Liturgical Reflection 30th Sunday in Ordinary Time FIRST READING: Jeremiah 31:7-9

Today we hear part of Jeremiah's promise of future restoration for God's people, a renewed life beyond any previously known. Even as the kingdom of Judah continues its dissolution, nearing its final end, the prophet, relying on an ever-faithful God, promises that beyond destruction and exile lies a recreated people. All this will be solely a divine work beyond human power. Jeremiah underlines the great contrast between the weakness of the people and God's strength and faithfulness. Their restoration has nothing to do with their merit and everything to do with God's great love.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Psalm 126

The Responsorial Psalm continues the theme of restoration found in the First Reading. It speaks of the experience of God's people who were brought back from exile. They had been carried off weeping, but were now being fully restored. The Psalmist beseeches the Lord to continue his beneficence and restore the fortunes of his people. We often pray to God this way, recalling how God had led us through difficulties in the past, and asking God to do so once again for we are in need.

SECOND READING: Hebrews 5:1-6

Today's reading from Hebrews insists that Christ intimately experienced the struggle and weakness shared by all human beings, but also attests that the totally human Jesus is Son of God as well, and so becomes the final High Priest, the perfect mediator between humankind and God. Christ's priesthood is superior to any other; it is eternal and it is God the Father who has given him his glory.

GOSPEL: Mark 10:46-52



Today's Gospel serves as an important transition in Mark's account of the Good News. Mark writes for a community suffering confusion, loss, and persecution, and so he emphasizes Jesus as the Messiah who inaugurated God's

final rule in the pattern of Isaiah's suffering servant. This healing account, like other miracle stories in Mark, serves to demonstrate that the Kingdom of God truly has begun in Jesus, since through him God overcomes the evil of every kind of illness and suffering. Bartimaeus hears that Jesus is nearby and begins to call to him for help. By using the title "Son of David," he acknowledges Jesus as a successor to Israel's most important king. Even though the crowds attempted to silence him, Bartimaeus' hope in Jesus proved more powerful than their objections. Bartimaeus modeled the faith that the disciples had been failing to attain. The blind man saw Jesus with the eyes of faith, and so is saved, healed, made whole. He followed Jesus as a true disciple, on "the way," the earliest term used to describe the followers of Jesus.


SUGGESTION BOX

You are free to visit any time without signing up. If you wish to sign up for a committed weekly hour, a sign-up sheet can be found on the bulletin board in the church or you can call Rhonda Gooch at 570-724-3092.

How does one spend an hour before Jesus exposed in the Blessed Sacrament? This hour Jesus wants you to spend with Him is spent any way you want. You may bring your own prayer books, use the books in the chapel, read the Bible, pray the Rosary, or just sit, relax and enjoy the sweet peace that comes from simply being in the Presence of God. You may feel you can't pray well. Don't let this discourage you. The mere fact that you take time out at a specific time each week to spend an hour with Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament pleases Him very much, and is in itself a prayer of great faith.

Religious Ed. & Youth Group News COIN CHALLENGE FOR CHARITY

The religious education classes will once again have a friendly competition to benefit a local charity. Students are encouraged to collect loose change for donation (dollar bills



are accepted, too!) and bring to class each Sunday in October. Last year, a total of \$530.64 was collected, which benefited the Samaritan House. Today ends the challenge. We will let you know the results after all the coins are counted and the winning class makes their decision on where the money will be donated.

CHILDREN'S LITURGY OF THE WORD

Children's Liturgy is offered at the 8:30am Mass. Children, along with an adult leader, are dismissed by Father before the First Reading and rejoin their families for the Liturgy of the Eucharist. While gathered in the parish center, children celebrate their own Liturgy of the Word that is more appropriate to their level of understanding. All children ages Pre-K through 4th grade are invited to attend. No registration is necessary.

All Saints Day - On November 1st we celebrate the Solemnity of All Saints, remembering all the saints known and unknown to us who enjoy the glory of heaven. In the day's Gospel account we hear the Beatitudes, which are guidelines for true joy and the attainment of sanctity in our Christian lives. We hear how to live lives of holiness so that we may attain happiness in this life, but even more happiness in the next life as we strive to likewise be numbered among all the saints in heaven.

All Souls' Day - On November 2nd we commemorate all the Faithful Departed. All Souls' Day is unique on the liturgical calendar. Neither a solemnity nor a feast, this commemoration outranks other feasts and even takes the place of a Sunday in Ordinary Time (should this commemoration fall on a Sunday). Prayer for the dead reaches deep into our human history, and it has been our custom from the earliest days of the Church. The belief that our prayers can be of assistance to the dead is a treasured tenet of our Catholic faith. We profess it every time we recite the Nicene Creed: "I look forward to the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come."

Visiting a Cemetery – From November 1st through November 8th, a plenary indulgence is granted the Christian faithful who devoutly visit a cemetery and pray, if only mentally, for the dead. This indulgence is applicable only to the souls in purgatory.

That's The Way It Is!



As your pastor, there are often times when I feel like I am caught between a rock and a hard place. At no time do I feel more like I am caught between a rock and a hard place then times I have to address a subject no one likes to hear about in the Catholic Church. I am talking about the dreaded "M"

word. Yes, that word; the most evil, vile, loathsome, filthy word in the English language. The word is so horrible I cannot even speak it. I will just write the symbol for the word. The symbol is \$.

I say I feel like I am caught between a rock and a hard place on the subject of \$ because no one wants to hear about it. At the same time people want to hear about it for the sake of transparency. It is rather oxymoronic. Right now, we have a deficit of over \$11,000. Collections are often in flux. Thus, deficits are not automatically a cause for concern. However, while we have run deficits before, what is concerning about this deficit is that it is far above where we were this time last year and this time the year before. For comparison sake, this time last year we were at about a \$6,000 deficit.

I need to note that the deficit is not caused because we are over spending. The deficit is caused because we are not meeting our weekly offering goals. We are over \$11,000 down from our projected income for this time of the year. At this time we owe no money and all our bills are paid. This, however, is due to the fact that we had a surplus from last year. Without that surplus we would be in trouble right now. While all the bills are paid, the surplus funds have been exhausted. We are now in a position where we are living collection to collection.

Because of the scandal I have avoided pushing the annual appeal this year. Notwithstanding the fact that the charitable work of the diocese must continue, I am trying to give people space. I understand there is anger. I understand many want to send a message that the bishops will hear. Many feel that the only way they can get the bishops to listen is by withholding contributions. I get that. Because of the scandal I have also tried to avoid talk of \$ even as it concerns the parish. I can tolerate a certain amount of deficits in the offerings and make due. But I have a duty to be transparent with you.

The biggest fiscal problem in our parish right now is not the \$11,000 deficit. The bigger problem is the overall trend in the offering totals. We are falling short of at least \$3,000 a month in the offerings. We can survive if we do not make up the \$11,000. I will find a way to work with that. We cannot survive if the trend in the overall decline in the offering totals continues. What I am asking of all our parishioners right now is to simply commit to supporting your parish in such a way as we make our offering totals. If you are willing to do that, we will survive and you will hear nothing further from me. We need approximately \$5,800 per week.

I ask each parishioner to commit to ensuring we make our weekly goals. I cannot tell you what amount you should be giving. I believe that is a personal decision that each person must make based on their Conscience and what they believe God is calling them to do. I think I can respectfully suggest that the amount you offer should be reflective of your state in life and income; that is, the more God has blessed you, I would hope the more you share those blessings for the support of your parish.

What happens if things do not turn around? It is too early to predict. I am hoping it does not come to that. Not making our goals does not impact us in the short run. That is why the \$11,000 deficit alone is not devastating. It does, however, have long term consequences. This is why the downward trend in offering totals is far more alarming. I am sounding the alarm now, while it is still early enough to turn this around. That is the good news: if everyone who attends Mass here at Saint Peter's is willing to commit to meeting our offering goals we will be just fine. But we need to start now while things can be turned around.

I am hoping you will respond to this need as you have generously responded in the past. As I have said before and I will reiterate now: as a priest, I want to worry about the work of the Gospel. I do not want to worry about \$. Put another way; I want to worry about \$ as much as you like hearing about \$. I am asking that you continue to not allow the \$ to become an issue here so that my time can be spent on more important things. I would suggest that my ministry and gearing up for our 50th anniversary celebration qualify as more important things. If \$ isn't an issue, then I don't have to talk about it.

That's the way it is, Reverend David Bechtel, Pastor

News From the Vatican



IF YOU HOPE, YOU WON'T BE DISAPPOINTED

Does one wait for Heaven as something abstract or as an encounter? Pope Francis asked this on October 23, 2018,

during his homily at the Vatican. "If you hope, you will never be disappointed," he affirmed. In his homily, reported by "Vatican News," the Holy Father meditated on the terms "fellow citizens" and "inheritance. " "Our identity is to be healed by the Lord, to be built as community and to have the Holy Spirit in us," he said.

The inheritance "is what we seek on our way, what we will receive at the end," thanks to hope which is "the virtue that is perhaps the most difficult to understand." "What is hope?" he asked. It's to hope in Heaven, "but what is Heaven for you?"

"To live in hope is to walk towards a prize, towards a happiness that we won't ever have here, but we will have it there (on high)... it's a virtue that is difficult to understand. It's a very humble virtue. It's a virtue that never disappoints: if you hope, you'll never be disappointed — never, never," he continued.

Hope is also "a concrete virtue." "But how can it be concrete, if I don't know Heaven or what awaits me?" Hope, our inheritance, is hope in something; it's not an idea, it's not being in a lovely place . . . no. It's an encounter. Jesus always stresses this part of hope, the fact of being in expectation, of encounter," he continued.

Pope Francis gave an image to illustrate hope: a pregnant woman who expects a child. She goes to the doctor's, he shows her the sonogram — "Ah, yes, the child . . .he's fine" . . . No! She is joyful! And every day she caresses her abdomen to caress the child, she is expecting the child, she lives expecting that child. This image can help us to understand what hope is: to live for this encounter. The woman imagines how her child's eyes are, how his smile will be, if he'll be blond or brown . . . she imagines the encounter with her child."

"Do I wait thus, concretely, or do I wait in a somewhat diffused way, somewhat gnostically? — he asked in conclusion. Hope is concrete; it's of every day because it's an encounter. And each time that we encounter Jesus in the Eucharist, in prayer, in the Gospel, in the poor, in communal life; each time we take an extra step towards this definitive encounter." The Pontiff wished for a Christian "the wisdom to know how to enjoy the small encounters of life with Jesus, while preparing for this definitive encounter."

PRIESTS FOR LIFE

Reflection on today's readings -The Gospel passage today about Jesus' response to Bartimaeus epitomizes a key aspect of the Church's teachings on social justice, namely, our preferential option for the poor. A "sizable crowd" was passing by, and the center of attention was Jesus. Not only were people not paying attention to the man by the side of the road, but his cries proved to be a nuisance, and people tried to silence him. Bartimaeus symbolizes the marginalized of our society, the inconvenient and burdensome, the unwanted. Crowds pass them by every day and don't even want to think about them. Jesus, however, pays attention to the man at the margins. And he called him and healed him.

As we promote a Culture of Life, there are some who want to silence even further the already silent screams of the unborn, who constitute the most marginalized and oppressed segment of humanity today. Yet as a Church we are called to give "urgent attention and priority" to these children (see the Pastoral Plan for Pro-life Activities of the US Bishops, 2001). We are called to embody the response of Christ, ignoring the rebukes of the "politically correct" segments of our society, and identifying ourselves with the "man at the margins." Not only is this an imitation of Christ, but it is a fulfillment in our day of the prophecy of Jeremiah that we hear in the first reading. God's promise regarding his scattered and oppressed people is, "I will gather them." That's what the pro-life effort of the Church does - it gathers back together those who are scattered by the legal fiction that their lives are not equal to the rest of people; it restores protection to those who would otherwise be scattered by the physical violence of abortion. www.priestsforlife.org


