

Sacramental Information

Baptisms - Parents anticipating the birth of their first child are asked to attend baptismal instructions classes before the birth of their child, if possible. Note: Baptisms cannot be scheduled until all the necessary paperwork is completed. Contact the Rectory to schedule.

Confirmation - Confirmation is administered every year to all 8th grade students in our Parish Religious Education program. Children wishing to receive Confirmation must be enrolled and participating in the program for two years before they are eligible to receive the sacrament.

Marriages- In order to complete the necessary paperwork, couples are asked to contact the Rectory at least one full year in advance of the proposed marriage date.

Anointing of the Sick - Please contact the Rectory whenever a member of your family has become sick or hospitalized.

Monthly Visitations - Any parishioner who is homebound and wishes to receive the Eucharist on a monthly basis is asked to contact the Rectory to schedule a visit.

Rite of Christian Initiation in Adults (R.C.I.A.) - The R.C.I.A. prepares unbaptized adults for reception into the Catholic Church. The program is adapted to the needs of each person and prepares them for full initiation into the faith. Contact the Rectory for more information.



FIRST READING: Ezekiel 37:12-14

Ezekiel announces to the people of the covenant God's fourfold promise to them: the graves of the dead will be opened, those who have died will be brought to new life, the people in exile will be brought back to their land, and the spirit of God will be given to them. The promise of restoration prefigures the promise of Christ for all those who believe in him. The promise of God is affirmed in signs and in words. "I have promised and I will do it, says the Lord."

RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Psalm 130

The prayer of the psalmist is a supplication and is a plea for the Lord's mercy. The psalmist calls on the Lord to be attentive to his plea believing that only the Lord is able to give him strength to withstand "the depths" in which he finds himself. The focus of his pleading is on the kindness of the Lord; no one else can raise him up.

SECOND READING: Romans 8:8-11

St. Paul nearly always uses the word "flesh" for those tendencies in man which incline him to sin and to the things of this earth in opposition to things spiritual. The man who follows these inclinations cannot please God, but rather offends him. Paul is addressing Christians who have died with Christ in baptism. The Holy Spirit has been given to the baptized. Through their union with Christ, the Spirit is within believers, transforming their rational faculties: they live a new life. Because the Christian has Christ dwelling in him, he is alive with a true spiritual life and divine grace which Christ brings to him. It is the Spirit of Christ that overcomes the flesh and brings a new way of life to those who believe.

GOSPEL: John 11:1-45

The three readings for today have a common theme – resurrection. In this reading, we have the story of the raising of Lazarus from the tomb, which proves the power Jesus had of raising the dead. St. John gives us here the last and the greatest of the miracles worked



by our Lord. It had two purposes: first, to prove that Christ was the Messiah, the Son of God to whom the Father was now testifying publicly by the miracle and second, to move the chief priests and Pharisees to carry out the plan they long since contemplated. This miracle took place a few miles from Jerusalem --- within a few hours the Pharisees had news of it; they called a meeting and decided Christ must be put to death. It was his Father's will that he should die at the Passover feast, which was drawing near. He had completed his work; his hour had come and so in the working this miracle, he gave them extra motive and excuse for carrying out their wicked designs. Christ's death, like the illness of Lazarus, would be for the glory of God, manifested in him. His raising of Lazarus was but for a short, extra period of earthly life; his own resurrection would be the first fruits of the eternal resurrection, which he would win for all those who would follow him.

SCRUTINIES

The Scrutinies are rites for self-searching and repentance and have above all, a spiritual purpose. They are meant to uncover, then heal all that is weak, defective, or sinful in the hearts of the elect; to bring out, then strengthen all that is upright, strong, and good. The Scrutinies complete the conversion of the elect and deepen their resolve to hold fast to Christ and to carry out their decision to love God above all. They are celebrated on the 3rd, 4th, and 5th Sundays of Lent. Today we pray for *Kristina Zimmerman*, *Scott Zimmerman*, *and Karon Swendrowski* as they receive the 3rd and final Scrutiny in preparation for initiation into the Catholic faith.

STATIONS OF THE CROSS

Stations of the Cross will be held every Friday during Lent at 7:00pm in the church. Children's Stations of the Cross will also be held at 3:30pm. Students are invited to the parish center after school



for a light snack before stations begin. The students will be chaperoned following the conclusion of stations, until parents are able to arrive. All parishioners are encouraged to attend Stations of the Cross during the Lenten season.

TENEBRAE SERVICE



What is a Tenebrae service? The Latin word "tenebrae" means darkness." The Tenebrae is an ancient Christian Good Friday service that makes use of gradually

diminishing light through the extinguishing of candles to symbolize the events of that week from the triumphant Palm Sunday entry through Jesus' burial. This increasing darkness symbolizes the approaching darkness of Jesus' death and of hopelessness in the world without God. The service concludes in darkness, sometimes with a final candle, the Christ candle, carried out of the sanctuary, symbolizing the death of Jesus. A loud noise may also sound symbolizing the closing of Jesus' tomb. The worshipers then leave in silence to ponder the impact of Christ's death and await the coming Resurrection. Join us on Good Friday at 7:00pm for this moving service.

HOMELESS SHELTER VOLUNTEER NEEDED

Pro Life News

PRIESTS FOR LIFE

The theme of this weekend's readings is an overwhelming proclamation that God is master of life and death. Lent is meant to deepen our awareness and conviction of this truth, which is in turn the basis of the pro-life movement. We are not simply counteracting an evil in society through our human strength; rather, we are sent on a mission by the one who has authority over death, to free the human family from its oppressive regime.

Imagine going to a wake service and having someone say to you, "If you had been here sooner, my loved one would never have died." Yet that is what both Martha and Mary said to Jesus. They knew he had power over life and death. And yet they were subject to the all too human fears and calculations we make when we battle the culture of death. Martha says, "By now there will be a stench."

We say the same thing. We know what is right, and what has to be said and done to defend life. Yet we fear the stench. We fear who will object, who will get angry. Politicians fear who will vote against them; businesses fear who will stop supporting them. "Surely, there will be a stench." And that becomes the excuse not to act - even when we know that Jesus has authority over death.

As we approach the climax of Lent and proclaim these powerful readings of God's victory over death, let's call our people to a confident and persistent activism for the cause of life, without fear or excuses. www.priestsforlife.org

That's The Way It Is!



In my article this week, I thought I would explain the things most Catholics have heard referenced but probably never thought to ask about. You hear words like Episcopal Vicar, Vicar General, Dean,

Chancellor, Monsignor, Cardinal, Archbishop, Diocese and Archdiocese. What do those words really mean anyway? Is a cardinal the boss of a bishop or archbishop? What about a monsignor? Is he the boss of a priest? Is it a promotion? I am going to pull back the veil and explain these confusing titles.

A diocese is a collection of Catholics in a particular geographic region, within a state or territory that is headed by a bishop, surrounded by a college of priests who assist the bishop in his pastoral care of the Catholics who reside in the diocese. An archdiocese is the same as a diocese, except that it is headed by an archbishop. The term archdiocese is simply an honorary term used to designate either a very large diocese and or a diocese that has religious or political significance. The term archbishop likewise, is an honorary term used for a bishop that heads an archdiocese. An archbishop does not have more authority than a bishop, and is not the boss of a bishop. An archbishop ranks ahead of a bishop only in terms of honor. An archdiocese ranks ahead of a diocese only in terms of honor.

Cardinal is an honorary term usually given to a bishop or archbishop, though not exclusively so. In theory lay people could be named a cardinal. In practice only bishops or archbishops will be named a cardinal. Only one priest, not already a bishop, has been given this honor in modern day and that was Avery Dulles. Dulles was a prominent theologian. Pope John Paul II was going to ordain Dulles to the Episcopacy but dispensed with the ordination at the request of Dulles. Cardinals are not the boss of a bishop or archbishop. The honors that go along with cardinal are the ability to elect a pope until age 80. Cardinals also represent the Pope in virtue of the fact that they are a cardinal. Like archbishops, cardinals rank ahead of a bishop or archbishop only in terms of honor.

Monsignor is an honorary term given to a priest by the bishop. Pope Francis has reformed the process by which priests can be given this title. After these reforms it is far more difficult for a priest to be given this title of honor. In the past, the use of the title was subject to potential abuse. Bishops might give the title to priests who distinguished themselves in some manner through their work. Bishops could also be quite arbitrary in who they selected for the title; giving the title to their friends or using it as a reward for priests who were loyal to them. Prior to the reforms of Pope Francis there were three levels of monsignor, each coming with certain rights and privileges for the priest. For simplicity sake: the higher the grade of monsignor the more the priest was permitted to take on some of the trappings of a bishop. The reforms of Pope Francis have

done away with the levels of monsignor. There is now only one level of monsignor. Eligible priests are either high ranking diocesan officials or priests over the age of 65.

A vicar general is a high ranking diocesan official. This person can be a priest or bishop. Larger dioceses have several officials with this title and they are usually bishops. Smaller dioceses can have several officials with this title, but they are usually priests. If a diocese has several vicar generals, the one who is appointed the moderator of the curia (analogous to a chief of staff) is the second in command. An episcopal vicar is also a high ranking official, though not as high as the vicar generals. They represent the bishop in specific regions of the diocese called vicariates. Vicariates are major subdivisions of a diocese. There are four vicariates in this diocese: North, South, East and West. Think of the vicar generals like the senior vice presidents of the organization, the moderator of the curia like the senior executive vice president, and the episcopal vicars like the vice presidents.

A dean, sometimes called *vicar forane*, is the bishop's representative in the more rural areas of a diocese. A vicar forane or dean heads a deanery. A deanery is a subdivision of a vicariate. Deaneries are further subdivided into the specific parishes in that deanery. Each parish is headed by a pastor. In our diocese, the dean ensures that the pastors are keeping proper sacramental records. The deans might also assist in finding Mass help for a pastor if he is sick. The dean might schedule meetings from time to time to discuss issues important in the deanery. The dean would probably be analogous to a supervisor type position.

A chancellor may or may not be a high ranking diocesan official. It depends on how the diocesan bishop chooses to use the position. Under Canon Law, chancellor is just a fancy title for a person whose job it is to be a glorified record keeper and diocesan notary. However, many bishops give their chancellors more roles in diocesan leadership, making them a high ranking official of the diocese. The chancellor might be a top advisor to the bishop, including on parish assignments. The chancellor may or may not be a priest. In our diocese the chancellor is a high ranking official analogous to a senior vice president. The chancellor is part of the bishop's core team of advisors and consultants. The chancellor also serves as the chief canonical consultant to the bishop. Currently a lay person occupies the role of chancellor in our diocese.

That's the way it is!

EUCHARIST, THE SACRAMENT OF OUR COMMUNION WITH GOD

Dear brothers and sisters: In our catechesis on the Mass, we now turn from the Eucharistic Prayer to the Communion Rites,

which begin with our common recitation of the Lord's Prayer. The prayer we offer to the Father as his adoptive children in Christ, disposes us to receive the Lord's body and blood in Holy Communion. We ask the Father for our daily bread, for the forgiveness of our sins, and for deliverance from evil. These petitions are then expanded in the following prayers, which invoke God's peace and unity upon the Church and our world. In the exchange of the sign of peace, we demonstrate our commitment to be reconciled with one another, so as to worthily approach the altar to receive the Lord's gift of himself. The rite of the breaking of the bread, accompanied by our invocation of Christ as the Lamb of God, acknowledges the saving presence of the risen Lord among us and implores the peace he won for us on the Cross. May our conscious celebration of these rites help us to experience ever more fully the Eucharist as the sacrament of our communion with God and with all our brothers and sisters.

THE POPE'S MONTHLY PRAYER INTENTIONS

March 2018 ~ Evangelization: Formation of Spiritual Discernment - That the Church may appreciate the urgency of formation in spiritual discernment, both on the personal and communitarian levels.

Lenten Reminders

Days of Fast and Abstinence – Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of fast and abstinence. All Fridays during Lent are days of abstinence. All Catholics, 18-59 years of age, are bound by Church law to fast, which means only one large meal and two smaller meals may be eaten. Catholics 14 years of age and older are required to abstain, which means no meat may be eaten.

Operation Rice Bowl - Operation Rice Bowl is the official Lenten program of Catholic Relief Services. Proceeds benefit the poor in our own diocese and throughout the developing world. You are asked to eat one sacrificial mean each week during Lent and to give the money you saved to the Rice Bowl program. An envelope can be found in your monthly offering packet.

Easter Duty – All parishioners are reminded of their obligation to fulfill their Easter Duty. A person's Easter Duty consists of receiving Holy Communion at least once between Ash Wednesday and Pentecost Sunday as well as going to the Sacrament of Reconciliation to confess any mortal sins.

Questions About Lent

Q. Does the Easter Vigil on Holy Saturday satisfy the obligation of Easter Sunday Mass?

A. Attendance at the Easter Vigil fulfills the obligation to attend Mass on Easter Sunday. The Vigil, called traditionally "the mother of all vigils," is the highlight of the celebration of Easter and indeed may be considered the principal liturgy of the church year. The whole liturgical year leads up to and draws its meaning from the Easter Vigil.

Q: Should the holy water fonts be empty during Lent?

A: On March 14, 2000, the Vatican's Congregation for Divine Worship observed that the "removing of holy water from the fonts during the season of Lent is not permitted." The congregation cited two reasons: water and baptism are frequently mentioned in the Lenten liturgical readings, and avoiding use of the Church's sacramentals is no way part of the abstinence encouraged during the days of Lent.

To be sure, hole water fonts are emptied on Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday, but each of these days invites us to look forward to the blessing of the baptismal water at the Easter Vigil.

THE LIGHT IS ON FOR YOU




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
