would never sinned, we would never sinned, we would never sinned, we would never have had the opportunity to reveal to us what greatness really is and what power really is—what it really means to be God.

Here is my point: just as you need the darkness to show the light, you need evil to show the good; hate to show love. Where is God in the tragedies of life? Where is God in the destructive weather? God is revealed in all the police, fire, National Guard, military, emergency responders, medical workers, etc, who risk their own lives to rescue people. God is in the volunteers who are helping the victims of hurricanes to rebuild. God is in the volunteers who help the people to grieve their losses. God is in the generosity of all the people who are sending in donations of money or other supplies. Without these tragedies, generosity, courage, sacrifice, love, etc, would not have the opportunity to express themselves and show their true power. While we never praise evil, without evil we could never know the real power of good. Evil and suffering give good people a chance to reveal the power of good. Hate gives love the chance to reveal what real power can do.

September 11 will never be forgotten. I remember watching a movie about the attacks. At one point in the movie a US Marine locates surviving emergency personnel. The personnel were naturally scared. They pleaded with the Marine not to leave them. The Marine said in a deep, and powerful voice: "Sirs, I am a United States Marine and YOU are my mission!" [In other words "Sirs, I would sooner die before I ran out on you."] One line from one Marine demonstrated how the power of good casts out evil and darkness. One line from one Marine demonstrated that God was very much present in that tragedy. For me, when the Marine uttered that one line, it was as if the sun came out and dispelled the darkness and evil of those attacks. The Marine, in short, revealed the power of love in the midst of hate. The Marine revealed God's presence.

None of what I have written explains why God allows evil. None of what I have written explains why good people suffer. What I have written, however, I hope, shows how good uses evil to reveal what real power is. What I have written, however, I hope, shows how God uses evil to show his true power and goodness.

I am hoping for a very generous response to the financial request of the USCCB. This gives the parishioners of Saint Peters and Saint Thomas the Apostle the chance to reveal their own generosity in the midst of tragedy and let the victims of the Hurricane know that we are with them. We should absolutely pray for the victims, but sometimes our prayers need to translate into concrete action. God will answer our prayers for the victims through our generosity to the victims in the offering being taken up for them this weekend. I know the generosity exists in both parishes because I have witnessed it. LOVE ALONE GIVES MEANING AND HAPPINESS TO LIFE

Last Sunday's passage (Matthew 16:21-27) is the continuation of the profession of faith of Peter, "rock" on which Jesus wishes to build his Church. Matthew shows us the reaction of the same Peter

when Jesus reveals to the disciples that He will suffer in Jerusalem, be killed and be raised. Peter takes Jesus aside and rebukes Him because this - he says to Him - can't happen to Him, to Christ. However, Jesus in turn rebukes Peter with harsh words: "Get behind Me, Satan! You are a hindrance to Me; for you are not on the side of God, but of men!" A moment earlier, the Apostle was blessed by the Father, because he had received from Him that revelation, he was a solid "rock" on which Jesus could build His community, and immediately after, he becomes an obstacle, a rock not on which to build but a stumbling block on the way of the Messiah. Jesus knew well that Peter and the others still had a long way to go to becoming His Apostles!

At that point, the Master turned to all those that followed Him, presenting clearly to them the way to follow: "If any man would come after Me, let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow Me." The temptation always, also today, is to want to follow a Christ without the cross, rather to teach God the right way, as Peter: "No, no Lord, not this, it will never happen." However, Jesus reminds us that His way is the way of love, and there is no true love without the sacrifice of oneself. We are called not to allow ourselves to be absorbed by the vision of this world, but to be ever more aware of the need and effort for us Christians to walk counter-current and uphill.

Jesus completes His proposal with words that express a great wisdom that is always valid, because they challenge the egocentric mentality and behavior. He exhorts: "For whoever will save his life will lose it and whoever loses his life for my sake will find it." Contained in this paradox is the Golden Rule that God has inscribed in human nature created in Christ: the rule that love alone gives meaning and happiness to life. To spend one's talents, one's energies and one's time only to save, protect and fulfill oneself leads in reality to lose oneself, that is, to a sad and sterile existence. If, instead, we live for the Lord and we organize our life on love, as Jesus did, we will be able to savor genuine joy, and our life won't be sterile, it will be fruitful. *********************

MORALITY ISN'T "YOU CAN, YOU CAN'T"

Morality isn't "you can, you can't" or "you must, you must not," says Pope Francis in a book-interview with French researcher Dominique Wolton. Morality is a consequence of an encounter with Jesus Christ. It's a consequence of the faith for us Catholics. Morality is always a consequence He points the finger at the "temptation of the Church" to

pronounce herself in terms of "they can't do this": "But no, and no, and no! This type of interdiction is what one finds in Jesus' dramas with the Pharisees. The same! The greats of the Church are those that have a vision that goes beyond, those that understand. Behind every rigidity, there is an inability to communicate.

PRIESTS FOR LIFE

The readings today provide important insight into the pro-life witness of the Church and of each member of the Church. Combining the themes of the readings, we can say that the Church consists of "loving watchmen." Because we love God, we love others, and therefore try to persuade others to love the same God and to keep themselves from the destructive harm of sin. When we try to fulfill the exhortation of Ezekiel and of Jesus to engage in the spiritual work of mercy of "admonishing the sinner," we are told – particularly when the sin we are trying to prevent is abortion - that we should "mind our own business." Yet it actually is our business to engage in fraternal correction, because God has entrusted us to each other. "The God of the Covenant has entrusted the life of every individual to his or her fellow human beings" (Evangelium Vitae, 76). There is a natural bond of responsibility, because we are all one human family, and there is a mystical communion in grace and a harm that is done to the entire Body of Christ by the sins of each individual. Hence, fraternal correction and being a "watchman," make sense. The task is especially urgent when we are speaking up for defenseless human beings who cannot speak for themselves.

The love that Paul describes in the second reading is what infuses the pro-life movement and motivates its participants. Defending the unborn is simply an application of "love your neighbor." Pro-life advocacy, therefore, does not have to be seen as ideologically or politically motivated. It is simply love in action, and love that inspires not only the work of the pregnancy centers and the post abortion healing ministries, but also the legislative efforts, the political efforts, the protests, and every other form of pro-life activity.

The gospel passage today ends with the words, "where two or three are gathered together in my name, there am I in the midst of them." Why did the Lord say "two or three?" He is there when just one person is present, isn't he? Certainly, he is. But it is when the "other" or "others" show up that we are then able to give ourselves away in love, and that bond of active love between human beings manifests Jesus' presence in the particular way that he highlights in this passage
