Liturgical Reflection

22nd Sunday in Ordinary Time FIRST READING: Deuteronomy 4:1-2, 6-8

God speaks through Moses in preparation for entering into covenant and giving them the Law. Since the Law comes from God, the people are cautioned not to alter it in any wav. As Moses presents God's Law, he insists that obedience will assure a good life. Most of all, he underlines the fact that they are uniquely privileged in the way God is present to them and has taught them. This reading, coming at the end of the summer season, invites us to look at our religious experience and tradition and appreciate our faith heritage in the same way that Moses encouraged his people to do.


RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Psalm 15

In the words of Psalm 15, we attest that those who do justice will live in the Lord's presence. We follow the Lord's law of truth, of kindness toward our neighbors, of honor to all who fear the Lord.

SECOND READING: James 1:17-18, 21-22, 27

Today's liturgy begins a series of readings from the brief, but important, Letter of James. We might say that the Epistle of James is the epistle of transparency. James insists that our faith must be expressed in action for the good of others. Those who truly hear this word must put it into practice. Care for one another calls for self-sacrifice like that of Jesus.

GOSPEL: Mark 7:1-8, 14-15, 21-23



Disputes between Jesus and various religious of Judaism leader with some appear frequency in the Gospel accounts. In today's reading Mark describes conversation that a Jesus and his disciples have with some scribes Pharisees and who

question their faithfulness to Jewish Law. The Law that the religious leaders were quoting to Jesus was actually scholarly commentary on God's law developed over the centuries. Certainly, it was good and healthful practice to eat with clean hands, but scrupulous attention to detail was not part of Jesus' vision of God's reign. Jesus teaches the principle underlying his actions: those who truly obey God's Law must hear and act; but even action, by itself, avails for nothing unless it comes from a heart truly attentive to God and the good of others. In Jewish thought, the heat represents the core of a human person; one thinks and decides with the heart. Thus Jesus insists that good or evil springs from the heat, and it is t he heart that must be attuned to God's Law and its true purposes.



SCHEDULING 2018 MASS INTENTIONS

Scheduling Mass intentions for 2019 will begin on September 4th, through the parish office, during regular business hours. The following are the established guidelines for scheduling intentions:

- 1. One weekend Mass on each weekend must be celebrated for the intentions of the parish. This is required by Canon Law (c. 534). Because of this we only have one weekend Mass for which we can accept an intention. Due to this limited availability of weekend Masses, no family may schedule more than ONE WEEKEND MASS PER QUARTER, or four weekend Masses per year.
- 2. There is no limit to the number of DAILY MASS INTENTIONS, including those Masses said at the nursing homes each month, which may be scheduled by each family.
- 3. Canon 948 states, "Separate Masses are to be applied for the intentions of those for whom a single offering, although small, has been given and accepted." Therefore, only one intention may be scheduled for any given Mass. However, for pastoral concerns to better accommodate the needs of the parishioners, we will adhere to the following: Up to three first names with the same last name (i.e. John, Paul and Mary Smith) or two last names only (i.e. Scott and Smith Families) will be allowed per intention.
- 4. The stipend given for a Mass intention is \$10. While we are willing to take requests over the phone, your Mass Intention will be not be scheduled until we are in receipt of vour donation.
- 5. Christmas, Easter, Mother's Day, Father's Day, and All Souls Day Masses are always for the individual intentions listed by parishioners on their envelope.
- 6. The Sanctuary Candle, burning in memory or honor of someone, is available on a weekly basis with no limit to the number each family may reserve.

Pro Life News

PRIESTS FOR LIFE

Reflection on Today's Readings - The Culture of Life will come about when we practice the "true religion" of which James speaks in the second reading. "Looking after orphans and widows in their distress" is what the pro-life movement does. The unborn child is the most orphaned of all when he or she is scheduled for an abortion. "Though father and mother forsake me, the Lord will receive me" – and the Lord receives them precisely through his people practicing "true religion." The mothers of these children may not be widowed in the sense that their husbands died, but they experience very often the absence of the father of the child, who may in fact be the one pressuring them to abort.

The Gospel passage makes it clear that the building of the Culture of Life comes "from within," just as do the death-producing ways of thinking that lead to the Culture of Death. The culture must be shaped by external factors, including law, and these factors can powerfully shape the heart. Yet from within the depth of the heart will spring our readiness to give life, welcome life, and defend life. *www.priestsforlife.org*

That's The Way It Is!



There is a saying and it goes like this: "When it rains, it pours." Right now in the Church to say that it is pouring is an understatement. It seems as if the release of the PA grand jury report sent things into a tail spin. You may have heard on the news that Pope Francis is now being accused of covering for

Theodore McCarrick, formerly "Cardinal" McCarrick.

Mr. McCarrick was accused of abusing a 16 year old altar boy when he was a priest for the Archdiocese of New York. He is also accused of abuse of seminarians, and general sexual misconduct. All of this was reported on the news prior to the release of the PA grand jury report. Pope Francis took action. Mr. McCarrick is no longer considered to be in good standing with the Church. The rights, privileges, etc, that go along with being a bishop and Cardinal in the Church have been taken away from Mr. McCarrick. He is been ordered into seclusion to a life of prayer and penance. From all appearances, Pope Francis took decisive and appropriate action.

There is just one problem. The former Apostolic Nuncio to the United States, Archbishop Carlo Maria Vigano, made a bombshell accusation against Pope Francis. He claims Pope Francis knew about the accusations against McCarrick shortly after becoming pope. In an 11 page letter he alleges that Pope Benedict and Pope Francis both knew about the accusations against McCarrick. He alleges that Pope Benedict took action against McCarrick by sanctioning him and issuing restrictions. When Pope Francis was elected, he alleges that the pope removed those sanctions and restrictions. He alleges that Pope Francis only recently moved to take action against McCarrick because he had no choice; the media reporting essentially forced his hand.

If the accusations are true, obviously Pope Francis needs to resign. Please note the operative word "if" in "If the accusations are true…" Just because Pope Francis is being accused of being part of a cover-up regarding Mr. McCarrick, does not entail that Pope Francis is guilty. Even the New York Times is expressing a note of Caution. An article called "Pope Francis Long Knew of Cardinal's Abuse and Must Resign" had this to say "Its [the letter] unsubstantiated allegations and personal attacks amounted to an extraordinary public declaration of war against Francis' papacy at perhaps its most vulnerable moment, intended to unseat a pope whose predecessor, Benedict XVI, was the first pontiff to resign in nearly 600 years." The New York Times is no friend of the Catholic Church. If they are expressing a note of caution, I think it is a good idea for us to exercise the same caution.

I am suspicious of the claim that Pope Benedict sanctioned McCarrick or otherwise took action against him in some way. First, the New York Times admits there is no record of this. Second, I am a priest. While I am not a high ranking church official, I do have some knowledge of the clerical culture. A pope taking any action against a bishop or Cardinal is a big deal; and I mean a big deal. A pope taking action against a bishop or cardinal is not analogous to a bishop taking action against a priest. It is extremely rare for a pope to rebuke a bishop or otherwise take action against a bishop.

The relationship between the bishops and pope is not analogous to the relationship between a bishop and his priests. The pope is head of the Church. At the same time he is not the boss of bishops the same way a bishop is the boss of a priest. In fact, the precise nature of the relationship between the bishops and pope has yet to be worked out. Vatican II did some work on this question, but the question has yet to be answered completely. My point is this: had Pope Benedict taken action against McCarrick that would have been big news. Even if Pope Benedict or Cardinal Wurl wanted to keep something like that quiet, they would not have been able to do so. Something like that cannot be kept under wraps. Yet this is the first I am hearing that Pope Benedict took action against Mr. McCarrick.

As an aside, because the nature of the relationship between the pope and bishops has yet to be fully answered or defined, that could be why Pope Francis is slow to try and create a formal mechanism of accountability for the bishops. Before such a mechanism can be created, certain difficult theological questions need to be worked out. Perhaps this sex abuse crisis will force the Church to answer these questions more precisely. Either way, all I ask is that we wait and see where the evidence takes us before we draw conclusions.


