

#### **Sacramental Information**

**Baptisms** - Parents anticipating the birth of their first child are asked to attend baptismal instructions classes before the birth of their child, if possible. Note: Baptisms cannot be scheduled until all the necessary paperwork is completed. Contact the Rectory to schedule.

**Confirmation -** Confirmation is administered every year to all 8<sup>th</sup> grade students in our Parish Religious Education program. Children wishing to receive Confirmation must be enrolled and participating in the program for two years before they are eligible to receive the sacrament.

**Marriages-** In order to complete the necessary paperwork, couples are asked to contact the Rectory at least one full year in advance of the proposed marriage date.

**Anointing of the Sick -** Please contact the Rectory if a member of your family has become sick or hospitalized.

**Monthly Visitations -** Any parishioner who is homebound and wishes to receive the Eucharist on a monthly basis is asked to contact the Rectory to schedule a visit.

#### PRAYER SHAWL MINISTRY NEEDS YOUR HELP

Do you knit or crochet? If so, please consider helping someone in need of your love by making them a simple prayer shawl. When they are alone or cold, when they need to feel the love of someone who cares, they can snuggle under a prayer shawl. Directions are simple and easy. Knitting: use needles size 11 or 13, cast between 54-63 stitches, knit 3, purl 3 to end of row, repeat. Crocheting: use a size P hook, chaining 48 loosely hooks, turn and double chain and repeat. The shawl should measure approx. 50" x 24" and optional fringe can be added to each end. Variegated Lion Brand yarn is wonderful to use. Yarn can be provided.

A beautiful testimony: A lady was in treatment for breast cancer and was gifted a prayer shawl, which brought her to tears. She would wrap up in it when she needed courage and strength, or to feel warm or love of the person who made it for her. She stated that it was a comfort and a prayer every time she wrapped up in it. That was 15 years ago and she still has her shawl, and it has comforted many since, as when she was finished with treatment and working in her office, it would be folded in a chair and often people would reach for it and hold it and she would know God's love was still at work. # **Liturgical Reflection**

20<sup>th</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time FIRST READING: Jeremiah 38:4-6, 8-10

Jeremiah again undergoes one of many sufferings as a result of his fidelity in proclaiming God's prophetic word to the people. His words of God's judgment and punishment for their sinfulness are continually rejected as the people take their anger out on Jeremiah personally, often endangering his life. Jeremiah, despite constant danger, trusted in the Lord and faithfully spoke God's words. God had warned Jeremiah that his prophetic words would lead some to "fight against you, but not prevail over you" (1:19). While constantly challenged in his ministry, Jeremiah continued to trust in the Lord and in today's passage, God once again save Jeremiah to preach again. How do you handle opposition and rejection for believing and trusting in God?

#### **RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Psalm 40**

The Responsorial Psalm celebrates the fact that God delivers us from all of our difficulties. This is especially significant today, for the First Reading and Gospel speak of the fact that we will suffer if we give witness to the world of God in our lives. When we suffer we wonder, like the psalmist, when God will intervene. This psalm reminds us to trust in God who will deliver us.

#### **SECOND READING: Hebrews 12:1-4**

Addressing the opposition to their faith, values, and lifestyle, the author of the Letter to the Hebrews counsels that faith community to consider the suffering that Jesus experienced during his lifetime and learn from it so "that you may not grow weary and lose heart." Jesus endured the Cross, despised its shame and rightly took "his seat at the right of the throne of God." "We are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses" who ran the race before us and despite the difficulties persevered in their faith while keeping their eye on Jesus, "the leader and perfecter of faith." In similar manner, we too are to shed all sin and all that burdens us and persevere in the faith, running steadily towards the prize, total union with Jesus at God's right hand.

#### **GOSPEL: Luke 12:49-53**



Luke's Jesus knows that his mission and ministry will bring opposition, rejection, and suffering. It will divide families, cause disruption and havoc in community groupings and bring division instead of peace. Aware of all this, Jesus longs to "set the earth on fire" with God's Kingdom, proclaiming a way of relating that is countercultural and contrary to the normal way of thinking and acting. In doing so, Jesus

will have to undergo the Baptism of rejection, suffering, and death, trusting that it will lead to ultimate victory. Despite all the rejection and suffering that will result from this ministry, both personally and to his followers, Jesus is determined to be faithful throughout bringing to completion and fulfillment God's Kingdom. As disciples we too are challenged to take up the same mission and ministry.

## **News from the Vatican**



# BE READY FOR THE FINAL ENCOUNTER WITH THE LORD

Pope Francis reflected on last Sunday's Gospel and on Jesus' call to be vigilant and to "light our lamps" as we

await the final encounter with the Father.

Jesus tells His disciples to "gird your loins and light your lamps." Pope Francis described this image as one that "recalls the attitude of the pilgrim, ready to set out on a journey." "It is a question of not putting down roots in comfortable and reassuring dwellings," he said, "but of abandoning oneself with simplicity and trust to the will of God, who guides us towards the next goal."

By reminding us to "light our lamps," Jesus invites us "to live an authentic and mature faith, capable of illuminating the many 'nights' of life," continued the Pope. "The lamp of faith needs to be nourished continuously, with a heart to heart encounter with Jesus in prayer, and in listening to His Word." "True faith opens the heart to one's neighbor," he said, "and spurs us on to concrete communion with our brothers and sisters, especially with those in need."

In Luke's Gospel, Jesus describes the servants awaiting the return of their master as an example of remaining vigilant. We need to be ready "for the final and definitive encounter with the Lord," added Pope Francis. "Blessed are those servants whom the master finds vigilant on his arrival." With these words, "the Lord reminds us that life is a journey towards eternity," said the Pope. "Every moment becomes precious, so we must live and act on this earth having a longing for Heaven in our hearts."

"If we live in harmony with the Gospel and God's commandments," continued Pope Francis, "He will allow us to share in His eternal happiness." Although "we cannot really understand what this supreme joy will be like," said the Pope, Jesus offers us an image of the master who, finding his servants still awake on his return, "will have them recline at table, and proceed to wait on them." It is as though everything in Heaven will be reversed, said the Pope: "It will no longer be the servants, namely, us, who will serve God, but God will put Himself at our service."

May the thought of the final encounter with the Father "fill us with hope," concluded Pope Francis. May it stimulate us to a constant commitment to becoming holy, "and to building a more just and fraternal world." *Vatican News* 

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# US BISHOPS CALL FOR RESPONSIBLE GUN LAWS AFTER SERIES OF MASS SHOOTINGS

The Catholic Bishops of the United States renew calls for responsible gun laws and more resources to address the root causes of violence, after a series of mass shootings that left 29 people dead in just a few hours.

"Something remains fundamentally evil in our society when locations where people congregate to engage in the everyday activities of life can, without warning, become scenes of violence and contempt for human life." US bishops expressed that conviction this weekend in a statement that followed a mass shooting in the US state of Texas on Saturday and shortly before another in Ohio.

In a separate statement released after the Ohio shooting, Cardinal Daniel DiNardo and Bishop Frank Dewane say the pair of mass shootings reveals "a terrible truth." "We can never again believe that mass shootings are an isolated exception," the two Catholic bishops note. "They are an epidemic against life that we must, in justice, face."

Expressing their condolences to the victims' families, the US bishops urge preventative action in the form of "prayer and sacrifice for healing," as well as a renewed push for changes to gun laws. "We encourage Catholics to pray and raise their voices for needed changes to our national policy and national culture," they write.

The USCCB "has long advocated for responsible gun laws and increased resources for addressing the root causes of violence. Things must change."

### **Priests for Life**

Reflection on the Readings - We are destined, in this life, to be divided from at least some people, and today's readings urge us to be divided for the right reasons. Prejudice continues to raise walls between people. That is the division that happens all too naturally, and the conflict between the culture of life and the culture of death is largely a problem of prejudice against the unborn, the elderly, and the disabled. None of the reasons offered for abortion would be tolerated as reasons to kill the born; it is only because the victims are unborn that they become victims. Similarly, none of the reasons for killing the less functional people would be tolerated as reasons to kill the functioning; hence again, prejudice is revealed as the real problem.

When we stand against that prejudice, however, we get treated like Jeremiah. He was accused of "demoralizing the soldiers" because he was saying that the Babylonians, who were about to attack Jerusalem, could not be stopped because they were being used by God to punish his people. The problem was not military or political, Jeremiah said, but rather moral. In our day, when we point out the moral problems that stand at the foundation of so many other societal ills, we too will be rejected and mocked.

Moreover, issues like abortion will divide family members, as the Gospel promises, and will require us to resist sin even "to the point of shedding blood," as the second reading says. The blood to be shed, in other words, is our own, as we stand against the opposition that others will launch against us. The fact that so many people will say, "The opposition against me isn't that bad and I don't foresee that it will be" becomes in fact a good reason to stop worrying about what will happen to us when we fight for what is right.

Do you love to pray? But recently prayer seems dry, God seems distant, and you feel like you are in a spiritual desert? Lay Carmelites meet monthly, live by the Rule of St. Albert, study writings of Carmelite Saints, and participate fully in the Life of the Church. #### Notice Regarding Reporting Sexual Abuse of a Minor

It is the policy of the Diocese of Scranton to report any allegation of sexual abuse of a minor to law enforcement. If you are a victim of sexual abuse committed by a priest, deacon, religious or lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton, you are encouraged to immediately report the matter to law enforcement. If any priest, deacon, religious, lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton has cause or reason to suspect that a minor has been subjected to any form of abuse, including child sexual abuse, the matter will be reported to law enforcement. t is also the policy of the Diocese to adhere to all civil and state regulations. In accordance with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's Child Protective Services Laws, reports of suspected child abuse should also be made immediately by phone to the 24-HourChild Abuse hotline (ChildLine) at 1-800-932-0313 electronically at www.compass.state.pa.us/cwis To this end, the Diocese is equally committed to adhering to the norms of the Code of Canon Law and to upholding the tenets of the USCCB Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People, which includes supporting victims of sexual abuse in their pursuit of emotional and spiritual well-being. As such, information regarding an allegation of sexual abuse of a minor should also be reported to the Victim Assistance Coordinator, Mary Beth Pacuska at (570-862-7551).

#### DO YOU KNOW YOUR CATHOLIC FAITH?

Why do Catholics light votive candles?

Almost nothing says "Catholic" like votive candles, especially if they are placed before images or statues in a church setting. When a film or show wants the audience to know a character is Catholic, a rack of votive candles is sure to turn up.

At our Easter Vigil, when the priest enters the darkened church with the Easter candle, he intones, "Christ, our Light," to which the congregation replies, "Thanks be to God." This recalls how Jesus came into our world of sin and death to bring the light of God to us.

Besides being used to illuminate the places where the early Christians celebrated Mass, candles were also lighted at the tombs of martyrs. Father William Saunders explains that "there is evidence that lit candles or oil lamps were burned at the tombs of saints, particularly martyrs, by the 200s, and before sacred images and relics by the 300s." In this context the "light signifies our prayer offered in faith coming into the light of God. With the light of faith, we petition our Lord in prayer, or petition the saint to pray with us and for us to the Lord."

The word "vigil" comes from the Latin *vigilia* and refers to keeping watch. The vigil candle that is lit remains so for a period of time (either a certain number of hours or a few days) and symbolizes how the person desires "to remain present to the Lord in prayer even though we may depart and go about our daily business." It also reminds the individual how the saint is constantly praying for their petitions.

Another word for these candles is "votive" candle and comes from the Latin *votum*, meaning promise, dedication or prayer. It reinforces the idea that the candles represent our prayers before God.

As humans, we are body and soul and our prayers often need to be expressed in a physical, tangible way. This helps our soul be at rest and is a way to deepen our spirituality. Similar to incense, the light of the candles is a physical reminder that points our souls to God. We light them not because we believe our prayers will be better heard by God, but because we need something visual to connect our body and soul.


