### **Liturgical Reflection** 8<sup>th</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time FIRST READING: Sirach 27:4-7

The First Reading presents a series of wisdom sayings that speak of finding out what really lies in peoples' hearts. They can put on a false front that hides what is inside of them, yet it is when they speak and when they are tested by adversity that whatever lies inside is revealed. This theme will be continued in the Gospel where it speaks of good trees bearing good fruit and bad trees bearing bad fruit, continuing the tree imagery seen here.

#### **RESPONSORIAL PSALM: 92**

The Responsorial Psalm also continues the tree imagery. The just will be like the palm tree, large, fruitful, and visible from a distance and like the cedar of Lebanon, which was a common symbol in the Old Testament for strength and beauty. This is a wisdom psalm that calls us to choose a righteous path. We have to choose to live in God's ways and reject anything that might distract us from our true goal. We must praise and thank God, placing him at the center of our lives and our love.

### SECOND READING: 1 Corinthians 15:54-58

Paul also reflects on the harvest of our sinful nature or of our virtue. Those who are embedded in the life of sin and corruption, are destined for death. For those who are "steadfast and persevering," death wins no definitive victory; the harvest is eternal life. The good people, who are "fully engaged in the work of the Lord," know their toil is not in vain. They shall bear fruit for eternal life.

#### GOSPEL: Luke 6:39-45



The Gospel, like the First Reading, contains a series of wisdom sayings. The first is about a blind person leading a blind person. It reminds us to be careful in choosing our

spiritual guides and to choose someone who truly believes in the truth. The second saying concerns judging others and ignoring one's own faults. We often hate in others what we see in ourselves. We should be brutally honest with ourselves and deal with our own problems before we set about to solve the problems of the world. Finally, there is a saying about bearing good fruit. Sometimes it is difficult to decide whether a person is in the right. Jesus counsels us to watch for the fruit that they bear. If the fruit is division and discord, then something is wrong. If it is compassion and love, then such a person is truly in the Lord. We have an excellent guide in Jesus, who instructs us with confidence. The excellent teacher tells us that "from the fullness of the heart the mouth speaks."

On Saturday, March 16<sup>th</sup>, the Knights of Columbus will host a Faith and Healing Retreat at St. Peter's Church. The retreat will include Mass, Adoration, Confession,

Discussion, Rosary, Angelus, and a Healing Service.

A video presentation of Salvation is from the Jew by Roy Schoeman will be shown. Roy Schoeman was born of Jewish parent who had fled Nazi Germany. Midway through his career as a Harvard professor, he received the grace of several supernatural experiences that resulted in his totally unanticipated and enthusiastic conversion to Christianity. Following his conversion he became active in Catholic evangelization, Catholic TV, and Catholic writing. He is also a popular guest on EWTN shows. In his talks, Roy weaves together his personal witness testimony with discussion of the role of Judaism in salvation history from the beginning to end of time, as illumined in Catholic doctrine. This gives the listener a deeper understanding of Judaism, both as a religion and as a central component of Christian salvation, and sheds light on the unfolding of salvation history leading up to the Second Coming.

### News from the Vatican



### LENTEN MESSAGE CALLS FOR CONVERSION

In his message for Lent, Pope Francis warns that once God's law is forsaken, the law of the strong over the weak takes over. Pope Francis is calling on the faithful not to let the Lenten season

of grace pass in vain, and to live as children of God acknowledging and obeying His law, in particular in regards to our brothers and sisters and to creation.

In this year's Lenten message, the Pope invites believers to prepare to celebrate the paschal mystery with mind and heart renewed, warning that "Sin leads man to consider himself the god of creation, to see himself as its absolute master and to use it, not for the purpose willed by the Creator but for his own interests."

The Pope's Lenten message was released on Tuesday and the theme chosen this year is "For the creation waits with eager longing for the revealing of the children of God" (Rom 8:19)

"Let us leave behind our selfishness and selfabsorption, and turn to Jesus' Pasch. Let us stand beside our brothers and sisters in need, sharing our spiritual and material goods with them." This is one of the key passages of Pope Francis' Lenten Message for 2019. Reflecting on a verse from St. Paul's Letter to the Romans, the Pope highlights how the season before Easter must be a time to "welcome Christ's victory over sin and death into our lives," and attract "its transforming power to all of creation."

Appealing to the faithful to not allow this season of grace to pass in vain, Pope Francis says that if, the Lent of the Son of God was an entry into the desert of creation to make it become again that garden of communion with God that it was before the original sin. Christians today are invited to embody the paschal mystery more deeply and concretely in their personal, family and social lives, above all by fasting, prayer and almsgiving.

Fasting, the Pope says, means turning away from the temptation to "devour" everything to satisfy our voracity; prayer teaches us to abandon idolatry and the self-sufficiency of our ego; almsgiving, whereby we escape from the insanity of hoarding everything for ourselves in the illusory belief that we can secure a future that does not belong to us. If we follow this journey, he said it "is possible to rediscover the joy of God's plan for creation and for each of us, which is to love him, our brothers and sisters, and the entire world, and to find in this love our true happiness."

The path to Easter demands that "we renew our faces and hearts as Christians through repentance, conversion and forgiveness," the Pope said, pointing out that it is a call that involves the whole of creation. This "eager longing," this expectation of all creation, Pope Francis says, will be fulfilled in the revelation of the children of God, that is, when Christians and all people enter decisively into the "travail" that conversion entails.

### **Pro Life News**

Be the Voice of the Voiceless - "Today we stand before new challenges that call us to be the voice of the voiceless. The child growing in its mother's womb and people who are in their declining years are a claim for dignified life that cries out to heaven and that cannot but make us shudder. The liberalization and routinization of abortion practices are abominable crimes, just as are genetic and embryonic manipulation, euthanasia. unethical medical testing, capital punishment, and many other ways of assaulting the dignity and life of the human being. If we want to maintain a solid and inviolable basis for human rights, we absolutely must recognize that human life must always be defended from the very moment of conception. Otherwise, the circumstances and conveniences of the powerful will always find excuses for abusing persons." Cardinal Bergoglio of Buenos Aires (now Pope Francis) 2007

### That's The Way It Is



"Unplanned" is the name of a movie set to be released on March 29th. The movie tells the story of one Abby Johnson. Abby Johnson was born in 1980 and is 38 years old. She was raised in a conservative home and raised to be pro-life. Despite the values her parents

instilled in her, she found her way to Planned Parenthood when she was in college. At the time, Johnson had never heard of Planned Parenthood, nor was she aware that they performed abortions. Amazingly, Planned Parenthood told Johnson that they wanted to reduce the number of abortions. In 2001, Johnson became a volunteer for Planned Parenthood. Johnson, notwithstanding her upbringing, described herself as extremely pro-abortion. She eventually worked her way to becoming the director of the Planned Parenthood clinic in Byron Texas.

Johnson was turned off by pro-life activists. Given her experience, I can understand why. During her time at Planned Parenthood, she escorted women who came for abortions and was heckled by the pro-life activists. She also received death threats from those who claim to be pro-life. Before I continue: please tell me I do not need to state the obvious: no one who understands what it is to be pro-life would make death threats, nor would they heckle women who come to Planned Parenthood. Let me make it clear: a person who calls themselves pro-life yet behaves in such a manner is about as "prolife" as a pro-abortion Catholic, is, well, "Catholic." Said Johnson of her experience with "pro-life" activists: "It's very scary, this group of people that claim to be these peaceful prayer warriors, or whatever they call themselves, it's kind of ironic that some of them would be sending death threats." Indeed. Johnson did such a great job for Planned Parenthood that she was named employee of the year 2008.

Johnson converted and is now pro-life. What changed her? Well, it turns out that she claims to have assisted on an ultrasound abortion procedure for a 13 week old fetus. Planned Parenthood, however, challenges those claims and says there is no record of such a procedure taking place on the day she alleges she assisted on the procedure. Planned Parenthood also claims that they would not have asked her to assist in the procedure in the first place. Planned Parenthood also alleges that she resigned four days after being placed on a performance review. They further allege that she stole confidential files and documents. Johnson denies doing so.

Who is telling the truth? For the sake of argument, I will give Planned Parenthood the benefit of the doubt in this case. What is not in question is that at some point,

something happened that caused Johnson to become pro-life. What is not in question is that she resigned her position at the clinic and is now a pro-life activist. What is not in question is that she had two abortions before the birth of her daughter. What is not in question that Johnson and her husband converted to the Catholic Faith in 2012. For a brief time her and her husband were Episcopalian but found themselves ostracized by the Church after becoming pro-life. Finally, what is not in question is that Johnson founded a ministry "And Then There Were None." This ministry is directed to those who work in abortion clinics and seeks to help them leave the industry.

"Unplanned" is a movie that tells Johnson's story. The movie, ironically, is rated R because it recreates some scenes of the abortion procedure. Yes-you read that right: the movie is rated R because of those scenes. Given the fact that movies rated PG-13 have violence. light sexual content and bad language, the fact that this movie is rated R just because it recreates scenes from abortion procedures is a bit of a left-handed compliment to pro-lifers. The fact that the movie is rated R is an implicit affirmation of what pro-lifers have been saying all along: abortion is an act of violence. Abortion is an act of violence against an innocent human life. Words like "choice" "freedom" and "health care" are just euphemisms abortion supporters employ to make abortion sound like something it isn't.

I don't know whether the movie will be released in our area. I don't even know if it will be good. Notwithstanding, I recommend that you see it if you can. If it is not released in our area, my hope is that it will eventually be released on home media applications such as DVD, Amazon on Demand or Netflix. If you happen to support abortion, please: take the time to see the movie. What is the absolute worst that will happen? You will come away regretting that you spent \$10 dollars on a bad movie and wasted two or so hours of your life. So what? The best that could happen—is you come away understanding better what it really means to be pro-life and rethink your support of abortion rights.



### LENT IS COMING


