Baptisms - Parents anticipating the birth of their first child are asked to attend baptismal instructions classes before the birth of their child, if possible. Contact the Rectory to schedule. **Confirmation** - Confirmation is administered every year to all 8th grade students in our Parish Religious Education program. Children wishing to receive Confirmation must be enrolled and participating in the program for two years before they are eligible to receive the sacrament.

Marriages- In order to complete the necessary paperwork, couples are asked to contact the Rectory at least one full year in advance of the proposed marriage date.

Liturgical Reflection

19th Sunday in Ordinary Time FIRST READING: 1 Kings 19:4-8

This Sunday we are taught again that all sustenance and nourishment for fullness of life comes from God. Last Sunday's First Reading recounted the story of God feeding the Israelites on their desert trek with quail and manna; today we find the great prophet Elijah also in need of food for body and spirit. When Elijah felt like he was ready to lie down and die, God sent an angel to wake him up and give him food to strengthen him. This might remind us of the warning "My child, when you come to serve the Lord, prepare yourself for trials" (Sirach 2:1). The only consolation, known by all who serve until the end, is that God will be with us.


RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Psalm 34

The next three Sunday's Responsorial Psalms come from Psalm 34, a song of thanksgiving. The refrain for all three weeks is the same, while the verses vary slightly. Following on the theme of eating and drinking for the journey of faith in the First Reading, the refrain invites us to "taste and see" the Lord's goodness. In the verses we praise the Lord for the glory of his name. With the mention of the Lord's angel in the final stanza, we also have a connection to the angel in the First Reading.

SECOND READING: Ephesians 4:30-5:2

How often have we considered the effects of our Baptism? Paul wants us to understand that Baptism has a profound effect on us. As baptized, we have become Christ's own so profoundly that Christ's Spirit lives in us, luring us toward all that we can become through sharing life with Christ. We cannot control the Spirit, but we are free to choose how much we wish to be open to God's constant offer of grace. The baptismal code of conduct follows the pattern of Christ, who surrendered himself to God even to the point of death and so was raised by God. All the baptized are to live in the powerful presence, the 'spirit' of this Christ.

GOSPEL: John 6:41-51



Today's Gospel is the third portion of the Bread of Life discourse, which concludes next Sunday. Throughout John's Gospel we encounter superficial understandings of Jesus' teaching. The people hearing Jesus in

today's story held such a high opinion of their knowledge of Jesus' background that they blinded themselves to him and his message. They refuse to accept that Jesus was sent from God and was with God form the beginning (John 1:1). John reiterates his conviction that Jesus is sent from God and can truly reveal God because he has "seen" the Father. Thos who believe this have "eternal life." Anyone who remains open to God's prompting will be drawn to Jesus. God calls, but we must listen; and if we do, and hear the Father, then we will seek out the Son.

The Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary August 15th

On November 1, 1950, Pius XII defined The Assumption of Mary to be a dogma of faith: "We pronounce, declare and define it to be a divinely revealed dogma that the immaculate Mother of God, the



ever Virgin Mary, having completed the course of her earthly life, was assumed body and soul to heavenly glory." The pope proclaimed this dogma only after a broad consultation of bishops, theologians and laity. There were few dissenting voices. What the pope solemnly declared was already a common belief in the Catholic Church.

We find homilies on the Assumption going back to the sixth century. In following centuries the Eastern Churches held steadily to the doctrine, but some authors in the West were hesitant. However, by the 13th century there was universal agreement. The feast was celebrated under various names (Commemoration, Dormition, Passing, and Assumption) from at least the fifth or sixth century. Today it is celebrated as a solemnity.

Scripture does not give an account of Mary's Assumption into heaven. Nevertheless, Revelation 12 speaks of a woman who is caught up in the battle between good and evil. Many see this woman as God's people. Since Mary best embodies the people of both Old and New Testament, her Assumption can be seen as an exemplification of the woman's victory. Furthermore, in 1 Corinthians 15:20 Paul speaks of Christ's resurrection as the first fruits of those who have fallen asleep. Since Mary is closely associated with all the mysteries of Jesus' life, it is not surprising that the Holy Spirit has led the Church to belief in Mary's share in his glorification. So close was she to Jesus on earth, she must be with him body and soul in heaven.

News from the Vatican



UPDATE TO CHURCH CATECHISM: 'THE DEATH PENALTY IS INADMISSIBLE'

Pope Francis, on June 28, 2018, approved the following new text of the n. 2267 of the Catechism of the Catholic Church.

The death penalty - 2267. Recourse

to the death penalty on the part of legitimate authority, following a fair trial, was long considered an appropriate response to the gravity of certain crimes and an acceptable, albeit extreme, means of safeguarding the common good.

Today, however, there is an increasing awareness that the dignity of the person is not lost even after the commission of very serious crimes. In addition, a new understanding has emerged of the significance of penal sanctions imposed by the state. Lastly, more effective systems of detention have been developed, which ensure the due protection of citizens but, at the same time, do not definitively deprive the guilty of the possibility of redemption.

Consequently, the Church teaches, in the light of the Gospel, that "the death penalty is inadmissible because it is an attack on the inviolability and dignity of the person," and she works with determination for its abolition worldwide.

A QUESTION AND ITS UNEXPECTED ANSWER

Jesus performed the miracle of the loaves and fish to reinforce believe in God, not just to fill empty stomachs. That was the message Pope Francis gave August 5, in his remarks before praying the noonday Angelus with some 20,000 pilgrims in St. Peter's Square.

"He wants the people to know Him. He wants the search for Him and the meeting with Him to go beyond the immediate satisfaction of material needs," the Pope explained. "Jesus came to bring us something more: to open our existence to a wider horizon than the daily preoccupations of eating, dressing, careers and so on."

Therefore, after performing the miracle of feeding thousands with a few loaves of bread and a couple fish, Jesus challenges the people to consider the real meaning of the miracle. He wants to understand that it is about the "great gift" God has given humanity: Jesus.

"He, true 'bread of life,' wants to satiate not only bodies but also souls, giving the spiritual food that can satisfy the greatest hunger," the Holy Father continued "Therefore, He invites the crowd to procure for themselves not the food that doesn't last, but the food that remains for eternal life. It's a food that Jesus gives us every day: his Word, his Body, and his Blood."

The crowd struggles to understand. But they ask Jesus what they must do to please God. "Jesus gives an unexpected answer: 'This is the work of God, that you believe in Him whom He has sent," Francis said. "These words are addressed, today, also to us: the work of God doesn't consist so much in 'doing' things but in 'believing' in Him that He has sent. This means that faith in Jesus enables us to carry out the works of God. If we let ourselves be involved in this relationship of love and of trust with Jesus, we will be able to carry out good works with the fragrance of the Gospel, for the good and the needs of brothers."

PRIESTS FOR LIFE

Reflection on Today's Readings - Elijah was fed on his journey to Horeb; the Israelites were fed on their journey to the Promised Land; we are fed on our journey to Heaven. In all three cases, God does the feeding. We also see that in all three cases, God's children complain when they face the struggles of the journey. The greatest temptation is to fail to trust God – and a failure to trust is what often leads to the devastating results.

In their desert journey, the sin of the Israelites was to grumble in distrust. Their lack of trust, in fact, was the reason they had to wander for forty years instead of going directly on a journey that could have only taken a few weeks. Even when God fed them with manna, they continued to grumble, getting tired of the same food every day. Some even wanted to go back to Egypt. Slavery seemed less challenging. At least they knew what to expect.

The Gospel passage from John 6 is like a replay of that desert grumbling. "The Jews murmured about Jesus," John says – just like they had murmured about the manna. We grumble too about the difficulties of the journey, which is why Paul has to give the Ephesians the admonitions he gives in today's second reading.

But Paul also gives the answer: "Be imitators of God...Live in love, as Christ loved us and handed himself over for us as a sacrificial offering..." The Gospel passage shows how Christ hands himself over to us – in the flesh, on the cross, in the Eucharist – that we may have life. We are to "imitate the mysteries we celebrate" at the altar. The Eucharist teaches us how to live. The food we receive gives us strength for a journey in which we are called to give ourselves away. Some grumble about having to sacrifice, but we see sacrifice as a life-giving gift. Some grumble because things get in the way of their plans for life. God is already in our future; yes, we must plan certain things, but we must trust for even more. The more we trust, and the more we sacrifice, the more we will give life, and the less we will grumble. www.priestsforlife.org

It's one less kid in the pew.

I'm nothing if not practical. We have five children, so when our oldest serves it cuts down on the crazy factor. I'm certain the people in the pew behind us are appreciative. The bonus is it requires us to plan ahead so we arrive to Mass 20 minutes early. I find that we're actually *more* prepared on the days he serves.

You're fostering a future vocation.

According to a recent study, 75% of the 2012 class of Ordinands (seminarians) were altar servers. It's no coincidence that when your children fall in love with the Mass, they fall deeper in love with God. Whether your children choose a religious vocation or one of married life, the effect of experiencing the Mass in a personal way can only help to further their faith life in the very best of ways.

Community with peers.

It's become something of the "cool" factor among my son and his friends. They enjoy serving together.

My son often drops by the altar server room before Mass just to see if they need an extra set of hands.

He's gotten to be friends with other children outside his peer group, our parish's seminarian serving his pastoral year, and our priests and deacons. We are called to live in community and I can't think of a more positive bunch than that one.

Respect and understanding of the Mass.

In the early days, we struggled just to keep our son quiet in the pew. As he grew into a school-aged child, he was present but still very unaware and uninterested in the Mass. We tried it all—MagnifiKid subscription, books about Mass, pointing out key moments during the liturgy—all with mild success. It wasn't until he began serving that we saw almost an immediate shift in his approach to the Mass.

An opportunity for leadership.

When our son first began serving, he started by shadowing other altar servers. You could see his anxious nerves! Our priest was so kind and patient as he learned the ropes. Now, I see my son mentoring younger servers. I see him taking pride in making sure the Mass goes smoothly. I see him smiling on the altar as the priest gives him a word of encouragement. I see a fine young man learning to be a leader by example.

Altar Server Training for all students who are interested in serving and are in 5th grade or older, will take place on September 9th following the 8:30am Mass.



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
