

**Sacramental Information**

**Baptisms** - Parents anticipating the birth of their first child are asked to attend baptismal instructions classes before the birth of their child, if possible. Note: Baptisms cannot be scheduled until all the necessary paperwork is completed. Contact the Rectory to schedule.

**Confirmation** - Confirmation is administered every year to all 8<sup>th</sup> grade students in our Parish Religious Education program. Children wishing to receive Confirmation must be enrolled and participating in the program for two years before they are eligible to receive the sacrament.

**Marriages**- In order to complete the necessary paperwork, couples are asked to contact the Rectory at least one full year in advance of the proposed marriage date.

# Liturgical Reflection

27<sup>th</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time

FIRST READING: Genesis 2:18-24

Leading up to today's passage, God created Adam from the clay of the earth and blew into it divine sprite or life-breath, and Adam became "a living being" which God settled in the garden of Eden. Today's First Reading continues the story by recognizing that the human creature is not meant for isolation. God creates many other living beings, and appoints "the man" to name them; a command to name other creatures gives the human being authority in relation to them. But none of them proves to be a fitting companion to the man. The woman is made from a rib taken from the man; this image indicates that male and female belong to, and participate in, one another yet are distinct. Today's passage concludes with a concise but potent image: man and woman united in marriage become one living being. This powerful statement forms the basis of Jesus' response to his questioner in today's Gospel

### RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Psalm 128

God will bless those who walk in his pathways. The household who lives in faith will prosper and will know the abundance of Jerusalem all the days of their lives.

### SECOND READING: Hebrews 2:9-11

The author admits that Jesus was, for a time, less than the angels, and immediately explains why that was so. The emphasis is on Jesus' divine-human identity. The divine Son made himself subject to the universal human experiences of anguish and mortality; by so doing, he brought many with him to share God's life. Since both the Son and those he saved through sharing humanity have the same origin, God the Creator, the Son does not hesitate to name those being saved as brothers and sisters.

### GOSPEL: Mark 10:2-16

A Pharisee (member of a Jewish sect that strove to live a faithful Jews by following the Law of Moses) poses a question to test Jesus. It was a question debated by several schools of thought at the time: may a man divorce his wife? While it was true that Mosaic Law permitted divorce, views of acceptable grounds for divorce varied considerably.



Jesus roots his response not in Moses, but in creation itself. He quotes today's First Reading, pointing out that God's intent seems to be that husband and wife form a bond such that they become like a single living being. Jesus states that either a man or a woman who divorces a marriage partner "commits adultery." With this teaching, Jesus treats man and woman in marriage as equals, with equal duties and rights. This reinforces his essential point: in marriage, the two partners are meant to create such oneness that they become an unbreakable unit.

While gathered in the parish center, children celebrate their own Liturgy of the Word that is more appropriate to their level of understanding. All children ages Pre-K through 4<sup>th</sup> grade are invited to attend. No registration is necessary.

## That's The Way It Is!



“Ultimately our eternal destiny is not in our hands. Thus, we must let go and give it to God.” This statement appeared two weeks ago in my bulletin article. Someone asked me a question. The question asked was “Father, I thought that the Catholic Church teaches that salvation is in our hands because we must cooperate with God’s Grace in order to be saved.” My answer was “It is true that we must cooperate with God’s Grace in order to be saved, however, even our cooperation with God’s Grace is itself a work of Grace.” I decided to write an article and explain the Catholic concept of salvation more fully. It is important to understand what Catholics understand about salvation because Protestants often accuse Catholics of putting their Faith in human works rather than in God for salvation.

In order to understand Catholic teaching on redemption, we must use the Incarnation as our model. Everything the Church teaches, believes and professes can ultimately be traced back to and is connected with the Incarnation. Every heresy that has ever been or will ever be involves, in some way, a denial of the Incarnation. The Incarnation is the Word of God, the Second Person of the Blessed Trinity, taking a human nature and uniting it to his divine nature in the one divine person of Jesus Christ. Jesus Christ is one divine person with two natures: human and divine. These natures are united, but not mixed or mingled. This means that every action of Jesus Christ is simultaneously an action of God and an action of man. There is never a time when the divine person of Jesus is acting only as God or only as man. Every single action of Jesus Christ is simultaneously an action of God and an action of man. This is important to grasp because it explains and places context around the Catholic belief that man can merit salvation. In the divine person of Christ, man has merited salvation. Christ is the second Adam. In Christ, man restores what man destroyed in the first Adam.

I need to note that this is what makes the saving power of God so great: through taking on a human nature, God turned the problem into the solution. The problem of sin did not originate in God. Sin did not enter into the created sphere because God’s creation was lacking in anything or that God did something wrong. Sin entered into the created sphere through a misuse of the freedom God gave to us. The problem of sin, then, lies with man, not God. Through the Incarnation, God took the problem and made it the solution: man was able to

restore what man destroyed. This is why it is vital that we understand why the notion that we can merit salvation is so important: to deny that man can merit salvation, as Protestants do, ultimately leads to a denial of the Incarnation. The Protestant pillar *Sola Fide* (Faith alone) while sounding good, and perhaps understandable in the context the reformers were living, ultimately denies the incarnation because it asserts that man cannot merit salvation.

Jesus Christ is the head of the Church. The Church is the Body of Christ. Head and body are united. What goes on in the head, must go on in the body and *visa-versa*. This means that if in our head, redemption was simultaneously an act of God and an act of man; it means that in the body, redemption will work in the exact same way. When we are baptized God joins our humanity to His divinity. We become like Jesus: we have two natures, human and divine. We are unlike Jesus in that we are not a divine person. We are a human person. But through our baptism our humanity is joined to God’s divinity in an analogous way as divinity was joined to humanity in the divine person of Jesus. That means every action we undertake is simultaneously an act of God and an act of man. For this reason, we can merit salvation. This is also why Mortal Sin is deadly: God cannot sin. When we commit a Mortal Sin, we cut ourselves off from God’s divinity, thus reducing ourselves to our natural states. Confession is the means by which we are reunited to God’s divinity.

When we are joined to God’s divinity, we can now merit our salvation with the merits of Christ. We can cooperate with God’s Grace because we are united to the divinity of Christ. God’s Grace is within us. God’s Grace is like a fire: we allow it to consume us. Through allowing God’s Grace to consume us our humanity is transformed and perfected. Our salvation is in God’s hands because we rely on God and God alone to give us everything we need to be saved. Without the Grace of God, salvation cannot happen. Without God joining our humanity to His divinity, Salvation cannot happen. Without God prompting us to come to Him and seek Baptism, or to seek Confession when we are wayward, salvation cannot happen. Salvation, indeed, is in the hands of God. It is on Him and Him alone that we rely. That’s the way it is,

### Year-to-Date Budget Variance

When creating our parish budget, St. Peter's Finance Council takes into account all projected income and expenses for the upcoming fiscal year. The *Weekly Goal to Meet Expenses* is then calculated based on total budgeted operating expenses divided by total number of collections. As shown above, at this point in our fiscal year, 3 months in, we are showing a negative balance. This means we have taken in \$9,753.14 less, an average of \$697 less each week, than what we need to meet our expenses. If we continue this trend, we will not be able to meet our projected expenses over the course of the fiscal year. Please reflect on your giving and if able, increase in your weekly offering.



## News From the Vatican



### **OUR RESPONSIBILITY IS TO SHOW YOUNG PEOPLE THAT ENGAGING WITH CHURCH, CHRIST'S TIMELESS MESSAGE, IS WORTH IT**

Pope Francis underscored this today, Oct. 3, 2018, to the Synod Fathers at the first General Congregation of the

Synod on Young People, the Faith and Vocational Discernment, Oct. 3-28, 2018.

The Holy Father began by thanking the young people connected to the congregation via streaming, and all the youth who have made their voices heard. "I thank them for having wagered that it is worth the effort to feel part of the Church or to enter into dialogue with her; worth the effort to have the Church as a mother, as a teacher, as a home, as a family, and, despite human weaknesses and difficulties, capable of radiating and conveying Christ's timeless message." He thanked them also for wagering that it is "worth the effort to hold onto the boat of the Church which, despite the world's cruel storms, continues to offer shelter and hospitality to everyone; worth the effort to listen to one another; worth the effort to swim against the tide and be bound by lofty values: family, fidelity, love, faith, sacrifice, service, eternal life." "Our responsibility here at the Synod," Francis said, "is not to undermine them; but rather to show that they are right to wager: it truly is worth the effort, it is not a waste of time!" The young people present and those participating from afar "fills us with joy and hope."

He made some suggestions to the Synod Fathers: "The Synod we are living is a moment of sharing, he said, noting this means all are invited to speak with courage and frankness. "Only dialogue can help us grow. An honest, transparent critique is constructive and helpful, and does not engage in useless chatter, rumors, conjectures or prejudices." Humility in listening, he said, must correspond to courage in speaking. "I told the young people in the pre-Synod Meeting: "If you say something I do not like, I have to listen even more, because everyone has the right to be heard, just as everyone has the right to speak."

"Many of you have already prepared your intervention beforehand – and I thank you for this work – but I invite you to feel free to consider what you have prepared as a provisional draft open to any additions and changes that the Synod journey may suggest to each of you," he acknowledged, recommending: "Let us feel free to welcome and understand others and therefore to change

our convictions and positions: this is a sign of great human and spiritual maturity."

Francis reminded the Synod is an ecclesial exercise in discernment. "Discernment is not an advertising slogan, it is not an organizational technique, or a fad of this pontificate, but an interior attitude rooted in an act of faith. Discernment is the method and at the same time the goal we set ourselves: it is based on the conviction that God is at work in world history, in life's events, in the people I meet and who speak to me." He also reminded: "We are a sign of a Church that listens and journeys." "A Church that does not listen shows herself closed to newness, closed to God's surprises, and cannot be credible, especially for the young who will inevitably turn away rather than approach."

The Pope also advised those present to leave behind prejudice and stereotypes, to decisively overcome the scourge of clericalism, and to cure the virus of self-sufficiency and of hasty conclusions reached by many young people.

The Holy Father prayed the Synod awaken our hearts. "The present moment, and this applies also to the Church, appears to be laden with struggles, problems, burdens," he acknowledged, "But," he continued, "our faith tells us that it is also the kairós in which the Lord comes to meet us in order to love us and call us to the fullness of life."

"The future is not a threat to be feared..." he said, stressing: "We need to rediscover the reasons for our hope and, above all, to pass them on to young people who are thirsting for hope." "Do not let yourselves be tempted, therefore, by the "prophets of doom", do not spend your energy on "keeping score of failures and holding on to reproaches", keep your gaze fixed on the good that "often makes no sound; it is neither a topic for blogs, nor front page news..." "And do not be afraid," he continued, "before the wounds of Christ's flesh, always inflicted by sin and often by the children of the Church."

Pope Francis concluded, saying: let us work to "spend time with the future," to take from this Synod "not merely a document – that generally is only read by a few and criticized by many – but above all concrete pastoral proposals capable of fulfilling the Synod's purpose."
