Liturgical Reflection

First Sunday of Advent FIRST READING: Jeremiah 33:14-16

Jeremiah offers sure hope in the midst of hardship saying, "The days are coming...I will fulfill the promise." His focus is on a future when current woes will cease, promises will be fulfilled, and transformation will be achieved so completely that all who look upon Judah will recognize the saving hand of God. By longing for the fulfillment of God's promises – in faith that turns to action – we can help bring it about.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Psalm 25

We cannot hope to be pleasing to God unless we open our hearts to his instruction. On our own, we are bound to fall into sinful and selfish habits. We fool ourselves by believing that what we are doing is what God wants, but is really what we wanted to do. On the other hand, if we humble our hearts, we will be able to hear what God is trying to tell us. He wants us to choose justice for that is the only real path to a life filled with peace and joy.

SECOND READING: 1 Thessalonians 3:12-4:2

Paul and his Thessalonian converts expected the great and terrible day of Christ's return to be imminent. But his advice is to do more of the same: continue turning their lives over to Christ, keep on loving one another as Paul instructed, remain pure and blameless in God's sight. Not panic, but peace. Not frantic activity, but calm. Anxiety and fear are for those who don't know their future.

GOSPEL: Luke 21:25-28, 34-36



We hear Jesus speak to his disciples about the need for vigilance and prayer as they wait for the coming of the Son of Man in glory. Though Jesus predicts a time of destruction and fear, Jesus indicates that others will be

frightened; Jesus' disciples are not to fear, but are to stand tall. Yet Jesus does not promise deliverance from anxiety or tribulations. He encourages his disciples to pray for strength. The early Christian communities did not find consolation in the promise of a utopia, nor should we. Instead, we find in our Christian faith the means by which we witness to God's unfailing love for us in all circumstances. Jesus' predictions about the end times may sound dire, but in the next paragraph Luke tells us that people woke early to listen to Jesus' teaching in the Temple area. In his person and in his message, those who heard Jesus found strength and consolation. Like the first Christians, we may encounter events and circumstances that could lead us to despair. Through prayer, however, we find strength and consolation in Jesus' words and in his continuing presence with us to endure all things and to witness to the action of God in our world.

The Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception December 8, 2018



The Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception celebrates the saving work of God in preserving the Blessed Virgin Mary from the stain of original sin. Because of His foreknowledge that Mary would consent to bear Christ, God kept Mary free from original sin from the moment of her conception in the womb of her mother, Saint Anne. Unlike certain other Holy Days of Obligation, where the requirement to attend Mass is abrogated when the date of the feast falls on a Saturday or a Monday, the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception is so important that the obligation is not waived.

News From the Vatican

"WHAT IF THE LORD WERE TO CALL ME TODAY?"

Pope Francis asked. What would I say and do? This thought, he said, helps us make progress. Not only will we meet the Lord in order to give an account of ourselves. It will also be a joyous, happy moment, one filled with mercy. Thinking about the end, about the end of the world, about the end of one's own life, is wise. Wise people do this.

The Church invites us to ask ourselves, "What will my end be like?" Pope Francis suggested an examination of conscience is useful in order to evaluate ourselves. What would I like to fix because it doesn't work? What would I like to sustain or develop because it's good. This is the Spirit's work, Pope Francis said. In conclusion, he encouraged that we pray for the gift of wisdom. This week, let's ask the Holy Spirit for the wisdom of time, the wisdom regarding the end, the wisdom of the resurrection, the wisdom of the eternal encounter with Jesus... It will be a joyful day, that meeting with Jesus. Let us pray so that the Lord might prepare us.

That's The Way It Is!



Happy New Year! Yes, you heard that right. Happy New Year! The first Sunday of Advent is the beginning of the new liturgical year. I have always loved this time of year. In my view it is the most beautiful time of the year. Everyone is looking forward to Christmas. Christmas decorations are outside and lit up. This is the darkest

time of the year at our latitude. Thanksgiving, Christmas and the New Year help turn what would be an otherwise very cold and depressing time into a time of light and warmth.

Of course liturgically speaking it isn't Christmas yet. We have begun the season of Advent. Advent is a time of preparation. I remember in seminary, the liturgy fascists would get a bit extreme on that point during the season. God help you if you had a Christmas decoration up or any Christmas joy in your heart before the stroke of midnight on December 25. Well, I am not a liturgy fascist. In case there is any doubt: while liturgically we are in the season of Advent, you all have my expressed permission to have Christmas joy in your hearts. You also have my permission enjoy the Christmas decorations and even set some up yourself. Not only do you have my permission, I encourage you to do so. You bet I will be doing so!

Notwithstanding the above, we must remember that the Church does give us the Season of Advent in order to prepare our hearts and minds for the coming of Christ. Advent is approximately four weeks. The time is marked by an Advent wreath. The wreath has four candles: three are purple, one is pink. Some Advent wreaths also have a white candle in the center. In the first two weeks of Advent we focus in general on preparing for the coming of Christ whether that be his birth or his second coming. The third week of Advent strikes a major change in the tenor of the readings and season. That is why the pink candle is lit on the third week. The lighting of the pink candle emphasizes this change in tone. Our preparation becomes more specific: we now must focus on preparing our hearts and minds for the birth of Christ. The white candle you see in the center of some wreaths represents Christ. Some parishes will light that candle on Christmas to signify the birth of Christ.

Unfortunately businesses have capitalized on this time of year. I don't blame business for that. *The business of business is business*. If you understand that adage you understand business. Business would not capitalize on this time of year if there were no market that allows and encourages them to do so. Consider the following illustration: Mr. Spacely of Spacely Space Sprockets manufactures, you guessed it... sprockets. During this time of the year he has a lot of people who want to buy his sprockets. How long will he be in business if he does not

capitalize on that? My point is this: everyone complains about the commercialization of Christmas. No one seems to realize that we are the reason Christmas has been hijacked by the retail industry. When we point an accusing finger at business for hijacking the holiday, three fingers are pointed right back at us.

I am a reasonable person. I don't expect things to radically change. I don't expect that businesses are going to magically stop commercializing Christmas. For that matter, I don't expect you to stop patronizing businesses during this season. Just as a business owner would be a fool to not capitalize on the season, so also you would be fools not to take advantage of a good deal. Notwithstanding that, I would encourage you to make sure you do not forget to adequately prepare your hearts and minds for the birth of Christ. Do not get so caught up in the hustle and bustle of the season that you forget what the season is really about. Sandy Clause, Frosty the Snowman and Rudolph are all well and good. Getting good deals is all well and good. Turkey and smashed potatoes are great, Lobster Tail with drawn butter is even better. By all means have fun and enjoy these things if you wish.

But remember to get to Confession. If you have time to wait in line at a store for a good deal, then you have time to go to Confession. Anyone who has been to Confession to me knows that it is no muss no fuss. You confess your sins and you are on your way. I don't do complicated liturgies and rites or make it difficult. I make it easy.

I recommend to most people that you should go to Confession twice a year: Advent and Lent. You can take advantage of the Penance services that are held. One will be held at Saint Peter's on Thursday, December 13 at 7:00PM. The other will be held at Holy Child in Mansfield on December 20 at 7:00PM. I will also hold one for Saint Thomas in Elkland in Wednesday, December 19 at 7:00. Going to Confession is one of the simplest and best ways to prepare your hearts and minds for the coming of Christ. Remember also that if you have time to shop you also have time to get to Mass. Jesus does not make things hard for us, he makes it easy. Just get to Confession and make certain you are getting to Mass. Enjoy the season and shop. Just don't forget about why the season exists.

That's the way it is!

ADVENT SEASON

Beginning the Church's liturgical year, Advent (from, "ad-venire" in Latin or "to come to") is the season encompassing the four Sundays (and weekdays) leading up to the celebration of Christmas. Advent is a time of preparation for the coming of the Lord. In this season, we recall two central elements of our faith: the final coming of the Lord in glory and the incarnation of the Lord in the birth of Jesus. The key themes of the Advent season are watchful waiting, preparation, and justice. In this new liturgical year, the Gospel of Luke will be the primary Gospel proclaimed (Lectionary Cycle C).

The Advent Wreath -

Advent devotions including the Advent wreath, remind us of the meaning of the season. Traditionally, Advent wreaths are constructed of a circle of evergreen branches into which four candles are inserted, representing the four weeks of



Advent. Ideally, three candles are purple and one is rose, but white candles can also be used. The purple candles in particular symbolize the prayer, penance, and preparatory sacrifices and goods works undertaken at this time. The rose candle is lit on the third Sunday, Gaudete Sunday, when the priest also wears rose vestments at Mass; Gaudete Sunday is the Sunday of rejoicing, because the faithful have arrived at the midpoint of Advent, when their preparation is now half over and they are close to Christmas.

The progressive lighting of the candles symbolizes the expectation and hope surrounding our Lord's first coming into the world and the anticipation of his second coming to judge the living and the dead.

ADVENT MATERIAL

There is a wide selection of free Advent material on the handout table on the side of the church to enrich your Advent season. Please feel free to take a few for your family. **Blessing Of An Advent Wreath --** The use of the Advent Wreath is a traditional practice which has found its place in the Church as well as in the home. The blessing of an Advent Wreath takes place on the First Sunday of Advent or on the evening before the First Sunday of Advent.

When the blessing of the Advent Wreath is celebrated in the home, it is appropriate that it be blessed by a parent or another member of the family.

All make the sign of the cross as the leader says: Our help is in the name of the Lord.

Response: Who made heaven and earth.

Then the Scripture, Isaiah 9: (lines 1-2 and 5-6) or Isaiah 63 (lines 16-17 & 19) or Isaiah 64 (lines 2-7) is read:

Reader: The Word of the Lord.

Response: Thanks be to God.

With hands joined, the leader says:

Lord our God, we praise you for your Son, Jesus Christ: he is Emmanuel, the hope of the peoples, he is the wisdom that teaches and guides us, he is the Savior of every nation.

Lord God, let your blessing come upon us as we light the candles of this wreath.

May the wreath and its light be a sign of Christ's promise to bring us salvation.

May he come quickly and not delay.

We ask this through Christ our Lord.

Response: Amen.

The blessing may conclude with a verse from "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel":

> O come, desire of nations, bind in one the hearts of humankind; bid ev'ry sad division cease and be thyself our Prince of peace. Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel shall come to thee, O Israel.
