## **Sacramental Information**

**Baptisms -** Parents anticipating the birth of their first child are asked to attend baptismal instructions classes before the birth of their child, if possible. Note: Baptisms cannot be scheduled until all the necessary paperwork is completed. Contact the Rectory to schedule.

**Confirmation -** Confirmation is administered every year to all 8<sup>th</sup> grade students in our Parish Religious Education program. Children wishing to receive Confirmation must be enrolled and participating in the program for two years before they are eligible to receive the sacrament.

**Marriages-** In order to complete the necessary paperwork, couples are asked to contact the Rectory at least one full year in advance of the proposed marriage date.

**Anointing of the Sick -** Please contact the Rectory whenever a member of your family has become sick or hospitalized.

**Monthly Visitations -** Any parishioner who is homebound and wishes to receive the Eucharist on a monthly basis is asked to contact the Rectory to schedule a visit.

**Rite of Christian Initiation in Adults (R.C.I.A.) -** The R.C.I.A. prepares unbaptized adults for reception into the Catholic Church. The program is adapted to the needs of each person and prepares them for full initiation into the faith. Contact the Rectory for more information.

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#### **Liturgical Reflection** Feast of Corpus Christi FIRST READING: Exodus 24:3-8

The people Moses led out of Egypt had gone through a death to their old way of life and were now on a journey toward the land and life God planned for them. By sprinkling ox blood on them, Moses ritualized their death to the old and their pledge of fidelity to the new covenant of the Law. Their sprinkling, like ours in Baptism, was an outward sign of the indelible inward change that had begun in them. On this Feast day, how can we show that we are faithful to our baptismal commitment to God?

#### **RESPONSORIAL PSALM 116**

In today's refrain, the psalmist names the Lord as the one responsible for his rescue and drinks the ceremonial cup of wine, the cup of salvation, as an acknowledgement of the life that is still his because of God's intervention. The stanzas call us to offer thanksgiving to the Lord and profess our vows to him for all that he has done for us.

#### SECOND READING: Hebrews 9:11-15

This letter to the Hebrews talks about God's dwelling places in the world. Once, the Hebrews carried a tabernacle on pilgrimage with them to the Promised Land, and installed it in the Temple. The Letter to the Hebrews proclaims that Christ has opened a new tabernacle in the dwelling place of God. In other writings Paul speaks of Christians as new dwelling places for God, as temples of the Holy Spirit. Where do we look for God's dwelling among us? As you celebrate the Eucharist and receive the Body and Blood of Christ, how will you show your gratitude for the sacrifice Jesus made out of love for us?

#### GOSPEL: Mark 14:12-16, 22-26

In Mark's narrative of the Last Supper, we realize that God has everything prepared, but that it is up to his disciples to lay it all out, to prepare for the actual sharing around the table. The breaking of the bread and pouring out of the wine remind us once again of how Jesus' body was broken on the cross and how his blood was spilled



for us. Now we are his body on earth. And we are nourished by his Eucharistic presence among us. Today, we might put ourselves in their sandals and ask how we are to play our part in preparing for and sharing the meal of the Eucharist. How do we prepare ourselves and what must we do so that others can fully participate?

#### **ABOUT THIS SUNDAY**



Today we celebrate *Corpus Christi*, the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ. In the Eucharistic feast, the gift of bread and wine really and truly become the Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity of

Christ. Through this covenant of love, God draws us into his divine life and offers us food for our earthly pilgrimage to continue with faith and hope, confident in God's ability to transform our weaknesses and sufferings into life and joy.

## **Pro Life News**

#### PRIESTS FOR LIFE

The Eucharist is a sacrament of faith. The Consecrated Host looks no different after the consecration than before. It looks, smells, feels, and tastes like bread. Only one of the five senses gets to the truth. As St. Thomas Aquinas' Adoro Te Devote expresses, "Seeing, touching, tasting are in Thee deceived. What says trusty hearing that shall be believed?" The ears hear His words, "This is My Body; this is My Blood," and faith takes us beyond the veil of appearances..

Christians are used to looking beyond appearances. The baby in the manger does not look like God; nor for that matter does the man on the cross. Yet by faith we know He is no mere man. The Bible does not have a particular glow setting it off from other books, nor does it levitate above the shelf. Yet by faith we know it is uniquely the Word of God. The Eucharist seems to be bread and wine, and yet by faith we say, "My Lord and My God!" as we kneel in adoration.

The same dynamic of faith that enables us to see beyond appearances in these mysteries enables us to see beyond appearances in our neighbor. We can look at the persons around us, at the annoying person or the ugly person or the person who is unconscious in a hospital bed, and we can say, "Christ is there as well. There is my brother, my sister, made in the very image of God!" By the same dynamic we can look at the pre-born child and say, "There, too, is my brother, my sister, equal in dignity and just as worthy of protection as anyone else!" Some people will say the child in the womb, especially in the earliest stages, is too small to be the subject of Constitutional rights. Is the Sacred Host too small to be God, too unlike Him in appearance to be worshipped? The slightest particle of the Host is fully Christ. Eucharistic Faith is a powerful antidote to the dangerous notion that value depends on size. www.priestsforlife.org

## News from the Vatican



## POPE PROCLAIMS GOD'S LOVE AND CLOSENESS

Dear Brothers and Sisters, good morning! Today, Sunday after Pentecost, we celebrate the feast of the Most Holy Trinity. A feast to contemplate and praise the mystery of the God of Jesus Christ, who

is One in the communion of three Persons: the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. To celebrate ever with renewed wonder the God-Love, who offers His life freely to us and asks that we spread it in the world. Today's biblical Readings make us understand that God doesn't want so much to reveal to us that He exists, but, rather, that He is the "God with us," who loves us, is interested in our personal story and takes care of each one of us, beginning with the littlest and the neediest. He "is God up there in

Heaven" but also "down here on earth" (Deuteronomy 4:39). Therefore, we don't believe in a distant, indifferent entity, but, on the contrary, in the Love that created the universe and generated a people, was made flesh, died and rose for us, and as Holy Spirit transforms everything and leads to fullness.

Saint Paul (Romans 8:14-17), who experienced personally transformation wrought by the God-Love, this communicates to us His desire to be called Father, rather "Daddy," with the total trust of a child that abandons himself in the arms of one who gave him life. The Holy Spirit — the Apostle recalls again — acts in us so that Jesus Christ isn't reduced to a personage of the past, but that we feel Him close, our contemporary, and we experience the joy of being beloved children of God. Finally, in the Gospel the risen Lord promises to remain with us forever: "Lo, I am with you always, to the close of the age" (Matthew 28:20). And, in fact, thanks to this His presence and to the strength of His Spirit, we can carry out serenely the mission that He entrusts to us: to proclaim and witness His Gospel to all and thus deepen communion with Him and the joy stemming from it.

Therefore, the feast of the Most Holy Trinity makes us contemplate the mystery of a God that creates incessantly, redeems and sanctifies, always with love and for love, and to every creature that receives Him, He gives the gift to reflect a ray of His beauty, goodness, and truth. He has always chosen to walk with humanity and forms a people that are a blessing for all the nations and for every person, none excluded. Therefore, the task of every baptized person is the same as that entrusted by Jesus to His disciples: "Go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit" (Matthew 28:19). A task that, thinking of the meaning of the verb "baptize," that is, "immerse," we can translate with the invitation to "immerse" every human being in this ocean that is the love of God; a love that raises from sin, heals the wounds of the soul and gives us salvation.

May the Virgin Mary, who from today we invoke taking up again the Angelus prayer -, help us to fulfill joyfully the mission to witness to the world, thirsty for love, that the meaning of life is precisely the infinite and concrete love of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.

## That's The Way It Is!



Picture it: the year is 1994 and I am a sophomore at the local Catholic high school. I remember one day the school was having Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament. Throughout the day students were assigned times to go to the chapel and pray. When I went to the

chapel during my assigned time there were several other students already in the chapel. One of them was a friend of mine. Upon graduation he was entering the seminary along with some of the other seniors. The other students present were the school jocks. They played all the sports; they drove the nicest cars and had everything going for them. All the boys wanted to be them and all the girls wanted to be their girlfriend. In short, they were the quintessential jock.

I went in to the chapel and sat in a pew for prayer. During the prayer time the jocks acted, well, like jocks. They were laughing and talking and having a grand old time. I ignored them and prayed. I don't claim that I was the perfect student or that I had the appreciation for the Blessed Sacrament that I should have had. I also did not have the appreciation for school that I should have had. I got into my fair share of trouble for stupid things. One thing I did know was that the chapel was not a place to act up. Whatever appreciation I did not have that I should have had for the Blessed Sacrament, at least I knew that I should be respectful in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament.

At one point I noticed my friend look up from his prayer, turn around, look at the jocks, then turn back around, shake his head, then go back to prayer. My friend, now a priest for the Diocese of Allentown, does not know that I noticed this and if he were asked about this would probably not even remember it. I remember it like it was yesterday. I remember it because that day when he looked at the jocks, he looked at them like he pitied them. When he shook his head, the manner in which he shook his head suggested that he felt sorry for them. The manner in which he shook his head suggested that he wished they could have what he has: namely the ability to pray and have a relationship with the Lord of Lords. That day, I realized my friend had more maturity than many adults I knew. My friend was not impressed with the jocks; my friend was not interested in having what they had. Quite the contrary: my friend wished the jocks could have what he had and see in the Blessed Sacrament what he saw. Because they did not have what he had, because they did not see what he saw in the Blessed Sacrament, he pitied them. It is not that my friend wasn't interested in girls, cars, sports, or being good

at sports; what guy isn't interested in that when they are in high school? My friend wasn't stupid. It is that my friend realized that some things are more important.

This Sunday is the Feast of Corpus Christi. It is a feast where we highlight and honor the Blessed Sacrament in our Liturgical prayers. The Blessed Sacrament is the greatest treasure that the Church has. The Blessed Sacrament is what makes the Catholic Church Catholic. This Sunday might be a good time to ask yourself whether you really believe what the Church teaches regarding the Blessed Sacrament. What does the Church teach? The Church teaches that what appears to us as simple bread and wine is really the body, blood, soul and divinity of our Lord Jesus Christ. If you do not believe this and are not open to believing this, then I have to respectfully ask why are you are even Catholic? If you struggle to understand this truth but otherwise are open to believing it, you are not alone. It is a difficult truth to comprehend. Many truths of God are difficult to comprehend. Theology is Faith seeking understanding. God asks us first to believe; the comprehension comes later.

For all the things I don't know and for all the faults I have, there is one thing I know: the only reason I am Catholic is because of the Blessed Sacrament. There are millions of enticing reasons not to be Catholic, not the least of which is all the scandals the Church has faced and continues to face. If it were not for the Blessed Sacrament I would have left the Church years ago. I am Catholic because despite all the imperfections of the Church, God is here in the Blessed Sacrament. For me, that fact is the only reason that matters in terms of why one should be Catholic and stay Catholic. If you see what I see by Faith in the Blessed Sacrament, you will never leave the Church.

Before I close, I would like to take the opportunity to invite you to come to adoration on Tuesdays. We need people to sign up for one hour time slots. The Blessed Sacrament cannot be left unattended. If we do not have the necessary time slots filled we will have to adjust the time of adoration. God wants to give us many graces and blessings when we adore Him in the Blessed Sacrament! That's the way it is!

# Mass Etiquette: Things To Do And Not Do In Mass

1. *Fast before Mass.* It is Church law that one fasts for at least 1 hour before receiving Holy Communion. Water and medicine can be consumed, of course. The purpose is to help us prepare to receive Jesus in the Eucharist.

2. No Food and Drink in Church. The exceptions would be a drink for small children, water for the priest or choir (if discreet) and water for those who are ill. Bringing a snack into church is not appropriate, because we want to set the church apart as a place of prayer and reflection.

3. Men take your hats off. It is impolite to wear a hat into a church for a man. While this is a cultural norm, it is one that we ought to follow closely. Just as we take off hats for the Pledge of Allegiance, we do so in church too; as a sign of respect.

4. Don't chew gum in church. It breaks your fast, it's distracting, it is consider impolite in a formal setting, and it doesn't help us pray better.

5. Cross yourself with Holy Water upon entering the church. This is a reminder of our Baptism, which made us members of Christ's Church. Just try to remain mindful of what is happening when you do so and don't do it without saying a prayer.

**6**. *Dress modestly and appropriately*. As Catholics we believe that God comes down to meet us at every Mass. So, why would we not dress appropriately?

7. Show up at least a few minutes early. Getting to Mass early allows you to pray and prepare yourself better for Mass.

8. Cell phones should never be used in Mass for calls or texting.

9. Don't sit on the edge of the pew if you sit down before others. Rather, sit in the middle so others don't have to climb over you.

10. When we enter and leave Church, genuflect toward the Tabernacle. Christ is present for our sake. By allowing our right knee to hit the floor, we acknowledge He is our Lord and God. If someone is physically unable to genuflect, then a bow is sufficient.

11. Please be quiet while in church. Once you enter the sanctuary – it is not the time or place to visit with those around you. If you must talk do so as quietly and briefly as possible. Remember that your conversation might be disturbing someone who is in prayer, which is much more important.

12. Take loud children to the back. Every parent knows that sometimes the baby is going to have a bad day. Don't make everyone else's day bad as well. Don't wait too long before you make a move. There is no reason to be embarrassed about having to quiet your child in the back of the church. It is worse to allow them to disturb Mass continually.

13. No bulletin reading during Mass. Imagine if you invited a guest to your house and before dinner (or during) they decided to read a magazine instead of talking to you. That is what is happening in God's house when you read the bulletin.

14. Bow before receiving Holy Communion. If it is God, then show your respect with a bow of the head. This is an ancient practice that has continued until this day.

15. Do not leave early. We should stay to the end of the recession and the hymn that accompanies it, if there is one. While there are certainly exceptions to this guideline, most who leave early don't need to and ought not to. Also, leave quietly. We encourage you to visit with others, but once you are outside of the main sanctuary of the church so you won't disturb others who want to stay and pray.
