It is important to understand that God calls us to give of ourselves to the poor.

You are a Missionary

The call to missionary life style is stated in scriptures. Matthew 28: 19-20 and Acts 1: 8 are just two of the many passages recorded that reflect the Christian duty, privilege, and challenge to share the love of Christ.

The New Testament clearly teaches that God has given us all gifts and that these are to be used to build up the body of Christ. So you have something to give! And you have something to share!

Your skills and willingness to serve will mean so much to the success of the team efforts! The experience will also mean a lot to you too! You will never be quite the same again. You will not regret making this journey.

Group Expectations

1) Respect for everyone involved which are team members, team leaders, and the Haitians.

2) Develop and maintain a servant attitude which is vital towards the Haitians and teammates.

3) Refrain from gossip and passing judgment towards others.

4) Refrain from complaining but be creative and supportive to the leaders and team.

5) Make a conscience effort to interact with all team members. Please refrain from any romantic interests with any team members or Haitians.

6) Team members are encouraged to restrain from any alcohol, tobacco or drug use during the trip.

7) Travel/team expenses should be paid in full prior to the departure.

Please feel free to discuss any of these expectations with us!

Communication while in Haiti

Before leaving the country, the leaders will give you necessary contact information for you to give to family members. We also require contact information from each of you to give to a main contact person here in the States.

Food and Water

We will be providing you with ample food to eat and snacks are at hand between meals. We hire Haitian cooks to cook for us at least one meal a day (supper) and we generally eat peanut butter, tuna, or chicken sandwiches at noon. Breakfast is hot cereal, pancakes, French toast, & fruit. We have clean safe water to drink and juice, pop and coffee are provided.

We request you to let us know of any food allergies or special diet needs so that we can accommodate you.

Our Mission House

Beginning in January of 2012, we have moved into our new Mission House. It is located near the village of Verrettes.

We are forever grateful to the individual who donated the funds to make this complex possible.

There are separate male and female dorm rooms, showers, and bathroom facilities. You will sleep on cots with air mattresses.

What Do I Wear?

You will want to wear light breathable clothing. Shorts and t-shirts are easy for men. Women need to wear appropriate length walking shorts or capris, and/or knee length or longer skirts. Sleeveless shirts or tank tops are fine as long as they are not too low cut. No spaghetti straps while ministering off the compound premises. Swimsuits should be modest one-piece style. Please bring a church outfit, which should be a dress or skirt/top combo for gals and nice shirt and pants for guys.

We recommend sturdy close-toed shoes for our daily work, and sturdy sandals are fine for within compound. Flip-flops are necessary for shower time.

All your bedding and towels will be provided while in Haiti. You may bring that special pillow if you wish.

Doctor Recommendations/Visit

We recommend that you visit your family doctor prior to going to Haiti and ask for recommended vaccinations/medications. Please inquire about malaria and Hepatitis A and B. Having an updated tetanus shot (within 5 years for Haiti) is important also.

We have a medical bag supplied with basic meds for cuts, headaches, and stomach issues. We work closely with a hospital that is 5 miles from our compound.

Trip Expenses

The cost of the mission trip is a set price plus your transportation to and from Haiti. Please email us for current rate. We cover everything else you will need in Haiti other than any personal item you may wish to purchase. You will also be responsible for meals while traveling to and from Haiti.
