Baptisms - Parents anticipating the birth of their first child are asked to attend baptismal instructions classes before the birth of their child, if possible. Note: Baptisms cannot be scheduled until all the necessary paperwork is completed. Contact the Rectory to schedule. **Confirmation -** Confirmation is administered every year to all 8th grade students in our Parish Religious Education program. Children wishing to receive Confirmation must be enrolled and participating in the program for two years before they are eligible to receive the

Liturgical Reflection

The 27th Sunday in Ordinary Time FIRST READING: Isaiah 5:1-7

The song of the vineyard is today's First Reading. The friend who has a vineyard is the Lord and the Lord's vineyard is Israel. The Lord had done much for Israel, yet her people at times chose to distance themselves from God. God who had so lovingly tended the vineyard, who judged it, announced the coming punishment. The very ones listening to the song are themselves the vineyard, God's cherished plant, and are subject to God's judgment for their failure to produce a good harvest. God looked for judgment, but instead got bloodshed; God wanted justice, but heard instead an outcry. Having listened to Isaiah's prophecy, perhaps the people will be moved to repentance.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Psalm 80

The refrain from the Psalm is taken from the beginning of the final verse of the First Reading. Israel is the Lord's vineyard. The verses come from Psalm 80, a communal lament of Israel's people in which they wonder why the Lord has seemingly deserted them after transplanting them out of Egypt. We hear the voice of the people plead for the Lord to once again take care of them. For their part, they will return to God and remain faithful.

SECOND READING: Philippians 4:6-9

Paul is writing to his beloved Philippian Christians while he is imprisoned and the community itself is facing persecutions. Paul encourages the Philippians to make their requests known to God in prayer. Since they are to petition God, the Philippians need to have no anxiety. God's peace in Christ Jesus will safeguard them. addition, Paul lists the virtues to which Jesus calls the Philippians: truth, honor, justice, purity, love, and graciousness. Whatever is praiseworthy is their calling. To live in this manner is to know the peace of God residing in us. Bringing his advice to a close, Paul again promises God's peace, and we can say with him: "The Lord is near."

GOSPEL: Matthew 21:33-43

'I tell you, then, that the kingdom of God will be taken from you and given to a people who will produce its fruit.

This Sunday's Gospel reading is another parable and continuous reading from where the parable of last Sunday's Gospel left off. The landowner and the vineyard in the parable provide obvious parallels with the First Reading. The servants the landowner sends, represents the prophet's whose message

the people often did not heed. The son whom the tenants kill, foreshadows Jesus' death at the hands of the authorities. Jesus' citation of Psalm 118 reveals that his death is not the end. Through his resurrection he lays the cornerstone for the Kingdom of God, a kingdom for those disciples willing to produce its fruit.

That's The Way It Is!



I am going to spend the next few articles disseminating and addressing the parish survey results. There were five main areas in the survey: Worship/Liturgy, Buildings/Grounds, Educational, Social Concerns, Parish Activities. The results were generally positive. As I disseminate the

information I will highlight the major themes in each of the areas. This week I will begin with the most important: Liturgy/Worship.

In the area of Worship/Liturgy, the priest is the most important because he leads and directs the worship of the people. People noted that my liturgical pace is quicker and faster than they have been used to. People have also noted that my liturgical preferences are for simplicity. (I am not high church) In regard to my preaching people noted that my homilies tend more towards education in the Faith, sometimes they can be a bit too heady, and sometimes they can be long. While the trend in the survey is that people are generally content, they would like me to adopt a slower liturgical pace. They would also like me to preach homilies that speak to practical needs or concerns in addition to the educational. People would like me to be more available to them after Mass.

I can work on my liturgical pace. I do not think anyone will ever accuse me of being too slow, and I may never be as slow as some might like, but I can work to slow down a bit. I will also work to make some of my homilies more practical—and less lengthy. As for being more available after Mass, that is more of a challenge. Two factors work against that. One I have some control over, one I do not.

The first is my personality. I am an introvert by nature. This means I expend a lot of energy when I talk to people—even close friends and family. Because of this, it is difficult for me to be emotionally available to someone on the fly. I need time to prepare myself. The second (I cannot control this) is that after Mass I am pulled in 50 different directions. Even if I was "Father People" that isan extreme extrovert, it would be impossible for me to give people sufficient time to talk after Mass. After Mass on Saturday I have to get to Westfield. After Mass on Sunday I have to get the collection over to the counters, I have CCD classes to teach, CCD confessions to hear, RICA, meetings, appointments, then after all that I have to get to Elkland. The only thing that I could change my schedule for would be an emergency anointing. Let me say this again so it is clear: I care about you and I want to talk to you. If you need to speak with me please just call the rectory and make an appointment. Then I will set aside as much time as you need and deserve. I will have nothing competing for my time. If you cannot come to the rectory, I can come to your home. I meet people all the time at their homes.

In regard to the music there were a lot of comments. The long and short the comments are this: some people want more "traditional" music while other people want more "contemporary" music. Some people want the music to be sung at a faster pace while others want music to be sung at a slower pace. Some people like the organ, others like the Piano. Some think the organ is too loud. (There was only one person who thinks the organ is not loud enough.)

There are many tastes and preferences when it comes to liturgical music. I do know that we try our best to accommodate all tastes and preferences, though it is impossible to appeal to every one's taste. I have met with the music director and passed along the survey results to her. She is working hard to incorporate the suggestions made into the current program. She is going to write some information in the bulletin about the music program. When she gets that information to me, it will be in the bulletin. Overall I think people are generally content with our music Relative to other Catholic parishes in our diocese, I would say our music program is good. We are lucky to have the musical talent available to us that we have. There are parishes—even larger and more prominent than ours that do not have the musical talent available to them that we have.

The general consensus in the survey was that people liked the Mass times as scheduled. They did not want a change in Mass times. Because of the need for Elkland to have a Sunday morning Mass we decided to eliminate the 11:00 Mass and keep the rest of the Mass times the same. The 11:00 Mass seemed the logical choice because it was the least attended. Obviously there are some that are upset to have the 11:00 Mass eliminated, but most have adapted. The Mass times are not set in stone. I can revisit the Mass times if necessary. What I cannot do is revisit the number of Masses offered at Saint Peter's on Sunday. Unless or until our linkage changes, it is only possible for me to offer one Sunday morning Mass at Saint Peters. Thank you for your patience and understanding.

Next week I will address another area of the survey. If you have any questions just the rectory a call.

News from the Vatican



POPE PRESENTS OUR 2 CHOICES: REPENTANT OR HYPOCRITICAL SINNERS

Christian life is the humble journey of a conscience that's never rigid and always in relationship with God, which is able to

repent and entrust itself to Him. Hypocrisy, duplicity, and detachment from others, he added, are denounced by Jesus and go against this. The key word is to repent: it's repentance that enables one not to become stiff, to transform the no to God into yes, and the yes to sin into no, out of love for the Lord. The will of the Father, who speaks delicately every day to our conscience "is fulfilled only in the form of repentance and continual conversion.

In the end there are two roads in each one's journey: to be repentant sinners or hypocritical sinners. However, what counts is not reasoning that justifies and tries to save appearances, but a heart that advances with the Lord, struggles every day, repents and returns to Him, because the Lord seeks the pure of heart, not the pure on the outside.

As in a family, where one must encounter and dialogue, the same must be done in Church and society. In the Church's journey, the question often arises: where to go, how to go forward? Offering some advice, Francis gave three points of reference:

The first, he said, was the Word, the compass to walk humbly, to not lose the way of God and fall into worldliness. The second, the Pope continued, is the Bread because everything begins from the Eucharist. It's in the Eucharist that the Church is encountered; not in gossip and chronicles, but here, in the Body of Christ shared by sinful and needy people, who, however, feel loved and then desire to love.

The third is the poor. Today many persons lack what is necessary, but in all of them we find Jesus.

The Word, the Bread, the Poor: let us ask for the grace not to forget these basic goods, which support our journey.

BE DEFENDERS OF LIFE, GUARDIANS OF CREATION URGED POPE FRANCIS

"Be men and women, boys and girls, who are defenders of life, guardians of creation, witnesses of the love given that generates good fruits for the community. The greatest gift God has made to each of us is life; and life is part of another original divine gift that is creation. We should all feel the great responsibility to properly guard creation and to care for it, protecting it from various forms of degradation. We have the task of preserving and delivering to the future generations the planet which we received as a free gift from the goodness of God. In the face of the ecological crisis we are experiencing, the prospect of the gift received and delivered to those who will come after us is a reason for commitment and hope."



Sixth and Last Apparition of Our Lady of Fatima



On October 13, 1917 the three children, surrounded by a crowd of 70,000 persons under a torrential rain, Lucy asked again of the Lady: "What do you want from me?" answered: "I am the Ladv of the Rosary, I desire here a chapel in my honor to be built, that people continue to recite the Rosary every day. Will the war finish. The war is going to end, and the soldiers will soon return to their homes." Then Lucy

asked: "May I ask you for cures and conversions, will you grant them?". "Some yes, others no. It is necessary that they ask pardon for their sins, that they don't offend God our Lord, and that he is already too much offended." "Do you want anything else from me?" Lucy asked. "I do not want anything more."

Then She opened her hands again and She launched a ray of light in the direction of the sun as Lucy shouted that they should look at the sun. At this point the promised sign happened, the rain stopped suddenly and there appeared an exceptionally bright sun, but not dazzling. The sun began to turn as if projecting, in each direction, bands of light of each color that lit and colored the clouds, the sky, the trees, and the crowd. It stayed for some moments then it went back to its normal position, stayed still for a small while and then it happened again. Suddenly it looked as if it stood out from the sky to fall headlong on the crowd that was looking terrorized; they fell to their knees and begged mercy. Meanwhile the children saw a Lady dressed like the white of the sun with a blue cope, St. Joseph with the Child Jesus that blessed the world. After this vision they saw The Lord bless the world, standing next to Our Lady of Sorrows. After these visions the Lady of Mt Carmel finished the miracle and the people then became aware that there clothes were completely dried.

One of the principal anti-clerical publications of the day was *O Dia*, a major Lisbon newspaper. On October 17th, *O Dia* reported the following: At one o'clock in the afternoon, midday by the sun, the rain stopped. The sky, pearly gray in color, illuminated the vast arid landscape with a strange light. The sun had a transparent gauzy veil so that eyes could easily be fixed upon it. The gray mother-of-pearl tone turned into a sheet of silver which broke up as the clouds were torn apart and the silver sun, enveloped in the same gauzy gray light, was seen to whirl and turn in the circle of broken clouds. A cry went up from every mouth and people fell on their knees on the muddy ground. The light turned a beautiful blue as if it had come through the stained-glass windows of a cathedral and spread itself over the people who knelt with outstretched

hands. The blue faded slowly and then the light seemed to pass through yellow glass. Yellow stains fell against white handkerchiefs, against the dark skirts of women. They were reported on the trees, on the stones and on the serra. People wept and prayed with uncovered heads in the presence of the miracle they had awaited.

Francisco died on 4 April 1919 and Jacinta died on 20 February 1920. Before she dies, little Jacinta revealed little-known but remarkable statements made by Our Lady. Here are just some of them:

- More souls go to hell because of sins of the flesh than for any other reason.
- Certain fashions will be introduced that will offend Our Lord very much.
- Many marriages are not good; they do not please Our Lord and are not of God.
- Priests must be pure, very pure. They should not busy themselves with anything except what concerns the Church and souls. The disobedience of priests to their superiors and to the Holy Father is very displeasing to Our Lord.
- The Blessed Mother can no longer restrain the hand of her Divine Son from striking the world with just punishment for its many crimes.
- Tell everybody that God gives graces through the Immaculate Heart of Mary. Tell them to ask graces from her, and that the Heart of Jesus wishes to be venerated together with the Immaculate Heart of Mary.

Lucy entered the Convent of the Sisters of St Dorothy to learn to read and write; then she entered in the convent of Coimbra. On December 10, 1925, Sister Lucy received an apparition by the Child Jesus and the Virgin Mary in her convent cell. The Holy Virgin shown her a Heart surrounded by thorns, Our Lady said to her:

"See, My daughter, My heart surrounded by thorns which ungrateful men pierce at every moment by their blasphemies and ingratitude... Say to all those who:

- for five months, on the first Saturday, confess,
- receive Holy Communion,
- recite the Rosary
- and keep Me company for 15 minutes while meditating on the fifteen mysteries of the Rosary, in a spirit of reparation,

I promise to assist them at the hour of death with all the graces necessary for the salvation of their souls."

Sr. Lucia, the last surviving witness of the three children to whom the Virgin Mary appeared at Fatima, Portugal, died on February 13, 2005 at the age of 97. The Church is currently examining documents and collecting testimonies for her beatification cause.

Pope John Paul II beatified Francisco and Jacinta Marto on May 13, 2000 in a celebration attended by more than 700,000 people. On May 13, 2017 Pope Francisco officially declared Francisco and Jacinta Marto saints of the Catholic Church in front of hundreds of thousands of pilgrims at Fatima, Portugal – teaching us that even young children can become saints.

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
