## **Sacramental Information**

**Baptisms -** Parents anticipating the birth of their first child are asked to attend baptismal instructions classes before the birth of their child, if possible. Note: Baptisms cannot be scheduled until all the necessary paperwork is completed. Contact the Rectory to schedule.

**Confirmation -** Confirmation is administered every year to all 8<sup>th</sup> grade students in our Parish Religious Education program. Children wishing to receive Confirmation must be enrolled and participating in the program for two years before they are eligible to receive the sacrament.

**Marriages-** In order to complete the necessary paperwork, couples are asked to contact the Rectory at least one full year in advance of the proposed marriage date.

Anointing of the Sick - Please contact the Rectory if a member of your family has become sick or hospitalized. Monthly Visitations - Any parishioner who is homebound and wishes to receive the Eucharist on a monthly basis is asked to contact the Rectory to schedule a visit.



#### SCHEDULING 2020 MASS INTENTIONS

Scheduling Mass intentions for 2020 will begin on September  $3^{rd}$ , through the parish office, during regular business hours. The following are the established guidelines for scheduling intentions:

- 1. One weekend Mass on each weekend must be celebrated for the intentions of the parish. This is required by Canon Law (c. 534). Because of this we only have one weekend Mass for which we can accept an intention. Due to this limited availability of weekend Masses, no family may schedule more than ONE WEEKEND MASS PER QUARTER, or four weekend Masses per year.
- 2. There is no limit to the number of DAILY MASS INTENTIONS, including those Masses said at the nursing homes each month, which may be scheduled by each family.
- 3. Canon 948 states, "Separate Masses are to be applied for the intentions of those for whom a single offering, although small, has been given and accepted." Therefore, only one intention may be scheduled for any given Mass. However, for pastoral concerns to better accommodate the needs of the parishioners, we will adhere to the following: Up to three first names with the same last name (i.e. John, Paul and Mary Smith) or two last names only (i.e. Scott and Smith Families) will be allowed per intention.
- 4. The stipend given for a Mass intention is \$10. While we are willing to take requests over the phone, your Mass Intention will be not be scheduled until we are in receipt of your donation.
- 5. Christmas, Easter, Mother's Day, Father's Day, and All Souls Day Masses are always for the individual intentions listed by parishioners on their envelope.
- 6. The Sanctuary Candle, burning in memory or honor of someone, is available on a weekly basis with no limit to the number each family may reserve.

## **Liturgical Reflection** ~ 23<sup>rd</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time FIRST READING: Wisdom 9:13-18

The theme of today's First Reading and Gospel is that God's ways are far beyond our ways. The author of the Book of Wisdom begs the question: Who can know the wisdom of God? Mortal beings are timid and unsure as they search for what God intends. But the wisdom of God is imparted through the Holy Spirit. Those who receive this wisdom will stand in awe of God's wonder and providence and their path of life will be made straight.

#### **RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Psalm 90**

The Responsorial Psalm continues the theme of the wisdom of God and how his ways are far beyond our understanding. The psalm reminds us to open our hearts to the ways of the Lord and not get so caught up in our everyday lives that we forget to explore its spiritual dimension.

#### SECOND READING: Philemon 9-10, 12-17

Paul writes to Philemon asking him to accept Onesimus, a runaway slave whom Paul has met and converted to Christianity, and to continue the work of the Gospel. Paul writes from prison but accepts his situation because it is in the name of Jesus Christ and for the sake of the Gospel. Nonetheless, Paul is committed to doing what he can to continue the work of the Gospel through Philemon and Onesimus.

#### GOSPEL: Luke 14:25-33

Jesus teaches the difficult demands of being his disciples. This may have been one of the "hard sayings" that caused some to walk away from his mission. Jesus teaches that in order to follow him, one must leave all other claims on their time and energy. Even family obligations have to be reconsidered by those who choose to follow him. Following Christ not only requires placing him ahead of all other values and concerns, it also demands a willingness to carry our cross and suffer with him. It will sooner or later cost us all that we have, but we will acquire more than we ever hoped to receive.

# **NEWS FROM THE VATICAN**



## SERVE OTHERS FREELY, AS GOD FREELY LOVES YOU

In his homily at Mass in the Casa Santa Marta, Pope Francis reminds us that our relationship with God is completely gratuitous and requires

only that we open our hearts to His grace. "Give freely that which you have received freely," Pope Francis said.

Focusing his remarks on the Christian's relationship with God, the Pope noted that we are called to serve and love our brothers and sisters in the same way that God has done with us. Taking his cue from the day's Gospel (Mt 10:7-13) in which Jesus commissions the disciples to go out on mission, Pope Francis said Christians cannot remain stationary, since our way of life impels us to "hit the road, always." He said Jesus has already given us our mission: "As you go, make this proclamation: 'The kingdom of heaven is at hand.' Cure the sick, raise the dead, cleanse lepers, drive out demons."

"Christian life is for service. It saddens us to find Christians who at the beginning of their conversion, or awareness of being Christian, serve and are open to serve the people of God, but who later end up making use of the people of God. This causes much harm to God's people. Our vocation is to 'serve', not to 'make use of'."


Christian life, said Pope Francis, is lived gratuitously. "Without cost you have received; without cost you are to give," he said, was how Jesus described the core of salvation. He said salvation cannot be bought, because God "saves us free of charge" and "requires no payment."

As God has done with us, so we are to do with others, he said. "Realize that the Lord is full of gifts for us. He asks just one thing: that our hearts be open. When we say 'Our Father' and we pray, we open our heart, allowing this gratuitousness to enter. Often when we need some spiritual grace, we say: 'Well, now I will fast, do penance, pray a novena...' Fine, but be careful: this is not done to 'pay' or 'buy' grace. We do it to open our hearts so that grace might enter. Grace is freely given."

All God's gifts, said Pope Francis, are given without cost. And he warned that sometimes "the heart folds in on itself and remains closed", and it is no longer able to receive "such freely given love." We should not bargain with God, he said. Pope Francis then invited Christians, and especially pastors and bishops, to give freely and not try to sell God's graces. "It pains the heart," he said, when we see pastors "that make money off of God's grace: 'I can help you, but it will cost this much...""

"In our spiritual life we always run the risk of slipping up on the question of payment, even when speaking with the Lord, as if we needed to bribe the Lord. No! That is not the correct path... I make a promise, in order to expand my heart to receive what is already there, waiting for us free of charge. This relationship of gratuitousness with God is what will help us to have the same rapport with others, whether it be in Christian witness, Christian service, or the pastoral work of those who guide the people of God. We do so along the way. Christian life means walking. Preach and serve, but do not make use of others. Serve and give freely that which you have received freely. May our life of holiness be permeated by this openness of heart, so that the gratuitousness of God – the graces that He wishes to give us without cost – may enter our hearts."

# **Priests for Life**

Mother Teresa of Calcutta has been declared a saint by the Catholic Church. Back in 1994, she spoke at the National Prayer Breakfast in Washington, DC, and said the following words:

I feel that the greatest destroyer of peace today is abortion, because it is a war against the child, a direct killing of the innocent child, murder by the mother herself. And if we accept that a mother can kill even her own child, how can we tell other people not to kill one another? How do we persuade a woman not to have an abortion? As always, we must persuade her with love and we remind ourselves that love means to be willing to give until it hurts. Jesus gave even His life to love us. So, the mother who is thinking of abortion, should be helped to love, that is, to give until it hurts her plans, or her free time, to respect the life of her child. The father of that child, whoever he is, must also give until it hurts.

By abortion, the mother does not learn to love, but kills even her own child to solve her problems. And, by abortion, the father is told that he does not have to take any responsibility at all for the child he has brought into the world. That father is likely to put other women into the same trouble. So abortion just leads to more abortion. Any country that accepts abortion is not teaching its people to love, but to use any violence to get what they want. This is why the greatest destroyer of love and peace is abortion.

*Reflection on the Readings* - "Hating...even his own life." This is a strongly-worded condition of discipleship laid out in today's Gospel passage. It takes aim at the arrogance to which the original sin has left us so inclined. It is the idea that was presented to our first parents. "You will be like gods," the serpent said to them in the Garden of Eden. This original temptation was a promise that what was right and what was wrong would be up to us; that we could write our own moral law. That's what the "tree of the knowledge of good and evil" meant, and why Adam and Eve couldn't eat from it. We are all called to know good from evil, but not to decide it. To think we decide it is the error of the "pro-choice" mindset. "It's all up to me and my choice, even if it means killing a baby." This way of thinking, of course, leads to total chaos. On what basis do we tell people not to kill each other or steal from each other unless there are standards of right and wrong that apply to everyone no matter what they believe?

The temptation to abort is often couched in reasons and language that seem to invoke the Gospel's advice to count the cost before building a tower or marching with an army. Yet prudence does not give license to kill in order to get ourselves out of undesirable consequences of past actions. Prudence, instead, calls us to evaluate those consequences before we act, and in this sense, the Gospel's lesson is a call to chastity, and not to engage in sexual relations until we are ready to welcome a child in the context of marriage. Moreover, the Gospel is a call to calculate the cost of that renunciation of our own understanding, which the first reading also reflects. "Unsure are our plans." When a child in the womb seems to throw life's plans out of control, today's message of total trust in the God who knows more than we do is a life-saving message indeed.

# **DO YOU KNOW YOUR CATHOLIC FAITH?**

#### Why Do We Sit, Stand and Kneel at Mass?

**Why We Sit During the Mass** - Sitting is considered the base position of worship. We sit when we are listening to the first two readings. We also sit down after the Gospel reading, focused and attentively taking in the homily. We remain sitting while waiting for the Eucharistic elements to be prepared, a very meaningful gesture because we expectantly wait and rise when the priest is ready.

**Why We Stand During the Mass** - Standing has been considered the appropriate position for prayer since before Christ's time. When we stand, we are following this centuries old tradition. Standing is also a simple but profound way of honoring and respecting Jesus who is represented by the priest during Mass. During the Gospel reading, we stand up. The Gospel is the Word of God and to hear these is a great honor which is why we ascend from our base position of worship. We stand to acknowledge the significance of hearing God's very own words. **Why We Kneel During the Mass** - Kneeling is the most humble way of worshipping God during Mass. When we kneel, we completely submit and surrender ourselves to our Heavenly Father. We kneel during several parts of the Mass. This is an incredible act of faith and devotion because when we kneel, we acknowledge that Jesus is really coming. We kneel to recognize Jesus' presence in the Eucharistic elements after the priest says the Eucharistic Prayers.

During the mass, the priest is not just leading the celebration of the Eucharist, he is acting the role of Jesus. As Jesus, he leads us to do the different gestures, traditions and rituals that are part of the Catholic Mass Order. This is why we sit and stand when the priest sits and stands. The Mass is rich with meaning, every element and gesture represents something profound and beautiful. When we understand these different meanings and take them to heart, each moment we spend during Mass will certainly become more transformative and nourishing to our souls.
