Liturgical Reflection

31st Sunday in Ordinary Time **FIRST READING: Deuteronomy 6:2-6**

Moses instructs the people of Israel to keep the Lord's commandments. Land, prosperity, and progeny will be theirs. Only the Lord is God. The Lord is the God of Israel whom the people shall love with their heart, soul, and strength. Moses' words call us to take the Lord's statutes into our hearts this day.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Psalm 18

We sing our thanks to the Lord for the rescuing us from our enemies and express our love of the Lord, for God is our strength and our rock. As Christians, we belive ours is the victory the Lord gave us in Christ Jesus.

SECOND READING: Hebrews 7:23-28

Jesus the high priest is unlike the Levitical priests who needed to offer repeated sacrifice for their sins and the sins of their people, and whose priesthood ceases at death. Jesus' Death on the Cross is "once for all" sacrifice, which he never needs to repeat. His priesthood is eternal and the salvation he offers to people, constantly available.

GOSPEL: Mark 12:28-34



Jesus' words in response to the scribe who inquires about the most important commandment, echo Moses' words in the First Reading. To the commandment of honor the Lord God alone with love of one's heart, mind, and strength, Jesus adds the second commandment to love your neighbor as vourself.

Understanding these commandments brings one near to the Kingdom of God. It is often difficult to balance love of God with love of neighbor. Should we spend our time praving or serving the poor? Should we dedicate our time to our family or to our church community? We will always be torn between these calls while we are upon this earth. In November we remember the dead, and it is a good time to meditate upon the fact that in heaven we will no longer be torn between loving God and loving each other. In heaven we will be able to love both. In fact, we will be able to love everyone without it taking away from our love of each one.

The Church has a long tradition of remembering those who have died, to the love and mercy of God. We do this in a special way on the Feast of





PRIESTS FOR LIFE

Reflection on today's readings - Christ puts the second commandment together with the first. "There is no other commandment greater than these." The close relationship between these two commandments is discussed at length in the First Letter of John, in which he makes it clear that the failure to love the neighbor we see, and to attend to his needs, makes it impossible to love the God we do not see. These two closely-related commandments provide the core of the Church's efforts to defend the unborn and the vulnerable. Because we love God with all our mind, heart, soul, and strength, we cannot place our own plans and choices above His choice to create human life and entrust it to our care. Moreover, we realize that religious piety is never meant to turn us in on ourselves, but rather to make us more attentive and responsive to the needs of the vulnerable. We love our neighbor – including our unborn neighbor – "like ourselves," which means that we recognize the unborn as a person like ourselves. Some say the unborn are too small, or too unlike us in their characteristics, to be considered a neighbor, a person. But the second commandment requires that we see every human being as a neighbor "like ourselves," and therefore love them.

This demand of love is greater than any other commandment. Often, it is the claim to observe other commandments that keeps people from intervening to save the unborn. We have legal concerns, often exaggerated. We shrink back because of human respect. We are afraid to part with certain possessions, relationships, or guarantees of security. And sometimes even those to whom we must answer tell us to "tone it down" regarding our outspoken defense of the unborn. But "there is no greater commandment than these." We are to love our unborn neighbor just as we love our born neighbor, and without reserve. *www.priestsforlife.org*

That's The Way It Is!



In reading books critiquing Christianity it is common to see the authors speculate about how religion arose in the human species. This is especially true when atheists critique the Catholic religion. There are several theories offered for why religion arose in our species. I am going to explore these

theories in this and subsequent articles and explain why they are not sufficient to explain the rise of religion in the human species. As you read this article, I would not be surprised if you recognize one or more of the theories.

The first theory is the Fraud Theory of religion. The theory goes like this: in early times a group of evil but shrewd people set themselves up as religious leaders and priests. They preyed upon the simple and ignorant. They were able to trick people into thinking they truly represented God. They used psychological manipulation, tricks, pseudo-ceremonial witchcraft and vague guesses that passed for prophecy. Though these tactics they were able to convince people that they were truly in communication with a higher, unseen god like being who rules the world. Through these unscrupulous tactics they were able to set themselves up with an easy life. We see this phenomenon today in the likes of televangelists like Jesse Duplantis. God apparently told him to get a brand new jet and that his followers should pay the \$54,000,000 for it. To think...I can't even get any of you to cough up a meager \$100,000 for a new BMW! This priesthood thing isn't working out. I need to take up televangelism...

Humor aside, the Fraud Theory of religion has one glaring problem: it presupposes the very thing it seeks to account for. You can't gain sway over a large group of people using religion unless religion already exists. Thus, the existence of religious quacks does not explain the existence of religion or people's belief in God. The basic premise of the Fraud Theory of religion is that religion originated from religious quacks. The theory is self defeating. There are quacks in every profession. The existence of quacks presupposes the existence of the profession. Quacks are not the origin of the profession. If charlatans masquerading as men of God explain the origin of religion, then Kevin Trudaeu explains the origin of the medical profession, ambulance chasers explain the origin of the legal profession and snake oil salesmen explain the origin of business. Religious quackery presupposes the existence of religion and

belief in God and therefore cannot explain the origin of belief in God and religion.

Another theory is the Law Theory. The basic premise of this theory is that Heaven, Hell, Religion, etc, all originated from those who ruled and governed. They were used as a means to keep people under control. People may think twice about disobedience and challenges to authority if they are brainwashed to believe that disobedience to the authority will send them to Hell and prevent them from going to heaven.

If this is true, from my view, this has proven a rather ineffective and poor means of controlling people. Now stop and think: religious leaders and other people in authority are alleged to have invented religion, concepts of God, Heaven and Hell as a means of controlling people, scaring them, preventing challenges to their authority and keeping them subservient. Yet history is replete with protests and revolts against the very same religious leaders and others in authority who are alleged to have invented the concepts of God, Heaven, Hell and religion to prevent the protests and revolts in the first place! The concepts of God, Heaven and Hell that were supposedly invented by religious leaders and those in authority to control people and keep them in submission do not work. People readily accept the concepts of religion, God, Heaven and Hell and from time to time still revolt and protest against their leaders, as history shows.

The theory, like the last theory is also self defeating. How can the authority appeal to Heaven, Hell, God, religion, etc, unless the people already believed in Heaven, Hell, God, religion, etc? The theory, like the last theory presupposes the existence of the very thing it seeks to account for and therefore is insufficient to explain its origin.

Next week I will explore other theories that seek to account for religion. I will explore the Social Theory, the Ghost Theory and the Instinct Theory. Until then,


