Sacramental Information

Baptisms - Parents anticipating the birth of their first child are asked to attend baptismal instructions classes before the birth of their child, if possible. Note: Baptisms cannot be scheduled until all the necessary paperwork is completed. Contact the Rectory to schedule.

Confirmation - Confirmation is administered every year to all 8th grade students in our Parish Religious Education program. Children wishing to receive Confirmation must be enrolled and participating in the program for two years before they are eligible to receive the sacrament.

Marriages- In order to complete the necessary paperwork, couples are asked to contact the Rectory at least one full year in advance of the proposed marriage date.

Anointing of the Sick - Please contact the Rectory whenever a member of your family has become sick or hospitalized.

Monthly Visitations - Any parishioner who is homebound and wishes to receive the Eucharist on a monthly basis is asked to contact the Rectory to schedule a visit.

Rite of Christian Initiation in Adults (R.C.I.A.) - The R.C.I.A. prepares unbaptized adults for reception into the Catholic Church. The program is adapted to the needs of each person and prepares them for full initiation into the faith. Contact the Rectory for more information.



Liturgical Reflection

Easter Sunday

FIRST READING: Acts 10:34, 37-43

Jesus of Nazareth, anointed by God with the Holy Spirit, healed many people. He was put to death but was raised by God. We have seen him and have eaten with him. He has sent us to preach this Good News. And this is the truth we speak to you today: "Everyone who believes in him will receive forgiveness of sins through his name." Peter took a very bold step that day to broaden the mission of the followers of Jesus. Because of the vision he received, Peter had come to believe that all people were to be included in the great work of preaching the story of Jesus Christ. The Good News could not and should not be contained, for it is meant for all time.

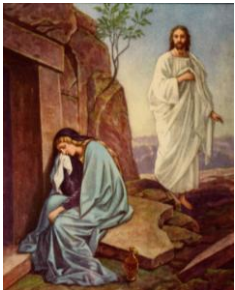
RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Psalm 118

More verses of the song of victory, Psalm 118, are heard in this reading. God's mercy is not a one-time-reality; it endures across the ages. God will protect those who believe, who are rescued through his power. The final verse, in which the rejected stone is mentioned, is recited by Jesus in reference to himself in the Gospel accounts of Matthew, Mark, and Luke. They also appear in Acts, Ephesians, and 1 Peter. Jesus has not fit the blueprint expected for the rebuilding of God's house.

SECOND READING: Colossians 3:1-4

The Colossians reading urges us to die to self in order to focus on the Lord, for having been baptized in Christ, the concerns of the world should diminish in meaning. For those who are caught up in the things of this world, however, this reading is an invitation to reorder our lives. On the day of glory, the worldly things that can consume human hearts will have no significance.

GOSPEL: John 20:1-9



Mary Magdalene is the first person at the tomb in all four Gospel accounts. In the synoptic accounts, she brings oil to anoint the body of the Lord. In John's account, the anointing has already taken place, but Mary is still the first person on record to go to the tomb. She is the messenger who then brings Peter and the Beloved Disciple

to see the stone has been moved. There are not angels in this story to suggest that a body has inexplicably been raised. There are only cloths that lay on the ground, the head cloth arranged in a separate place, all to indicate that this is not the scene of a robbery. In those first moments, what it all means is unclear, and only the Beloved Disciple "saw and believed." Time and future appearances of the Lord will add believers to the community. As we gather on this Easter day, we remember and celebrate that Jesus is indeed risen and walks among us still. Yet, it is only with eyes of faith that we recognize him – in the breaking of bread, in the preaching of his Word, and in the presence of his people gathered in his name.

ABOUT THIS SUNDAY

Easter Sunday marks the end of the Triduum and is the first day of the Easter Octave. The great 50 days begin. Forty days of fast yield to fifty days of feast. After many weeks of penitential preparation, we now celebrate the defeat of sin and death and the victory of love. We use the word "Alleluia" for the first time since Lent began in order to celebrate and participate in that victory. Our participation in the liturgy on this day is our participation in the salvation won for us and made present for us; therefore, it is on this day that God, through his only begotten Son, has "conquered death and unlocked for us the path to eternity."

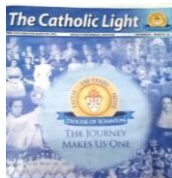
ADULT FAITH FORMATION

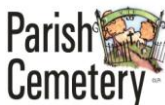
NEW ITEMS HAVE ARRIVED

Pro Life News

PRIESTS FOR LIFE

There is no day on which it is easier to preach on the victory of life than today, the Feast of Life, the Feast of Christ's victory over death. Easter makes it clear that being "pro-life" is not something that flows primarily from any political or ideological loyalty, nor simply from a cause, plan, project, or organization. Being pro-life, and all its other manifestations and activities, flow from what happened on Easter. Christ did not only conquer his death; he overturned the entire kingdom of death!

On Easter, we do not come to Church simply to congratulate Jesus for rising from the dead. We come to celebrate the fact that we share that victory. We too, by living and dying in him, will rise in him on the last day.

But this victory is also about today, because we share his risen life now. If we share his life, we are "an Easter people," or as Evangelium Vitae says, "the People of Life." This means that we proclaim this victory of life, and stand strongly against all the forces in our society that eclipse or destroy the value of life – foremost among them all being abortion. We stand before these forces, not intimidated, hesitant, or unsure of our ability to overcome them. Instead, we stand before them in strength, declaring that they no longer have any ground to stand on, nor any place in our midst. Christ is Risen! On this day we preach with all the vigor and conviction that the Gospel inspires, and send our people forth to apply the Easter victory of Christ to every segment of society!

That's The Way It Is!



Happy Easter! Today we celebrate the most triumphant day in the history of creation. If Good Friday is the darkest day in the history of creation, this is the most triumphant! Christians celebrate a Passover of sorts on this day. This is the Passover sacrifice of the Lamb of God.

Christ has passed over from death to life. The wedding feast of the Lamb has begun and his bride is prepared to welcome him. Alleluia. The real meaning of Good Friday is revealed in the resurrection.

I have said this so many times you probably are tired of hearing me say it: Christ is Risen in truth. The resurrection is a historical event; it is a historical fact. The resurrection is not mass hallucination on the part of the first Christian disciples. The resurrection is not a metaphor for the rise of the Easter Faith of the first Christians. The resurrection is not a fairy tale. The resurrection happened. Jesus who is both man and God was dead. He came back to life; he rose and walked out of his grave in his body. Our Christian Faith is utterly devoid of any meaning or substance if the resurrection is not a historical fact. Our Christian Faith is utterly and completely worthless if the resurrection is not a historical fact. I tell you in truth: if the resurrection was found to be a hoax I would give up the Christian Faith and become atheist. Then I would become the fiercest opponent of Christianity. I would be so fierce that Richard Dawkins and the rest of his New Atheist bunch would seem tame compared to me.

I was assigned to Saint Matthew's in my first assignment as the assistant pastor. On Easter Sunday my parents came to visit. They came to the Easter Sunday Mass that I was celebrating. I remember telling the congregation that the resurrection is a historical fact. If it were conclusively shown to be a hoax I would give up the Christian Faith and become atheist. My father told me that as I said that people were rolling their eyes. What can I say? Let them roll their eyes! I can't speak for you I can only speak for myself and the Catholic Church. Our Faith is utterly and completely worthless without the resurrection. There is absolutely no point to being a Christian without a resurrection. From my view, without a resurrection there is no point to religion.

Karen Armstrong is a former nun. She is a fellow in the Jesus Seminar. The Jesus seminar is a group of liberal scholars who reject any notion of the supernatural in salvation history. When the Bible records any supernatural happenings such as the resurrection, these "scholars" assume a naturalistic explanation. Karen Armstrong was

having a discussion with Christopher Hitchens. Hitchens prior to his death was part of the New Atheist movement. The New Atheist movement distinguishes itself in the sense that they are very public and almost evangelical with their claims. They have made atheism into a religion. In the interview Armstrong mentioned that the Christian Faith does not require a historical resurrection. She claimed that the resurrection is a metaphor the rise of faith in the early Church. Hitchens saw right through that load of garbage. He told her point blank: that isn't much of a faith. To that I say Amen! It is sad that an atheist actually knows and understands the seriousness of the claim of the resurrection better than a purported Christian!

What does the resurrection mean to us? It means that evil, suffering and death do not get the final word. Evil suffering and death do not win in the end. It means that God will vindicate us. It means that all of our loved ones who have died from cancer or other illness, all of our loved ones who suffered in this life for no apparent reason, all people in this world who have suffered evil, mistreatment, sickness, homelessness and injustice will be vindicated. All of us who keep the Faith despite being mocked, bullied or put down will be vindicated. We who knew Christ in this life and put our Faith in him and his promises will be vindicated. That is why the resurrection matters.

The resurrection also matters because God is going to recreate our bodies after they return to the dust of the earth. The afterlife is not just some vague kind of spirit existence where we float around on some cloud. The afterlife is not a Casper the friendly ghost type of existence. The afterlife is corporeal. We will have our bodies in heaven. Our heavenly bodies will not be subject to disease, pain, death, decay or age. We will live forever with God and glorify him in body and spirit, spirit and truth. We will cast our crowns before him lost in wonder, love and praise. We will glory in his perfect love.

Happy Easter!

CONTINUING CATECHESIS ON THE MASS

Dear brothers and sisters: In our continuing catechesis on the Mass, we now turn to its culminating moment in the rite of Holy Communion. The Lord's gift of

himself at the Last Supper is renewed at each Mass in the offering of his body and blood under the signs of bread and wine. After the breaking of the bread, the priest asks us to acknowledge the Lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world. His words invite us to acknowledge our sins, to trust in the reconciling power of Christ's sacrifice, and to receive the medicine that unites us ever more closely to him. At the moment of communion, we respond "Amen" to the words "The body of Christ". In this way, we signify our openness to the transformative power of God's grace, which enables us to grow in the unity of Christ's mystical body, which is the Church. Nourished by the bread of life, we become a living Eucharist; in a word, we become what we receive. Our silent prayer after receiving communion is gathered up in the final prayer of the Mass, which thanks God for making us sharers in this holy banquet and asks that we may grow daily in union with him, until we share at last in the wedding feast of heaven.

Notice Regarding Reporting Sexual Abuse of a Minor

It is the policy of the Diocese of Scranton to report any allegation of sexual abuse of a minor to law enforcement. If you are a victim of sexual abuse committed by a priest, deacon, religious or lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton, you are encouraged to immediately report the matter to law enforcement. If any priest, deacon, religious, lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton has cause or reason to suspect that a minor has been subjected to any form of abuse, including child sexual abuse, the matter will be reported to law enforcement. In accordance with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's Child Protective Services Laws, reports of suspected child abuse should also be made immediately by phone to the 24-Hour Child Abuse hotline (ChildLine) at 1-800-932-0313 or electronically at www.compass.state.pa.us/cwis.

It is also the policy of the Diocese to adhere to all civil and state regulations. To this end, the Diocese is equally committed to adhering to the norms of the Code of Canon Law and to upholding the tenets of the USCCB Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People, which includes supporting victims of sexual abuse in their pursuit of emotional and spiritual well-being. As such, information regarding an allegation of sexual abuse of a minor should also be reported to the Victim Assistance Coordinator Mary Beth Pacuska at (570-862-7551), or to Diocesan officials, including the Vicar General, Monsignor Thomas M. Muldowney, V.G., at (570-207-2269).
