Sacramental Information

Baptisms - Parents anticipating the birth of their first child are asked to attend instructions classes before the birth of their child. Note: Baptisms cannot be scheduled until all the necessary paperwork is completed. Contact the Rectory to schedule.

Confirmation - Confirmation is administered every year to all 8^{th} grade students in our Parish Religious Education program. Children wishing to receive Confirmation must be enrolled and participating in the program for two years before they are eligible to receive the sacrament.

Marriages- In order to complete the necessary paperwork, couples are asked to contact the Rectory at least one full year in advance of the proposed marriage date.

Anointing of the Sick - Please contact the Rectory whenever a member of your family has become sick or hospitalized.

Monthly Visitations - Any parishioner who is homebound and wishes to receive the Eucharist on a monthly basis is asked to contact the Rectory to schedule a visit.

Rite of Christian Initiation in Adults (R.C.I.A.) - The R.C.I.A. prepares unbaptized adults for reception into the Catholic Church. The program is adapted to the needs of each person and prepares them for full initiation into the faith. Contact the Rectory for more information.



Liturgical Reflection

The Epiphany of the Lord

The Solemnity of the Epiphany of the Lord has several themes. First, we have the wise men being guided through darkness by the light of the star. Second, we have the star as a sign that leads the wise men to Jesus. Third, we have the manifestation of God to Gentiles, not just Jews, pointing to the reality that Jesus came for all people. Fourth, we have the mystery that God does reveal his very self in human flesh. This feast with its stars and the arrival of the Magi, reminds us that God has a plan that is worked out in time.

FIRST READING: Isaiah 60:1-6

In Isaiah's splendid poetry, Israel heard a promise of the exiles' return from Babylonian captivity and a prophecy that Gentiles would one day come to honor the city. Light and darkness are the images he uses to suggest the difference that will be manifest when God's strong arm demonstrates divine power over the earth. To Christian ears Isaiah's words announce the coming of the light of Christ who dispels the "darkness" of sin and fills us with radiant light. Note: it is form this text, not Matthew's account of the Gospel, that we derive the details of kings and camels that we generally associate with the magi.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Psalm 72

The psalmist petitions God for blessing upon the king. The king not only acts on behalf of God, but must have the justice and compassion of God. No small task for a monarch. One of the king's particular responsibilities is to treat the poor and the afflicted with special concern, just as the Lord would do.

SECOND READING: Ephesians 3:2-3, 5-6

Unique among the band of Apostles, Paul gained knowledge of the mysteries of salvation by direct revelation from Christ himself without ever having known him in the flesh. The special charge entrusted to Paul was to evangelize the Gentiles, and such was his success that his efforts could only have been fueled by divine grace. The revelation Paul asserts here was a disquieting one among the early Christians: Gentiles are made coheirs with the Jews. The mercy and generosity of God goes far beyond our own; Jews cannot claim exclusive right to Christ. In Christ, Jews and Gentiles are made members of one body and both are sharers in the promises of Christ.

GOSPEL: Matthew 2:1-12



The arrival of the magi and their inquiry regarding the child born to be "king of the Jews" strikes fear in the heart of Herod and all his minions. Immediately, he seeks information about the prophesied birth of the Messiah,

so Herod fears not some futures human usurper, but the divine will itself that will place a rue and eternal king upon the throne of David. The sad details of the story tell of this tragic king's futile efforts to thwart the will of God through schemes and subterfuge. But we're left with a hopeful image of a child in his mother's lap plied with gifts that dimly foreshadow his destiny of King and Savior.

That's The Way It Is!



The Catholic understanding of sin is one of the many ways we differ from our Protestant brothers and sisters. Catholics believe that there are two types of personal sin: Mortal and Venial. Protestants do not make such a distinction. Catholics believe that in order to

be forgiven of Mortal Sin they must go to Confession. Confession is not necessary in order to be forgiven of Venial Sin. It is important to note that the difference between Mortal and Venial sin is not degree but kind. It is important to understand this difference because Venial sins cannot add up to a Mortal Sin. Venial sins are venial.

Mortal sins are deadly—that is when one commits a Mortal Sin they sin unto death. It is because one sins unto death that Confession is necessary in order to be forgiven from a Mortal Sin. When one commits a Venial sin, one does not sin unto death. This is why Confession is not necessary to be forgiven of Venial Sins.

It might be helpful to draw an analogy in order to understand this better. On the spiritual level, Venial Sins are like minor illnesses in one's physical body: a cold, the flu, a headache, minor aches and pains throughout the body, etc. In all of these cases, one's body can recover from these illnesses without the aid of a doctor. One might choose to take an over-the-counter drug to assist the body's natural healing process, but one's body can recover without major medical intervention. There are some things however, that cause death—such as when one's heart stops beating. One's body cannot recover without major medical intervention. Without the intervention from a doctor, one dies. Moral Sins are analogous to that. Just as one cannot recover from a heart attack without major medical intervention, so too, one cannot recover from a Mortal Sin without the intervention of a priest.

The commission of sin causes damage to our souls. Sin does not only effect those we sin against it effects our souls. When God forgives the sin the soul is cleansed of sin but the damage from the sin is not repaired. Think of it like this: your soul is like a white cloth. Sin is like a red thread running through the cloth. Forgiveness removes the red thread. The damage the sin caused is like the holes created from the needle when the red thread was sewn into the cloth. Forgiveness removed the red thread but it did not repair the holes created from the needle. This is where penance for sin comes in. The penance we do to make up for sin is what fills in the holes caused by the needle.

This is why a penance is assigned after Confession. Your sins have been forgiven but the damage those sins caused needs to be repaired. God does for us what only God can do: forgive our sins. Our part is to do what we have the power to do: repair the damage the sin caused. This is why penance is so important. It is important to note that works of penance do not get our sins forgiven. We cannot earn God's forgiveness. Works of penance presuppose that our sins have been forgiven. Works of penance are of no use if our sins have not been forgiven. Looking at the analogy, the holes from the needle cannot be repaired if the red thread is still in the cloth.

This is where Purgatory comes in to play. If we do not do sufficient works of penance to repair the damage our sins caused in this life, then God must do it for us in the next life. God does this in Purgatory. The more works of penance we can do in this life to make up for sin, obviously the less work God has to do in Purgatory to repair the damage for sin. This is also where indulgences come in. Indulgences are special gifts that are given based on the infinite merits of Christ that repairs the damage sin has caused to our souls without us necessarily having to do penance. Indulgences can be plenary or they can be partial. A Plenary indulgence repairs all the damage sin has caused while a Partial indulgence removes some of the damage. The Church makes it very easy to gain indulgences. We can gain an indulgence by reception of Holy Communion, Confession, and performing the work attached to the indulgence. Reading the Bible, praying the Stations of the Cross, and a whole host of things are examples of works that can have indulgences attached to them. Cardinal Wuerl has attached a Plenary indulgence for anyone in his diocese who attends the March for Life in Washington DC. That's the Way it is!

Pro Life News

PRIESTS FOR LIFE

The opening and closing prayer, the Preface, and the readings of today's feast all work powerfully together to enable us to communicate the message of the sanctity of life. Epiphany is about "revelation" and "manifestation," and that, of course is what Christ does. Not only does he reveal the Father to us, but he reveals us to ourselves. He shows us that this human nature of ours, that can be so troublesome and burdened, has in fact been renewed. The Preface proclaims, "You made us new by the glory of his immortal nature." That, indeed is "the promise in Christ Jesus through the Gospel" that Paul proclaims to the Ephesians in the second reading. As the opening prayer for the Vigil Mass says, it is a promise that God will enable us to "reach the brightness of our eternal home." Death is no longer the final word for the human family, and this gift is shared not only by one nation or one people, but by all humanity.

The universal offer of God's salvation extends to those still in the womb. Epiphany not only tells us that there are no national or ethnic boundaries to God's call, but that there are no artificial boundaries between "born" and "unborn," "wanted" or "unwanted," "convenient" or "inconvenient." Moreover, the "epiphany" most needed in our time is the ability to see beyond the appearances of those who are smaller and weaker, and beyond the illusion created when some are declared "non-persons" under the law. Breaking through all this darkness and blurriness is the clear light of Christ, which shines on every human life without exception, bringing those lives God's love and giving us the sacred obligation to love them as well.

News from the Vatican



LET'S ACKNOWLEDGE WE HAVE SINNED

Dear brothers and sisters: In our catechesis on the Holy Eucharist, today we consider the penitential rite. To prepare ourselves to celebrate worthily the sacred mysteries, we

acknowledge, before God and our brothers and sisters, that we have sinned. Significantly, we make this confession as a community, yet in the Confiteor each of us speaks personally: "I confess... that I have sinned." Like the humble publican in Jesus' parable, we strike our breast and recognize that we are unworthy of the gift of God's mercy and forgiveness. We then beg the intercession of Our Lady and all the angels and saints to sustain us on the path of holiness and conversion. The priest then pronounces the absolution - "May almighty God have mercy on us, forgive us our sins, and bring us to everlasting life". Unlike the absolution granted in confession, this does not remit mortal sin, yet it expresses our trust in God's promise of forgiveness and reconciliation. We thus join the great line of biblical figures - like David, the Prodigal Son and Saint Peter – who, conscious of their sin, acknowledged it before God with confidence in the transforming power of his

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
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
