Sacramental Information

Baptisms - Parents anticipating the birth of their first child are asked to attend baptismal instructions classes before the birth of their child, if possible. Note: Baptisms cannot be scheduled until all the necessary paperwork is completed. Contact the Rectory to schedule.

Confirmation - Confirmation is administered every year to all 8th grade students in our Parish Religious Education program. Children wishing to receive Confirmation must be enrolled and participating in the program for two years before they are eligible to receive the sacrament.

Marriages- In order to complete the necessary paperwork, couples are asked to contact the Rectory at least one full year in advance of the proposed marriage date.

Liturgical Reflection

6th Sunday of Easter FIRST READING: Acts 15:1-2, 22-29

Today we hear of the pivotal meeting in Jerusalem. While in his letters Paul often asserts his authority as an Apostle, here we see him acknowledging a higher authority within the Church as he and Barnabas set out for Jerusalem to consult with Peter, James, and other elders of that local church. This gathering does not put an end to the Mosaic Law; rather, it exempts the Gentiles from becoming Jews so that they may become followers of Jesus Christ.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Psalm 67

This psalm is a hymn of Thanksgiving based upon the blessing of Aaron found in the Book of Numbers (6:24). It celebrates God's abundant blessings on Israel, but calls upon all nations on the earth to give praise to the Lord. God's blessing upon Israel was a model of the way that God would now treat all the peoples upon the earth. They were now all his chosen people, all his beloved.

SECOND READING: Revelation 21:10-14, 22-23

This chapter of the Book of Revelation speaks of the passing away of the old creation, which is replaced by a new heaven and a new earth. This vision of Jerusalem is glorious, perfect, whole, and complete. The twelve tribes are represented by the Twelve Apostles. The city does not need a temple because the presence of God and the Lamb make the entire city a temple of the Divine. God no longer dwells in a house of stone, but in the hearts of his people.

GOSPEL: John 14:23-29



The Gospel emphasizes the sending of the Holy Spirit, the Paraclete, that will remain with the community always. John's community had great faith that the Spirit was still with them. Jesus is

about to surrender his life and soon thereafter will return to the Father. In this discourse, set within the context of his final meal with them, Jesus offers assurance that they will lose nothing of what they've learned because another Advocate, "the Holy Spirit," will come to help them remember and understand all that Jesus taught them. But first, Jesus again the teacher, reminds the disciples that there is no love without obedience. Anyone who keeps his Words receives the Father's love and becomes a living tabernacle, a place where God can dwell. Jesus promises peace to those who keep his Word. In receiving the Spirit, we receive the peace of Christ. There is a great deal in human life designed to cause unrest and to even destroy peace. The offering of the sign of peace in the Mass, reminds us that we are given the peace of Christ and commanded to share it.

This Monday is Memorial Day. In honor of our country, emergency responders, fire fighters, police and military we sing patriotic hymns on this weekend. This is a weekend to pray for our country. Despite the problems we face as a nation

I believe that we are the greatest nation on earth. Nowhere else do people enjoy the freedoms we enjoy. Nowhere else do people have the opportunities to achieve wealth and success that they do in the United States. Nowhere else can someone aspire to hold the highest office in the land: the US Presidency. Consider: if you want to be president, all you have to do is run a good campaign and convince enough the American people to vote for you. That is it. You don't have to be royalty; you don't have to be born into a political dynasty. You don't even need experience in politics. Anyone can be the president.

The freedoms we enjoy, however, come at a great price. People have given their lives in service of our country to keep our country free. People continue to give their lives so that we can enjoy something as simple as the right to worship our God as we see fit. Freedom is not free; nothing is free. Nothing valuable, nothing worth having is free. Things of true and lasting value always come at a great price. In our case, no amount of gold or money can purchase freedom. Freedom comes only at the price of blood. For that reason, on Memorial Day, we take time to remember all those who give their lives to provide that freedom. At Mass, we take time to remember them in our prayers. We also ask God to bless our nation and guide us. What the Feast of All Souls is to the Catholic Church, Memorial Day is to our nation: a time to remember the deceased, especially those who serve in the military.

Notwithstanding the solemnity of Memorial Day, I have fond memories of the day growing up. Usually the sun was out on Memorial Day making for a beautiful day. We attended Mass as a family in the morning. After Mass, we would go to the Memorial Day parade. I played the Trumpet and then later the Baritone. The Nativity B.V.M. band marched in the parade. After the parade my father would take my brothers and I to the Odd Fellows Cemetery in Pottsville. Four generations of Bechtel's are buried there, including my grandfather. My Father would teach us the history of each of the generations. He would plant a Geranium at each of the plots. Women would get a white Geranium, men a red Geranium. My father still does this. My brothers will go with him if they do not have to work. Of course I have to work on Memorial Day so I cannot be present

anymore. My last year of teaching at SJNRA, I made sure to go home on Memorial Day because I knew once I was a pastor I would not be able to be home on Memorial Day anymore. After we were finished at the cemetery, we would go home and then have a picnic that my mother prepared while we were at the cemetery.

I think for many people, despite the solemnity of the day, Memorial Day can be a day for family and friends to get together and enjoy each other's company. Memorial Day opens the summer. A lot of people have picnics. School is winding down and a lot of the students are looking forward to the summer recess. We all know what it was like when we were students on the cusp of summer recess. That was a magical time. Anything and everything was possible. Seniors in high school are simultaneously excited and apprehensive. They are excited because they are getting ready to graduate and move on to the next chapter of their life. They are apprehensive for the same reason. Around this time of the year, the most memorable event of the school year takes place as well, namely, the Prom.

The point is that Memorial Day is a solemn day where we take time to remember and honor those who have given their lives in service of our country to provide our freedom. It is a day that we thank God for the freedoms we enjoy and ask God to preserve our nation and bless us. But Memorial Day also falls during what is in my opinion the most beautiful time of the year, and the most exciting time of the year for many people. The day, therefore, is simultaneously solemn yet joyful. It is in many ways, a perfect day.

God Bless America, God bless our military, police, fire fighters, emergency responders and their families. May those who have given the ultimate sacrifice for our country rest in peace. May God preserve and protect our nation. May our nation be a beacon of light to the world and the bastion of liberty.

Priests for Life

Reflection on Today's Readings- The readings today instruct us that as a fruit of the Resurrection, we enjoy the presence of Christ forever, through his Holy Spirit. That Spirit both enlightens us interiorly and as a society, bringing about peace and right relationships.

The truth that the Spirit brings, first of all, is one with the word of Jesus and the Father, as the Gospel passage explains. No "new gospel" can come along under the purported inspiration of the Spirit. No such inspiration will contradict the settled teachings of the Church. Jesus says the Spirit will "remind" us of what he said. Such reminders are necessary as we journey through history, and through periods, as in our day, when certain trends obscure fundamental truths, such as that of the sanctity of life. When influences in society like the decisions of government or the messages of mass media line up against the sanctity of life, the Spirit "reminds" the faithful and the Church of the truth about life and how it is to be respected.

The Spirit guides not only individuals, in whom God resides (as the Gospel passage indicates), but also the community, as the first reading demonstrates. Moreover, the guidance, or light, of God will be the center of the community in the world to come. That is why the Second Reading indicates that there is "no need of sun or moon to shine on" the new Jerusalem, because "the glory of God gave it light and its lamp was the Lamb." The truth of God is what holds his people together, and brings the peace of which Jesus speaks in the Gospel. This truth is the foundation of the right relationships between us, including our relationships with the youngest and most vulnerable members of the human family.

"We pray for those who live with severe illness. Let us always safeguard life, God's gift, from its beginning until its natural end. Let us not give in to a throwaway culture." Pope Francis

DO YOU KNOW?

Why do Catholics believe the Catholic Church is the one true Church, founded 2,000 years ago by Jesus Christ Himself?

The Catholic Church is the only church today that can claim to be the one church founded by Jesus Christ 2,000 years ago. Other denominations can trace their origins back to various human founders at a later date in history.

Where does the Pope get his authority to lead the Church on earth? What do Catholics believe about 'apostolic succession'?

Matthew 16:18 is key to understanding Christ's intent to pass on the authority to lead the Church to Peter and the apostles. Christ tells Peter that he is the rock on which He will build His church. When Catholics use the term apostolic succession, they are referring to the line of bishops that stretches all the way back to the apostles—to Peter—the first Pope. Apostolic tradition (the authentic teaching of the apostles) was handed from Christ to the apostles, and from them to their successors. This unbroken line of popes, the bishops of Rome, have guided the Church for the past 2,000 years, just as Christ intended (Matthew 28:19-20). Christ sent His apostles out into the world with authority to teach and heal (Luke 9:1-2) and to forgive sins (John 20:23). This God-given authority is exercised by the bishops within the Catholic Church to this day.

News from the Vatican



LORD'S PRAYER CONFRONTS FULL RANGE OF EVIL

Pope Francis focuses his catechesis at the Wednesday General Audience on the final petition of the Lord's Prayer, saying Jesus is at our side to deliver us

from all manner of evil. "Christian prayer does not close its eyes on life," said Pope Francis. "It is a filial prayer, not an infantile one."

Reflecting on the final petition of the Lord's prayer, he said Jesus invites us to ask God to "deliver us from evil" because "life is fraught with difficulty." "If these last lines of the Our Father were excluded, how could sinners, the persecuted, and desperate and dying souls pray?" he asked.

Pope Francis then reflected at length on the presence of evil in the world. He said the word used in the original Greek (π ov η p ϕ ς) evokes "the presence of evil that seeks to grab hold and bite at us, and from which we ask God for delivery." "History books are a bleak catalogue of how our existence in this world has often been a failed adventure." There is a mysterious evil, he said, "which is surely not the work of God, but which silently penetrates the folds of history." But, the Pope noted, the person who prays is not blind and sees clearly that evil is in contradiction with the mystery of God.

"The last cry of the Our Father is hurled against this evil," he said, "which encompasses the most diverse experiences, including mourning, the suffering of innocents, slavery, the exploitation of others, and the cries of innocent children." Covering the full range of evil, the Lord's Prayer is like "a symphony that seeks to be fulfilled in each of us."

Pope Francis said Jesus' experience of death on the cross fulfilled the prayer he taught his disciples: "Father forgive them for they know not what they do." No matter how much we are subjected to wickedness, Jesus will be at our side to save us. "Jesus' prayer leaves us the most precious inheritance: the presence of the Son of God who delivers us from evil," he said. "From Jesus' forgiveness on the cross flows peace. True peace comes from the cross; it is the gift of the Risen One."

HOLY SEE REITERATES PROMOTION AND DEFENSE OF FAMILY

The Holy See is calling for the promotion of the family as the "fundamental and basic unit of all societies", saying its defense needs to be sustained for the common good of our world community. "The family, after all, is, in many ways, the first school of how to be human and at the same time the family is the centre and the heart of what Paul VI called 'the civilization of love'," said

Archbishop Ivan Jurkovic, Holy See's Permanent Representative to the United Nations and Other International Organizations in Geneva, on Tuesday. He was addressing an interreligious conference on families organized by the World Council of Churches (WCC) in view of the May 15th UN International Day of Families. *Family for peaceful civilization*

The archbishop expressed concern that "today, too little attention is given to the importance and to the potential of fruitful interchange between generations and to family values." Individualism appears at odds with the family as a community of persons, and as the initial social unit, he said. Asserting that "the family remains always the cell of society, and the primary place of education," the Vatican diplomat noted that the family's "fundamental role for a peaceful civilization finds itself increasingly challenged". However, the fact that families continue to remarkably witness to those values that constitute the foundation of the institution of the family, is a balm of true fraternity that is so much needed in today's world.

Weakening generation bonds

Archbishop Jurkovic pointed out that harsh difficulties such as economic crisis and poverty make it difficult for families to maintain intergenerational bonds as in the past. "The lack of family ties and solidarity nourished by altruism and forgiveness" could lead to dramatic situations. "As family ties break down," he said, "millions of children and youth are left without the proper and necessary guidance and are increasingly exposed to risks such as dropping out of school, forced labor, and sexual exploitation."

Synod - School of humanity

He pointed out that the Synod on the Family, in 2014 and 2015, underscored the centrality of the family as the true "school of humanity" which is much needed today. In fact, he said, it is in the family that a person learns endurance, the joy of work, fraternal love, and generosity in forgiving others and, above all, the offering of one's life at the service of the others. Hence the desire to marry and form a family needs to be strengthened in order that its fundamental role for society may be rediscovered. Archbishop Jurkovic urged for greater cooperation and concerted actions to strengthen family-centered policies and programs.

"The peace of Jesus is a gift. We cannot obtain it through human means. The peace of Jesus is something else: the peace of Jesus teaches us to endure. To endure is to carry life on our shoulders, our difficulties, our work, everything, and to have the courage to go forward."
