Sacramental Information

Baptisms - Parents anticipating the birth of their first child are asked to attend instructions classes before the birth of their child. Note: Baptisms cannot be scheduled until all the necessary paperwork is completed. Contact the Rectory to schedule. **Confirmation** - Confirmation is administered every year to all 8th grade students in our Parish Religious Education program.

Children wishing to receive Confirmation must be enrolled and participating in the program for two years before they are eligible to receive the sacrament.

Marriages- In order to complete the necessary paperwork, couples are asked to contact the Rectory at least one full year in advance of the proposed marriage date.

Anointing of the Sick - Please contact the Rectory whenever a member of your family has become sick or hospitalized.

Monthly Visitations - Any parishioner who is homebound and wishes to receive the Eucharist on a monthly basis is asked to contact the Rectory to schedule a visit.

Rite of Christian Initiation in Adults (R.C.I.A.) - The R.C.I.A. prepares unbaptized adults for reception into the Catholic Church. The program is adapted to the needs of each person and prepares them for full initiation into the faith. Contact the Rectory for more information.



Liturgical ReflectionThe 33rd Sunday in Ordinary Time

FIRST READING: Proverbs 31:10-13, 19-20, 30-31

This is the final Sunday before Christ the King. One might wonder why the First Reading is the selection from Proverbs about a worthy wife. The woman's fear of the Lord is an example to us. Her works demonstrate how to respond faithfully to the Lord's call. Her reward for a life well lived is entrance in the heavenly Jerusalem. Accomplished as she is, the greatest praise that the worthy wife receives is that she fears the Lord. She stands in reverent awe before the God who governs all things.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Psalm 128



The refrain for today's Responsorial Psalm replicates the theme of the First Reading. Those who fear the Lord are blessed. The verses used today begin and end with a general statement extending the Lord's


blessing to all those who fear him.

SECOND READING: 1 Thessalonians 5:1-6

Our Second Reading begins with Paul affirming that he really does not need to write the Thessalonians about anything related to the times and seasons, especially the time when Christ will come like a thief in the night. The timing of the Lord's coming will be unexpected. The Thessalonians are children of the light, not of the dark, so the unexpected nature of Christ's coming will not leave them behind. Children of the light stay awake for the Lord, living in steadfast and sure hope.

GOSPEL: Matthew 25:14-30

The well known parable of the talents is the Gospel for this final Sunday Ordinary Time. This parable is about the kingdom of heaven, and who is in and who is out. One could incorrectly get the sense from this



parable that what we do with the gifts God gives us, determines our entry into the kingdom of heaven. Yet, the parable is not about us earning our salvation, but rather about how responsible we are with all our generous gifts God gives us. God calls us to imitate his generosity to the best of our ability, for in doing so we accept his invitation to share the Master's joy. Both the positive and negative portraits of the Master in this parable, can act as incentives to be always prepared for the Lord's coming, whether that be in the here and now or at his final appearance.

Following Christ helps those who are hungry to grow in their relationship with Jesus Christ to better understand and respond to the Lord's call. Following Christ consists of seven sessions and a retreat day. The weekly sessions include four components: prayer, video teaching, fellowship, and small group discussion.

- Prayer The prayer time is an opportunity for participants to grow deeper in their response to God's love together in group prayer.
- Video Teaching The teachings provide practical ways to grow in relationship with the Lord and include foundational disciplines and truths that are important for maturing in Christ.
- Fellowship The time of fellowship over drinks and desserts comes after the teaching as people transition into their small groups.
- Small Groups The small groups are a place to freely discuss the teaching content, as well as a place of accountability for completing the action items encouraged in each session.

Pro Life News

PRIESTS FOR LIFE

We all have talents, the use of which will be judged at the end of time. In preaching about the use of our talents in a fruitful way, we can preach about the wide variety of talents that are applied to the effort to defend and promote the sacredness of human life. A wide variety of activities comprise the pro-life movement. People provide alternatives to abortion, legal advice, counseling, medical services, adoption services, employment searches, housing, education, and the many other services of Pregnancy Resource Centers, accessed through hotline numbers and websites. There is also the wide range of healing ministries for those who have had abortions. Moreover, the pro-life effort is advanced through research, medical expertise, litigation, lobbying, media work, writing, speaking, grassroots activism, and much more. In short, there is room for everyone in the movement. The greatest fruit of our talents would be to be able to present to the Lord the lives saved through our efforts.

That's The Way It Is!



Last week I talked a little bit about the Reformation and how Catholics and Protestants see the Reformation. This week I want to continue that discussion. The Protestant reformers came up with five "solas" to describe in a simple manner what

they believed. This is also what they expected Protestant Christians to believe. Sola is a Latin word that means "alone." These five solas guide their theology and belief. The five solas are: 1) Christ alone, 2) the glory of God alone, 3) Grace alone, 4) Scripture alone and 5) Faith alone.

Catholics agree with three of the five: Christ alone, Grace alone, God's glory alone. Catholics cannot agree with Scripture alone or Faith alone. The doctrine Scripture alone is why Protestants are always demanding that Catholics prove their doctrines from Scripture. This is why many Protestants have such problems with the use of statues or images, honoring Mary or the saints, Purgatory, the Sacraments, and many other Catholic beliefs. They believe that these doctrines do not have a Scriptural basis. They believe that they are what they call "Romanist inventions." The word "Romanist" is a pejorative term used to mock the papacy.

Many Catholics in our parish probably know of someone, or even have someone in their family who constantly criticizes the Catholic Faith. Ex-Catholics are even worse. Ex-Catholics aren't happy unless they are making practicing Catholics unhappy. "Show me where Scripture teaches the Immaculate Conception." "Show me where Scripture teaches purgatory." "Show me where Scripture teaches the papacy" etc. I have been in these situations countless times. The truth is—we can show where Scripture reflects these doctrines. The problem is that the person demanding Scriptural proof has already made up their mind that the Catholic cannot show where Scripture reflects Catholic doctrine. Thus, any proof a Catholic gives from Scripture is by definition not proof to the "Bible Christian."

After years of frustration in dealing with such people, a light bulb went on in my head: Catholics do not believe Scripture alone, the Protestant believes Scripture alone. Catholics have never claimed that the Catholic Faith is based solely on the Bible; therefore, the Catholic is not the one who has something to prove. I have taken to turning the tables when Protestants ask such questions. "Since the Catholic Church has never claimed that the Catholic Faith is based solely on the Scriptures, why do I have to prove anything to you?" I then put the Protestant on the defensive: "Why don't you show me where Scripture teaches Scripture alone?" Then the conversation usually turns to Second Timothy 3:16. I will write more on that at a later time.

The doctrine Faith alone is why Protestants accuse Catholics of being works centered and trying to earn God's love or heaven. There is a sense in which Catholics believe we can merit salvation, but it is not in the sense that Protestants think. Protestants think Catholics believe that we can put God in debt to us through our good works such that God owes us salvation. Catholics believe that good works save, not because they are inherently worth anything to God or because they somehow put God in our debt. Catholics believe that good works are saving; that we can merit salvation through good works because God has chosen and promised to associate his grace and benevolence with our human works of love.

This principle of human and divine working in unison is revealed in the Incarnation. I will write more on that at a later time. For Catholics, human works are saving because God's grace works in them, just as God's grace works in Faith. The truth is that Protestants believe similarly. No Protestant, no matter how fundamentalist, is going to argue that Christians do not actually have to practice what they preach and live a good Christian life. Protestants may not go as far as Catholics and claim that grace is operative in human works, but they do believe good works are necessary to vindicate Faith if nothing else.

Given what I have said, I hope this helps to explain the tone in some of the articles in the newspaper during the 500th anniversary of the Reformation. I also hope it explains further some of the disagreements between Protestants and Catholics and where they originate.

News from the Vatican



MASS IS PRAYER 'PAR EXCELLENCE'

Dear Brothers and Sisters, good morning!
We continue with the catecheses on the Holy
Mass. To understand the beauty of the
Eucharistic Celebration, I want to begin with

a very simple aspect: the Mass is prayer, rather, it's the prayer par excellence, the highest, the most sublime and, at the same time, the most concrete. In fact, it's the encounter of love with God through His Word and the Body and Blood of Jesus. It's an encounter with the Lord.

However, first we must answer a question. What is prayer really? It is first of all dialogue, personal relationship with God. And man was created as being in personal relationship with God, who finds his fulfillment only in the encounter with his Creator. The journey of life is towards the definitive encounter with the Lord.

The Book of Genesis affirms that man was created in the image and likeness of God, who is Father and Son and Holy Spirit, a perfect relationship of love, which is unity. From this we are able to understand that all of us have been created to enter into a perfect relationship of love, in a continuous giving and receiving of ourselves to thus be able to find the fullness of our being.

When Moses received God's call in front of the burning bush, he asked Him his Name. And what did God answer? "I am who I am" (Exodus 3:14). In its original meaning, this expression expresses presence and favor, and, in fact, immediately after God adds: "The Lord, the God of your father, the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob" (v. 15). Thus Christ also, when He calls His disciples, He calls them so that they will be with Him. Therefore, this is the greatest grace: to be able to experience that the Mass, the Eucharist is the privileged moment to be with Jesus and, through Him, with God and with brothers.

To pray, as every true dialogue, is also to be able to remain in silence, — in dialogues there are moments of silence -, in silence together with Jesus. And when we go to Mass, perhaps we arrive five minutes early and we begin to chat with the one who is next to us. However, it's not the moment to chat: it's the moment of silence to prepare oneself to dialogue. It's the moment to recollect oneself in the heart to prepare oneself for the encounter with Jesus. Silence is so important! Remember what I said last week: we are not going to a show; we are going to an encounter with the Lord, and silence prepares us and accompanies us. We remain in silence together with Jesus. And from God's mysterious silence gushes His Word, which resounds in our heart. Jesus Himself teaches us how it is really possible "to be" with the Father and He demonstrates it with His prayer. The Gospels show us Jesus who withdraws to places apart to pray. The disciples seeing this, His intimate relationship with the Father, feel the desire to be able to participate in it, and they ask Him: "Lord, teach us to pray" (Luke 11:1). We heard it in the First Reading at the beginning of the Audience. Jesus answers that the first thing necessary go pray is to be able to say "Father." Let's be careful: if I'm not capable of saying "Father," I'm not capable of praying. We must learn to say "Father," namely, to put ourselves in His presence with filial confidence. However, to be able to learn, it is necessary to recognize humbly that we are in need of being instructed, and to say with simplicity: Lord, teach me to pray.

This is the first point: to be humble, to recognize ourselves children, to rest in the Father, to trust Him. To enter the Kingdom of Heaven it's necessary to make oneself little as children, in the sense that children know how to trust, they know that someone will take care of them, of what they will eat, of what they will wear and so on (Cf. Matthew 6:25-32). This is the first attitude: trust and confidence, as a child towards his parents' to know that God remembers you and takes care of you, of you, of me, of all.

The second predisposition, which is also proper to children, is to let oneself be surprised. A child always asks a thousand questions because he wants to discover the world, and he marvels even at small things, because everything is new to him. To enter in the Kingdom of Heaven it is necessary to let oneself be surprised. I ask, in our relationship with the Lord, in prayer, do we let ourselves be surprised or do we think that prayer is to talk to God as parrots do? No, it's to trust and to open one's heart to let oneself be surprised. Do we let ourselves be surprised by God who is always the God of surprises? Because the encounter with the Lord is always a living encounter, it's not a museum encounter. It's a living encounter and we go to Mass not to a museum. We go to a living encounter with the Lord.

In the Gospel there is talk of a certain Nicodemus (John 3:1-21), an elderly man, an authority in Israel, who goes to Jesus to get to know Him, and the Lord speaks to him of the need to be "born anew" (Cf. v. 3). But what does it mean? Can one be "reborn"? Is it possible to have again the taste, the joy, the wonder of life even in face of so many tragedies? This is a fundamental question of our faith and this is the desire of every true believer: the desire to be born anew, the joy of beginning again. Do we have this desire? Do each one of us always have the desire to be born anew to encounter the Lord? Do you have this desire? In fact, it can be easily lost because, given so much activity, so many projects to implement, at the end there is little time left and we lose sight of what is fundamental: our life of the heart, our spiritual life, our life which is encounter with the Lord in prayer.

In truth, the Lord surprises us by showing us that He loves us also in our weaknesses. "Jesus Christ is the victim of expiation for our sins, and not for ours only but also for the sins of the whole world" (1 John 2:2). This gift, source of true consolation – but the Lord forgives us always – this consoles, it's a true consolation, it's a gift that is given to us through the Eucharist, that nuptial banquet in which the Bridegroom meets our frailty. Can I say that when I go to Communion in the Mass, the Lord encounters my frailty? Yes! We can say it because this is true! The Lord encounters our frailty to take us back to our first calling: that of being in the image and likeness of God. This is the environment of the Eucharist; this is prayer.






