#### **Sacramental Information**

**Baptisms -** Parents anticipating the birth of their first child are asked to attend instructions classes before the birth of their child. Note: Baptisms cannot be scheduled until all the necessary paperwork is completed. Contact the Rectory to schedule.

**Confirmation -** Confirmation is administered every year to all  $8^{th}$  grade students in our Parish Religious Education program. Children wishing to receive Confirmation must be enrolled and participating in the program for two years before they are eligible to receive the sacrament.

**Marriages-** In order to complete the necessary paperwork, couples are asked to contact the Rectory at least one full year in advance of the proposed marriage date.

**Anointing of the Sick -** Please contact the Rectory whenever a member of your family has become sick or hospitalized.

**Monthly Visitations -** Any parishioner who is homebound and wishes to receive the Eucharist on a monthly basis is asked to contact the Rectory to schedule a visit.

**Rite of Christian Initiation in Adults (R.C.I.A.) -** The R.C.I.A. prepares unbaptized adults for reception into the Catholic Church. The program is adapted to the needs of each person and prepares them for full initiation into the faith. Contact the Rectory for more information.

### **Liturgical Reflection**

Fourth Sunday of Advent
FIRST READING: 2 Samuel 7:1-5,8-12,14,16

This passage from 2 Samuel is a delightful conversation between David and the Lord. David wants to build a house for God, but instead God responds that he will build the house. God promises David that this house and kingdom will be firm forever. The house of David also means the household, family, or relations of David. David's salvation does not come alone as an individual or even as a king. Rather, it comes in community, among people who are in relationship with one another. Christians throughout the ages have come to believe that the birth of Jesus fulfilled the "Davidic covenant"; the promise God made to King David.

#### **RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Psalm 89**

The psalmist sings a hymn of praise to God for faithfulness to the promise given to David. The promise is in the form of a covenant, a bond between God and the people of God. This bond is based on fidelity and is intended to



endure "through all generations." The ensuing relationship is not like a civil or political agreement; it has the nature of a relationship as familiar and intimate as that between a father and a son.

#### **SECOND READING: Romans 16:25-27**

Found at the end of Paul's epistle, these verses are a doxology or a benediction, a hymn of praise and glory to God. This reading echoes connections to the other readings in images of the endless mystery of God to be proclaimed to all nations. In proclaiming this gracious and generous message of covenantal relationship and compassion to all, it will be known to the world that God is indeed faithful. God offers salvation to everyone, Jew and Gentile alike, who has faith in Jesus Christ.

#### **GOSPEL: Luke 1:26-38**



In telling Mary's story on this last Sunday, the Church highlights her response to the overwhelming power of God's Spirit. In her acceptance and trust of God's promise, Mary responded as a faithful servant of the line of

David. There has been no kings in the Davidic line for over five centuries since the Babylonian exile, yet God is faithful and has found a way to allow the Son of the most High to inherit David's throne. Mary has responded as a faithful disciple and, because of her willingness to allow God to enter into her very self, God's salvation will be seen upon the earth. As the season of Advent draws to a close, "all nations" wait in eager expectation for the celebration of the birth of Christ and remain ever-vigilant for his return.

Following Christ helps those who are hungry to grow in their relationship with Jesus Christ to better understand and respond to the Lord's call. This is accomplished through the grace of God by praying together, teaching, and supporting one another in some of the basic disciplines and truths practiced by Christians since the early Church.

Following Christ consists of seven sessions and a retreat day. The weekly sessions include four components: prayer, video teaching, fellowship, and small group discussion.

- Prayer The prayer time is an opportunity for participants to grow deeper in their response to God's love together in group prayer.
- Video Teaching The teachings provide practical ways to grow in relationship with the Lord and include foundational disciplines and truths important for maturing in Christ.
- Fellowship The time of fellowship over drinks and desserts comes after the teaching as people transition into their small groups.
- Small Groups The small groups are a place to freely discuss the teaching content, as well as a place of accountability for completing the action items encouraged in each session.

**Session Topics:** Daily Personal Prayer, Hearing God in Scripture, The Power of the Sacraments, Forgiving One Another, The Spirit-Empowered Life, Retreat - The World, The Flesh, The Devil, and Advancing the Mission of the Church.

### That's The Way It Is!



Merry Christmas it's a Boy!

The Christmas Season is a time to pray and meditate on the Incarnation of God in the Divine Person of Jesus Christ. Note that God chose to incarnate as a man. That God chose to incarnate as a man begs the question as to why God

chose to incarnate as a man and whether God's incarnating as a man has any significance in the work of redemption. Theologians call the study of the work of redemption Soteriology. To put the question, then, in theological language, we can ask "Does the fact that God incarnated as a male as opposed to a female have any soteriological significance?"

Most people, especially if they are steeped in the principles of modern feminism would answer in the negative. They would say that God became a man because of the culture of the time in which he became incarnate. People were not educated then. They thought females were inferior to males. Had God incarnated as a woman, no one would have taken him seriously. Had God chosen to come today, he might chose to incarnate as a female. This is because we are so much more enlightened as a society today than those living in first century Palestine.

The fact is that God became man for a reason—and the reason is not incidental. The reason has nothing to do with culture and everything to do with the way in which humanity fell. In Adam, all sinned. Adam was a male. Adam was also the head of the human race. Thus, the new Adam, Jesus, is male in order to redeem humanity. Adam, however, did not sin in a vacuum. Eve's disobedience paved the way for Adam's disobedience. In the order of redemption, Mary, the second Eve, through her obedience, paves the way for the second Adam, Jesus to redeem the human race. Hence, just as the fall of humanity happened with a man and a women working in tandem, the redemption of humanity happens in a way that parallels the fall of humanity. A man and a women work in tandem to redeem the human race. It was necessary, then, that in order to save humanity, God not only assume our humanity. God must assume our humanity as a male.

This may make little sense to the modern mind. I think this is, in part, due to the fact that many people today think categories like male and female are incidental—that is—subjective projections of the human mind. Many, being steeped in the principles of liberal, secular humanism believe that the categories of male and female are not essential aspects of humanity. The categories of male and female depend more on a person's subjective identification than any objective features of the real world.

Christianity believes that the categories of male/female are objective features of the world. God intentionally created humanity male and female in His image. Males and

females equally, though in distinct but complementary ways image God. It is important to understand this because if we do not understand this, we will not understand the significance of the incarnation of God as man, the significance of Mary's obedience in contradistinction to that of Eve, nor will we understand how redemption works. If we do not understand how redemption works, we will not understand the nature or purpose of the Church in the world. If we do not understand the nature of purpose of the Church in the world, we will begin to look on the Church as little more than another private, charitable organization, rather than an organization that exists to bring redemption to the world. We will not understand the roles of men or women within the Church or why those roles exist as they do.

This morning we celebrate the Fourth Sunday of Advent. This evening we will celebrate Christmas. The celebration of Christmas is a birthday celebration. We celebrate the birthday of Christ. God became man because Jesus is the second Adam. In Jesus, man does what man did not do in the first Adam: die for his bride.

If you want to understand the significance of the incarnation of God as man, try meditation on the fall of humanity. Try seeing the connections between the fall of humanity and how redemption plays out. I need to state that this is hard work. These connections are subtle. This is not something you will sit down and immediately see. However, if you meditate on the mystery of the fall and the mystery of redemption with the eyes of Faith, you will begin to see things more clearly.

I want to take this opportunity to wish everyone very Merry Christmas and a happy and healthy 2018. Enjoy your Christmas and New Year's celebrations with your family and friends. To those who might be alone, do not lose heart! While celebrating Christmas with family and friends might be nice---if you have Jesus in your heart, you have all you need to celebrate Christmas!

## News from the Vatican



# JOSEPH, SILENT STRENGTH AND FAITH

Joseph is a perfect model of silent strength and faith. Pope Francis reflected on Joseph's initial doubt and worry when he learned Mary was pregnant. When we have difficulties or

are down, Pope Francis said, we should be inspired by St Joseph, who knew "how to walk in darkness," "listen to the voice of God," and "go forward in silence." While he "did not understand," the Pope said, he knew that Mary was "a woman of God," and believed when the Lord sent him an angel in a dream to explain how—though the Holy Spirit—the child had been conceived.

"Joseph fought within himself; in that struggle, the voice of God is heard: 'But get up' — that 'Get up' [which is heard] so many times in the Bible at the beginning of a mission — 'Take Mary, bring her to your home. Take charge of the situation; take this situation in hand, and go forward.' Joseph didn't go to his friends to be comforted, he didn't go to a psychiatrist so that he could interpret the dream. No... He believed. And he went forward. He took the situation in hand. But what must you take in hand, Joseph? What was the situation? What was it that Joseph had to take up? "Two things: fatherhood, and mystery," Francis answered. Regarding "fatherhood," Francis observed: This is already implied in the genealogy of Jesus, which explains how He "was thought to be the son of Joseph."

"He took on a paternity that was not his own: it came from the Father. And he went ahead with that fatherhood and all it signified: not only supporting Mary and the Child, but also raising the Child, teaching Him his trade, bringing Him up to manhood. 'Take up a paternity that is not yours, but God's.' And this, without saying a word. In the Gospel, there is not a single word spoken by Joseph. A man of silence, of silent obedience."

Turning to mystery, the Holy Father explained that Jesus took in hand the mystery of leading people back to God mentioned in the first reading.

"Joseph took in hand this mystery and helps: with silence, with his work, up to the moment when God called him to Himself. It is said of this man, who took up fatherhood and mystery, that he was the shadow of the Father: the shadow of God the Father.

"And if the man Jesus learned to say 'daddy,' 'father,' to His Father Who He knew as God," Francis explained, "He learned it from life, from the witness of Joseph, the man who took care of Him, the man who raised Him, the man who carried forward every paternity and every mystery, but took nothing for himself."

Pope Francis concluded saying this is the great Joseph, whom God needed to carry forward "the mystery of leading the people anew to the new Creation."

#### PRIESTS FOR LIFE

The readings of today and the closeness of Christmas, thrust us into reflections on the Incarnation. Christmas is not only the Feast of Christ's birth, but the celebration of the entire mystery of God taking on a human nature beginning with the event narrated in today's Gospel, whereby Christ was conceived within Mary's body. God redeems us by joining every aspect of our lives to his. God even becomes an unborn child. Human life was already sacred because it always was and is God's creation, made freely from his love. But in the Incarnation it takes on an even deeper meaning and sanctity, because human nature is forever united with Divine Life. This affects all who share human nature, even the children still in the womb. That is why Evangelium Vitae can make the following two assertions: "Life, especially human life, belongs only to God: for this reason whoever attacks human life, in some way attacks God himself" (EV n. 9). "By his Incarnation the Son of God has united himself in some fashion with every person. It is precisely in the "flesh" of every person that Christ continues to reveal himself and to enter into fellowship with us, so that rejection of human life, in whatever form that rejection takes, is really a rejection of Christ" (EV n. 104). The fact that Mary was not expecting to carry a child, and was troubled at the greeting, also leads us to reflect on the Providence of God. No unexpected pregnancy has ever affected history so profoundly, and no woman besides Mary is a better example to those who feel they cannot handle a pregnancy.



Beginning the Church's liturgical year, Advent (from, "advenire" in Latin or "to come to") is the season encompassing the four Sundays (and weekdays) leading up to the celebration of Christmas. Advent is a time of preparation for the coming of the Lord. In this season, we recall two central elements of our faith: the final coming of the Lord in glory and the incarnation of the Lord in the birth of Jesus. The key themes of the Advent season are watchful waiting, preparation, and justice. In this new liturgical year, the Gospel of Mark will be the primary Gospel proclaimed.



As Elizabeth recognized God's presence in Mary, we too are invited to discover the Lord in our midst. May our eyes be open to see God among us, and may we respond with hearts that are open to the abundant love which is our inheritance.

#### The King Shall Come When Morning Dawns

The King shall come when morning dawns and light triumphant breaks, when beauty gilds the eastern hills, and life to joy awakes. Not as of old a little child to bear, and fight, and die, but crowned with glory like the sun that lights the morning sky. O brighter than the rising morn when He, victorious, rose and left the lonesome place of death, despite the rage of foes. O brighter than that glorious morn shall this fair morning be, when Christ, our King, in beauty comes, and we His face shall see. The King shall come when morning dawns, and earth's dark night is past: O haste the rising of that morn, the day that are shall last. And let the endless bliss begin, by weary saints foretold, when right shall triumph over wrong, and truth shall be extolled. The King shall come when morning dawns, and light and beauty brings; "Hail, Christ the Lord!" Thy people pray, come quickly, King of kings!

# CHRISTMAS SEASON

## December 25 - January 8

Christmas is a privileged opportunity to meditate on the meaning and value of our existence. The approach of this Solemnity helps us on the one hand to reflect on the drama of history in which people, injured by sin, are perennially in search of happiness and of a fulfilling sense of life and death; and on the other, it urges us to meditate on the merciful kindness of God who came to man to communicate to him directly the Truth that saves, and to enable him to partake in his friendship and his life. Therefore let us prepare ourselves for Christmas with humility and simplicity, making ourselves ready to receive as a gift the light, joy and peace that shine from this mystery.

Christmas is one of the most important days of the Church year, second only to Easter itself. It is the feast of the incarnation, the feast of God becoming flesh (the Latin "in carne" means "enfleshment"). It is a uniquely Christian teaching, the Divine choosing to become one of us. Because of this belief, God is not only Transcendent, but also wholly Immanent, Emmanuel (God-with-us). While remaining Transcendent (meaning we must rise above our present condition to reach Him), He is at the same time Immanent (meaning He is with us as we rise toward Him). Every Eucharist is like Christmas where the bread and wine are transformed into His flesh, His Body and Blood, and, in a sense, He is born anew on the altar.

The liturgical season of Christmas begins with the vigil Masses on Christmas Eve and concludes on the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord. During this season, we celebrate the birth of Christ into our world and into our hearts, and reflect on the gift of salvation that is born with him...including the fact that he was born to die for us.

The Christmas tree and the Nativity scene are popular symbols of the season and a tradition in many Christian homes. It is also traditional to exchange Christmas gifts with family and friends as a way to honor God the Father's gift of his only son to the world. Having received the gift of Christ, we naturally want to pass that gift along to our loved ones.

### A Prayer for Christmas

O God, our loving Father, help us rightly to remember the birth of Jesus, that we may share in the song of the angles, the gladness of the shepherds, and the worship of the wise men. May Christmas morning make us happy to be your children, and Christmas evening bring us to our beds with grateful thoughts, forgiving and forgiven, for Jesus' sake. Amen





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
